The trip began with a private tour that included a rare stop in the General Assembly, by the highly skilled and very informative South African tour guide, Tumi. The next stop was to the Offices of Ambassador Aisi, for a private, intimate, catered luncheon where the Ambassador dedicated an extraordinary two hours to conversation with students and Professor Michael Sperazza. Discussions included Eco Farming in India, GM Food Eradication, Mining in Papua New Guinea, Sea Level Rise, Women's Reproductive Rights, Marine Ecosystems, Deforestation, real G 20 successes in Copenhagen, and Ambassador Aisi's intention to build a strong relationship with Stony Brook Southampton in the years to come. A special highlight of the day was when Ambassador Aisi shared one of his treasured secrets to successful diplomacy, 'My mother always told me, you have two ears and one mouth. 
