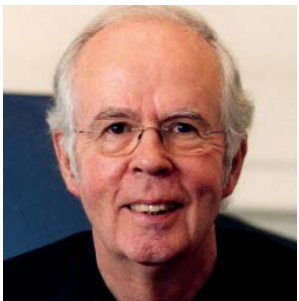


Jagdish Bhagwati

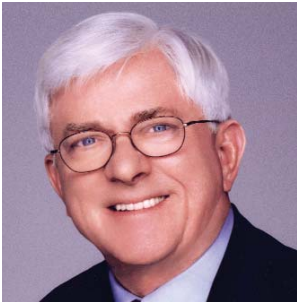


John Stachel

His research now focuses on problems in quantum gravity.
