A Lotus Notes security flaw has been discovered. The flaw is in the Lotus Notes File Attachments Viewer and can be exploited if a user opens an e-mail attachment with malicious code. We recommend not opening e-mail attachments from anyone you do not know, keep your virus definitions up to date, and consider upgrading to Lotus Notes release 7.0.3 which will be available on Softweb as of 10 a.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 30, 2007.
