



LETTER FROM THE EDITOR



ADVISORY JUDICIARY COMMITTEE

DORMITORY CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE






VWYLENK KYDIO

















ATHLETICS

With much good will on the part of the students, and a great deal of cooperation in the use of community facilities in the area, many athletic and recreational events were held this year.

Intercollegiate basketball improved with a season of four wins in ten games, and one of the outstanding performances of the year was provided in a close loss to Queens College. The performance of the players was superior, and an excellent demonstration of spirit and sportsmanship was shown by the spectators.

In moving to Port Jefferson harbor, crew again encountered the same difficulty of lack of facilities which had taken almost four years to solve at Oyster Bay. Despite this, the varsity boat beat St. John's in the opening race of the season, and finished out with two strong performances in the final two regattas.

Both cross-country and track staged strong comebacks during the year, with small squads showing promise for the future, which should be even brighter next year with the completion of our own quarter-mile track on campus. The Freshmen continued a trend started by the present Sophomore class in winning the Inter-class track and field meet.

Bowling on all levels was highlighted by a large number of participants. The varsity won two dual matches and placed third in the Athletic Association of Long Island Colleges Tournament, and the interclass matches were won by the Senior women and the Frosh men.

New sports conducted on an informal level included soccer, gymnastics, baseball and tennis. Perhaps the highlight of these programs was the first faculty softball victory in many years.

In addition to the planned sports, many activities such as dances and parties sponsored by the Recreation Advisory Group were enthusiastically received.

In the future, the completion of indoor and outdoor facilities will produce many changes in athletics and recreation. These changes will consist of increased opportunities for participation, both in new and existing activities.

The gymnasium, scheduled to open in January, will provide us with a swimming pool, handball courts, dance studio, wrestling and exercise rooms, both men's and women's gyms, and the necessary service areas. Outdoors, the additions will include six more tennis courts, a second baseball diamond, the running track, and an increase in general field areas.

ADVISORY JUDICIARY COMMITTEE

The eleven students composing the Advisory Judiciary Committee are appointed by the Executive Committee of the Polity, from a list of volunteers, to serve as counsel to Dean Tilly in cases of dormitory violations.

Pending the ratification of permanent dormitory legislation, this committee will be replaced by a new group which will perform the same function under the recently established dormitory constitution.

DORMITORY CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE

Composed of elected representatives from each hall, the Dormitory Constitution Committee was formed as a direct result of a residents' protest which expressed the desire of the students to institute their own form of government.

The constitution devised by this committee is designed to give each hall the right to decide upon their own immediate living conditions. This system, allowing for nearly complete self-government, is aimed at making dormitory life a rewarding social and educational experience.

Under the governmental structure provided by the Dormitory Constitution, the individual resident maintains a maximum of self-expression within the bounds of community living.
