AFO: Less than 96 hours ago, more than a million New Yorkers went to the primary polls and established the ballot for the state elections just five weeks from tomorrow. Heading the ballots, as we all know now, will be the gubernatorial race between Mario ~~Scarrow~~ ^{Cuomo,} who has the nominations of both the Democratic and Liberal parties, and Lewis Lehrman, who has

been nominated by both the Republican and Conservative parties. ^PHi, everybody. This is "Here at Stony Brook" and I'm Al Oickle. During the next ~~last Thursday evening, the radio and television reports announced~~ half-hour, we'll be taking a look at the Thursday primaries, and what ~~the victory early on for Mr. Lehrman. The evening's surprise was~~ the results mean to New Yorkers. Here to help analyze the voting are ~~invited nationally early on~~ John V. N. Klein, a lecturer in political science at the State University of New York at Stony Brook, and former county executive in Suffolk County, and Howard Scarrow, a professor in political science, here at Stony Brook. Lew Lehrman's success in the Republican primary also was apparent soon after the polls closed. The focus of attention, then, was on the race between the Democratic candidates for governor, the incumbent lieutenant governor, Mario Cuomo, and New York City's mayor, Edward I. Koch.
