STONY BROOK WOMEN'S 1998 SOCCER SEASON IN REVIEW

Seawolves enjoy finest season since 1994

Stony Brook, NY - The 1998 campaign was a breakthrough year for the Stony Brook women's soccer team. Although the season began slowly, the squad came together quickly as a maturing core of veterans blended with a rich influx of talent to propel Stony Brook to a successful season. The fall season for the Stony Brook women's soccer team was its finest in four years and arguably the best performance in school history. The Seawolves took on all comers as they posted an 11-5-2 record, achieved several new milestones and set the foundation for a bright future for the women's soccer program.



Fast Fact
The 1998 Stony Brook Women's Soccer Team earned the 1998-99 Stony Brook Athletics Quantum Leap Award - going from 7-11-1 in 1997 to 11-5-2 in 1998

After an opening day loss to C.W. Post, the Seawolves reeled off a team record seven straight wins en route to its best start ever in the history of the program. Buoyed by the addition of three freshmen in the starting lineup, a core of veterans provided the leadership to propel the team to success. Seniors Erica Keller, Jamie Owen and Amanda Piccirillo captained the young squad whose promise began on a road trip to Washington D.C.

Heading into the trip with a 2-1 record, the Seawolves stunned American University, 2-1, beating them for the first time ever and followed that up with a 1-0 overtime win at Mt. St. Mary's to up their record to 4-1 and set the tone for the rest of the season. The overtime win at Mt. St. Mary's was the first of three straight overtime wins that saw the team also beat Northeastern before capping off the streak with a thrilling 2-1 overtime win over local rival Hofstra. Melissa Eigen's first goal as a collegian in the second overtime against Hofstra lifted Stony Brook to the win, providing the team with just one of many exciting moments this season.

After having their seven-game win streak snapped at Marist, Stony Brook went unbeaten in its next five games, going 4-0-1 in that span. Keller provided the goal scoring punch, tallying in seven straight contests en route to becoming the University's all-time leading scorer. On October 20, Keller's second goal against Lehigh made her the all-

time leader in goals scored (42) and points scored in a career (102) eclipsing the previous mark set by Lisa Paladino. She finished her career with 45 goals and 106 points. Freshmen Lori Kotzen (6 goals) and Kerri McCabe (3 goals) also provided scoring punch for the team. McCabe led the team with three game-winning goals.

Much of the team's success this season can also be credited to the defense. Eigen, along with Lisa Mariano, Kristin Lynch, Larisa Mahns, and Elizabeth Friedler stymied opponents all year long helping goalie Jamie Owen register seven shutouts and a .880 goals against average. The .880 GAA set a new GAA record for a single season as Owen bested the mark of .98 set by Chris Foley in the 1988 season.

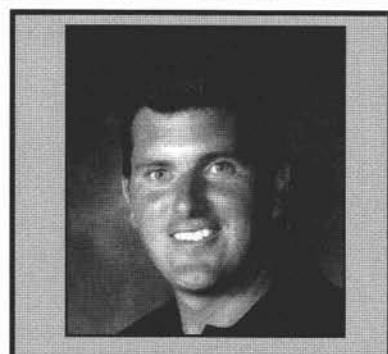
The Seawolves also got solid play at midfield from Rebecca Ferreira, Marti Yeager, Audra Dutkowsky, newcomer Janine Rollins and Piccirillo. Yeager notched two goals on the season and Dutkowsky rebounded from an early season injury to post four assists, the second best mark on the team. Tri-captain Piccirillo concluded her career at Stony Brook starting in an incredible 71 straight games since arriving on campus four years ago.

Coach Ryan was also able to call upon a deep bench to provide the team with a lift when needed. Newcomers Katherine Bemis and Michelle Dabe made significant contributions this year. Dabe notched two goals and an assist in her first season.

The team's success led to their first postseason berth since 1988, its first-ever postseason appearance at the Division I level. The Seawolves earned a bid to the ECAC Division I women's soccer playoffs and faced Yale in the semifinal round. Although the Bulldogs defeated Stony Brook, 4-1, the loss did not diminish what was an outstanding season for the Stony Brook women.

Despite being one of only two independent teams in the nation, the team still managed to garner accolades for their outstanding season. *Soccer Buzz*, an on-line women's soccer publication, tabbed Stony Brook as the third most improved team in the nation and the New York Metropolitan Intercollegiate Soccer Officials honored Stony Brook as the team that displayed the best sportsmanship during the 1998 year.

The 1998 team was a young team that featured only three seniors in the starting lineup, a sign that things will only get better for Stony Brook women's soccer. If 1998 is any indication, there is a lot to look forward to.

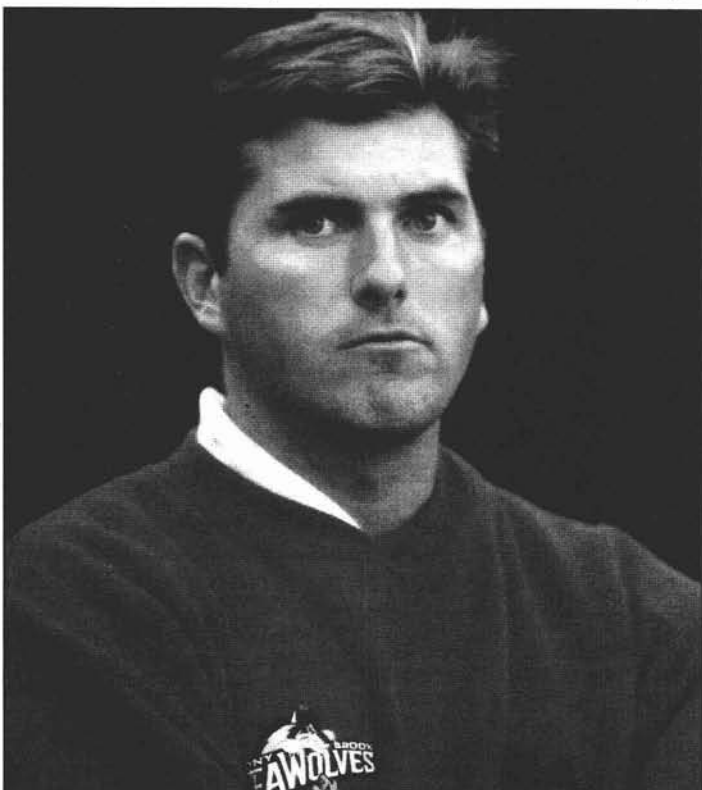
Scott Dean begins his third season as head coach of the Stony Brook Seawolves. Dean came to USB in 1997 from the University of Rhode Island after a season of serving as the URI's assistant men's soccer coach.

Last season, the Seawolves finished 8-10 and Dean was honored as NECC Coach of the Year for the turnaround from an 0-17-1 record in 1997. Dean earned his first collegiate win as a head coach just two games into

the year with a 2-0 win over NJIT. The highlight of the year was a five-game winning streak that included a 2-1 upset win over the ninth-ranked team in the nation, New Hampshire College, at University Field. The win helped establish Stony Brook as a force at home as they ended up finishing the year with a 5-1 record at University Field.

At Rhode Island, Dean was an integral part of the Rams surge to national prominence. Involved in every phase of the Rhode Island program, he helped make Rhode Island into a top 20 team and a program that was ranked as high as fourth in the nation. At the end of the regular season, Rhode Island received a NCAA Division I Tournament berth.

Prior to Rhode Island, he served as the Connecticut Olympic

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q: What are your expectations for the upcoming season?

A: We have a full Division I schedule. With the group we have, we'll be very competitive with everybody we play.

Q: How do you hope to follow up last year's success?

A: This is a year we could have anywhere from eight to 14 wins. A lot depends on the health of our players during the course of the year. There's not a team on the schedule that we can't beat.

Q: What are your thoughts on competing at the Division I level?

A: The biggest plus for us is that we've been competing in the NECC, the best Division II soccer conference in the country. We were competing with the top four teams in the conference, whose players were 24 and 25 years old on average. We did that with an 18-year-old freshman recruiting class. Now our guys will be playing athletes their own age.

Q: What will be the strengths of this year's team?

A: We're a year older, and we'll be able to rely on the guys coming back. Our new recruiting class will be very good, and our transfers coming in have competed at a high level. Not only do we have good players, but we have good players and students. They are going to gel quickly, they'll get along well and put things together pretty rapidly.

In his third season, Dean guided the team to 19 wins, which was a school record for most wins in a season.

Dean's coaching excellence has earned him numerous awards along the way. In addition to Dean's 1998 NECC Coach of the Year award, he was twice named the Shoreline Coach of the Year (1994-95) and was selected the Connecticut Senior Bowl Coach in 1993-94.



A 1988 graduate of Green Mountain College in Poultney, Vt., Dean earned a bachelor of science degree in business. At GMC, he captained the Eagles and was named to the Mayflower Conference team and the NAIA District V Team in 1987.



Upon graduation from GMC, Dean served as an assistant men's soccer coach at his alma mater for one season before moving on to become Westbrook High School's head coach for two years.

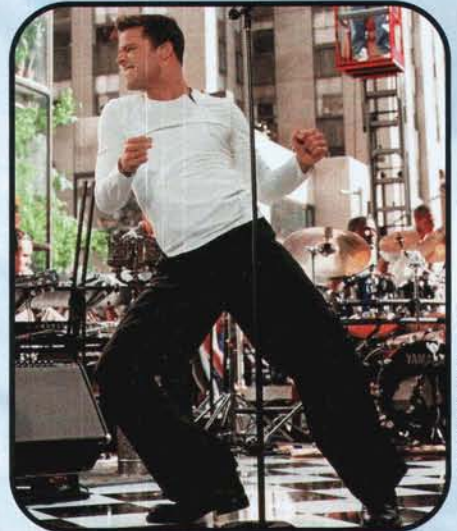

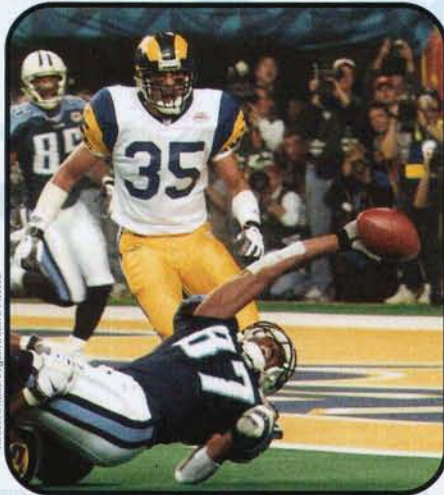

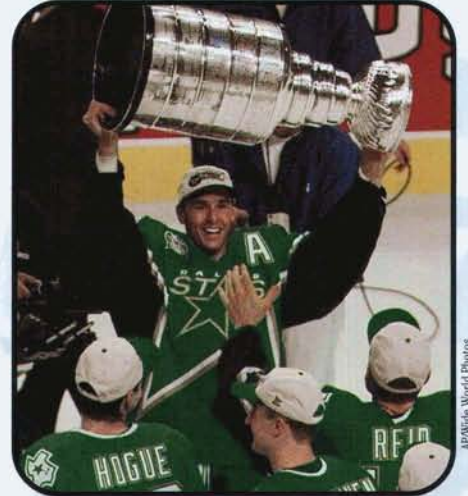

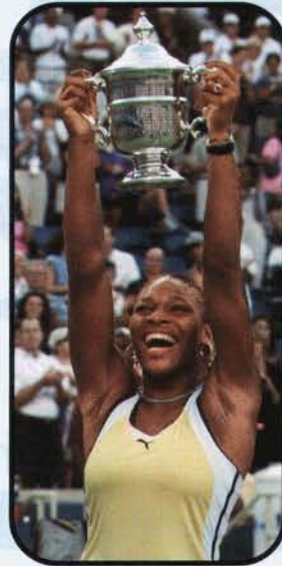

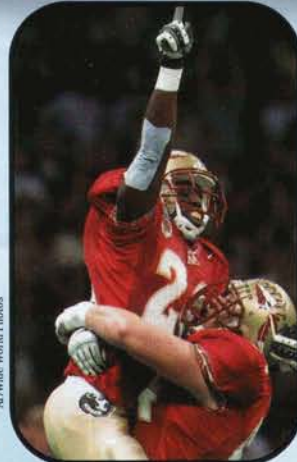

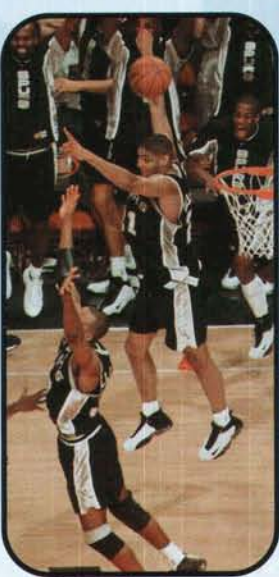
