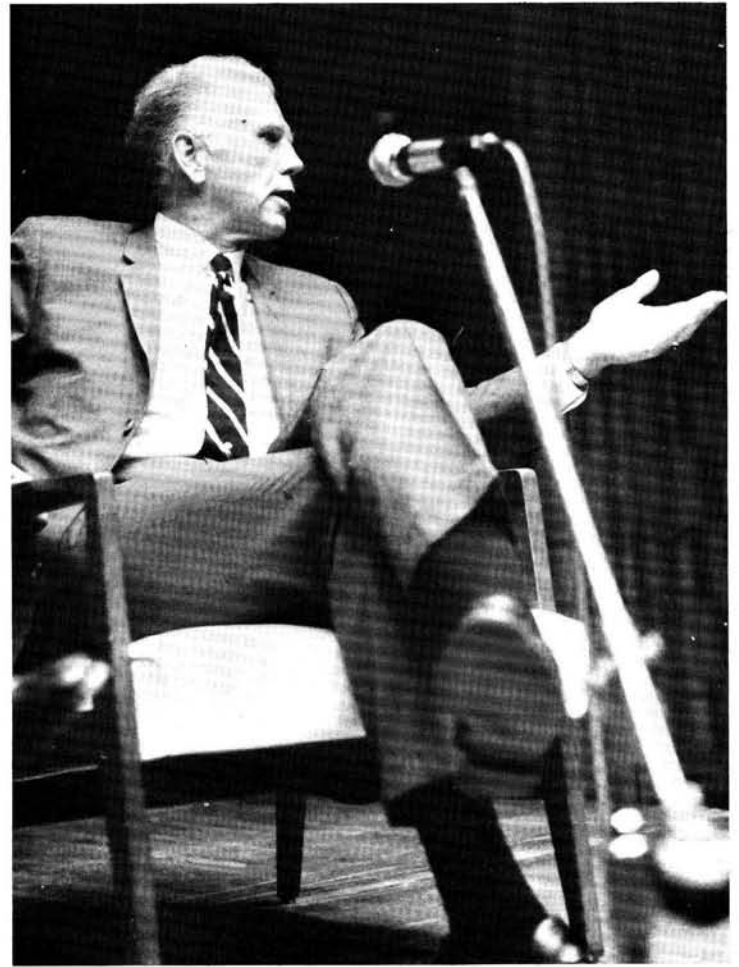
Ashley Schiff was an extraordinary man, dedicated to all he undertook. He was a teacher in every sense of the word. It is to his memory that this book is dedicated.

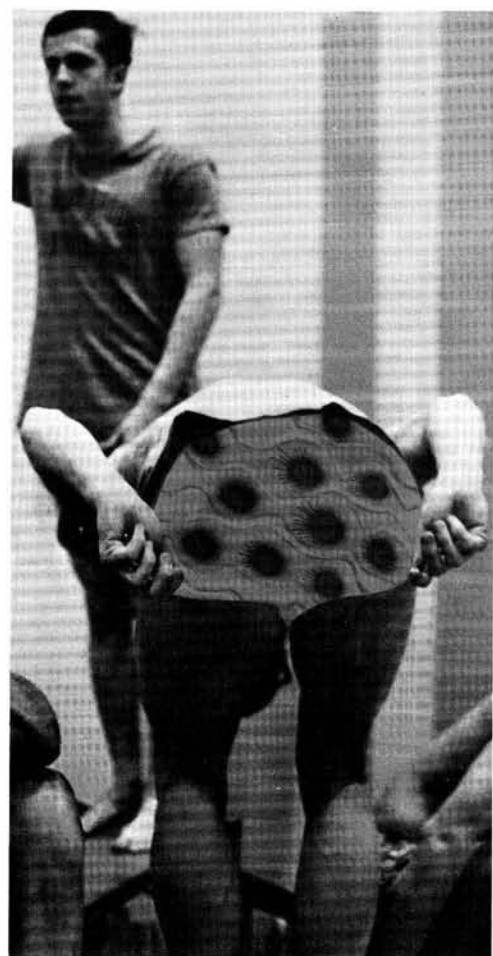




SWIMMING
