#### RECENT FACULTY/DEPARTMENT AWARDS/HONORS

Professor Kenneth Lindblom of the English Department has been chosen to be the editor of the *English Journal*, the premier national journal for secondary English. The *English Journal* is the oldest and most widely read of the National Council of Teachers of English's eight journals.

According to a recent study by the Center for the Study of Democracy, University of California at Irvine, Stony Brook University's Department of Political Science is ranked fifth in the country in terms of percentage of Ph.D.'s who receive tenure track positions at other doctoral institutions.

#### **UPDATE ON WINTER SESSION 2007**

To date, Winter Session 2007 has enrolled 928 students (725 taking courses on the West campus, 187 taking courses at Stony Brook Manhattan, and 16 taking courses towards the MBA program). Stony Brook is office 65 courses (50 courses west campus, 15 east campus) as well as 6 courses as part of the Study Abroad Program, to be held in the following cities:

Last year's Winter Session enrolled 875 students (85.8% undergraduate, 14.2% graduate) and offered forty-six courses (37 undergraduate, 9 graduate); seven of which were offered at Stony Brook Manhattan.

The increase in enrollments this semester is partially attributed to the success of our first Winter Session last year and to an increase in advertising this year. There were 2 weeks of heavy advertising radio stations WALK and WBLI in mid-November, as well as weekly ads in Newsday, Times Beacon-Record and on-campus sites.

The incentive program that was piloted last year is in place for this year's session.

Winter Session 2007 will run from January 2-19, 2007. The following information has been provided to faculty and provides guidance for course offerings.

#### **General Information**

- Winter Session 2007 course offerings will include Main Campus, Stony Brook Manhattan and Study Abroad Programs.
- Winter Session is patterned on Summer Session in terms of policies, procedures, and revenue models
- Winter Session teaching counts as extra service and does not count toward regular teaching load.
- Students pre-pay for courses. Most will not be eligible for additional financial aid for the Winter Session. In some cases alternative loans may be available. Students will be advised to meet with a Financial Aid Counselor to determine what options may or may not be available.
- The Office of the Provost is working with the libraries, bookstore, Instructional Computing, and other relevant offices to insure adequate student services.

 We do not anticipate opening Residence Halls that would not otherwise be open. (Residence Hall housing will only be available for students who are currently in residence.)

### Courses, Credits, and Calendar

- Winter Session courses will meet 12 times for 3 hrs 25 mins. Courses will meet four days a week. (TuWThF) (except MBA courses which will meet on weekends).
- Most courses will be 3 credits. Courses from 1-4 credits may also be available.
- To allow for SUNY mandated time out of class, students will be limited to no more than 4 credits.
- The attached calendar indicates the schedule for this Winter Session. The schedule allows for adjustment for weather-related cancellations.

#### **Course Offerings and Deadlines:**

- In order to accommodate curriculum committees, winter session offerings involving new courses were required by Sept. 15. In order to coordinate facilities and other logistics the Provost's Office requested the full list of Winter Session offerings by October 20, 2006.
- Departments were encouraged to offer courses for which there is unmet demand, in particular DEC and gateway courses.

#### Academic Policy for "Cancelled Class Sessions"

Any class sections(s) that are "cancelled" must be rescheduled on a "scheduled make-up date" in order to provide students with the number of hours of instruction required for the credits to be earned at the end of the Winter Session term.

This requirement must be adhered to as per the State Education Department (SED).

In order to comply with SED requirements, "Make-Up" class sessions will be held at the same class time as the Tuesday-Friday class schedule.

# Faculty, instructors and graduate students must be prepared to schedule make-up session(s) for any class sessions that are cancelled during the scheduled dates provided.

It is the student's responsibility to drop themselves from a waitlisted course. If a student is registered directly from the waitlist and the student does not drop the course by January 4th, the student is responsible for tuition resulting from the registration.

No petitions for exceptions to University policy and deadlines will be accepted for Winter Session courses.
