In just one and a half years, the Stony Brook Health Sciences Center Community - School Healthcare Advocacy Program and student development programs have reached greater than 2000 participants from low-income and minority communities. Below is a listing of the activities already conducted in this program. Opportunities exist for faculty and staff participation, if you are interested in participating in any of these activities, please contact Hector Sepulveda MD, MA, MPH, Special Assistant for Healthcare Advocacy, he would welcome your support and interest.

I am proud of the work that all the HSC schools have done in joining as a team to outreach groups on Long Island. I am impressed by the example these students who devote their time and energy set for others. They have become role models for others to emulate. Each them makes a difference by caring and sharing what they have with those who have less.

1. "Healthy People, Healthy Families, Healthy Communities" Community outreach in health educational, screening, and resource development.
2. "Healthy choices for now and the future: Adolescent Health Conferences" exposes children to health professions, education on preventive health, and generates opportunities for shadowing and mentor programs.
3. "Healthy Seniors": Community Health Outreach: Helping community through education on preventive health, screening, and resource development.

4. Probation and Jail Community Health Outreach for at risk populations: An extension of the adolescent health program, which is catered towards the needs of this population. We emphasize drug and alcohol prevention, mental health, violence prevention, and resource development.
5. Long Island East End Community Forum partnership with Diabetes Resource Coalition Stimson Middle School (Huntington L.I.): Adolescent Outreach.
 - A. "Project Excel" : Mentorship Program.
 - B. "Teaching our Children to Practice Good Health."
(Parent conference on child health issues).
6. Child and Family Health Plus Outreach Program (CHPS).
7. Elder and migrant Flu Vaccination Outreach Program.
8. AMSA: Community Outreach Program resource coordination.
9. Latino Health Initiative of Suffolk County Partnership.
10. Intergenerational Strategies of Long Island Program: Learning from our elder professionals developing tomorrow's leaders.
11. Primary Care Partnership Program (Family Practice and Pediatrics): Allows students to work side by side with primary care physicians in various community settings learning how to culturally interact with populations needs.
12. General Clinical Research Center: Community Outreach: Program shows students the importance of clinical research and community involvement in research.
13. Gay, Lesbian and Transgender Community Partnership: Educates students on the health care needs of the community by creating an interactive forum (both in the classroom and field) for students to learn and have questions answered by community members and leaders.
14. Wyandanch Health Center Health Literacy Program: Demonstration program, which emphasizes the importance of plain language and patient health care education.

Educational:

1. HSC 500: Teaches students intercultural interaction amongst different health professions.
2. "ACT" AIDS Community Teaching Outreach Program: Educating high school students on the dangers and risks of falling into peer pressure.
3. Public Health Interest Group (Graduate and Undergraduate) HSC Program: Development of students in the field of public health and research show casing program development, coordination and partnership building.
4. Minorities in Medicine Program: Mentoring program with undergraduate students interested in health care and becoming doctors.
5. General Clinical Research Center: Community outreach screening skills workshop program.
6. C3: Career, Culture and Competence: Program, which provides a forum for cross professional cultural understanding, community cultural awareness and career opportunities through a series of lectures planned throughout the year. All students from the five schools of health work together in this program's coordination.
7. American Medical Association Medical Spanish Outreach Program coordination.

GRANT TO TRAIN LOW INCOME HEALTHCARE WORKER

Stony Brook University Hospital has received a \$220,000 New York State grant for a unique program designed to recruit and train healthcare workers from low income households. The program will develop the training curriculum in cooperation with the School of Health Technology and Management, the School of Nursing, and the School of Dental Medicine, components of Stony Brook's Health Sciences Center.

The grant is designed to support Stony Brook's effort to help address the regional shortage of healthcare workers in specific fields while providing opportunities for eligible participants to upgrade their skills.

The effort will create employment advancement opportunities for people with low incomes and remove financial barriers to training and education. Participants will be trained as nursing assistants, dental assistants, phlebotomists or surgical technicians. Approximately 30 positions will be created in the first year of the program, most of those within Stony Brook University Hospital and the Health Sciences Center.

"This program is an example of the critical mass that Stony Brook can assemble in order to develop an initiative that responds to a specific need-in this case, a shortage of healthcare workers-while at the same time providing its resources to the surrounding community in a way that aids those with low incomes," said Lee Xippolitos, R.N., Ph.D., the program administrator and Chief Nursing Officer at the hospital.

Specifics of the program include:

- A five-week, 200-hour training course to develop nursing assistants.

- A full-time, 10-month program to train dental assistants, dental receptionists, and dental laboratory assistants.

- A six-week program to train students on blood-collection techniques, specimen requirements, and processing.

- A full-time, seven-month program to develop surgical technicians.

Bessie Ortega, Associate Director of Community Relations for the hospital, will work with various organizations throughout Suffolk County to identify candidates for the training. Key organizational support has been provided by the Suffolk County Department of Health, Community Housing Innovations, Inc., the Town of Islip Department of Human Services, and the Shinnecock Nation. In addition, the Suffolk County Department of Social Services will provide child care assistance and the Suffolk County Department of Labor will provide short-term transportation assistance to individuals who meet their requirements.

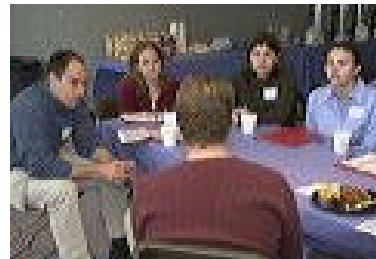
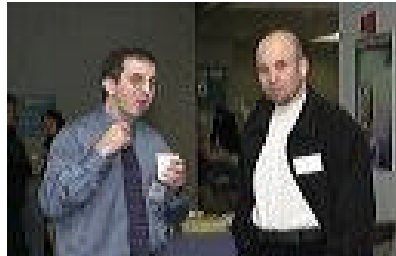
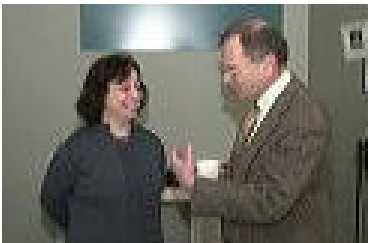
