will assemble for five evenings, April 16-May 18.in groups of 10-15 in five or six locations: Three Village, Port Jefferson-Port Jefferson Station, Mount Sinai-Miller Place, Rocky

Point-Sound Beach, Shoreham-Wading River, and northern Longwood School District. Facilitators will be expected to bring out constructive ideas from all the participants without imposing their own views, and to summarize what has been said without bias

or distortion. A full day of training will be given on a preceding Saturday so that facilitators will be prepared to play their part successfully, and a debriefing meeting will be held on

a Saturday following the five sessions.

The organizer, Philip Lynn of Stony Brook, says: "Study Circles are small discussion groups that provide a simple way to involve community members in dialogue and action on social and political issues. They lead to positive change and help to build the bonds that are essential to creating healthy communities." The resulting common basis of understanding helps to avoid misinterpretations that can lead to problems and provides the framework for viewing and enhancing various components of a course. Participants also gain valuable insights into why students react differently to different types of feedback.
