SUNY SEGMENT #1 (Time 5:30) VIOLENCE IN SPORTS

Alvin F. Oickle, associate director of University News Services, SUNY/Stony Brook, interviews Professor Lyle Hallowell of Stony Brook's Sociology Department on the subject, "Violence in Sports." Professor Hallowell is writing a book on the subject. Hockey is emphasized.

SUNY SEGMENT #2 (Time 8:30) BONE TRANSPLANTATION

Alvin F. Oickle, associate director of University News Services, SUNY/Stony Brook, introduces Roger Dee, M.D., professor and chairperson of orthopedics in the School of Medicine in Stony Brook's Health Sciences Center. The subject is bone transplants. Dr. Dee describes the successful transplantation in the upper arm of a young Long Island woman, using a bone sent by airplane from a Miami "bone bank." Dr. Dee discusses also patients' potential psychological problems in sharing cadaver's bones.

SUNY SEGMENT #3 (Time 4:30) CHRISTMAS SPECIAL

Alvin F. Oickle, associate director of University News Services, SUNY/Stony Brook, talks with Professor Peter Manchester of Stony Brook's Center for Religious Studies and Professor Robert Goldenberg of the Judaic Studies Program. The subject: "1,982 Years Later." This is an appropriate program during the December holiday season. It covers the birth of Christ and compares the human condition then and now.

SUNY SEGMENT #4 (Time 5:02) TALK ABOUT TEACHING

Alvin F. Oickle, associate director of University News Services, SUNY/Stony Brook, interviews Elof Carlson, distinguished teaching professor in Stony Brook's Biochemistry Department, and recipient of Danforth Foundation and Chancellor's awards in teaching. The subject: Teaching.

SUNY SEGMENT #5 (Time 6:46) WITCHCRAFT

Alvin F. Oickle, associate director of University News Services, SUNY/Stony Brook, interviews Helen Lemay, professor of history at Stony Brook, on the subject of witchcraft. This is an appropriate program during October, before Halloween.

SUNY SEGMENT #6 (Time 6:20) "CHINESE TYPEWRITER"

Alvin F. Oickle, associate director of University News Services, SUNY/Stony Brook, interviews Dr. Christopher George, adjunct associate professor in religious studies and research director of the Institute for Advanced Studies of World Religions at Stony Brook. He has invented Asiagraphics, "a Chinese typewriter." Asian languages, using his computer program, can be written with the 26-character Roman alphabet and develop a print-out in the thousands of ideographic characters of the Asian language. (NOTE: Air-conditioning motors hum in the background throughout.)

SUNY SEGMENT #7 (Time 7:52) BLACK HISTORY

Alvin F. Oickle, associate director, University News Services, SUNY/Stony Brook, interviews Professor Amiri Baraka of Stony Brook's Interdisciplinary Program in Africana Studies and Lloyd Sargeant, an admissions counselor and president of the Black Faculty and Staff Association at Stony Brook, on black history. This is appropriate for February/Black History Month. (Note: Professor Baraka formerly was known as Leroi Jones.)

SUNY SEGMENT #8 (Time 9:51) DES DAUGHTER

Alvin F. Oickle, associate director, University News Services, SUNY/Stony Brook, interviews Joyce Bichler '75, author of DES Daughter. The Associated Press reported on May 12, 1982: "New York's highest court yesterday upheld a ruling that drug manufacturer Eli Lilly and Co. is liable for damages suffered by a woman whose mother took the drug DES during pregnancy. The seven-judge Court of Appeals ruled unanimously that the drug company must pay a \$500,000 award even though the court conceded that there is no proof that Joyce Bichler's mother took Lilly-made DES during her pregnancy. Ms. Bichler claims the drug was responsible for the cervical and vaginal cancer she developed in 1971."
