INTRO UP AND UNDER

Hi, everybody. Who and what are you? That's a serious question with its roots in history. Who are you? How did you become what you are? Is having white skin, or black skin, a genetic accident of birth, as most of us might respond, or are we white, or black, or some other color, as a matter of moral choice?

These intriguing and challenging questions have been asked publicly most recently by the noted novelist, James Baldwin.

Today, we'll hear some of what Mr. Baldwin had to say about this during a recent lecture at the State University of New York at Stony Brook.

Mr. Baldwin raised the question of identity while calling for reconciliation and confrontation --- reconciliation with ourselves through confrontation with our history. Mr. Baldwin, of course, has answers to such questions. His answers might be unsettling to some. It has to do with the American experience, and how about different that experience is for white people and for people of color. He began by recalling a Roberta Flack song called "Compared to What?"
