2. Copy Paper Prices Increase

International Paper Mills has increased its prices due to the rising costs of energy and raw materials for the manufacturing, transportation and distribution of copy paper products, resulting in an increased cost to their distributors. Effective April 10th 2006, copy paper prices under the Staples contract have increased. At the request of the Procurement Office, Staples has agreed to a curtailed price increase. The price of Staples Red Box paper (8.5 x 11) has increased to \$26.90 a carton and will hold firm until 7/1/06, at which time the price will increase to \$27.90 a carton, provided that no additional price increases will be passed along by International Paper Mills.
