Hi, everybody. This is Al Oickle of the Office of University News Services at the State University of New York, here at Stony Brook.

Today we'll be talking about a subject of interest to everyone---aging. Aging is something like heaven...everybody wants to go there but nobody wants to die to do it. Nobody wants to get older but considering the alternatives...

Jane Porcino thinks about aging a lot. Especially does she think about what happens to people when they pass into and through midlife. Indeed, her special interest is the woman who has entered this period of life. Jane Porcino knows whereof she speaks. Her own ^{midlife} experience is not uncommon, yet it is a story of fear overcome, of withdrawal defeated. She is on the faculty of the School of Allied Health Professions, here at Stony Brook, and coordinator of the Gerontology Project.

In late 1979, Dr. ~~Procino~~ Procino was named by a national magazine, called New Ms., as "one of 80 women to watch in the 1980s." This decade is about a quarter gone now and Jane Porcino is still being watched. On April 22 she was honored as a Long Island Achiever of the Year by the 110 Center for Business and Professional Women. Dr. Porcino, how does it feel, being watched by a nation?
