INTRO UP AND UNDER

Hi, everybody.

Jacob K. Javits has had a busy summer. The former U.S. Senator from New York has joined the corporate law firm of Parker Chapin Flattau and Kimpl in Manhattan and Melville on Long Island. He has begun work on a new book of essays about foreign policy. He has delivered two major public lectures. And he has been helping a staff of historians and librarians who are processing the thousands and thousands of documents and other items in the Jacob K. Javits Collection at the State University of New York at Stony Brook. That's not bad for anyone. But Jacob Javits is confined to a wheelchair and must use a respirator. At 80 years of age, he suffers from Lou Gehrig's disease. In a moment, we'll look at his life through the eyes of the curator of his collection.

Later in the program, we'll talk with a research pediatrician who has been alerting physicians to the danger of disease posed to children and other family members by...the family's household pets.

Senator Jacob Javits retired from the U. S. Congress in 1980 after a lifetime career of public service. Did I say "retired"? He's been at the State University of New York at Stony Brook since June working on a new book of essays on U.S. foreign policy and helping a staff sort through thousands, perhaps millions, of pieces of memorabilia and paper that the Senator has given to the Frank Melville Jr. Memorial Library at the University. The other day, I toured the large area on the library's third floor with Mary Bocaccio, the Javits Collection curator. We began in a room in which some of the staff is examining documents that date back to before World War II, when the young Jack Javits was just beginning his law career.
