

As part of the festivities, there will be a re-dedication ceremony of the original MRI device in the Chemistry Building lobby.

Gail Mandel, Professor of Neurobiology and Behavior,

received notification that her position as Investigator of the Howard Hughes Medical Institute has been renewed for a second five year term. The HHMI funds investigators at the top research institutions and these investigators are heavily sought after. Dr. Mandel is the only HHMI investigator in the entire SUNY system. The scientific intelligencia reviewing for the HHMI, consist of members of the National Academy of Sciences and Nobel prize Laureates. Their decision are based upon the quality and importance of scientific contributions.

Harold Bien, an MD/Ph.D. student, working under the mentorship of Emilia Entcheva, Assistant Professor, both of Biomedical Engineering, has won an Individual National Research Service Award (NRSA) from the NIH-National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences (NIEHS). This is the first predoctoral NRSA awarded to Stony Brook by the NIEHS. The title of Harold's research is: "Myocardial response to particulate matter air pollution," and will be supported by providing Harold's stipend, tuition and some extra funds (direct cost approximately \$85k) over the next three years.

Craig Lehmann, Dean of the School of Health, Terchnology, and Management and Paul Werfel, Director of the Paramedic **Program** just received the state exam results for the paramedic course. Their class exceeded the statewide average (based upon 279 candidates statewide) in 10 out of 11 categories. They exceeded the EMT-Basic average by 3.3% and the Paramedic by 6%! In the cardiovascular section of the exam, they exceeded the state average by almost 10% (9.76%)! That is a huge difference in the most core area of paramedic management.
