THEME UP AND UNDER

Spring is the traditional time of year for renewal...for reawakening. Two such events will be happening in April at the Fine Arts Center at the State University of New York at Stony Brook. Professor David Lawton will be talking with us today about a Donizetti opera that will be performed with full orchestra for the first time in America since its premier in 1842. And Professor Karen Ahlquist will stop by later to tell us about some early poetry by the Long Islander, Walt Whitman, that has been set to music and which will be performed this month by the Chamber Singers at Stony Brook.

Hi, everybody. This is Al Oickle. I'm with the Office of University News Services, here at Stony Brook. And the name of this program is: Here at Stony Brook. I'll be back in a moment with Professor Lawton to talk about that reawakening of Donizetti that I mentioned earlier.

THEME UP AND OUT

David Lawton is a Californian, an associate professor of music at the State University of New York at Stony Brook for more than a decade and a scholar dedicated to opera. On the weekend of April 22-23, he will be prominent in what is being announced as "A Gala Donizetti Weekend at Stony Brook." What could be more appropriate to spring, the time of renewal and reawakening, and more appropriate to a modern campus like Stony Brook than to introduce an American audience to an opera seldom heard in the 142 years since it was written. David Lawton is not new at detective work with Italian opera. This is the third he has brought from dustly library shelves to the brightness of the Fine Arts Center stage at Stony Brook.
