## GUIDELINES FOR COPYING 1981-82 "SUNY SIDE UP" TAPES

1 - Copy each one intact from the ree-to-reel to a cassette.
2 - Keep tem in order----TWO on each eassette. (See Master List.)
3 - Type a label for each cassette, giving show number, date aired, and other details on existing labels.

4 - Monitor each of the tapes placed in a special pile as possible SUNY Central radio segments. Take short segments from all those that seem appropriate. No less than three minutes, no more than 10.

NOTE: They are asking for cassettes, and permitting more than one to be placed on each tape. Allow space between each one. Although SUNY doesn't say so, I recommend you introduce each one very simplE; e.g., "This is Stony Brook Segment Number One," or, "Stony Brook Segment Number One, Al Oickle speaks first, Bentley Glass speaks second," the latter to give them voice ID.

5 - Prepare a brief introduction and explanation of the discussion and show to Al Oickle before having it clean-typed.

TIP: When you monitor those tapes being considerdd for SUNY Central, timeliness must be the first consideration:

A - Very timely; e.g., Prof. Helen Lemay discusses witcheraft, a natural for the Halloween period.
B - Timeless. Most of them will fall into this category. Imagine a radio listener in Albany next January, one who never heard of Stony Brook. The discussion must be of interest to that listener.
