Newspapers gave the conference substantial coverage. So did radio and television. The conference provided the opportunity for those involved in the woman's movement, and all others who are interested, to measure the progress made towards equality over the past decade, and to take a look at what remains.

One of the delegates from the United States was Dr. Ruth Brandwein. She is dean of the School of Social Welfare at the State University of New York at Stony Brook. Dr. Brandwein, if you had to write the headline summarizing the Decade for Women, what would the headline say?

- -- Moral-religious restraints
- -- Strategy for next 15 years to year 2000
