AFO: We're going to shift focus slightly now and talk with Professor Bruce Hare of the Department of Sociology, here at Stony Brook. Professor Hare has been in the news the past month as the author of a 50-page report, entitled "The Rites of Passage: A Black Perspective." The report was repleased by the National Urban League, which commissioned the study, during its annual conference last month. A large part of the report deals with the nation's youth, and with the problems of unemployed youth.
