Even though evolution has been considered a fact by most biologists for over a century, it is considered controversial by a large fraction of the American public. Partly on this acount, the subject is often neglected or avoided in educational curricula. However, evolution is as thoroughly supported as any principle in science. Moreover, it is an essential framework for understanding almost all of biology, and plays increasingly important roles in health sciences, food production, pest management, and many other applications.
