Today I will be talking with Elof Axel Carlson, who is distinguished teaching professor of biology at the Sate University of New York at Stony Brook. Prof. Carlson has won many honors over the years. He was awarded the prestigious Harbison Award for fifted Teaching by the Danforth Foundation (1971). His field is genectics, in which he has his doctorate, andhe is among the distinguished faculty in a new Stony Brook doctoral program in genetics offered in collaboration with the star research laboratories at Cold Spring Harbor and Brookhaven National Laboratory.

In addition, Elof Carlson is a noted researcher and author. He hasedited two volumes of the works of Nobel laureate H. J. Muller and written an acclaimed text, "The Gene---A Critical History." Now, Prof. Carlson's latest volume, a biography of the late Prof. Muller, has been nominated for the Pulitzer Prize.

All of this is, of course, most impressive, but I must say, Prof. Carlson, that my hasty research on you has turned up a most impressive part of your character that may, in fact, be omitted from a dry recitation of your curriculum vitae. And that is that you are a humanitarian in everythingyou do.
