

Slepian slept his way to top

Polity President Dan Slepian has slept his way to the top of the student government, a *Statesman* investigation has found.

Accounts from several past and present Polity officers indicate that Slepian used his body for more than just pinning up posters in his three Polity elections. And Slepian has had sex with more than half of the students who voted for him in the electors, *Statesman* has learned.

Former Treasurer Mark Joachim recalled when Slepian won his bid for freshman representative in 1988. "He had sex with all 200 freshmen who voted for him," said Joachim. "Was it a coincidence?"

Former President Sorin Abraham said he objected to Slepian's campaign tactics when the two ran for president and vice president in 1989. "I don't believe in using sex for personal gain," he said. "Besides, he must have been hurting after election day!"

Polity Junior Representative Tom Pye, who has reportedly used similar tactics to win elections, said: "There's no connection between the elections and [Slepian's] sexual conduct. Can he help it if he's a stud?"

Statesman photographers reportedly witnessed a meeting between Slepian and Pye last week, during which the two agreed to run together for office in the upcoming Polity elections. The photographers snapped the above shot of the two cuddling immediately after the agreement.

Slepian and Pye deny any sexual encounter during the eeting.

Statesman has also collected campaign material from Slepian's victories including: "Have your way with Slepian"; "Slepian's behind you"; "Slepian: On your side, on his back."; and "Slepian: He'll do anything for students.'

When asked if he had any knowledge of Slepian sleeping his way to the top, Vice President Joe Mignon replied: "Well, sometimes it seems like he's still sleeping."

In an interview, Slepian admitted using sex to win elections. "If you were gifted with a body like this one, you'd use it to be president too," he said.

"Well, it's not illegal or anything," Slepian continued. "And I always used a condom."

In a *Statesman* poll, 56 percent of students said they had been swayed to vote for Slepian after having sex with the candidate.

Marburger fired; budget cuts cited

University President John Marburger was fired today as a result of Stony Brook's \$8.5 million budget cut.

Marburger was found crying face down on the leather couch in his office with the telephone receiver dangling from his desk, according to Fred Preston, vice president for Student Affairs, who rushed into the

president's office when he heard loud sobs in the next room.

"I picked up the telephone receiver and heard someone shouting 'Jack, Jack, I'm sorry'," said Preston. "It was Mario [Cuomo]." Preston hung up the phone and tried to comfort Marburger.

"I have no comment at this time," said Marburger as he left the office with tissue stuck to his shoe. Kelly

Grads, profs discover time warp

Students who feel that classes take way too long were vindicated last week when a discovery of monumental proportions was

A time warp, the first ever, was discovered by a Stony Brook think-tank consisting of professors and graduate students of physics, calculus and philosophy. These studies have confirmed suspicions and hypotheses that have pervaded the scientific and academic community for years.

This time anomaly, verified through mathematical computations, physical research and really intense thought is proof that, what is thought of as a normal flow of time is not the true case. The truth is that each hour spent in a class environment is, in reality, an average of three to four times longer than time spent outside of the class environment.

This would account for the feeling students often express that classes seem to take forever," said philosophy professor Gary Mar. "In fact, that is what led the group to turn their research the direction

"We are able to determine that the warp becomes active when the student first enters the classroom," said mathematics professor Lowell Jones. "It was also found that there is a synergistic effect as more students enter the class. In layman's terms: the more people, the greater the time stretch.

Along with an increase of class time, there is a resulting decrease of leisure and free time.

"Even if class related work is being done, the time field is sped up," said associate professor of physics, Richard A. Mould. "This is why deadlines for class projects and homework assignments come faster than students expect."

Though the theory had been tossed around the brain-trust for some time, the crucial breakthrough was made over spring break. "We are supposed to have a period of nine days off over spring break," said 23- year-old physics graduate student Max Toshiba. "But as the sixth day of the break approached, I realized that only two or three days had passed."

Toshiba recalled, "I sped to my personal computer and fed it the information I had gathered. I wasn't that surprised by the response I received. Passage of time was severely increased."

The time warp, however, still remains a partial mystery. "Due to the differences in class schedules, students are affected at different times," said physics professor Peter B. Kahn. "We feel that it may be some sort of personal time field."

Maxwell buys The Press

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
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First the bus fee, now the bench fee

The University Budget Committee passed a resolution this weekend that will have students pay a \$.50 fee every time they use a bench on campus.

The bench toll will go into effect May 1, 1991. Campus officials said the money raised will go to placing backs on the benches on the main campus.

The University plans to enforce the bench fee by putting meters next to each bench (the meters are similar to those used for automobiles). Fifty cents will buy any student, regardless of race, color, or creed (remember- we in the Stony Brook Community don't discriminate- we'll take anybody's money) a half hour of sitting time. Anyone caught sitting on a bench without paying or over the alloted time will be fined \$75.64. A second offense could mean offenders will be physically forced to attend a performance at the Staller Arts Center.

Campus spokesmodel, Bunny Boo Boo said, "We need to raise this money. It is very unhealthy to sit on a bench that has no support for one's back. It causes back spasms, boils, gangrene, and in some cases,


pimples of the buttocks, which are gross. We are not only doing this [the bench fee] for health reasons, but we'd also like to beautify the campus, which is gross, too."

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
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
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
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
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
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
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Until They All Come Down

On January 17, 1991, President George Bush began Operation Desert Storm and Stony Brookstudents put up yellow ribbons to support the troops in the gulf. Two months later, the war has ended but the ribbons are still around.

A group called Until They All Come Down is prepared to meet the challenge of ridding the scenery of the tattered, weathered ribbons.

"We will not stop working until they all come down, hence the name," said group president, Jake "Jimbo" Jimbrowski. He is one of a select handful of individuals who take pride in their work — and the University's donation of five dollars an hour.

"Oh sure we'll miss Jack, but it's an \$8 million load off my mind. C'mon let's get some pizza," said Cuomo. "My treat."

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


"MUTANT DOGLADY FROM HELL"

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

Hockey team finds a home; Laxmen 'Sainted'

To ease the travel burdens of the homeless Patriot ice hockey team, University president John Marburger has decided to transform the pit gracing G Quad into an ice rink.

"We will knock down the plants, enclose the space, flood the pit with extensive application of Nitrogen so that our hockey team can finally have a place to call home," Marburger explained. "We feel the pit is a prime location. Tenants of Gray, Amman, Irving and O'Neill can watch the games from their windows. Some will probably even charge people who want to watch along with them in the comfort and confines of the rooms. We're very excited about this."

University president John Marburger is excited to have such a talented athlete representing Stony Brook. "It will defi-



Iraqi Foreign Minister heads to Garden
