May your journey be full of happiness.

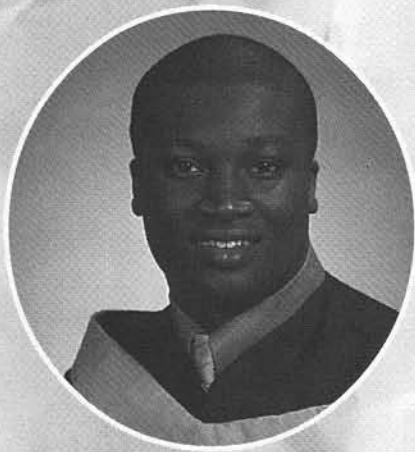

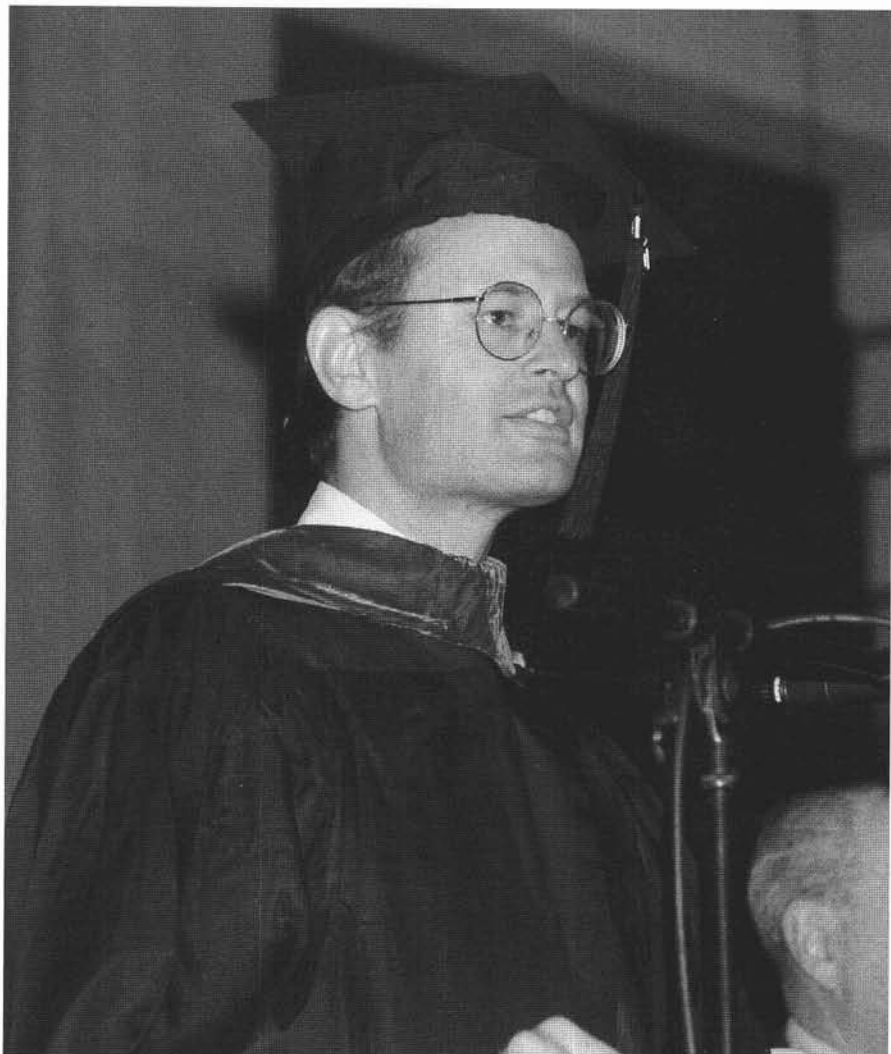
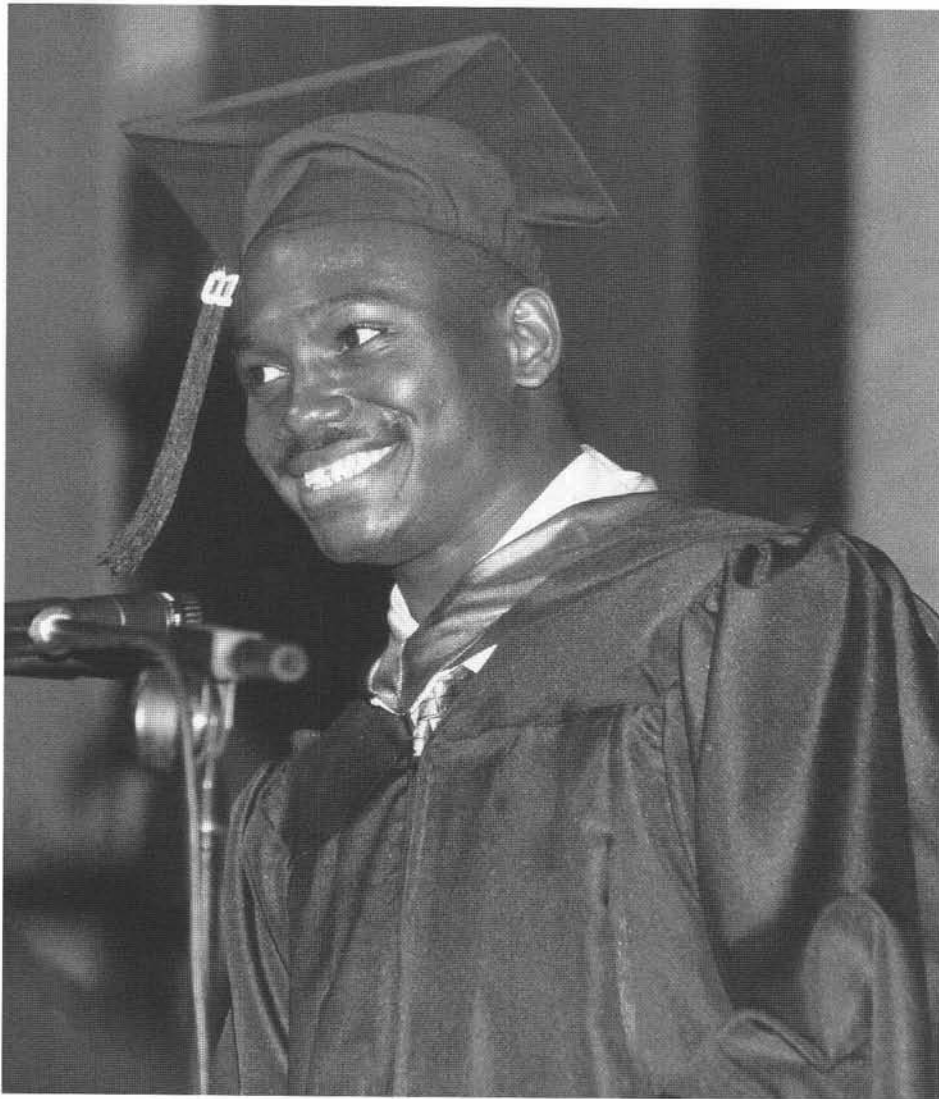




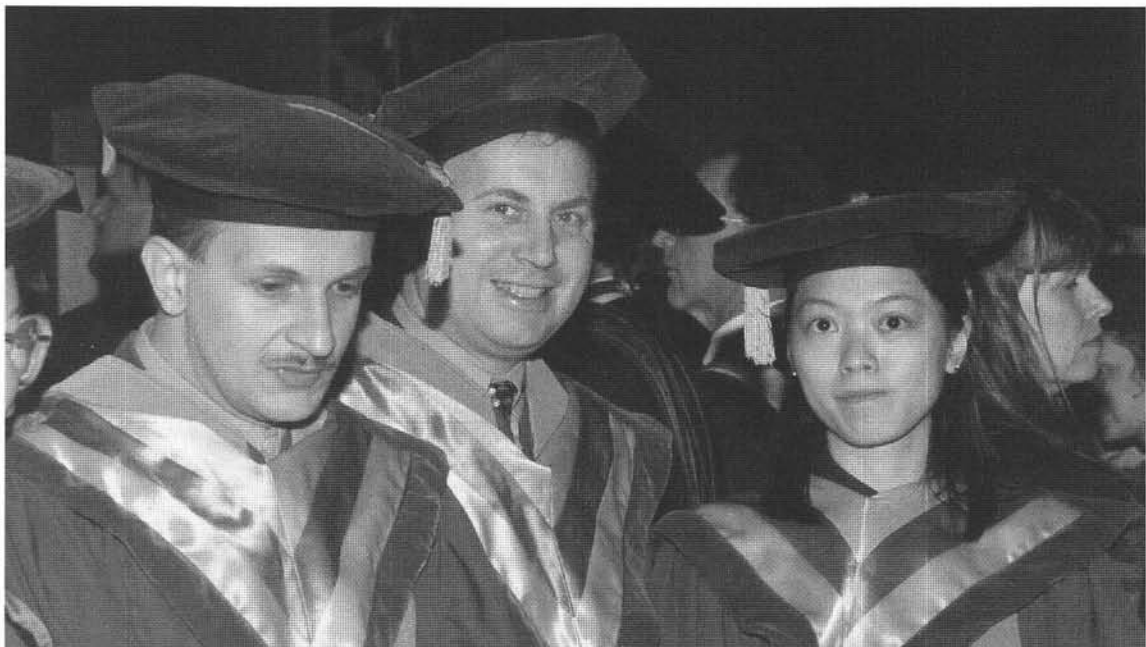
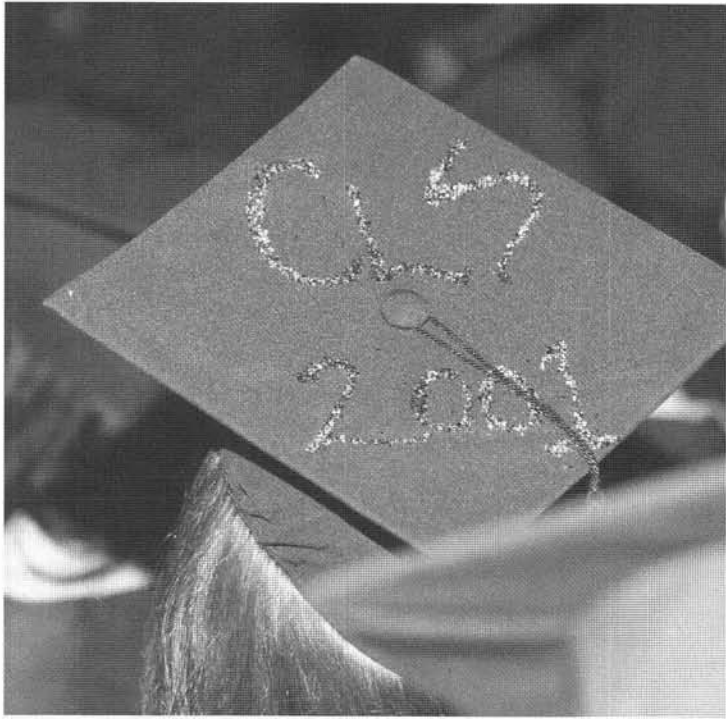


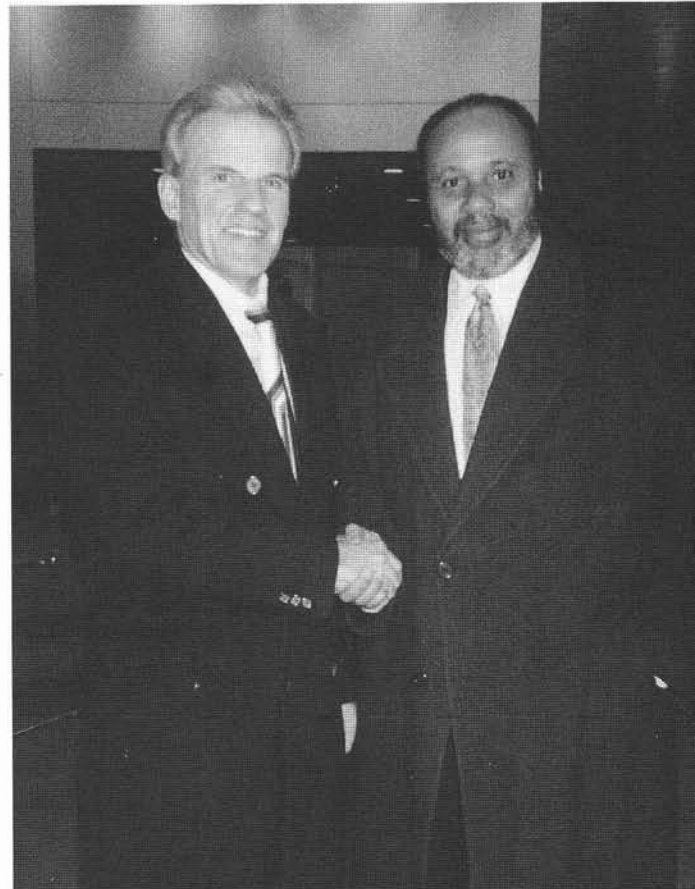
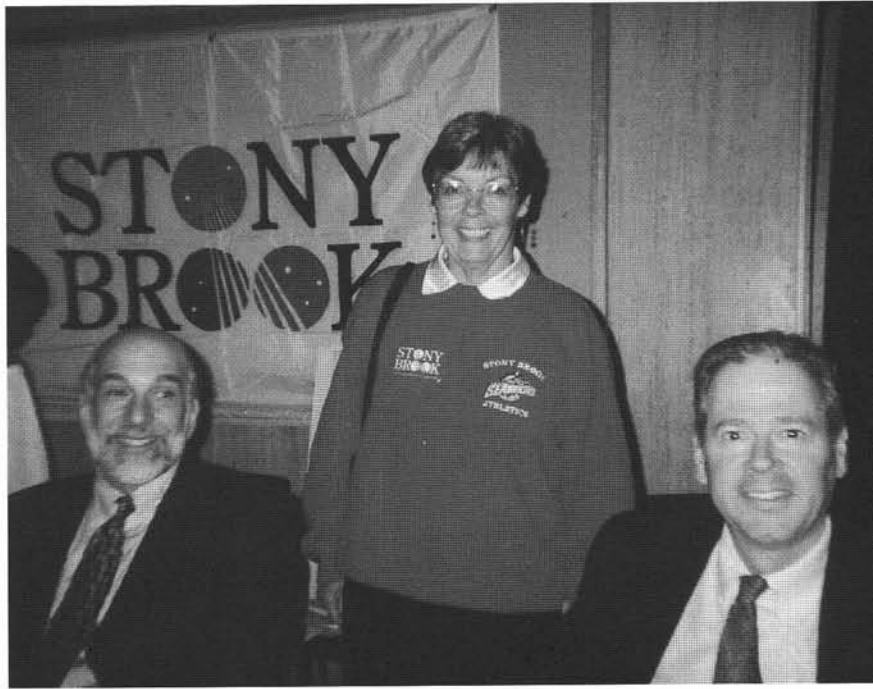


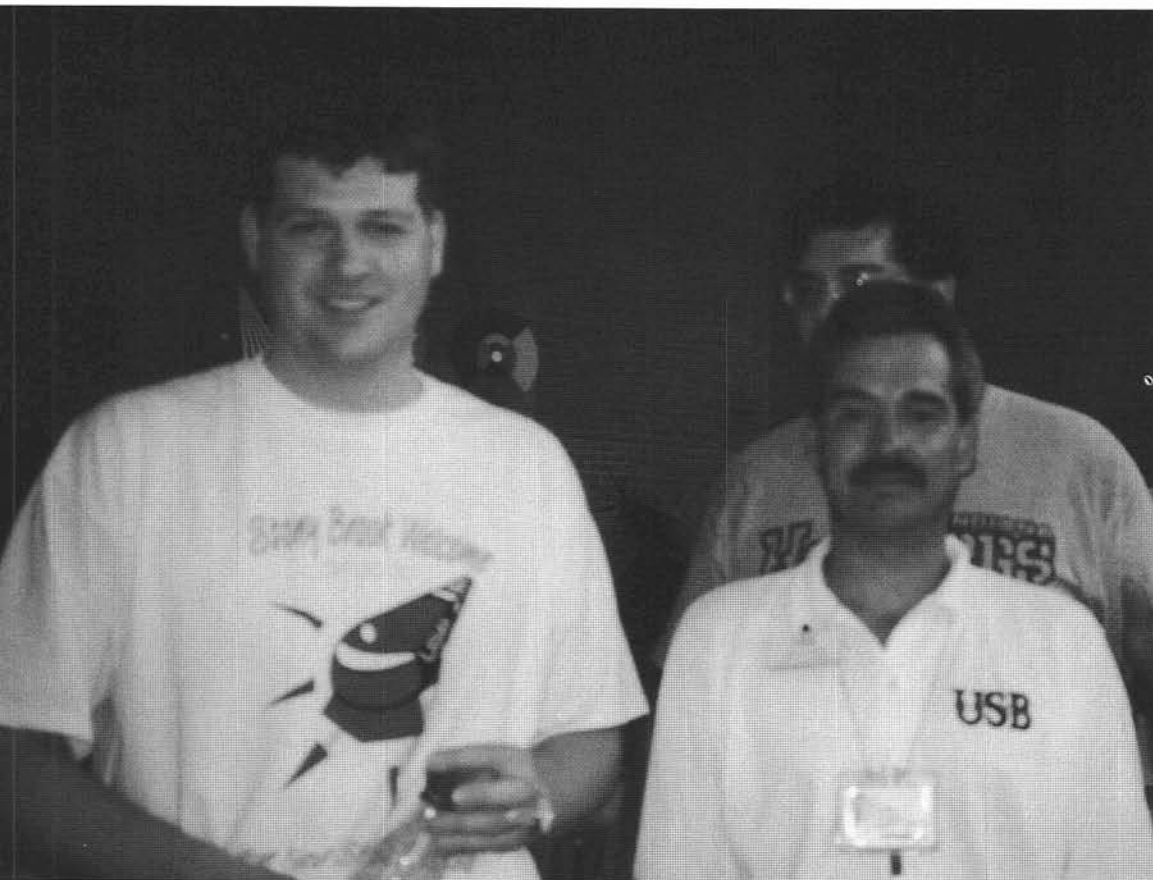




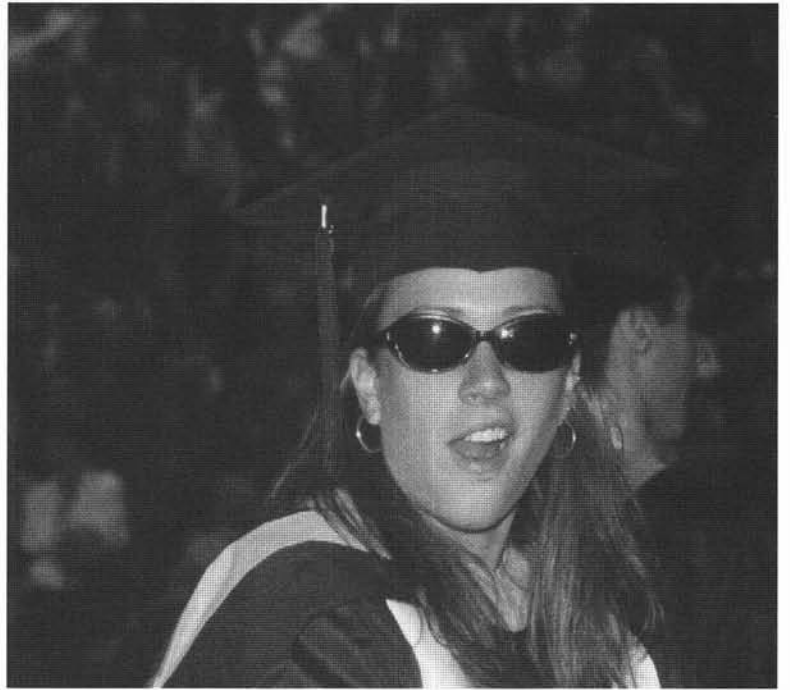
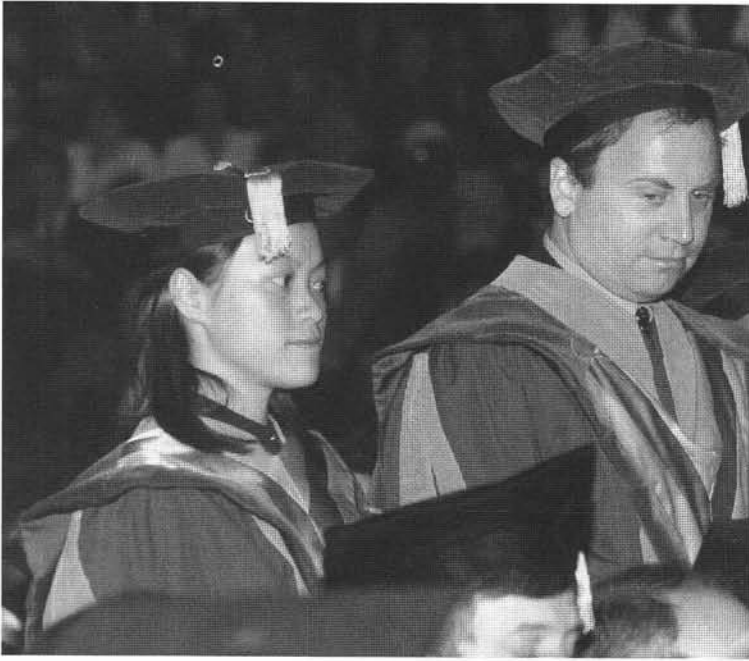












Stony Brook Soars: An Overview

Stony Brook is a 1,100-acre universe where world-renowned faculty have created a stimulating, highly interactive environment for undergraduate studies. With exceptional strength in the sciences, mathematics, humanities, fine arts, social sciences, engineering, and health professions, Stony Brook offers an array of challenging, career-building programs.

Established in 1957 as part of the State University of New York system, Stony Brook has grown at a prodigious rate and is now recognized as one of the nation's finest public universities. There are approximately 1,682 faculty and 19,831 students.

Stony Brook has been classified as a Type 1 research university, which is the highest distinction granted to fewer than 2 percent of all colleges and universities nationwide. This reflects Stony Brook's high volume of federally sponsored research and its emphasis on scholarship. Funding for research programs has grown faster than at almost any other university, making it the major research campus in SUNY, the largest public university system in the country.

A recent study published by Johns Hopkins University Press found Stony Brook to be one of the top public research universities in the nation. Measuring such criteria as the number of fellowships awarded and the volume of articles published by faculty in major scholarly journals, the study awarded Stony Brook high ratings in each of the major disciplinary categories. Stony Brook is quickly becoming the national model for undergraduate education at a research university.

In addition to its leading position as a research center, Stony Brook offers excellent instructional programs in a broad spectrum of academic subjects. Internationally recognized faculty members teach courses from the undergraduate to the doctoral level in more than 100 undergraduate and graduate degree programs. The academic and cultural resources of the University and the surrounding community provide a superb environment for intellectual and personal growth.

Our Surroundings

Close to the historic village of Stony Brook at the geographic midpoint of Long Island, the University campus lies about 60 miles east of Manhattan and 60 miles west of Montauk Point, convenient both to New York City's urban vitality and cultural attractions and the tranquil countryside and beautiful seashore of eastern Suffolk County. It is only a short drive to some of New York State's richest farmland and fishing grounds, the spectacular Atlantic beaches at Fire Island, the elegant resorts of the Hamptons, the craggy bluffs and natural harbors along Long Island Sound, and the picturesque village greens and gracious old homes of the North Shore towns. The internationally recognized research facilities of Brookhaven National Laboratory and Cold Spring Harbor Laboratory are nearby. And a two-hour train ride will bring you to the heart of one of the most exciting cities in the world.

The Campus

Ongoing campus beautification has created an atmosphere that encourages students and faculty to interact. The new fountain in the center of the six-acre Academic Mall has become a focal point for social activity. Surrounding the fountain are lawns, shrubs, gardens, trees, and a brook that cascades down steps leading to the campus's main entrance. A nature preserve, bicycle paths, park benches, an apple orchard, and a duck pond are interspersed among the spacious plazas, modern laboratories and classroom buildings, a performing arts center, and the rising walls of the new Asian American Cultural Center, being built with a major gift from Charles B. Wang, founder and CEO of Computer Associates.

At the center of West Campus stands the Frank Melville, Jr. Library, which holds more than 2 million bound volumes and some 3 million in microformat; around the library are the major academic buildings for the Colleges of Arts and Sciences and Engineering and Applied Sciences, the Van De Graaff nuclear accelerator, the Administration Building, Jacob K. Javits Lecture Center, Computer Science Building, Educational Communications Center, Computing Center, the Stony Brook Union, Indoor Sports Complex, and other service build-

ings. The Museum of Long Island Natural Sciences, located in the Earth and Space Sciences Building, displays dioramas of Long Island's natural landscape and special temporary exhibits.

The Student Activities Center features a food court and dining hall, study and assembly areas, and an auditorium. The center provides a focal point for the extracurricular activities that are an important part of life on campus. By the end of 2001, there will be two large multi-purpose rooms, an expanded wellness center, and an art gallery.

Stony Brook's Staller Center for the Arts provides superb performing arts facilities, where artists of international stature appear. The Staller Center also houses the departments of Theatre Arts, Music, and Art. A broad plaza (where outdoor concerts are held) connects the Melville Library, Stony Brook Union, and the Staller Center.

Encircling the academic buildings are several residential quadrangles, each with living space for about 1,000 students. The quads are made up of three to five coeducational "colleges," or residence halls, each housing 200 to 400 students. About 60 percent of the undergraduate student body lives on campus. The quads are the basic social units for this on-campus population, providing residence halls, study and social space, and dining facilities. There is a 240-unit complex of one-, two- and three-bedroom apartments near the Health Sciences Center, and a 220-bed apartment building on the southwest corner of campus.

Rising dramatically above the woods on East Campus is the Health Sciences Center, which provides academic and support areas for five professional schools and University Hospital, a 500-bed facility that admitted its first patients in 1980 and has since become a nationally significant teaching hospital. (A recent study ranked it as one of the top 15 teaching hospitals in the country.) Also on the East Campus is the Long Island High Technology Incubator, an important link to local business, which opened its doors to 20 start-up companies in biotechnology and other high technology fields in October, 1992.

South of the academic cluster is the 20-acre Ashley Schiff Nature Preserve. Beyond these woods, and linked to the rest of campus by shuttle bus service

are 11 functionally adaptable single-story buildings housing the Marine Sciences Research Center and the School of Dental Medicine. Across Nicolls Road lies more student housing, and the 350-bed Long Island State Veterans Home, which was completed in the fall of 1991.

Stony Brook Students

Undergraduates at Stony Brook can choose from over 50 majors, offered through the College of Arts and Sciences, the College of Engineering and Applied Sciences, the Health Sciences Center, Marine Sciences Research Center, and the W. Averell Harriman School for Management and Policy.

The University's enrollment for 2000 was 19,831. Currently there are 13,527 undergraduate and 6,574 graduate students at Stony Brook. Many students are also enrolled part-time in late afternoon and evening courses offered by several departments and by the School of Professional Development.

The majority of Stony Brook's undergraduates—95 percent—come from New York State; 52 percent of these are from Nassau and Suffolk counties and 36 percent from New York City. At any one time more than 100 Stony Brook students are studying abroad in approved exchange programs spread across the globe, in countries such as France, Poland, Italy, Bolivia, Jamaica, Spain, Germany, England, and Korea. International students representing some 75 countries are attending Stony Brook.

The overwhelming majority of first-time, full-time Stony Brook students are still in attendance after their first year. Many students who do not remain full-time return for continued study at a later date, while others go on to another college. Approximately 55 percent of each incoming freshman class graduates from Stony Brook; 36 percent in four years, and an additional 19 percent after their fourth year. The graduation rate exceeds the national rate of approximately 50 percent.

The University aims at the highest standards in all of its programs. Its record of placing graduates in the nation's best

graduate and professional schools shows that these standards are being maintained, and that an educational experience of high quality is available to the broad and diverse student body at Stony Brook.

Stony Brook Faculty

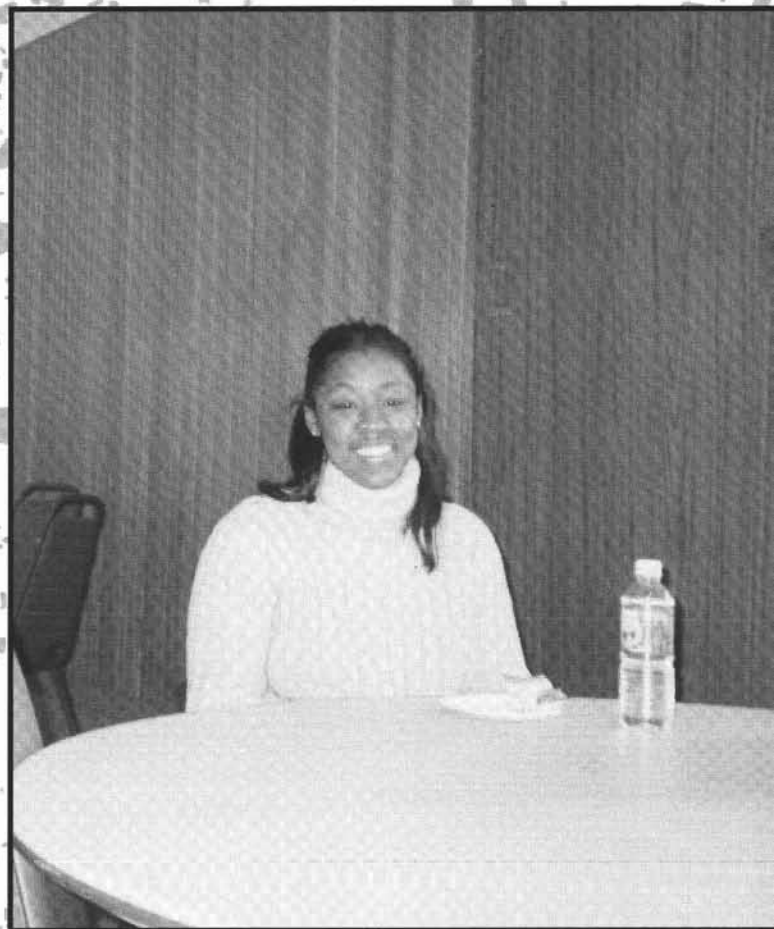
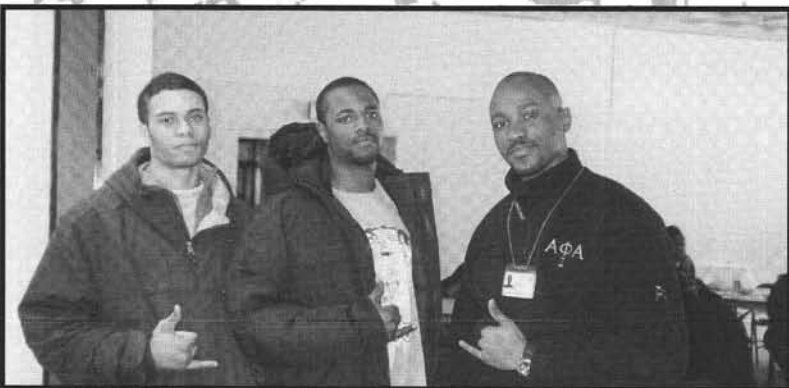
The vast majority of Stony Brook's 1,682 faculty members hold doctoral degrees, and 90 percent or more are engaged in active research leading to publication, much of it supported by external grants and contracts. It was the productivity and high quality of our faculty that helped earn Stony Brook a ranking among the best public universities in the country. The faculty-student ratio is about one faculty member for every 18 students.

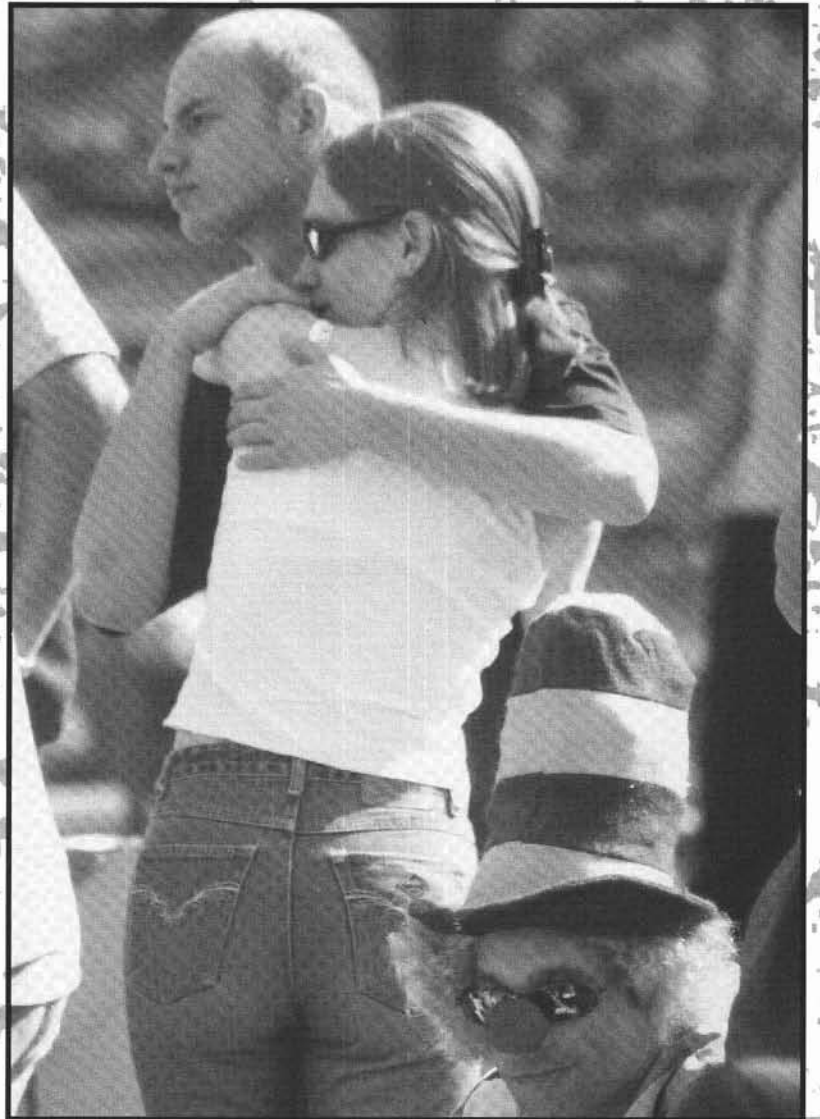
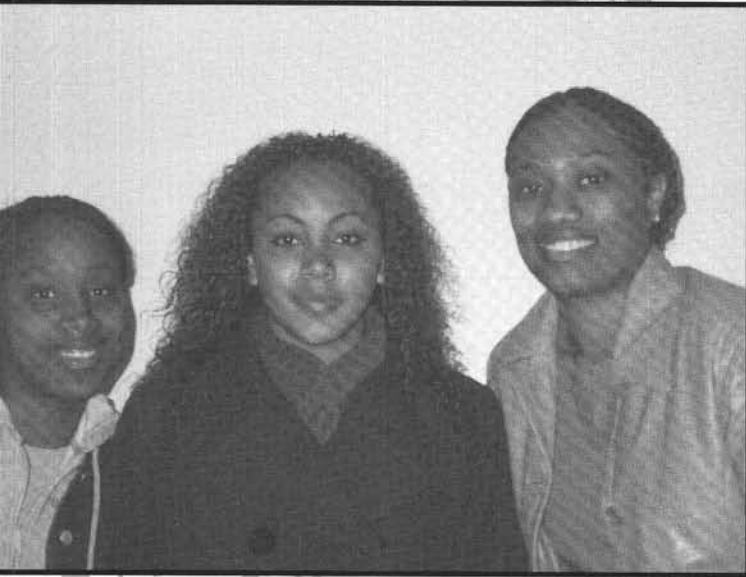
Eminent faculty members include numerous internationally recognized scholars. Many have earned high honors in their fields, such as Einstein Professor C.N. Yang, a Nobel laureate in Physics; John Milnor in Mathematics, winner of the prestigious Fields Medal; and MacArthur fellows John Fleagle, professor of Anatomical Sciences, Paul Adams, professor of Neurobiology and Behavior, Patricia Wright, associate professor of Anthropology, and Daniel Monk, assistant professor of Art. Pulitzer-prize-winning poet Louis Simpson in English and Obie-winning poet, playwright, and activist Amiri Baraka in Africana Studies—these are only some of the best-known. Other eminent faculty members include: University Professor John H. Marburger in Physics and Electrical Engineering, former president of the University at Stony Brook; Distinguished Professors K. Daniel O'Leary in Psychology, Gerald E. Brown in Physics, James Glimm in Applied Mathematics and Statistics, Benjamin Chu in Chemistry, Lorne Mendell in Neurobiology and Behavior, Robert Sokal in Ecology and Evolution, Edward Reich in Pharmacological Sciences, H. Blaine Lawson, Jr. in Mathematics, Janos Kirz in Physics, Iwao Ojima in Chemistry, Theodosios Pavlidis in Computer Science, Felix Rapaport in Surgery, and Louis Ripa in Children's Dentistry; Distinguished Professors Emeriti Lewis Coser in Sociology, Jacob Bigeleisen in Chemistry, Seymour Cohen in Pharmacology, and Charles Rosen in Music; Distinguished Teaching Professors

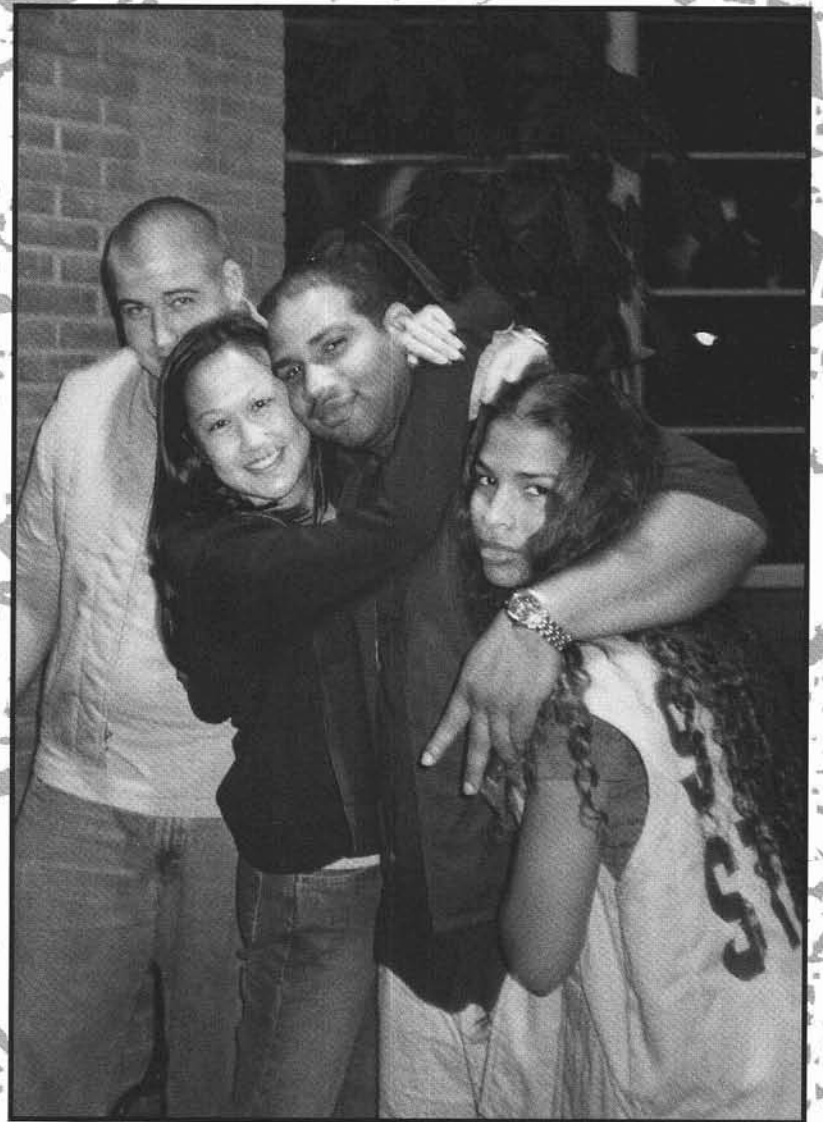
Stony Brook's distinguished faculty is also proud to include 11 members of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, 12 members of the National Academy of Sciences, and three members of the National Academy of Engineering. More than 300 scholars from 40 countries pursue research here and teach at Stony Brook throughout the year.

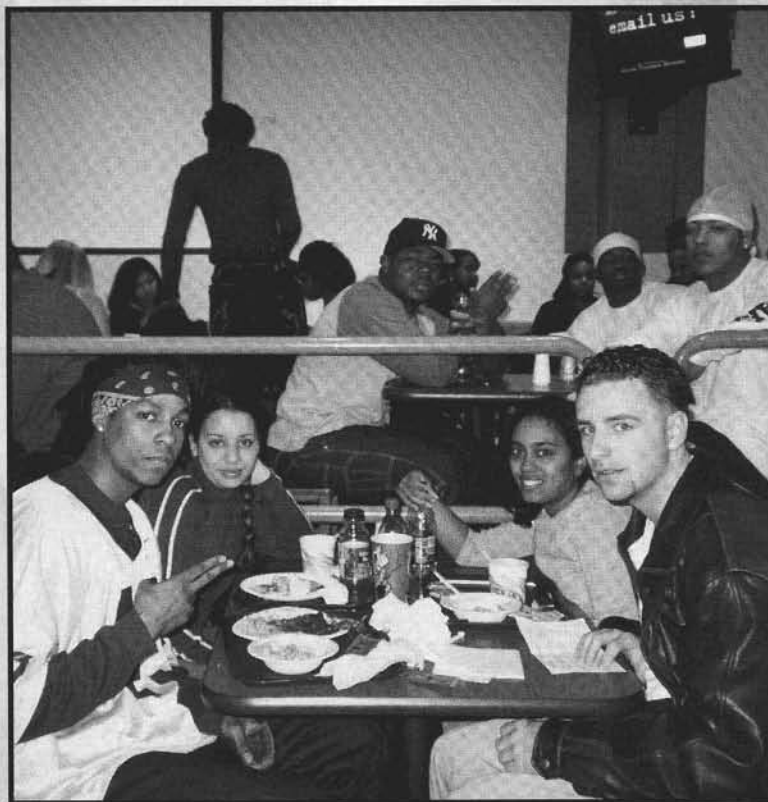
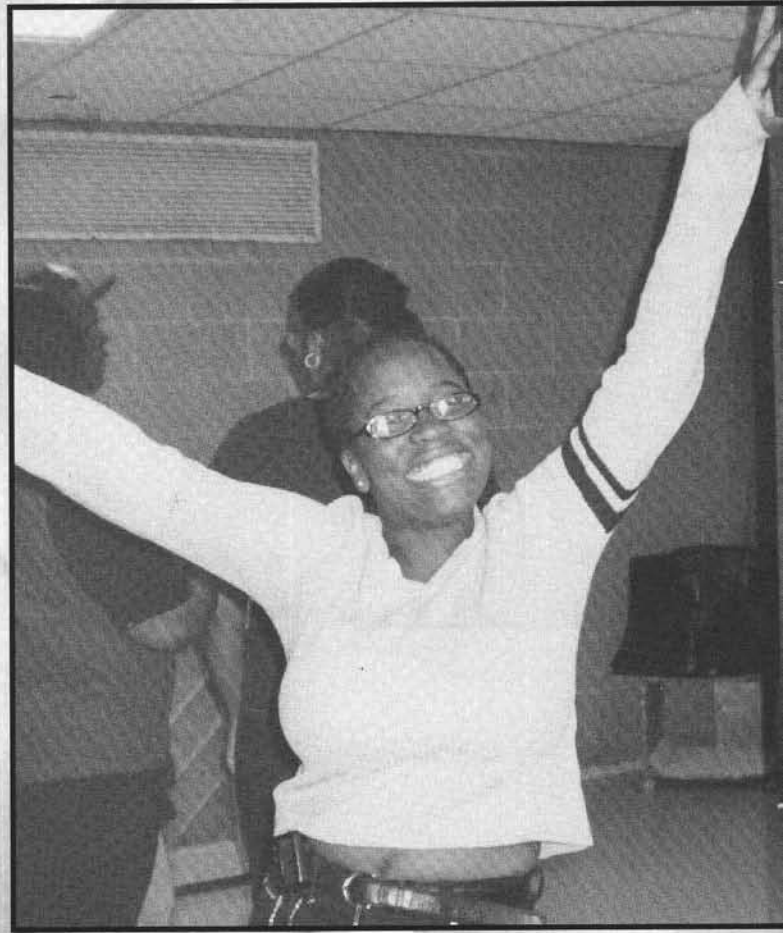
The 1994 Middle States Reaccreditation Report observes that "Stony Brook has been strikingly successful in developing its research enterprise." In 1998-99, Stony Brook generated \$112 million in annual research activity from sources outside Long Island. Nearly 1,900 sponsored projects are being pursued, including scientific studies, training programs, public-service projects, educational activities, and library support. Among the hundreds of subjects currently under examination by faculty and students are cancer, arthritis, diabetes, lasers, semi-conductor chips, recombinant DNA, the mathematics of nonlinear systems, three-dimensional imaging systems, the psychology of political attitudes and behavior, the social history of American slavery, the interface between art and science, and urban problems and their solutions.



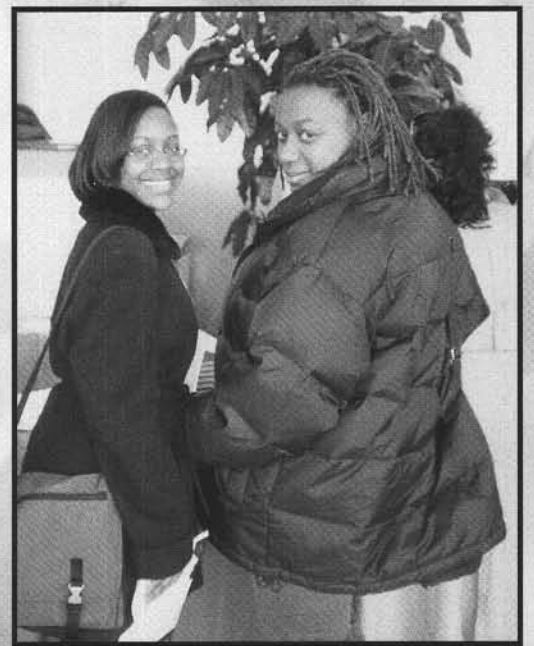


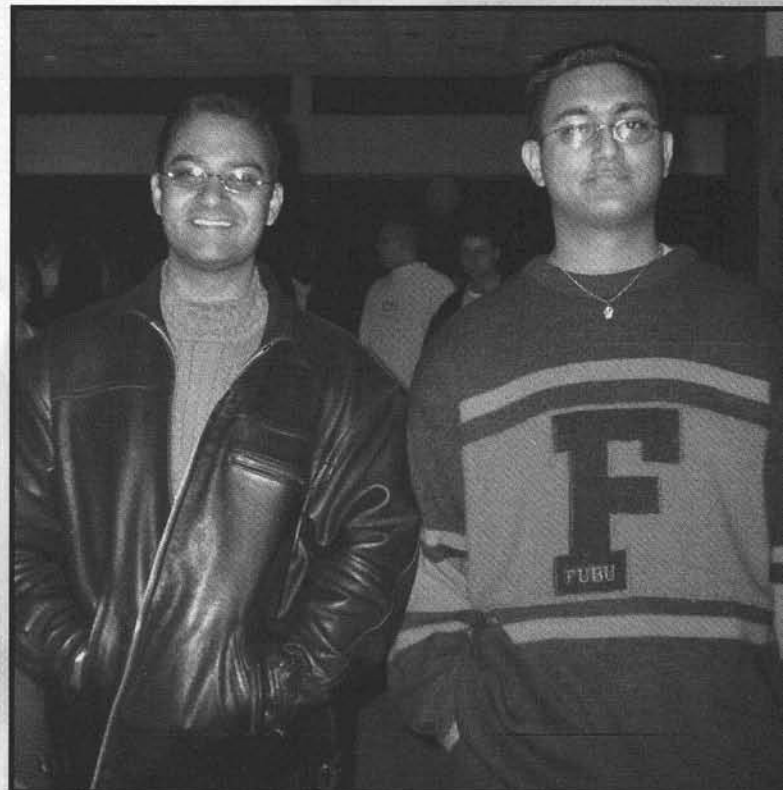
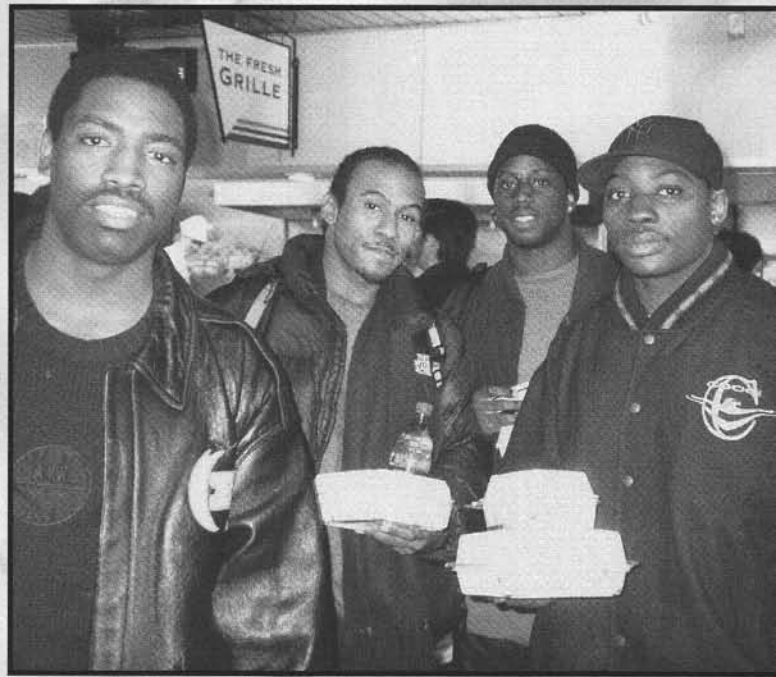




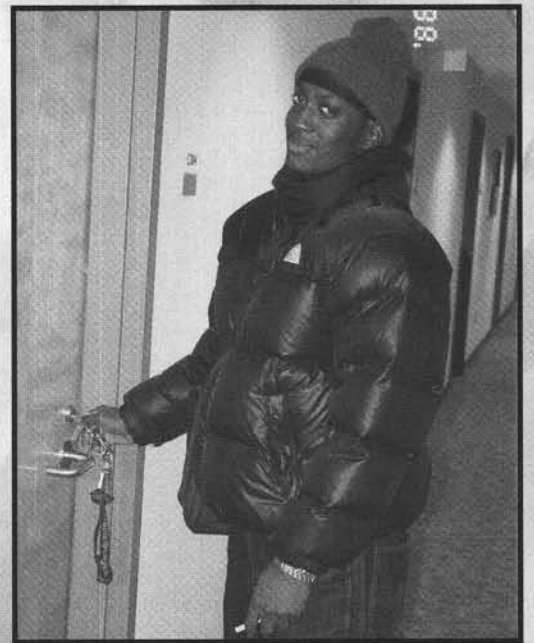
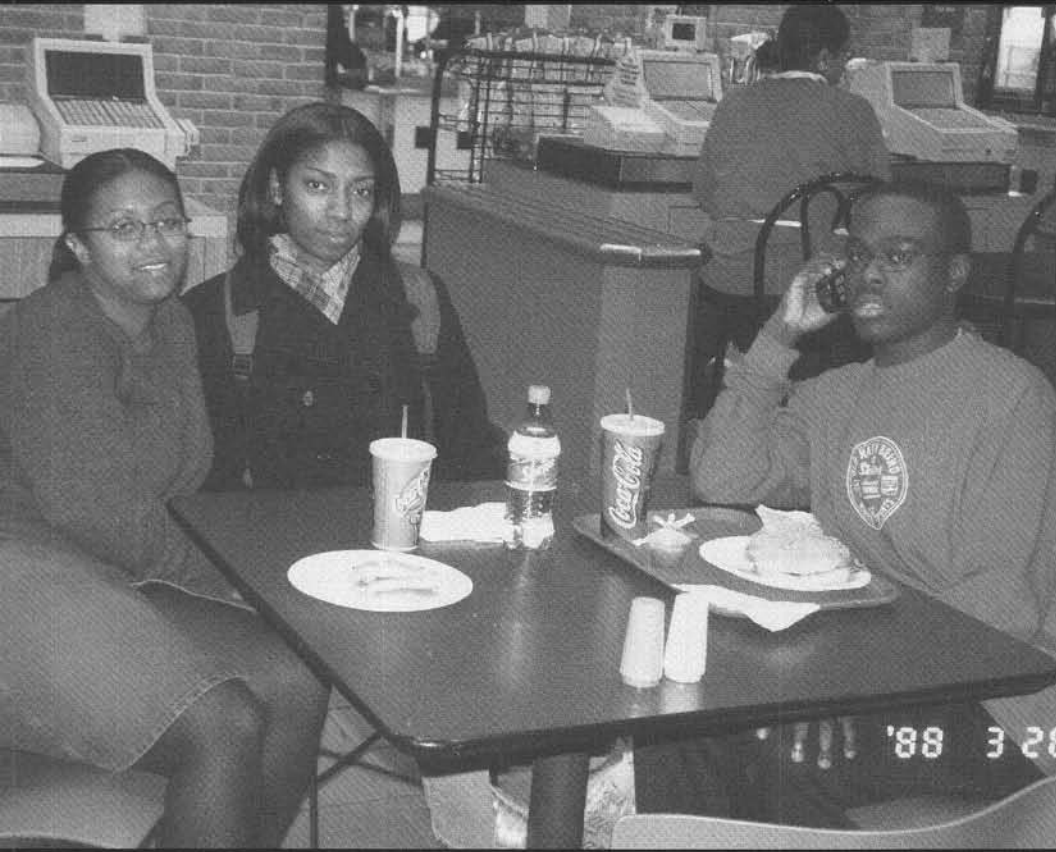


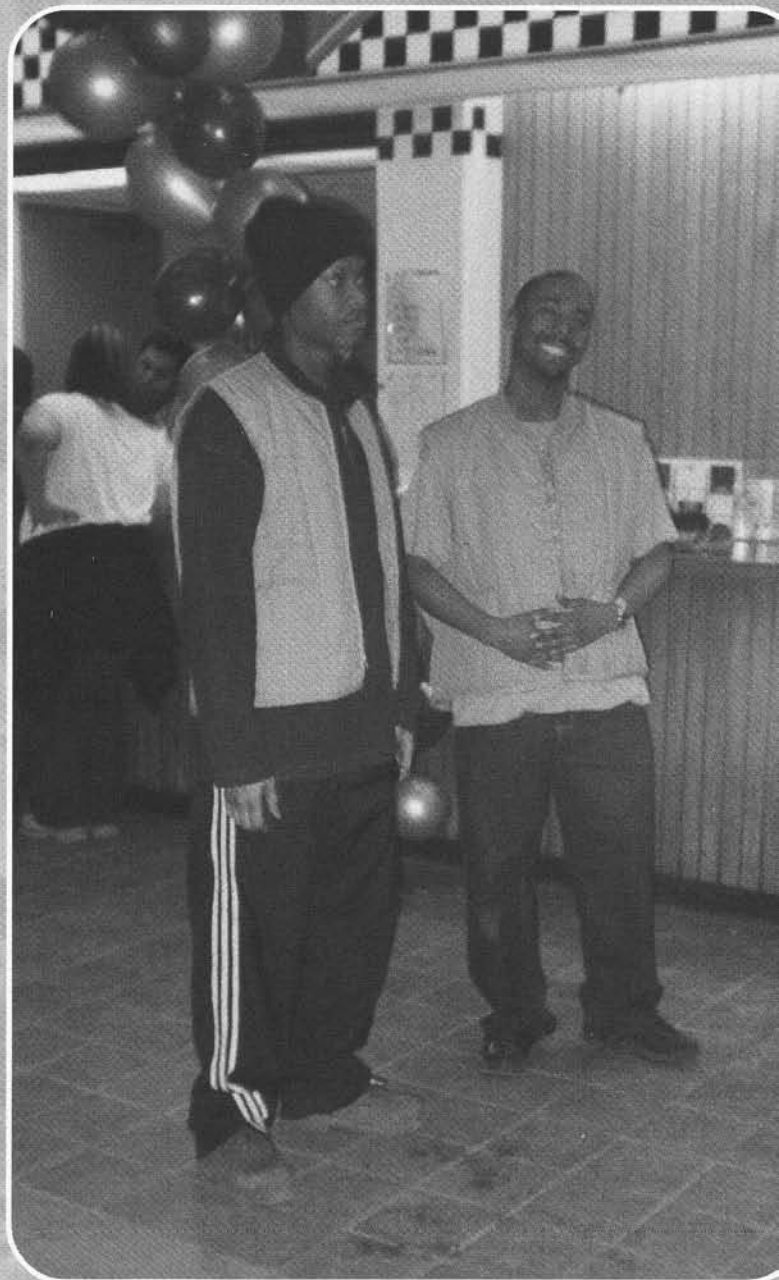

▲ Gas prices soar across Europe. Heavy taxation policies in France and England cause massive protests and transportation blockades. Both governments eventually promise relief.

✓ The Millennium Bridge, a footbridge across the River Thames connecting London's St. Paul Cathedral with the Tate Modern Art Gallery, opens in June. It is the first bridge to be built over the Thames in 100 years.



▲ Former KGB agent Vladimir Putin is sworn into office as Russia's new president in May 2000, succeeding long-time leader Boris Yeltsin. Despite fears of an authoritarian style, Putin's public approval ratings remain high.



▲ Floods in Southeast Asia are caused by days of pounding rain. Millions are forced to leave their homes and more than a thousand people die in the region's worst flooding in decades.



▲ President Clinton travels to Southeast Asia in November to help mend relations between the United States and Vietnam. He is the first U.S. president to visit Vietnam since the end of the war in 1975.



▲ A cable car carrying skiers and snowboarders in Austria catches fire inside a tunnel, killing more than 150 people on board. It is the worst Alpine disaster in the country's history.



▲ Yugoslav President Slobodan Milosevic is ousted from office in October, ending 13 years of violent rule. Vojislav Kostunica becomes Yugoslavia's first democratically elected president.

✓ Australian street artists called "Strange Fruit" perform gravity-defying feats around the world. The performers float above the audience on 15-foot fiberglass poles.

President Clinton makes a last-ditch effort to broker a Middle East peace deal before his term ends in January 2001 by drafting a plan for leaders of both Israel and Palestine to review. Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Barak and Palestinian Yasser Arafat agree to review Clinton's proposal, but no deal is signed before month's end.

A Singapore Airlines jumbo jet crashes during takeoff in Taiwan, killing 81 of the 179 people on board. In a blinding rainstorm the pilot uses the wrong runway and collides with construction equipment.



▲ Canada mourns the death of former Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau, who served the country for nearly 16 years. Trudeau, who was 80, is remembered for his flamboyant style and his commitment to keeping Canada a single nation.

▲ Two hundred North and South Koreans separated from family members since the 1950-1953 Korean war reunite in August. The four-day visits are a goodwill gesture by both countries' leaders, who met for the first time in June.

▼ In August, the Russian nuclear submarine *Kursk* sinks to the bottom of the Barents Sea after an unexplained explosion. All 118 crew members are killed.

AIDS reaches epidemic proportions in southern Africa. Leaders and citizens throughout the world conduct a massive educational campaign on World AIDS Day December 1 to teach people about the disease that is killing 6,000 sub-Saharan Africans each day.

Uganda is struck by an occurrence of the deadly Ebola virus that is linked to more than 100 deaths. The outbreak is traced to a Gulu woman who died in September and whose body infected other people during the ritual cleansing of the dead.

▲ In January 2001, a 7.9 magnitude earthquake devastates Gujarat in western India. The huge quake causes an estimated \$5.5 billion in damages and kills more than 20,000 people.

▲ In August, Somalia elects its first president in nine years. President Abdiqasim Salad Hassan promises to bring peace and economic recovery to the African nation.

✓ The U.S. Senate passes the Permanent Normal Trade Relations bill in September to open up trade between the United States and China. The bill is expected to increase U.S. exports by \$13 billion annually.

▲ Firestone initiates the largest tire recall in history after dozens of rollover accidents appear to be caused by faulty treads. At least 148 deaths in the United States are linked to the defective tires, although other problems with sport utility vehicles also are under investigation.

▲ Summer air travelers wait out some of the worst flight delays on record. Bad weather and heavy air traffic cause delays that reach a peak in June, when only 66% of the flights arrive on time.

☐ Convicted of monopoly practices in the software industry, Microsoft Corporation is ordered by a federal district judge in June to break into two separate companies. Company chairman Bill Gates files for an appeal.

A wave of Internet startup companies, once the darlings of the online economy, file for bankruptcy after falling short of stockholders' earnings expectations. The NASDAQ stock exchange, where most dot-coms are traded, loses 39% of its value for the year.

Millions of Californians go for hours without power in January 2001 as utility companies cut off electrical supply due to low reserves. The crisis, blamed on aging generating plants, deregulation, soaring wholesale prices and debt-ridden utilities, spurs other states to begin devising prevention plans.

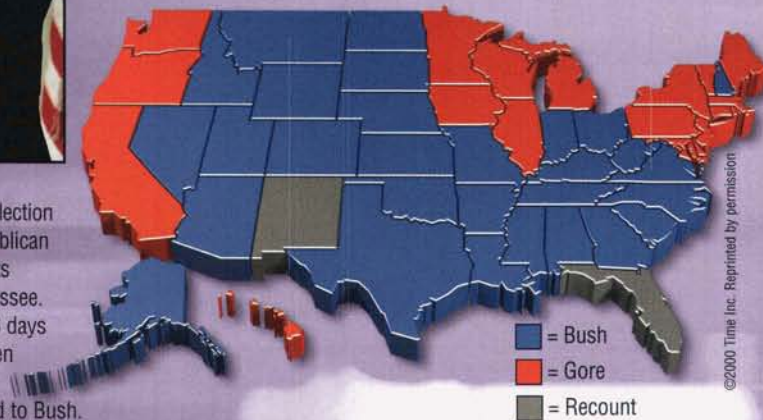

▲ In the closest presidential election in more than 100 years, Republican George W. Bush of Texas beats Democrat Al Gore from Tennessee. The race isn't decided until 36 days after the popular election, when Florida's hotly contested 25 electoral votes are awarded to Bush.

▼ On December 4, 2000, the U.S. presidency remains in limbo as both Florida and New Mexico officials recount ballots to determine who will win their state's electoral votes. New Mexico goes to Gore. Ultimately, Bush wins Florida which gives him a narrow victory.

On election night, several TV networks prematurely declare Al Gore the winner in Florida, only later to reverse themselves, twice. The fiasco confirms many Americans' distrust of polling and early "calling" of elections.

In one of his first duties as President-elect, George W. Bush nominates Colin Powell to be Secretary of State. The four-star Army General becomes the first African-American in history to serve in this role.

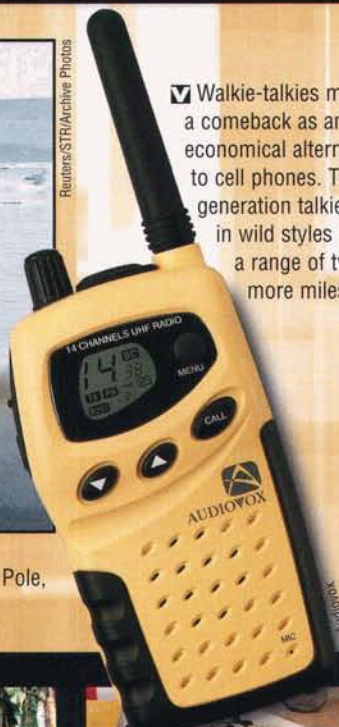

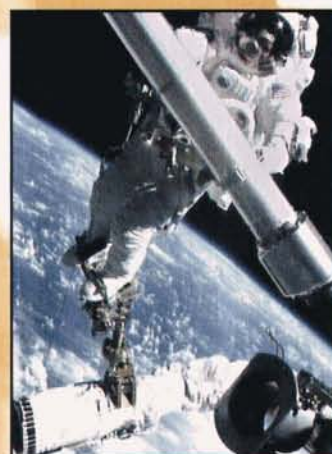

Scientists are forced to rethink the traditional definitions of a star and planet when 18 massive planet-like bodies that don't revolve around a sun are discovered in the Sigma Orionis cluster.

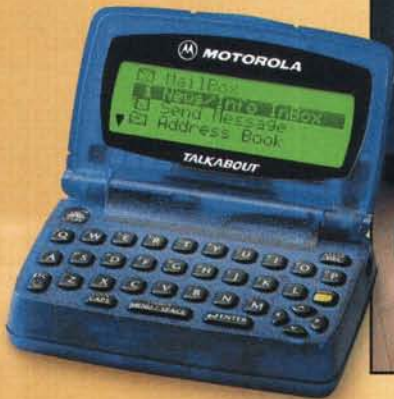

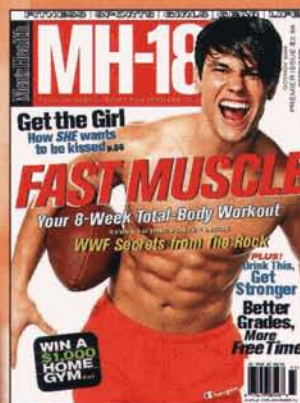

▲ American Heritage, among other publishers, releases new dictionaries, capturing the language of our computer-savvy culture. "Dot-com," "netiquette" and "cybersurfing" are among the new entries.



▲ Pleather, a synthetic fabric that looks like leather, comes in an array of colors and prints and is popularized by celebrities like singer Christina Aguilera.

▼ Techno pants, as functional as last year's cargoes but with cleaner lines and nylon fabric, are popular with teens. They come in a variety of colors and feature zippered legs and pockets, toggles and nylon drawstrings.



▲ Laser eye surgery becomes an increasingly accepted alternative to eyeglasses and contact lenses as the technology continues to improve.

◀ The popularity of Apple Computer's translucent berry-colored iMac sparks a wave of similarly colored cell phones, CD players, cameras, irons and other household appliances.

For the first time, females outnumber males in Internet use in the United States, representing 50.4% of the online population in 2000. Teenage girls are the fastest growing user segment.

Designer faceplates become a popular way to personalize cell phones. The decorative attachments come in a variety of designs and colors to match the user's mood or outfit.



▲ Wordstretch bracelets become a trendy accessory in Hollywood and around the nation. The multi-colored elastic bands come inscribed with "Call me," "Money is overrated," "Snap out of it" and other simple messages designed to spark conversation.

By the end of 2000, an estimated 75% of U.S. universities offer courses online and more than 5.8 million students have logged on.

With the 2000 unemployment rate at a low of 4%, college students working as summer interns command wages up to \$20 an hour, along with compensation packages, from high-tech and Internet companies.



▲ Companies like Estee Lauder, Origins, Hermes and Blistex begin to market products in portable single-use packets. Products include nail polish remover, scented wipes, hair conditioners and moisturizers.



▲ Stick-on crystals and gems become popular fashion accessories for teen girls, accenting the face, neck and shoulders.



▲ Mail-order clothing pioneer Lands' End introduces "scan wear." The technology captures customers' body measurements, and allows users to virtually "try on" clothing when ordering via the Internet.



▲ "Personal TVs" by TiVo and ReplayTV allow users to control live TV by pausing or rewinding and to record their favorite shows without having to set a VCR timer or purchase videotapes.



▲ Chrysler rolls out its 1930s retro car, the PT Cruiser, in spring 2000. The five-door "personal transportation" wagon is a hot seller, beating the popular Volkswagen New Beetle by two to one in the first month. It also wins *Motor Trend* magazine's 2001 Car of the Year.

✔ Teens involved in anti-smoking organizations such as The Truth and Target Market strike back at Big Tobacco for marketing to youth, by launching their own in-your-face advertising campaigns targeting cigarette makers. The print and broadcast ads are sponsored by funds won from tobacco suit settlements.

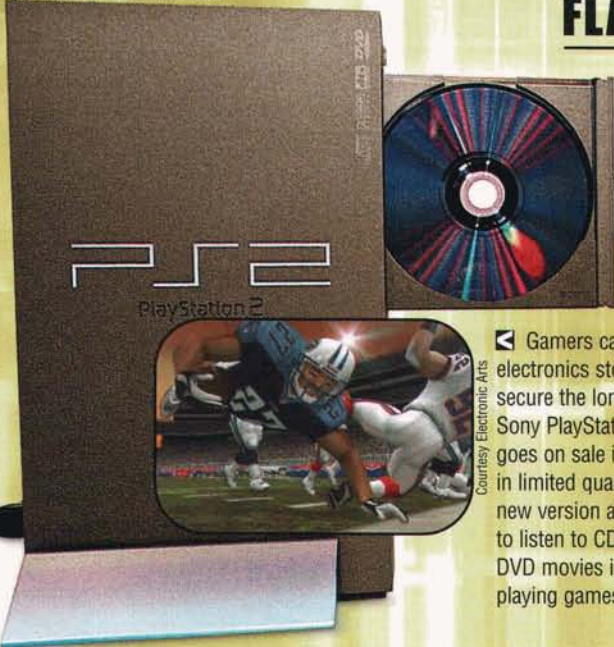

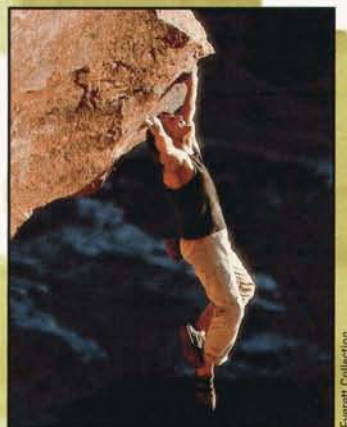

Russell Crowe becomes a household name with the release of *Gladiator*. The epic film wins a Golden Globe Award for Best Drama as well as an acting nod for Crowe.

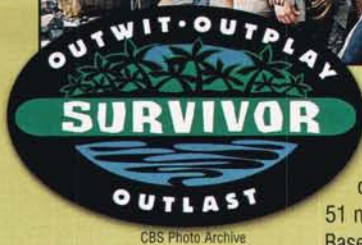

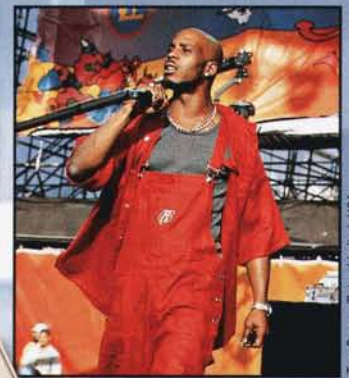

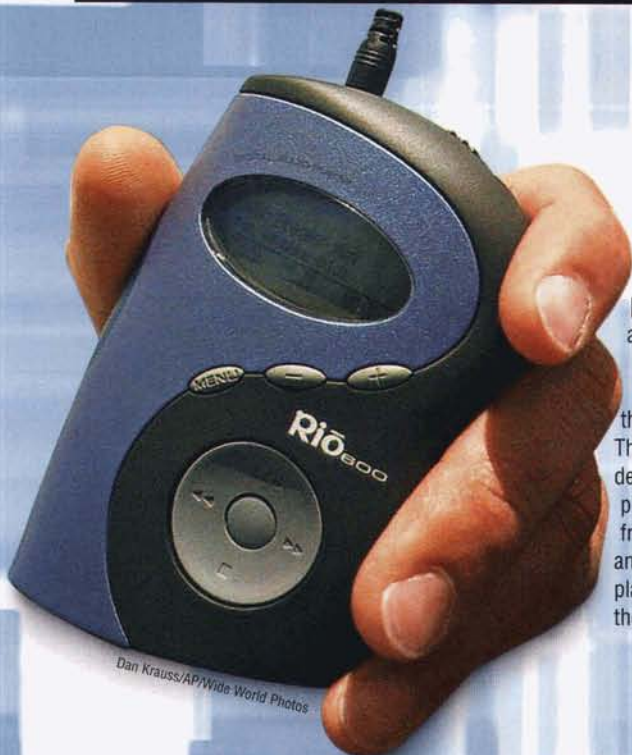

Opening week sales records are shattered in 2000 with benchmarks set for the number of albums sold. Sisqo, a member of the R&B band Dru Hill, goes solo in 2000. The singer tops the singles chart with "Incomplete" and "Thong Song" and takes home awards from *Billboard* and the American Music Association.



Napster loses several court battles with the recording industry over copyright infringement. The popular online music sharing service, with over 60 million users, faces shut-down unless it can create a new business formula that satisfies the major recording labels.

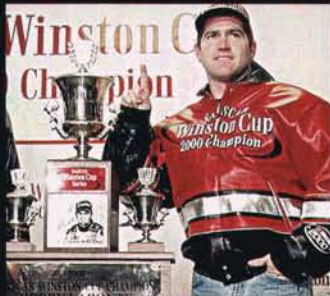

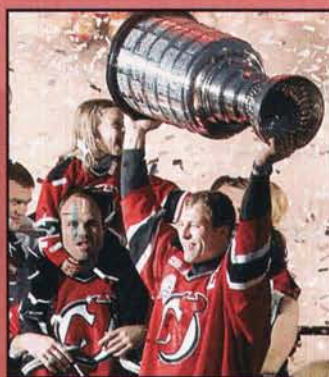

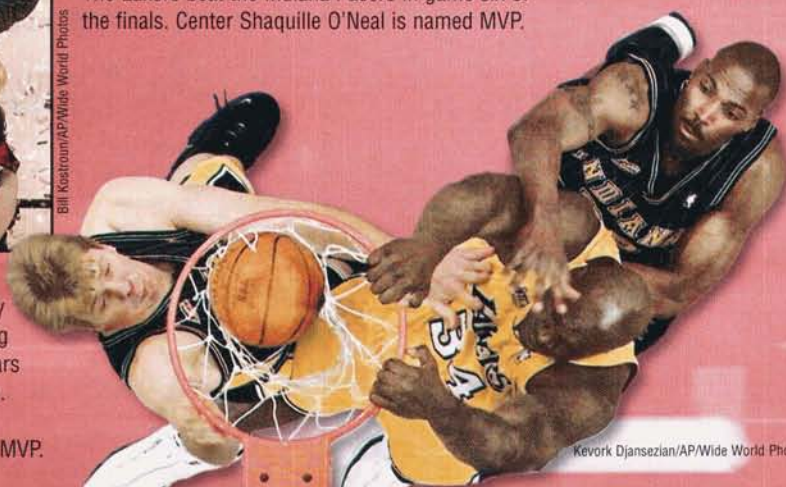

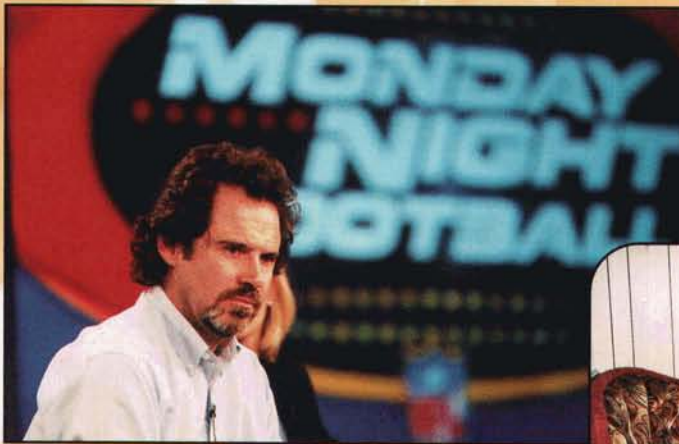
