An eclipse of the sun usually happens once a year somewhere in the world. But the alignment of the earth, moon and sun that results in a rare annular eclipse visible in a large part of the United States is quite rare. The United States has that treat on its 1984 calendar and we'll be talking about that eclipse, and other astronomical wonders, with Dr. Deane Peterson.
