The Stony Brook Music Department is pleased to welcome world renowned pianist, Leon Fleisher, who will conduct the Symphony Orchestra on the Main Stage at the Staller Center for the Arts

8:00 p.m. Saturday, February 17. Fleisher, who studied piano with Artur Schnabel, was the first American winner of a major international competition, the Queen Elisabeth of Belgium in

1952. Making his debut with the New York Philharmonic and Pierre Monteux at age 16, he has since performed as a soloist with many international orchestras and festivals throughout the United States, Europe, and South America. He has recorded for Columbia, Sony Classical, and Philips recording companies. From 1985-1997 Fleisher was the Artistic Director of the Tanglewood Music Center

and is currently Co-artistic Director for the Theatre Chamber Players of the Kennedy Center. Fleisher is a member of the Academy of Arts and Sciences and teaches piano at Peabody Conservatory.

Saturday's concert also features Concerto Competition winner Shih-Yu Cheng performing in Prokofiev's Concerto No. 3 for Piano and Orchestra.
