Anthropology is a social science that seeks to understand and explain human cultural, behavioral, and biological variation through time and space. This gives anthropology a wide reach and has

resulted in the formation of three subdisciplines: social anthropology, archaeology, and physical anthropology. Social anthropology concentrates on modern human culture and behavior. Archaeology examines cultural and behavioral variation over time. Physical anthropology studies the biological evidence for human evolution, encompassing everything from the study of modern non-human primates to the earliest stages of mammalian fossil evolution. The objective of the anthropology major is to train the student in all three subdisciplines while allowing the student to concentrate on any specific subdiscipline.

Students with a major in anthropology take several post-graduate paths. Some continue their anthropology training in graduate schools, many at the finest graduate schools in the country. Others pursue, for example, medical school or conservation studies.

The undergraduate program introduces the student to the general field of anthropology, its branches, its theories and methods, and its relation to the other social sciences, the humanities, and the natural sciences. The curriculum emphasizes the fields of cultural and social anthropology, archaeology, and physical anthropology, and includes offerings in medical anthropology. Students often have the opportunity to pursue coursework in any of the three fields in different cultural settings. Please see the Director of Undergraduate Studies for details.

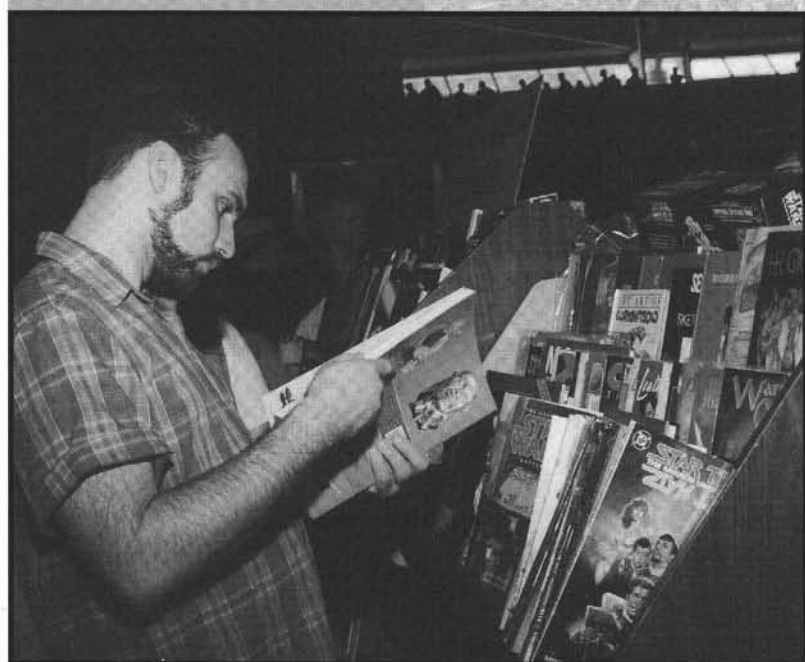


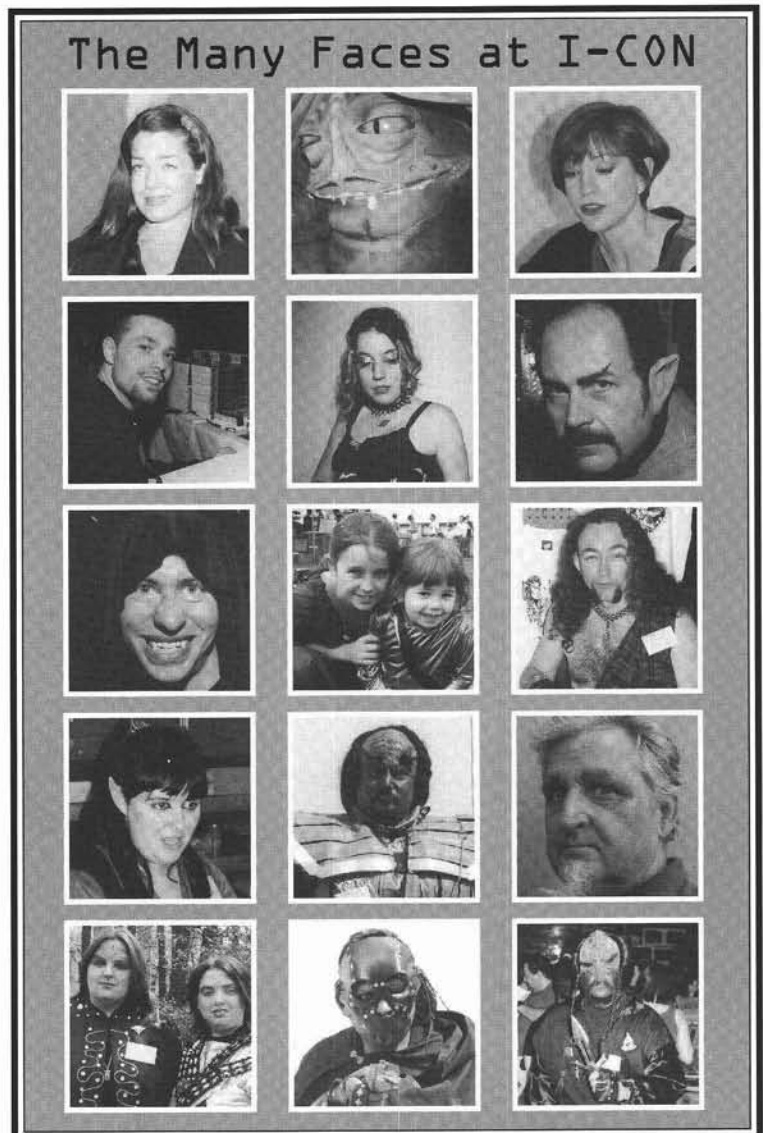
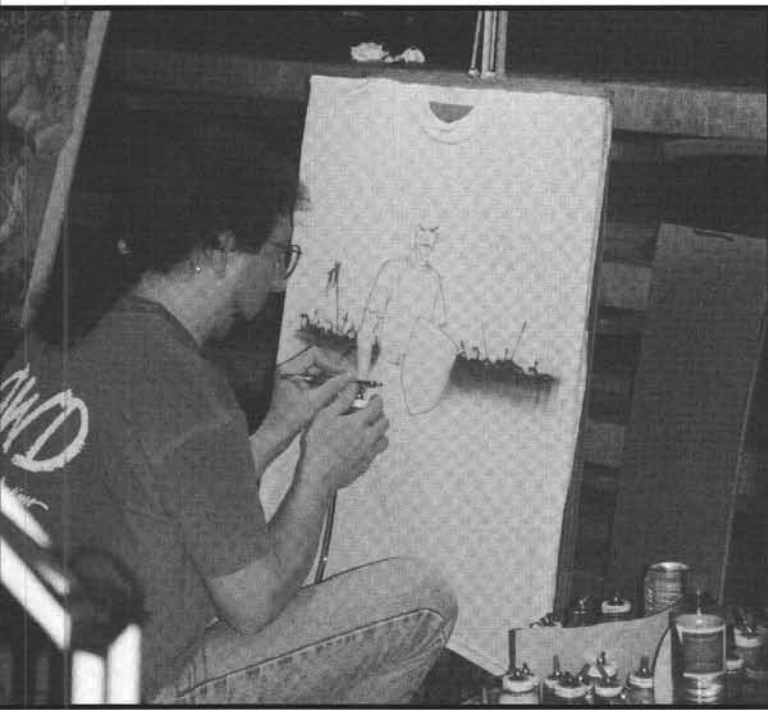


I-CON Seventeen

got splashed, immersed, or dunked into the Pond.



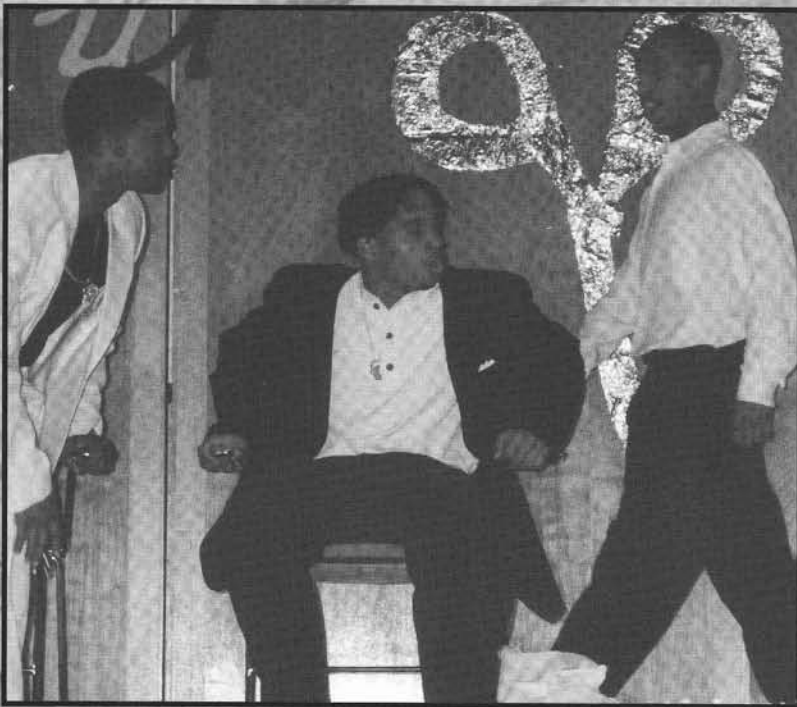
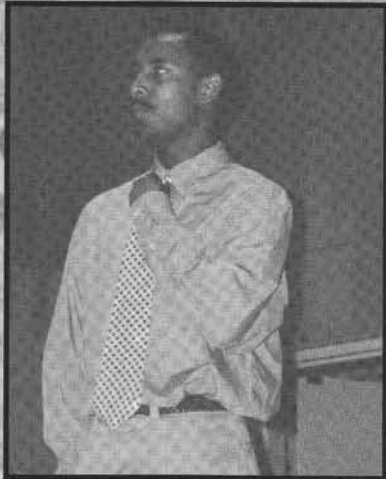






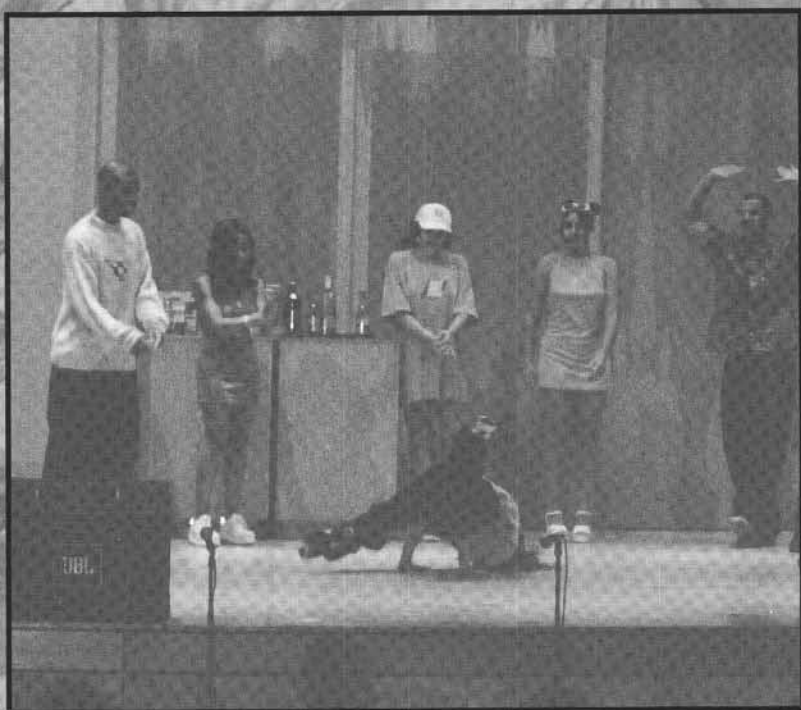
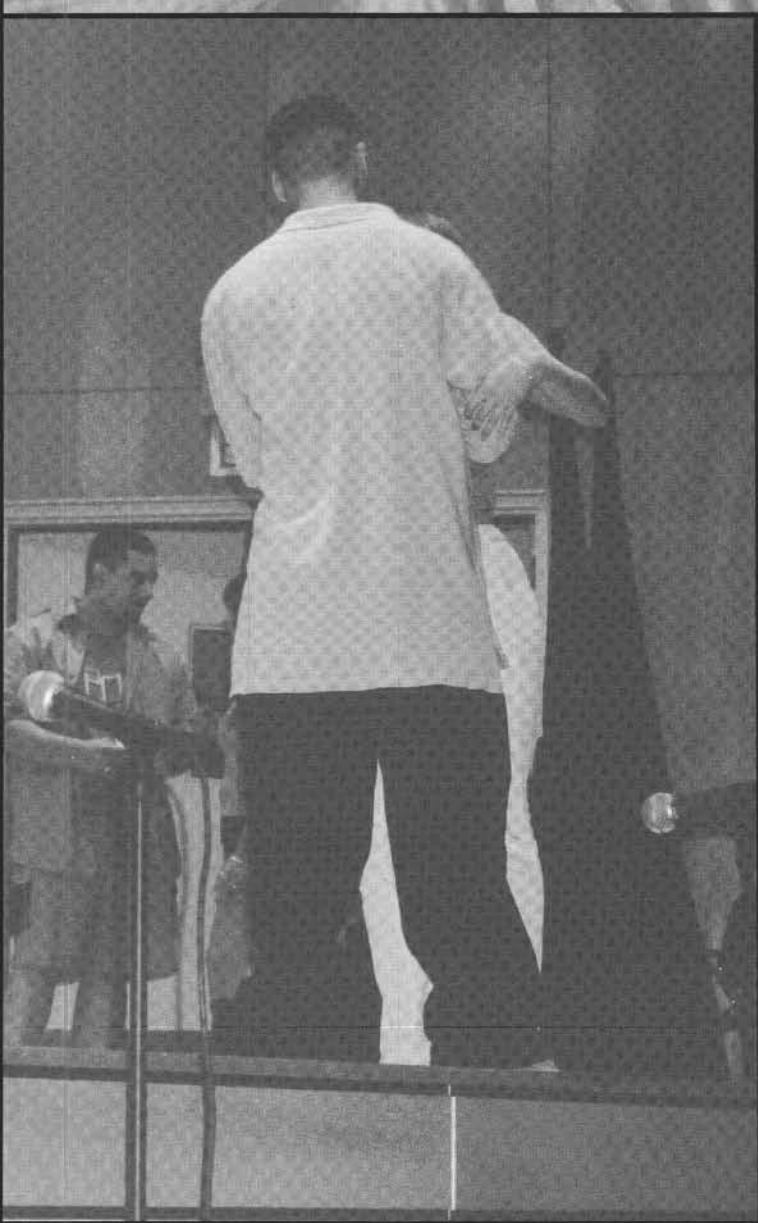

\$\$ The Missing Million \$\$

Once again the Africana Studies Program is under attack by University officials. In our last issue we as students questioned why such a long-lived program has not yet been given departmental status? In this issue we are questioning the unexplained absence of one million dollars from the AFS budget over a span of five years.

Dr. Leslie Owens of the AFS Program, alerted a group of student leaders to the ills that are transpiring at this University, concerning this particular unit.

The discovery of the "missing million" resulted from a self-study that was conducted by AFS. Over the past five years AFS has generated more than two million dollars, which is a direct result of student enrollment revenue.

The College of Arts and Sciences, which houses the AFS Program, allots an annual budget of \$352,343 to AFS. A debt of \$21,000 that was incurred by the College as a whole, and not by AFS, is deducted from the annual budget, leaving a total of \$331,343. It is this

figure multiplied by five years and subtracted from the two million plus that produces the "missing million" from the AFS budget.

Dr. Owens sent a memo to Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, Paul Armstrong, requesting an explanation for the misappropriation of funds. In his memo Owens writes: It seems legitimate for AFS to raise questions about how the balance of \$979,185.00 has been spent and for what purposes. It clearly has not been used to enhance the development of AFS. And it is abundantly clear that the AFS program has successfully produced revenues to fund itself in the environment of the University at Stony Brook but has not been acknowledged for doing so.

Owens proudly says, "Africana Studies is totally self-sufficient. No other department pays for itself. They must get outside funding."

The "missing million" has concerned the AFS faculty. "This causes emotional and intellectual difficulties," Owens said.

The Statesman will receive Referenda funding with an increase in the amount of Student Activity Fee paid. The Cultural and Advocacy Interests organizations will receive Referenda funding with no increase in the amount of the Student Activity Fee paid. The Men's Rugby team will continue to receive 75 cents per student, bi-annually. The Part Time Student Activity Fee will be mandatory for all part time undergraduate students

Affirmative Action Watch

University Found Guilty of Discrimination

The Stony Brook Research Foundation, a recipient of over 104 million dollars in Federal funds during fiscal 1997, has been found in violation of Federal Affirmative Action guidelines.

In an audit conducted by the Office of Federal Contract Compliance (OFCCP), the Research Foundation at Stony Brook is guilty of non-compliance to Executive Order 11246, a government law which mandates federal contractors to adopt hiring policies that do not discriminate on the basis of race and gender.

Officially, the audit is still being conducted. The Research Foundation is now in the process of "negotiating" with the government concerning the violations. Or in other words, the Research Foundation is amending its policies which do not adhere the Federal guidelines

and submitting the revisions to OFCCP. But in addition to the negotiation process, as a result of already being found guilty of Affirmative Action violations, the Research Foundation will be closely monitored till the year 2000, with regular six month campus visits by a federal auditor. It is not known at this time how these Affirmative Action violations will affect Stony Brooks' Brook Haven National lab bid.

During a recent interview with BLACKWORLD and EN ACCION, President Kenny denied any knowledge of the audit results; however, BLACKWORLD has since learned that she was officially notified of at least two Research Foundation violations, weeks ago but has been trying to suppress the information. The fact that these Research Foundation violations occurred under

the Kenny Occupation should not come as a surprise. With Kenny serving as president, there have been over 400 Affirmative Action waivers applied to hiring situations. And this has occurred with a steadily decreasing retention rate of Black and Hispanic faculty and staff.

Similarly, when contacted, the University Affirmative Action Office - which is still operating without a full-time Director and reports to George Meyer, Assistant Vice-President for Presidential Initiatives (read: Kenny watchdog), issued "no comment" concerning the on going investigation. But BLACKWORLD has solicited the audit findings from the U.S. Department of Labor under the Freedom of Information Act. As more details become available, BLACKWORLD will be the first to bring them to you.

Super Cop Ruby Collins

Where was Ruby Collins when television producer Steven Bochco created the failed television comedy on ABC about singing and dancing cops called *Cop Rock*, because New York Police Department police officer Ruby Collins can actually sing!

Collins, a Brooklyn native, grew up singing in her Seventh Day Adventist church at a very young age. She used to be self-conscious about singing in front of large crowds because she didn't think she looked good enough. "I was extremely shy about my appearance," the 5'8" Collins said. "I knew I could sing, but the confidence in my appearance was low." All of that is behind her now, and after hearing her first album titled, "The Gift of Song," I can safely say that Whitney Houston should be scared!

I spent some time with Collins at the apartment she shares with her mother in Brooklyn to find out more about the woman who enforces the law by day, and records tracks for her soon to be released album, by night.

Upon entering her home I heard a voice filtering the air from the stereo in the dining room. When Collins asked if I recognized the voice that I heard, I thought it sounded like a familiar gospel singer, possibly Vanessa Bell Armstrong. I soon realized, however, that the voice belonged to Collins, who sounded as professional and talented as someone with a record deal already.

Collins got her start when she auditioned for the New York City police commissioner, Howard Safir. She wanted to sing at her graduation from the Police Academy in Madison Square Garden. Since bringing down the house with that performance, Ruby has performed for millions on Show Time at the Apollo and the Rosie O'Donnell Show. In 1996 she sang for the President in Washington, D.C. for the National Peace Officer Memorial Day, which was a ceremony that honored slain cops. Collins has also sung the national anthem at the Garden for a New York Knicks game.

Not only can Collins sing, but she writes her own lyrics and plays the piano too. All of her musical talent has not been discovered yet, but Collins just says, "It wasn't my time. Everything happens for a reason. I believe my time is coming soon though."

In the meanwhile, Collins will continue to be a police officer, even

though that is not what she always aspired to do. After graduating from John Jay College of Criminal Justice, she took the New York City police exam and shortly thereafter became an officer. Since becoming an officer, she has not regretted a moment of it, but in back of her mind, she knew that she had a God-given talent that she was not going to waste.

Currently, Collins works in the Drug Prevention Unit. She speaks to public school students about the dangers of drug and alcohol abuse, which oddly enough includes sniffing Wite-Out, the correction fluid. Besides teaching students how to stay off drugs, she encourages them to reach for their goals, like she is doing. "I always tell the children I speak with to aspire to achieve their dreams," Collins said. "Whatever it is you want to do, never stop believing it can be done. If you believe in it and work towards it, doors will open up in ways you would never imagine."

Collins took matters into her own hands and opened doors for herself when she created her own record label called Bourne Records. She named the label after her relatives in Trinidad, whose surname is Bourne. "I wanted my own label because if I can do it myself, I have more control."

Collins is definitely a multifaceted woman. She's catching the bad guys, doing business, educating our youth, and making music. The only thing left for her to do is drop that album!

Mary McLeod Bethune, A Forgotten African-American Legend

Oprah Winfrey, perhaps the most influential African-American woman in the U.S. today, but how often do people ever consider the African-American women who paved the way, so that Oprah could get to where she is.

Too often, Black pioneers get lost among the few that are continually recognized. Besides Martin Luther King Jr., Malcolm X, and W.E.B. Du Bois, how many other African-Americans have contributed to the growth of the Black community? How many women would be in that category?

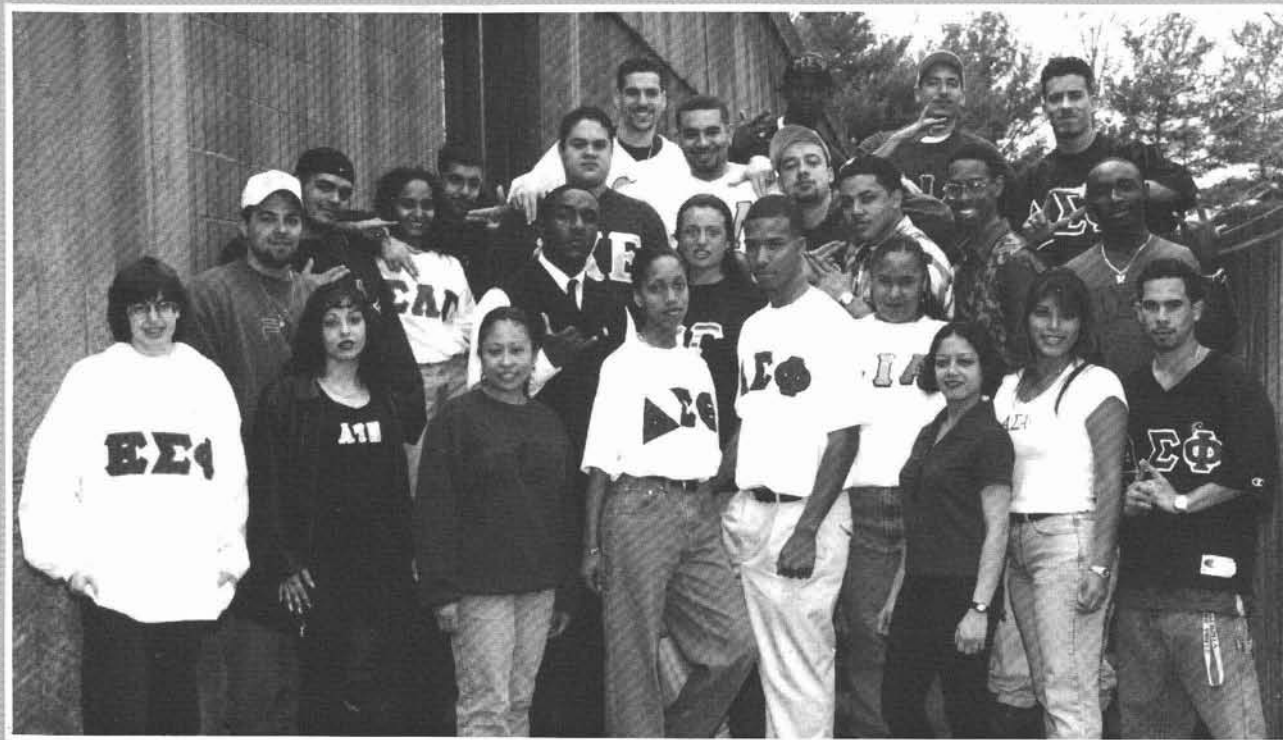
One of the most influential African-American women in the history of Black people was Mary McLeod Bethune. The daughter of ex-slaves, Bethune rallied to help improve conditions for black America - the people, perhaps the most influential African-American woman in the U.S. today, but how often do people ever consider the African-American women who paved the way, so that Oprah could get to where she is.

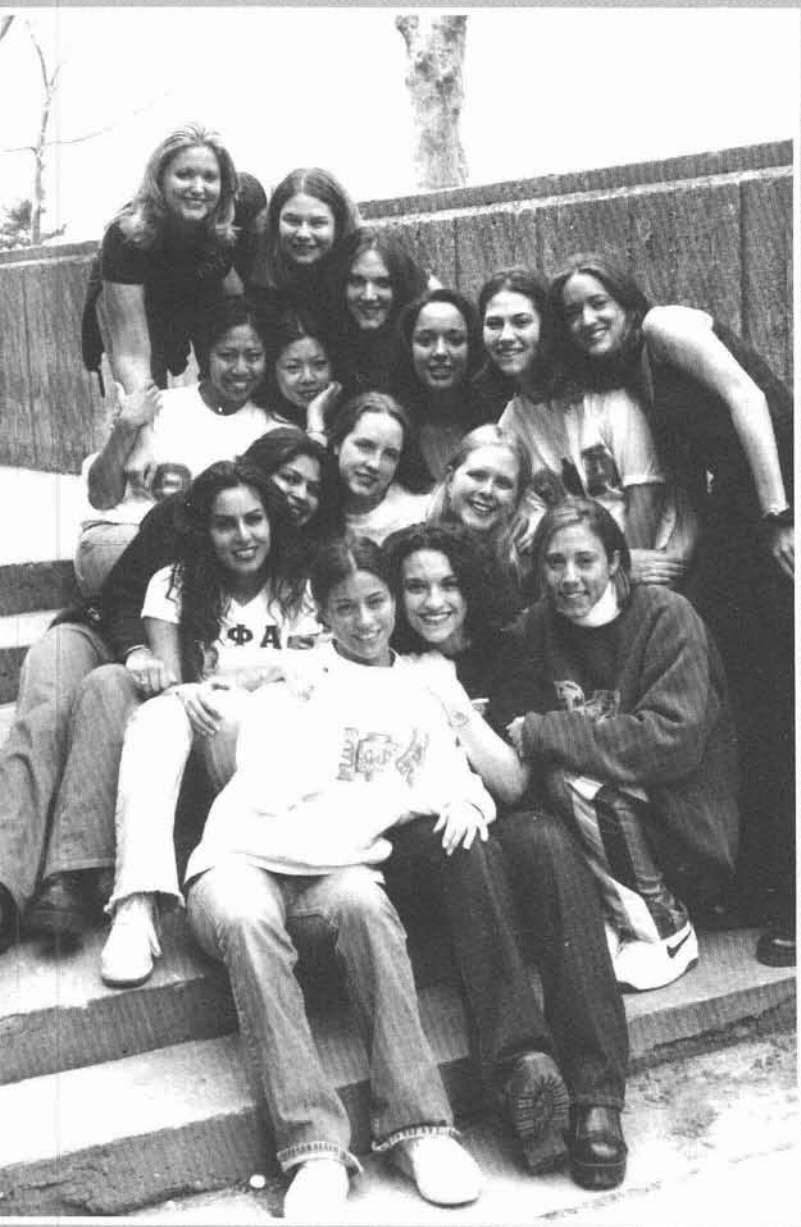
From the cotton fields, she rose to the top of the political arena, ultimately becoming an advisor to five presidents. She did not attain such an astute position overnight, but rather, she fought hard to overcome all obstacles in her path. She felt compelled to aid in the plight of young blacks, females especially.

In 1904 she established the Daytona Normal and Industrial Institute for Girls, which later expanded to include males in 1923. She began the school with five little girls. She believed in God, and 50 years later, she said, "From nothing, I built this school and against great odds, she had brought forth a mighty institution of higher learning." Originally the school was designed to train young girls as domestics, but it later expanded to include a nursing program.

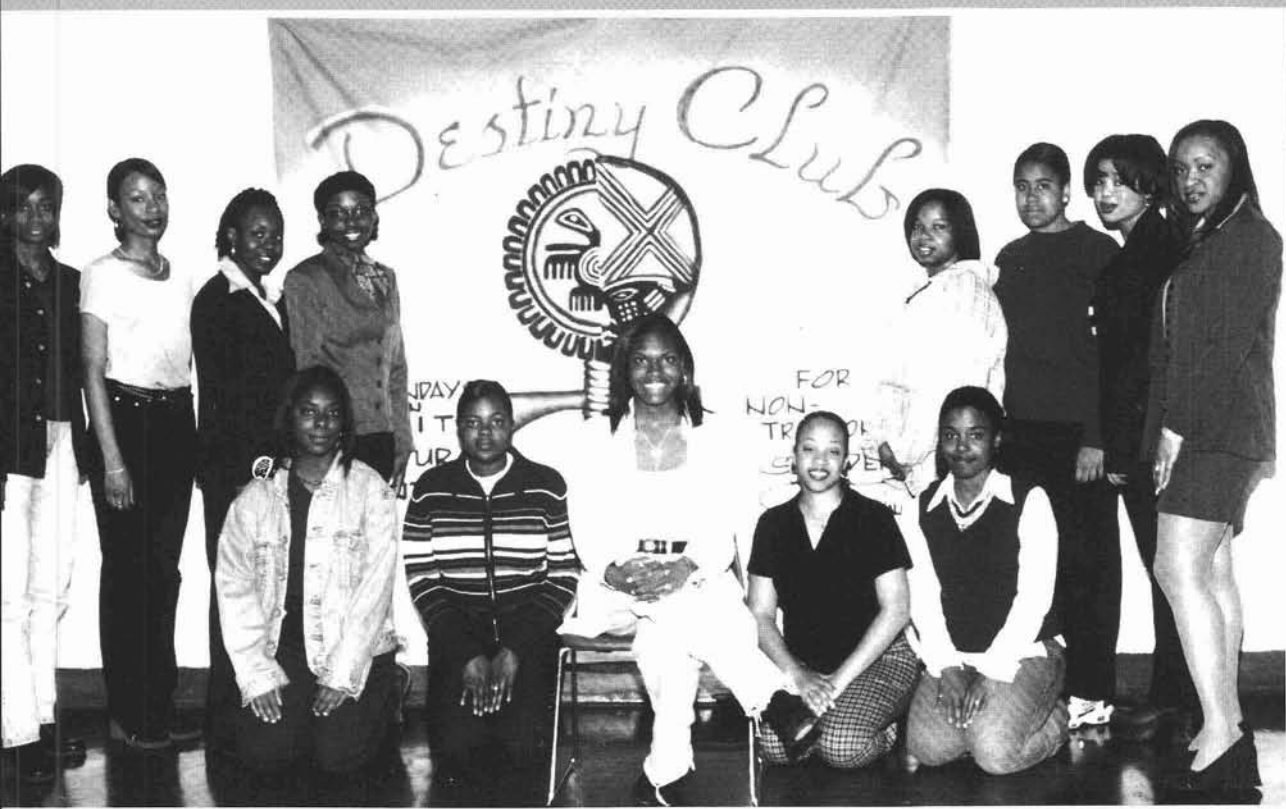
Bethune never waited for things to happen. She believed that Black people needed political power if they were ever to survive the brunt of social and economic oppression in America. Her true calling thus became a political one. In 1924 she became head of the National Association of Colored Women (NACW), where she fought for women's suffrage and an end to lynching in the South. She was later recruited under the Wilson administration to help integrate the American Red Cross.

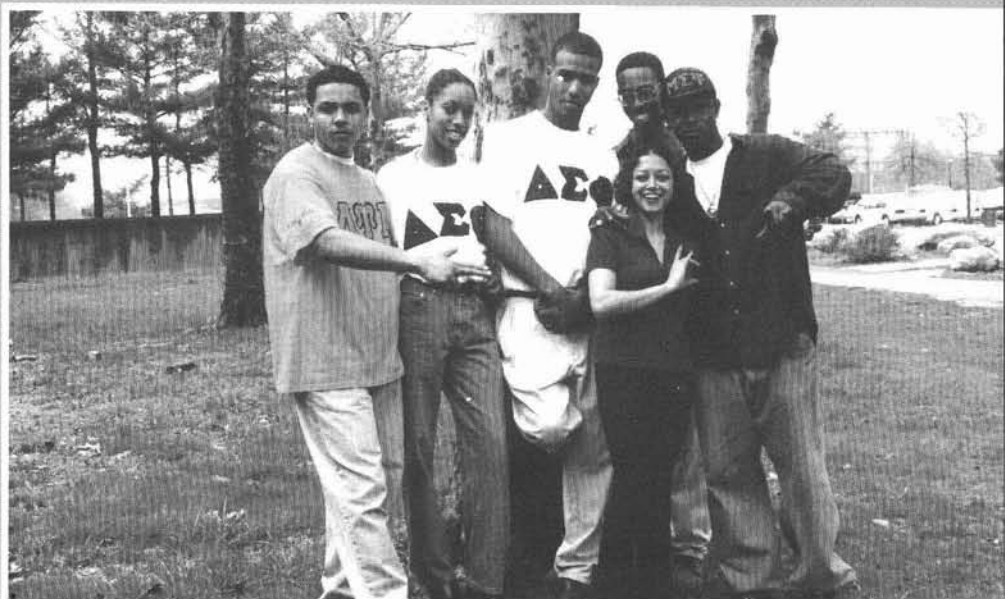
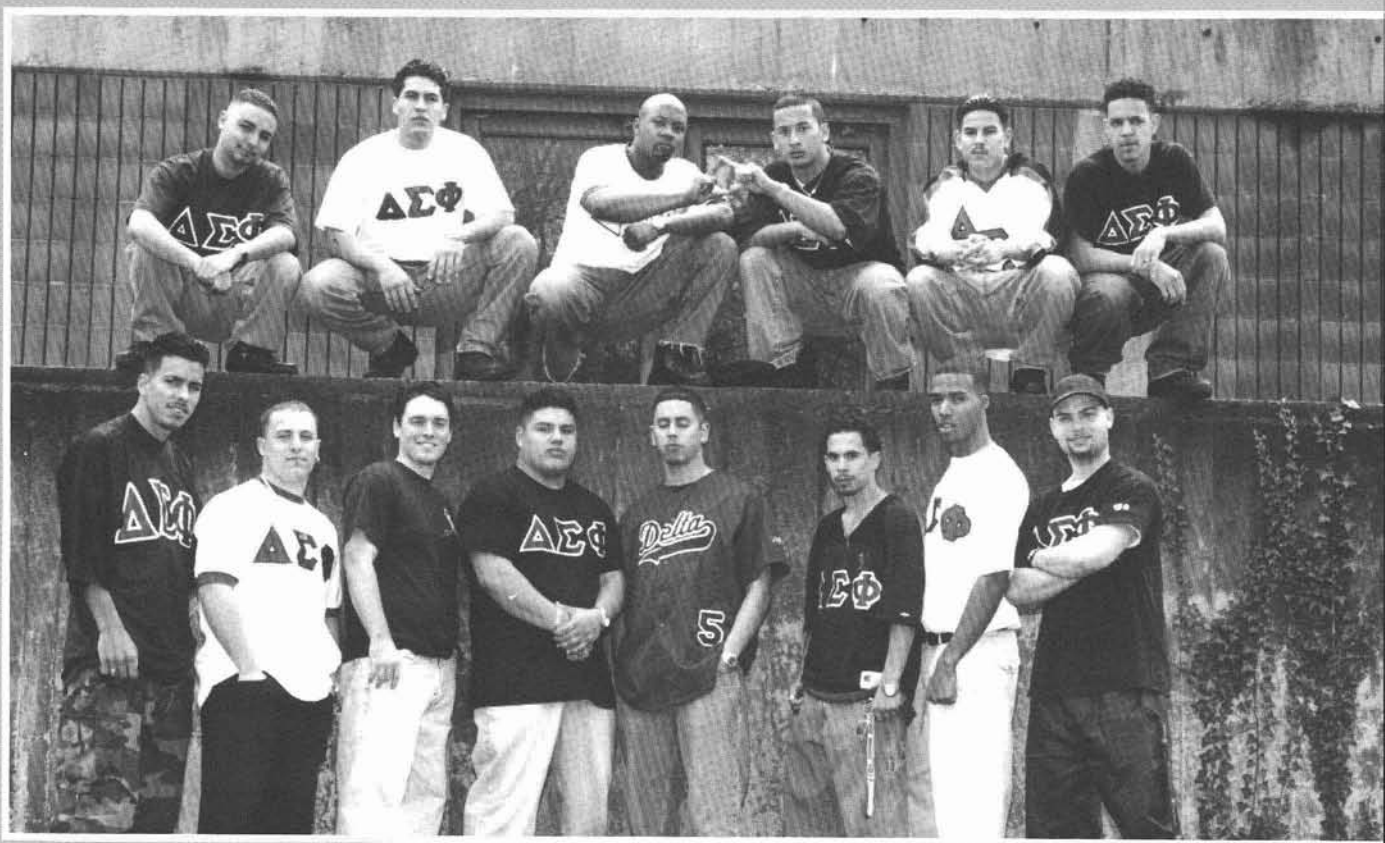
During the presidencies of Calvin Coolidge and John Edgar Hoover, Bethune was invited to attend national conferences on child welfare. Her national credentials at

Why USB is Among the Elite

- In a national study of research universities, Stony Brook was tied for second among public research universities, behind only UC Berkeley.
- Charles Wang, Chairman of Computer Associates International, donated \$25 million to build a new Asian American Center, the largest private donation in SUNY history.
- Stony Brook's faculty tutored one out of every eight Westinghouse Science Talent Search finalists.
- Stony Brook is the first public university in New York State to be ranked a "Type I Research University" by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, a distinction granted to fewer than two percent of all colleges and universities in the nation.
- Selected as one of 10 universities as the winner of the National Science Foundation's Recognition Award for Integrating Research and Education.
- The University Hospital at Stony Brook is ranked among the 15 Best Teaching Hospitals in the United States and one of the best 100 hospitals overall.
- The National Science Foundation funded two new Materials Research Science and Engineering Centers at USB. Only 20 such centers are funded nationwide, and Stanford is the only other university with two.
- Stony Brook has been named a Best Buy by *Money Magazine* and *U.S. News and World Report*.
- The faculty includes a Nobel Prize winner in Physics; a faculty that ranks second among America's best public universities in research per faculty member.

Stony Brook: Division I In All Sports In 1999

University President Dr. Shirley Strum Kenny announced that the University will upgrade its entire intercollegiate athletics program to NCAA Division I status, effective in the 1999-2000 academic year on June 3, 1997.

The announcement came after President Kenny endorsed a plan set forth by the Intercollegiate Athletics board (IAB) to immediately bring Stony Brook's 19 varsity athletic programs in compliance with NCAA Division I regulations. Dr. Kenny notified the NCAA on Friday, May 30, 1997, of the University's intention to reclassify the school's membership from Division II to Division I.

The decision marked the culmination of an initiative whose roots date back to the 1988-89 academic year when the men's lacrosse and women's soccer programs were upgraded to the Division I level.

Only three years later, the Future Directions Committee recommended to then University President Dr. John H. Marburger III, that the University elevate its intercollegiate programs from the Division III level to NCAA

Division I status. In March of 1993, Dr. Richard Laskowski came to Stony Brook and was charged with guiding the athletic program to the Division I level. Over the past four years, Laskowski has set the course to make the dream a reality.

In the fall of 1995, Stony Brook competed at the Division II level for the first time as a member of the New England Collegiate Conference.

With the decision, USB immediately begins complying with all Division I regulations during the mandatory two-year transition period to NCAA Division I status. As a result, Stony Brook's athletic teams are ineligible for NCAA championship competition and can only compete in ECAC postseason tournaments.

For Stony Brook, the time is now. The fall of 1999 is only two short years away.

Why Seawolves?

In an effort to bring an exciting new identity with its move to the Division I level, then University at Stony Brook President Dr. John H. Marburger III, and Dr. Richard Laskowski announced in 1993 that beginning in the 1994-1995 academic year, the University and its athletic teams would be referred to by their new nickname, Seawolves.

The Seawolves became the fourth nickname in the history of the University at Stony Brook and was chosen by a 32-person committee comprised of students, alumni, faculty and administrators. Seawolves was selected from a list of over 200 possible names.

A Seawolf is a mythical creature of Indian legend that is said to bring good luck to all those who were fortunate enough to see it.

Sandy Weeden Director of Athletics



Sandy Weeden is entering her 28th year of service in the Division of Physical Education and Athletics. During her tenure, Weeden has coached women's basketball, softball and tennis and served as the intramural director for women.

The University's most experienced athletic administrator, Weeden spent 23 years as the Director of Women's Athletics before becoming the Director of both Men's and Women's Athletics. Weeden, who served for four years on the powerful NCAA Council, is an Associate Professor of Physical Education and was enshrined in the Cortland State College Athletic Hall of Fame in 1987.

Weeden currently serves on several NCAA Committees, including the NCAA Division II Academic Requirements Committee as well as being a member of the selection committee for Undergraduate Excellence and Outstanding Achievement awards. She is also the chair of the NECC Women's Basketball Committee.

In addition to her work with the NCAA, Weeden has had a major impact at the university level. Her outstanding work as a coach, a professor and athletic administrator has earned her numerous honors that include Coach of the Year (1972 & 1976), the NYSWCAA Service Award (1985) and has twice been recognized for exceptional service to undergraduate education at the University at Stony Brook (1985 & 1991).

Weeden earned her undergraduate degree in physical education from SUNY-Cortland in 1967 and completed her masters degree in education at the UNC-Greensboro in 1972.

Sam Kornhauser Sr. Associate Dir. of Athletics



In addition to serving as head football coach for the past 13 years, Kornhauser served as the Director of Men's Athletics from 1992-95. He is currently the Senior Associate Athletic Director and a tenured Associate Professor in the Department of Physical Education. Kornhauser, who has been named the University's Men's Coach of the Year three times, currently serves on the ECAC Football Playoff Selection Committee.

Paul Dudzick Associate Dir. of Athletics



Paul Dudzick has experienced virtually every facet of Stony Brook athletics in his 28 plus years at the University. He began his tenure in 1968 as Stony Brook's crew coach and has since coached women's cross country, women's tennis and men's crew. Dudzick is the only coach in USB history to be named both the Men's Athletics (1971-72) and Women's Athletics (1980-81) Coach of the Year. Currently, his primary responsibility is serving as the NCAA Compliance Coordinator.

Rick Cole, Jr. Associate Dir. of Athletics



In his third year at Stony Brook, Rick Cole heads the athletic advancement initiative designed to raise the necessary funds for USB's move to Division I. His responsibilities include marketing the Athletics program through corporate sponsorship donations. A 1992 graduate of the University at Buffalo, Cole was a volleyball standout who earned All-America honors following his junior season. Cole served as the Assistant Director of Marketing at Buffalo for one year before coming to Stony Brook.

Rob Emmerich, Jr. Director of Media Relations



Rob Emmerich begins his first full year as the Director of Athletic Media Relations after joining Stony Brook last December as the Assistant. A 1991 graduate of Cornell University, Emmerich was an assistant in the Big Red Sports Information Office upon graduation. He interned for both the New York Mets and Hoop-It-Up before serving as a graduate assistant for two years in the Stony Brook athletic department. Emmerich earned his masters degree from Stony Brook in 1995.

Judy Christ Business Manager



In the midst of her 20th year, Judy Christ was served as the Business Manager for the past 14 years. She began at Stony Brook 1978 as the head softball coach and remained in that post for 15 years. Christ received the prestigious Chancellor's Award for Excellence and Professional Service in 1986 and was honored with the NYSWCAA Service Award in 1993 after serving as that organization's treasurer for 10 years.

A Look At Stony Brook Athletics

The University at Stony Brook offers 19 intercollegiate varsity sports, 10 for men and nine for women competing within the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC), the New England Collegiate Conference (NECC) and local conferences for various sports.

In July of 1993, Stony Brook initiated a process of complying with NCAA Division II regulations that will ultimately take its entire athletic program to the NCAA Division I level. On June 3, 1997, University President Dr. Shirley Strum Kenny announced that Stony Brook will elevate its entire collegiate athletic program to Division I level in the 1999-2000 academic year.

Seventeen of the University's 19 sports are currently NCAA Division II membership sports (men's lacrosse and women's soccer already compete at the NCAA Division I level).

Stony Brook teams have enjoyed success in recent seasons with NCAA postseason appearances by the men's tennis (1997), men's basketball (1991), women's volleyball (1990, 91, 92, 93, 94) and baseball (1995) teams. Three seasons ago, the football (ECAC Southeast Championship Game), men's soccer (ECAC playoffs), men's basketball (ECAC playoffs) and women's basketball (NYSWCAA playoffs) teams competed in the postseason.

Over the past seven years the women's volleyball team has captured two NCAA Division II championships and won at least one match in each of its five NCAA Division II tournament appearances. The women's volleyball team has captured two NCAA Division II playoff regional titles (1992, 1994), finished third in the nation (1992), captured an ECAC title (1995) and finished second in the ECAC Championships (1996). The women's indoor track team finished fourth at the NCAA Championships after the 1989-90 season, while the men's basketball team won the ECAC championship the same year. Following the 1990-91 season, the men's indoor track team won the ECAC championship. In addition to its ECAC appearance two seasons ago, the men's baseball team captured the ECAC championship in 1992 and advanced to the ECAC final in 1994. The 1995-96 winter season saw the women's swim team capture the Metropolitan Conference Championship.

And just last year, the men's tennis team claimed Stony Brook's first New England Collegiate Conference Championship.

Stony Brook consistently produces All-Americans both in the classroom and on the fields of play. Since squash standout Stuart Goldstein ('74) became Stony Brook's first All-American, the University has produced countless All-Americans in the sports of football, men's and women's basketball, lacrosse, women's soccer, women's volleyball, men's tennis, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, men's and women's swimming, and squash.

The University at Stony Brook is quickly developing a rich athletic tradition with individual and team success at the national level. Stony Brook will continue this excellence as it approaches its new beginning of NCAA Division I competition.

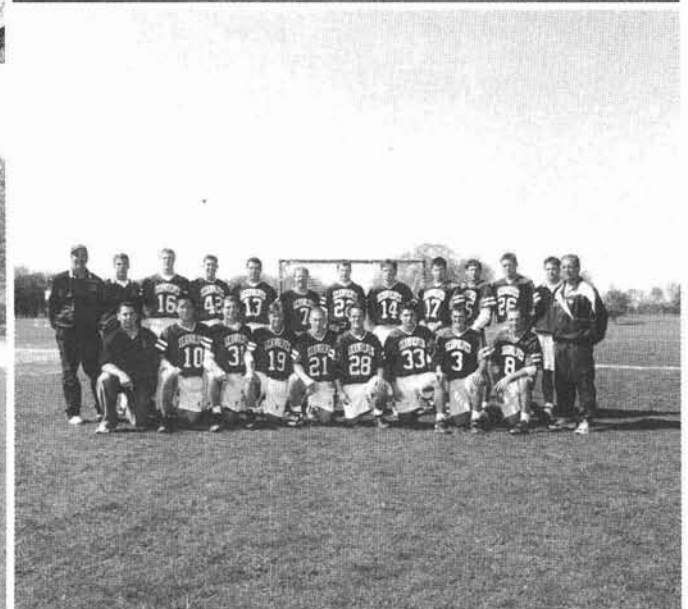
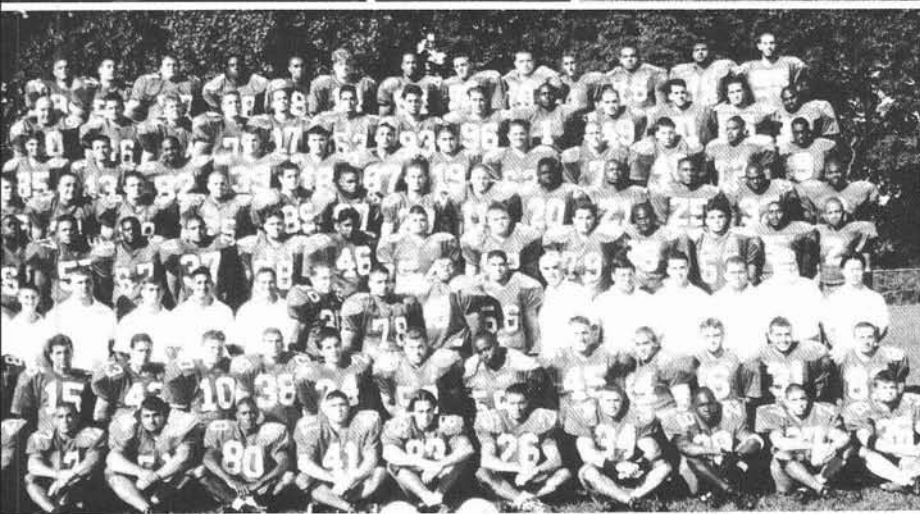

1997 Season Preview

The Seawolves will once again feature a quick, aggressive group of defenders that will focus on creating turnovers. With eight starters returning the Seawolves' defense is loaded with experience from top to bottom. All-American Jon Sorbera (53 tackles, 9 for losses) and Ryan Maloney give the Seawolves a pair of tackles that possess size, strength and quickness, while George Karafantis (38 tackles, 6.5 sacks) and John Kostkowicz (44 tackles, 13 for losses, 7 sacks) developed into solid defensive ends by the end of last season.

"This year's group of defensive tackles and defensive ends might be the best group to ever play at the University at Stony Brook," Kornhauser said. "Sorbera, Maloney and (Brian) Schwirzbain are without a doubt the best group of defensive tackles to play here. And, when Karafantis, Kostkowicz and (Keith) McInnes are healthy, they are the best group of defensive ends that have played here."

Stony Brook returns a pair of starting linebackers in All-American John Harris (69 tackles, 12 for losses, 5 sacks), and Phil Pape.

"John Harris can flat out play football," Kornhauser said. "He has better than average speed, can defend the passing game and is one of the best tacklers on the team. He is a great football player."

"Pape has been very versatile over his career, but really settled in last season as a linebacker," Kornhauser commented. "We are looking towards Jesus Marciano and

Randy Misa to fill the void left by Vin Romano.

Junior Gabe Rodriguez and Andre Mais return in the Seawolves secondary, while Solan James, who recorded two interceptions as a situation specialist, and Lyshaan Hall, who returns to the team after sitting last season out, will also see a lot of playing time.

"Our secondary will remain solid with four players that have played a lot of football for us the past three years," Kornhauser said. "All four of our returners are college pass defenders."

The kicking game remains solid with the return of punters Jeff Heck and AJ Schaeffer, and kickoff specialist Jason Harris.

With more seniors returning than ever before, Kornhauser wants them to know that this season is their opportunity to leave a mark on Stony Brook football.

"This group of seniors has gone from playing in the Division III ECAC playoffs, to having two successful seasons at the Division II level to complying by Division I rules this year," Kornhauser said. "We are counting on this years seniors to provide us with the experience, physically and mentally, that will allow us to win every close game."

"Every game is winnable," Kornhauser said. "But, there aren't any easy games along the way."

There never are.

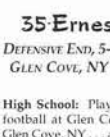

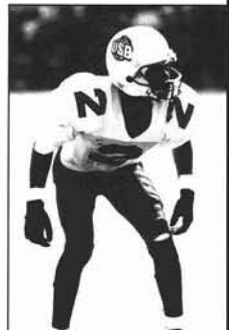

In his career-finales against Southern Connecticut in the NECC Quarterfinals, he tied Mike Francis for the school record for three-pointers in a game, making eight on 14 attempts. Hennessy also served as team captain as a senior.

Hennessy scored 770 points in his career at Stony Brook. He ranks second on the all-time list for three-pointers made with 143 and three-pointers attempted with 378.

Hennessy transferred to Stony Brook from C.W. Post in 1993-94. At Oceanside High School, Hennessy was an All-Long Island player.

The 1996-97 edition of the University at Stony Brook men's basketball team seems poised to get to another level in the powerful and challenging New England Collegiate Conference. Coming off a (10-16, 6-12) effort last year, several key returners combined with its best crop of recruits in years should propel the Seawolves into the upper half of the NECC.

Standing in the way will be several top teams, two of which are ranked among the best in the country. Division II Preseason polls have NECC members Southern Connecticut ranked eighth and New Hampshire College eleventh in the nation. Coach Bernard Tomlin hopes he has assembled a squad that he feels can compete against anyone, one that will take the next step to Division I.

Guards

Lone senior Larry Gibson returns to provide the Seawolves with leadership in the backcourt. The four-year starter saw the bulk of the action at point guard last year and should see significant time at that position this year as well. "Larry is our leading returning starter in scoring and assists and his leadership will be a valuable asset to our team," coach Tomlin said. The Seawolves will count on Gibson to provide some more offense as he looks to replace some of the scoring that Brian Hennessy provided last season. Hennessy averaged over 15 points per game last year.

Look for Demez Carrington to spell Gibson at the point guard position at times with Gibson shifting to the shooting guard spot to allow him to further utilize his offensive skills. Carrington has shown great improvement in his ballhandling and decision-making skills at the point guard position which could make his second year at Stony Brook a memorable one.

Complementing Gibson and Carrington in the backcourt will be a host of newcomers that will bring a new level of excitement to this year's team. Joining veterans Gibson and Carrington will be rookie Eric Lomot, a three-sport

standout at Amityville High School. Lomot is a solid combination guard who will see more time at shooting guard where he can hurt opponents from point land. Freshman Josh Little the Seawolves a solid transition player with the proven knack for scoring. Eric Austin-Johnson gives the wolves depth off the bench.

One big loss is sophomore Hartman. Last year's NECC ROL the Year candidate torn his ACL right knee in the off-season and will be the entire year.

Forwards

Returning starter Pablo Porras counted on to give the Seawolves scoring in the paint. Perhaps Tomlin's most reliable rebounder, stepped in to the starting lineup rookie season and performed well, averaging 4.7 points and 4.2 rebounds per game. Bobby Mahoney is a scoring

The Seawolves will feature some size under the basket in returning starter Ryan McDermott. McDermott, who split time at power forward and center last season, has added some size to his 6-8 frame and looks to build upon his impressive rookie numbers. In 26 games, he average 6.6 points and 4.8 rebounds per game while posting five double digit rebound performances. He also totaled 26 blocks.

Recruits

This year's crop of recruits is one of the best ever assembled by Tomlin. Four new faces join the team, all of which will most likely make significant contributions immediately. The new players give the Seawolves more shooting at every position and the opportunity to be more aggressive on offense this season. Balliro, Chapman, Lomot, and Little are all legitimate threats from three-point land and will give opposing defenses something to think about.

A Tough Road

Cracking into the upper crust of the NECC will not be easy. The conference boasts two teams in the preseason top 25 poll with Southern Connecticut ranked eighth and New Hampshire College eleventh in the nation. Last season, Southern Connecticut advanced to the Elite Eight where it was defeated by eventual champion Cal-State Bakersfield. Franklin Pierce, Albany and Sacred Heart all return solid teams that will also compete for NECC supremacy.

Outlook

This year's team has set its sights on making a run at the conference championship and going far in the ECAC playoffs. Look for the Seawolves to make use of their good shooters and creating an exciting style of play as they look forward to establishing the foundation of success in the move towards Division I.

ward who excels in the transition game, able to give the Seawolves an instant lift at anytime. This year's team plans to run more than any other Stony Brook team so that style should suit Mahoney's skills very well. Steady Kendall Richards will be a stable inside force who gives Tomlin a proven rebounder and depth at the forward spot.

Coach Tomlin will again rely heavy on his young talent at this position. Chris Balliro joins the Seawolves out of Swampscott High School in Massachusetts. A pure shooter, Balliro averaged 24 points and 14 rebounds per game in his senior season and will allow the Seawolves to become more aggressive on offense this season. Transfer Chris Chapman comes to Stony Brook after spending one season at Okaloosa Community College in Miami, Florida. 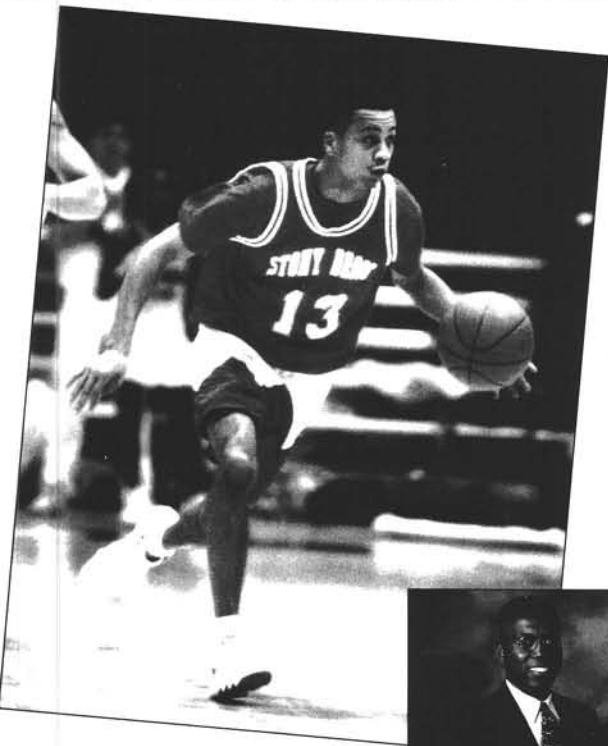

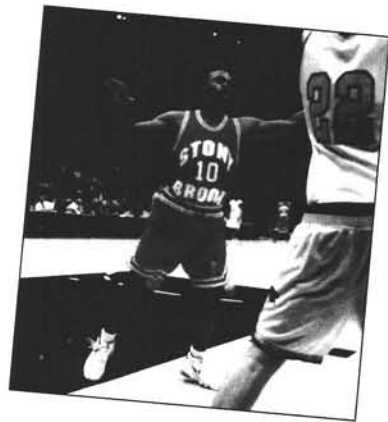

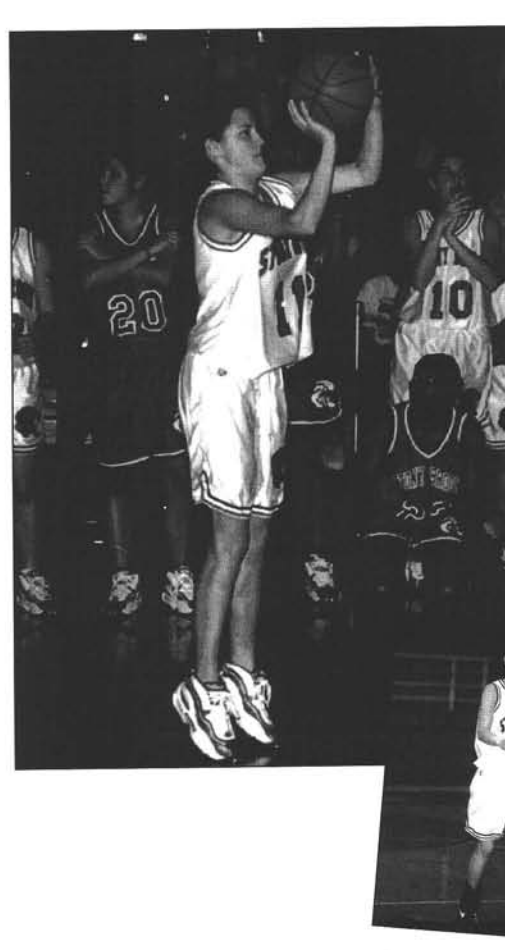

1997-98 Seawolves Women's Basketball - 21

Head Coach John Espey

John Espey enters his 11th year as head coach of the Seawolves and his tenth season with USB in NCAA Division I competition. At Stony Brook, Espey has pumped pride and excitement into the lacrosse program and last year brought the Seawolves into the Top 25 for the first time in their history and to the brink of a Top 20 ranking.

Last season, Espey had perhaps his finest team in his 10-year history at the school. Veteran leadership and outstanding talent combined to turn around a 3-8 record in 1996 to a 9-4 showing last year, including a win over nationally-ranked Hartford. The 9-4 finish matched UMBC for the best turnaround record in the nation, improving six victories from the year prior. Ironically, it was a gut-wrenching 12-11 loss to UMBC last spring that prevented the Seawolves from cracking the Top 20 and having the best turnaround season of any team in the country.

In his first season at Stony Brook in 1988, Espey led USB to the semifinals of the ECAC NY/NJ Metropolitan Lacrosse Championships, where they fell at Montclair State, 12-4. Two years later, Espey led Stony Brook to a school-record 12 victories. After losing its first game of the season to Georgetown 11-9, Stony Brook won 12 straight games for the longest NCAA winning streak of the season. Since that time, Espey has upgraded the Seawolves' schedule to regularly include the nation's elite teams, including North Carolina, Princeton, Navy and Duke. In 1999, the Seawolves will add Virginia and Cornell to their schedule.

Prior to his arrival at Stony Brook, Espey coached at Duke University for six years, twice leading the Blue Devils to a national rank-



ing in the Top 20. Credits on other levels include North Hempstead Lacrosse Club and Chaminade High School, both of which enjoy local reputations for quality teams with outstanding individual talent. Throughout his lacrosse career, Espey has coached over 75 collegiate All-Americans and World Team players.

Espey earned a bachelor's degree from the State University of New York College at Cortland, where as a member of the Red Dragon's NCAA Division I lacrosse team, he twice received All-America honors as a midfielder. Espey led the Red Dragons to a Final Four appearance in 1972 where Cortland fell to the Virginia Cavaliers, the eventual 1972 NCAA Champions. In 1973, Espey led the Red Dragons to their first-ever NCAA Championship. As a senior, he was honored by being selected to play in the North-South Senior Classic in Atlanta, Georgia. In 1992, Espey returned to the North-South All-Star Game as an assistant coach for the North team, which included former Stony Brook goalie Rob Serratore.

Espey received his master's degree in health and physical education from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1976, while serving as a graduate assistant coach.

Espey serves on the United States Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association Ranking Committee.

Over the summer, Espey directs the Stony Brook Boy's Lacrosse camp and is an instructor at coaching clinics and summer camps in New York State throughout the East.

Currently a tenured associate professor in the Division of Physical Education at Stony Brook, Espey resides in Commack, New York with his wife Linda and their three children Michelle, Kimberly, and John.

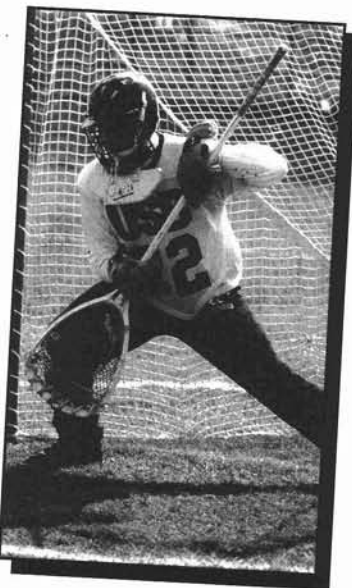

1997-98 Season Preview

The 1997 season featured the arrival of the University at Stony Brook men's tennis program into the national spotlight. The Seawolves finished the season with a 15-3 record, captured the New England Collegiate Conference Championship and earned an NCAA post-season bid as the number-one seed in the Northeast Regional and the number-four seed in the East.

Head Coach Mansour Tabibnia is confident that the 1998 season will be just as successful.

"Last season was a tremendous season for our program," Tabibnia said. "For the first time ever we received national recognition."

Returning for Tabibnia and the Seawolves from last year's team will be number-one singles player Daniel Antonius, number-two singles player Tae Byon, as well as number-five singles player Charles Greenhut and number-six player Otto Krcal. Tabibnia also returns veteran players Arman Halajian and Schelton Assoumou.

"We have a great group of returning players that learned just how hard it is to be considered a contender last year," Tabibnia said. "We had a great season and with a large number of players returning and a solid recruiting class, we should have another great season."

This year's newcomers include Phillippe Duyon, Seheui Jo and Kyle Warner.

"Our newcomers should be able to step in and help us immediately," Tabibnia said. "We have some of the top junior players from the Eastern Tennis Association joining our team."

One step that Tabibnia has taken each year at Stony Brook is improving his schedule. 1997-98 will be no different. The Seawolves schedule includes Division I opponents (Colgate, Bucknell, Bradley and Hofstra) as well as Division II powerhouses such as Concordia, Quinnipac, S.C. Aiken, Millersville and Kutztown.

The Seawolves also received an invitation to the prestigious Bloomsburg Duels in April.

"One of the keys to becoming a top team is playing against the best teams," Tabibnia said. "Now that we have received some notoriety, making quality schedule is easier."

"This year we have some unfinished business to take care of," Tabibnia said.

Last season was Tabibnia's best at Stony Brook as the men posted a 15-3 record, captured the NECC championship and became the first team at Stony Brook to earn an NCAA bid at the Division II level.

In 1996, Tabibnia was selected as the Professional Coach of the Year by the United States Tennis Association (USTA), the Eastern Tennis Association (ETA), and the Long Island Tennis Association (LITA).

Tabibnia, who graduated from St. John's University in 1988 with a degree in Business Administration, played on the men's professional circuit for a period of 18 months after graduating from high school.

Tabibnia has compiled a 43-18 record as the Seawolves men's tennis coach. Tabibnia also coached the Stony Brook women's tennis team for three seasons, 1993-95.

In addition to his coaching, Tabibnia serves as Founder/Director of the Impact Tennis Training Academy and Grand Slam Tennis Camps. He is a USTA/ETA Summer National Coach and was head coach of the USTA/ETA Long Island Player Development. Tabibnia has coached over 100 nationally-ranked juniors, and seven professional circuit players.

Tabibnia currently resides in Dix Hills, NY.

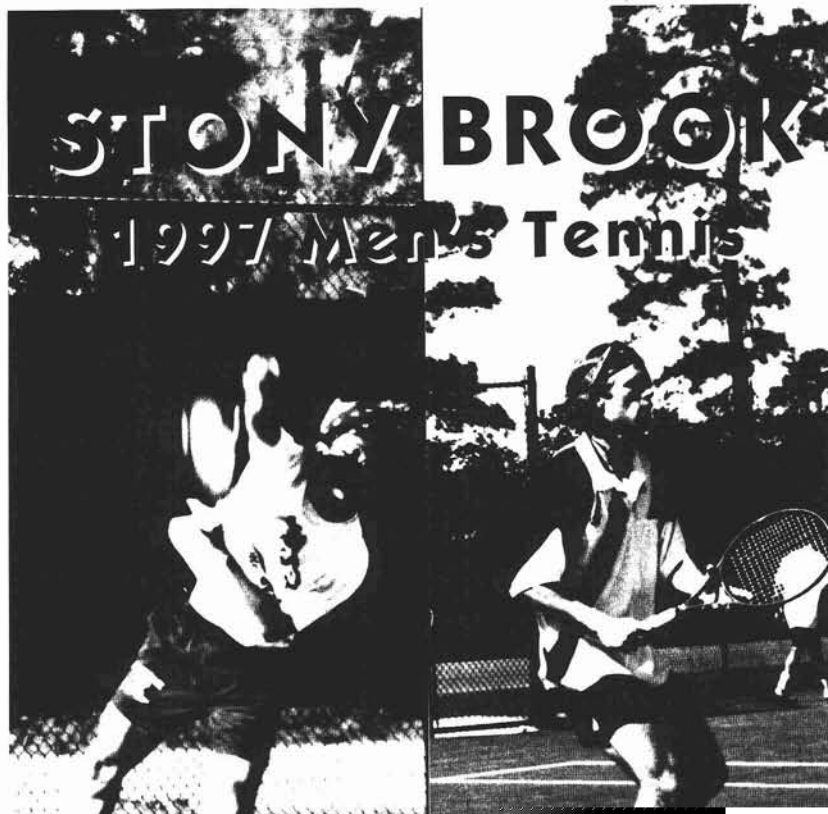

1998 Seawolves Season Preview

The Seawolves are looking to rebound from a disappointing 15-19 season of a year ago. Last season was only the second time during the seven year tenure of head coach **Matt Senk** that the team finished under .500 baseball. It also broke a streak of three consecutive post-season appearances by the Seawolves. The 1998 edition of the Stony Brook baseball team is expecting to return to form and compete for the NECC title this season.

"We're looking to bounce back from an atypical season. We've established a winning tradition and we want to get back to the type of baseball Stony Brook is known for," Senk said. "Our goals always remain the same. We want to win the conference, head to the postseason and be ranked nationally as high as possible."

Pitching

Matt Senk knows the key to winning this season is good pitching. "The pitching staff could be the key to our success. It's not an overpowering staff but if they understand and accept their roles that should lead to good things for us," said Senk.

This year's staff will be comprised of junior **Tim Loyal** and returning seniors **Greg MacKoul** and co-captain **Dennis Kelly**. Loyal and Kelly combined last season to pitch 108.3 innings. Loyal finished with a 3-3 record with a 3.49 ERA and Kelly produced a 4-4 record with a 3.27 ERA. They will be expected to carry the bulk of the pitching load again this season. The 1998 Seawolves pitching staff will be bolstered by the addition of lefty **Brian Keyes**, a sophomore transfer from Rhode Island and Long Island native, is expected to win a spot in the starting rotation.

Returns **Ray Fifield**, **Harrison Edwards** and **Ed Rasmison** will compete for the final spot in the rotation. Fifield and Rasmison will also be used as middle relievers. Edwards could see work in the closer role.

Three transfers will enter the Seawolves pitching scenario with hopes of strengthening the bullpen. **Moises Cruz**, a junior transfer from Suffolk Community, **David Fanning**, a senior transfer from Iona and **Keith Otto**, a senior transfer from Dowling will be used as middle relievers. **Chris Collins**, **Chris Gregory**, **Mike Johnston** and **John Zervas** are returning players who should see more time out of the bullpen. **Lee Reynolds** and **Jason Doviak** round out the pitching staff.

Infield

"Coming off the fall season our overall defense, especially in the infield, is considerably tighter than last year. That, combined with solid pitching should give us a greater opportunity to win games," said Senk. That figures to be an important area for the Seawolves as last year they were 3-7 in games decided by two runs or less and 2-5 in games decided by one run.

The infield will be led by senior co-captain **Vin Causeman**. Causeman batted .355 with 21 RBI last season for the Seawolves. Senior co-captain **Eric Dieckmann** returns to man the second base position. While he will receive the majority of playing time at second, Dieckmann will also be used as a utility infielder, able to play shortstop and third base.

Freshman **Matt Salmon** is expected to step in and start at shortstop this season and

Catcher

Sophomore **Craig Anzman** will be responsible for most of the catching duties. Last season, he batted .333 with a .417 slugging percentage. "Anzman has a cannon of an arm and should keep people from running on the basepaths against us. We expect solid receiving from him and improved power numbers," said Senk. Freshman **Omar Ramos** will spell Anzman behind the plate. "He is a solid player who will get better," said Senk.

Designated Hitter

Both Lutz and Causeman will be used in the designated hitter spot when they are not playing first base. John Salmon could also be used for speed in the DH role.

Outfield

Power hitting sophomore **George Kearnes** will return to the centerfield position and his role as cleanup hitter. Last year, Kearnes batted .302 and drove in 31 runs. Kearnes also set a new USB record for most home runs in a single season with nine round trippers. "He's got lots of tools, puts up big power numbers and has a great arm," Senk said. **Jeff Fiermonte** makes the move from first base to rightfield for this season. Fiermonte batted .345 with three homers and 19 RBI last year. Senk said "He really improved his defense over the summer. He had a solid year last season and now hopes to have an even better year in 1998."

Chris Manna will be in leftfield this season. "He's a game player, a hard worker and a solid hitter," Senk said. Last season, Manna hit .310 with a .646 slugging percentage. **Ramy Nasr**, a sophomore transfer from Lehman College, will be the first outfielder off the bench. He will also be used as a defensive replacement. The outfielding core will be rounded out by **Joe Deneroff**, a sophomore transfer from Wooster College and **Paul DiDio**, a sophomore transfer from Concordia College.

Outlook

This season looks to be a year of improvement for the Seawolves as they attempt to rebound from the disappointment of last season. The expected improvement of returning starters and the addition of key transfers and freshmen should lead to a better record for the Seawolves in '98. In addition, the improving defense and added depth in the bullpen should help Stony Brook in their efforts to reverse their fortunes from last year in close games. Nineteen-Ninety Eight promises to be a successful campaign for the Seawolves.

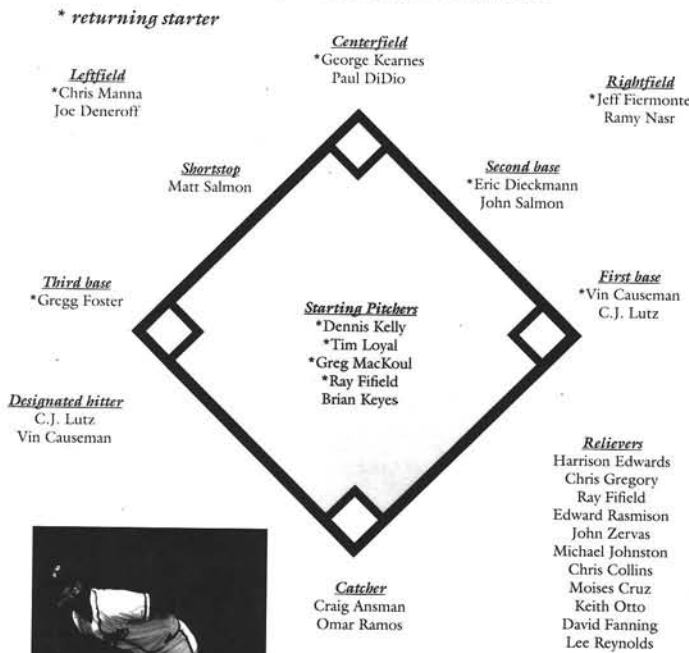

Matt Senk enters his eighth year as head coach of the baseball team at the University at Stony Brook. Senk has established a tradition of excellence for the program, both at an individual and a team level. During his tenure at Stony Brook, Senk has had 32 players named All-Conference, 15 players named All-Region Team, five players nominated for All-American honors, one signed to an independent-league contract (Frank Colon) and one (Joe Nathan) chosen in the annual Major League Baseball Free-Agent Draft. Nathan is now a member of the San Francisco Giants' 40-man roster. Academically, over 90 percent of his players have graduated and moved on into successful careers or graduate school.

In just seven seasons at Stony Brook, Senk has become the all-time winningest coach in the history of the program. Last season, Senk guided the Seawolves to a 15-19 mark after graduating nine starters from a team that went 24-17 and earned an Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) playoff bid in their first season at the Division II level. Three years ago, Senk guided the Seawolves to

a 30-8 record, including the University's first appearance in the NCAA Division III New York Regional Championships. The season prior to that, Senk led Stony Brook to a 26-9 record and the Skyline Conference title, and an appearance in the ECAC Metro NY/NJ Championship. Following that season, Senk was honored as the Skyline Conference Coach of the Year. In addition, Senk has been named the University at Stony Brook Men's Athletics Coach of the Year for the 1991-92 and 1994-95 academic years.

Prior to accepting the coaching position at Stony Brook, Senk spent three years as head coach at Kellenberg Memorial High School where his teams captured both League and Division Championships. Before coaching at Kellenberg, Senk was the head coach at St. Agnes Cathedral High School where he guided his team to a Division Championship and was named Nassau-Suffolk Catholic High School Athletic Association Coach of the Year.

Senk is a graduate of the State University of New York College at Cortland where he earned his Bachelor's degree in

Psychology in 1980. While at Cortland, Senk was the Red Dragon's starting catcher for three seasons, a two-time All-SUNYAC selection and team Most Valuable Player as a senior. Senk earned his Master's degree in Physical Education from Adelphi University. Senk is a member of the American Baseball Coaches Association and the New York State College Baseball Coaches Association.

In addition to his head coaching responsibilities, Senk is an experienced teacher and clinician. He was recently appointed the University's Coordinator of Summer Sports Camps and also teaches classes in the Department of Physical Education. Senk also oversees the University at Stony Brook Baseball Camp as well as other camps throughout Long Island.

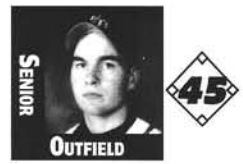

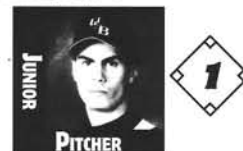

Michelle Kim begins her first season as Coach Tiso's assistant. She replaces Kim Foster who left after three years as an assistant coach at Stony Brook. Kim, a resident of Oceanside,

N.Y., graduated from Binghamton University in 1996 where she earned her degree in Psychology. The former Nassau County All-Conference player was a four-year starter for the Colonials as a setter and defensive specialist. She captained the team over her final two seasons at BU and helped lead the Colonials to a 23-17 record and the ECAC North Region semifinals last season.

In 1995, Kim was integral part of a team that posted an outstanding 40-9 mark and earned the school's first-ever SUNYAC and New York State Championship titles. That same team went to the NCAA Regional semifinals. Kim registered 576 assists and 248 digs that season. In 1996, Kim finished the season with 882 assists, the second highest single-season total in school history, and 427 digs.

1997 Seawolves Season Preview

Expectations are high within the University at Stony Brook volleyball program as the 1997 season nears. Head coach Tiso returns six players, including five with a wealth of starting experience, from last season's Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Division II Championship runners-up.

It took a while for last year's team to get rolling, but after starting the season 9-15, the Seawolves rolled off a 14-match winning streak before falling to New Haven in the New England Collegiate Conference Championships.

A Veteran Group

Leading the crop of returners will be juniors Sarah Boeckel, Carrie Doyle, Elka Samuels and Mary Schelp, and sophomore Jessica Serrano. Doyle, Samuels and Serrano provide the Seawolves with a solid hitting corps, while Boeckel and Schelp will set.

Doyle is coming off the best season of her career, as she set personal bests in kills (201), kill percentage (.236), aces (37) and digs (102). "Carrie established herself as a true team leader both on and off the floor this past season," Tiso said. "We are expecting Carrie to continue to improve her total game just like last year."

Boeckel was named a NECC Second-Team All-Star after becoming the second Stony Brook setter to record back-to-back 1,000 assists seasons. Boeckel finished the season with 1,014 assists, a team-high 59 aces and 245 digs. "Sarah has been one of the most consistent setters in the NECC the past two seasons," Tiso said of the Seawolves' 1996 Most Valuable Player.

Like Doyle, Samuels had the best season of her young career as she established career-highs in virtually every category. Samuels, a Second-Team NECC All-Star selection, finished the season with 307 kills, a .292 hitting percentage and 249 digs. "Elka came into last season a lot stronger, physically and mentally, and developed into a solid Division II volleyball player," Tiso said. "We look forward to Elka to continue to develop during the season and continue the strong play she

exhibited during our spring season." Rosie Cicciarella (Long Island Power) round out the Seawolves roster.

Plenty of Depth

Sophomore Heather Bure and newcomers Tara Reidy (Suffolk C.C.), Cynthia Orengo (Lady Warriors Club), Catrina Gordon (Lady Warriors Club) and Ivonne Estevez (St. Francis Prep) will provide the Seawolves with the depth needed to entertain ideas of capturing the NECC championship and an eighth consecutive trip to postseason play. Cheryll Sock (Westhampton Beach HS), Yin May Tuen (Lady Warriors Club), Trisha Lollo and

After playing only 55 games as a freshman, Schelp established herself as a solid contributor during her sophomore season. Last year, she played in 180 games, recording 191 digs, 67 assists and 50 kills. "Mary is probably our best all-around player," Tiso said. "The best thing about Mary is her willingness to accept any role that she is asked to take on and do an excellent job."

Serrano will have a hard time posting better numbers than she did during her award-winning

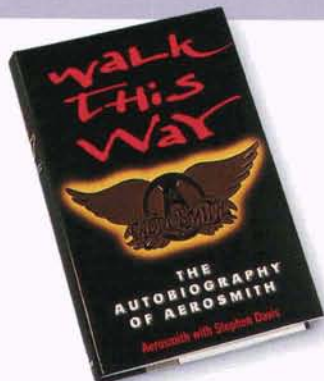

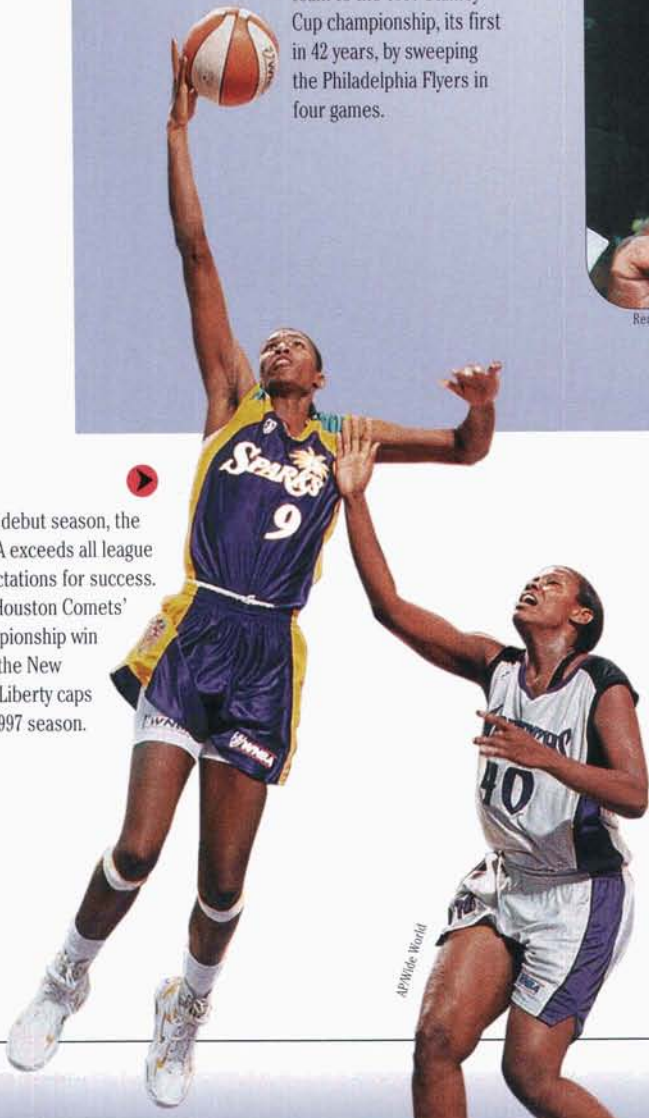
