










OCTOBER also foreshadowed the major trends of intellectual involvement for the year. The death of Woody Guthrie who sang the ideals of another college generation reminded some of us that for this land to be our land its values had to reflect the integrity of the best of its citizens. While the problem of commitment was an academic one for most of us, for many it assumed an immediacy on the March to Washington as they faced arrest for their protest of the war. Phil Ochs appeared in concert to give voice to the restless dissatisfaction and move to commitment sweeping the nation.






















Commitment on campus appeared sorely lacking to the Executive Committee as the first of the elections which were to become a liet-motif in campus affairs highlighted student apathy. Despite the diversity of the ballot listing referendums on the war and fraternity recognition, the turnout was a severe disappointment to student leaders. The Amendment Amendment, which permitted the E.C. to operate without being bogged down by the albatross of the student body, was passed only after polls were left open for three days. Disgust, channeled by the sophomore class officers, eddied into E.C. debate on motions to dissolve itself, but the rock of Stony Brook inertia prevailed, and the E.C. turned to the discussion of recruitment and Polity hired faculty as the Sophs slaughtered the Freshmen in their annual athletic and thespian challenge.



NOVEMBER brought relandscaping to G and H, but thanks to the relatively dry winter, dust was more prevalent than mud. The academic environment was further enhanced by the stripping of the pine tree on the library mall.


















Speculas were distributed to remind everyone about the good ole days but student reaction was vehement as a quick perusal informed us that the editors didn't think the good ole days were very good at all. Stony Brook's November election was an exercise in futility, as the Free College Referendum drew an overwhelming negative and Ed Salsberg was elected to the position of Senior Rep only to have his election invalidated three months later. However, such is the intrepidity of Stony Brook students and institutions, that despite these minor setbacks they both continued to function even without official sanction.

















WOMEN'S INTERCOLLEGIATE SPORTS How rare, how precious,

























DECEMBER began the crisis-a-month tradition at Stony Brook, with The Incident of December Seventh. In ironic confirmation of the Ombudsmen's report that the university is faced with "serious continuing problems", SDS chairman, Neil Frumkin was punched in the mouth while exercising free speech on the Library Mall. His assailant was an evanescent but nonetheless burly construction worker, whose attitude furthered the cause of student-administration cooperation by demonstrating an equal disdain of both groups. Ramifications led to faculty meetings and an all-night sit-in in the library, patrolled by members of the E.C. who had been auctioned off just the week before in the annual Gal-Sale. The world situation was central to campus affairs this month as it became evident that the Whitehall Street/ Smithtown draft resistance demonstrations helped to inflame the construction workers against campus protesters.





















Olatunji counselled world brotherhood as the administration attempted, with all deliberate speed, to take action against the offending workers.

Meanwhile, the theater production of "The Connection" foreshadowed January's contribution to the monthly crisis with the story of a group of drug addicts.

Christmas vacation, heralded by the University Chorus's carols and The New Campus Theatre Group's production of "A Child's Christmas in Wales", brought the administration a welcome, if temporary, release from student pressure.










For two weeks following our return from vacation, most of us were preoccupied with reviewing for, or at least worrying about finals. Academic tension was up and the outside world seemed to recede.

We hardly noticed when Stan Getz cancelled, or when our own Modern Dancers blossomed in their semiannual splendor.













Our guard was down, and Commissioner Barry feinted in the shadows and kept his eye on us. Finally, sneaking stealthily up on us in the pre-dawn gloom (and protected by 198 cops and 30 reporters) he took careful aim and delivered a right hook smack in the middle of finals week where it really hurt. He even managed a series of left jabs at Dr. Toll that caught him full in the headlines.












Barry's first-round TKO gave way to the wrestling team of Hepper and Macher whose amorphous roles presumed to protect us from ourselves with Encounter sessions, and deliver us over to Civil Authorities if we were caught smoking. We were out of the frying pot and into the fire, you might say.

While our heads (sic) were still spinning, intercession interposed itself, and the preliminary session of the study series in Political Realities I, II, and III got underway at 14 Vesey Street. The simultaneous investigation of Stony Brook by Kottler's Commission on Higher Education and Hughes' Crime Commission provided a valuable distinction between responsibility and rape. Our University was ravaged by a Crime Commission hungry for headlines, and the future of the university rested precariously in the careless hands of a Syracuse Senator and his hatchetman from the Bronx.

The Administration knuckled under pressure and imposed its own stringent rules, bypassing the duly appointed Rules Committee which had been working to revise the rules and regs since September. The Rules Committee resigned, students organized Praxis as their own response to drug abuse, and Dr. Bentley Glass was elected to the American Association of the Advancement of Science.

Stony Brook got down to the nitty-gritty and began to react. The atmosphere was never the same after the raid; a paranoid fear of headlines (we were like a woman undressing in a darkened auditorium . . . we never knew who was watching), and a newly sobered outlook replaced the careless, almost frivolous approach to problems we demonstrated during the fall semester.








The Organization for Progressive Thought attempted to usurp SDS and encompass the entire left-of-center spectrum in a grassroots approach to the 'real issues', but encountered the wall of apathy which student government battered only moderately successfully.

The war received its share of attention in a Military Service Information presentation which was passed off as the answer to the recruitment problem and the elections, which like the poor, were always with us, offered freshman council reps and polity-hired faculty referendum to an indifferent electorate.





Peter Nack stressed Intellectual Confrontation at our annual Spring Rally, and on the anniversary of Marty Dorio's mass meeting last year, students staged a mudin in Dr. Toll's office which proved, if nothing else, that we weren't ready to relinquish the symbology of mud and lights which Peter Nack said we had transcended the week before.

March Madness reigned, and not for just a weekend, either. Peter Adams resigned from his office of Soph President (or did he?) and another election was held in which No Vote was elected to fill Adam's boots. The election was invalid because No Vote wasn't running and the blank ballots got a majority anyway.

The Yippies staged a mock raid, Alan Ginsberg called us dirty names, and Jimi Hendrix demolished his guitar for us in the gym.


The Free University rose from the ashes, and let us know that despite the evidence of the student concert Stony Brook students could so do something well.



Somehow we knew that fine phrases weren't enough to counteract brutality, ignorance, and hate, on our campus or in the nation.




Four years at this University is at least a unique and hopefully at most a learning experience. Strangely enough it is often the individual who determines what and how much he learns. Surely there is an obvious problem when all the available mechanisms for learning are not employed by an educational center or by the students at that center. Ideally, all the members of a university community are deeply committed to a search for knowledge . . . all are impossible dreamers embarking on an impossible quest. Despite the phenomena of institutionalization and bleak red brick at this university there should be room for growth by every participant.

Many of us, on all levels of participation, seem to have lost sight of our purported ideals. Where are the dreamers, the seekers of knowledge? Why don't we question ... and when we do, why are the answers so often encased in non-thinking, bureaucratic, one-dimensional jargon? Why have all of us stopped trying to understand, to see beyond the tips of our noses?

To experience learning more is needed than a large variety of text-books and professors. To be a true university, we need much more than we have here ... but the need is caused not only by a dysfunctional system but by dysfunctional human beings. Somehow, somewhere we have mislaid the concepts of understanding and empathy. To become educated or to educate, we must be able to comprehend the goals of our educators and our students, to see them as unique human beings with viewpoints and perspectives of their own.

Just this simple realization of the differences between individuals does not suffice for the building of an excellent learning experience but it is a beginning. We can and must go beyond this, so that every member of the university is both teacher and student, constantly searching through listening and understanding for that vague and perhaps unattainable goal of knowledge.

FROM THE EDITOR


