The subject has special relevance for the Stony Brook campus and the communities nearby because of the loss in financial assistance being threatened by the Reagan Administraton's proposals. I will give you additional information later, but for now consider that the loss projected for the Stony Brook campus alone is \$10 million in 4000 student awards for the year 1983-84. That represents about ______ percent of ______ aid given in the current year
