Pulitzer Prize winner Marsha Norman and writer/director and iTheatrics CEO Tim McDonald.

Marsha Norman was awarded the Pulitzer Prize, Susan Smith Blackburn Prize, Hull-Warriner, and Drama Desk Awards for 'Night Mother; a Tony Award and Drama Desk Awards for The Secret Garden; and the John Gassner Medallion, Newsday Oppenheimer award, and the American Theatre Critics Association Citation for Getting Out. Other plays include Third and Oak, The Laundromat, The Poolhall, The Holdup, Traveler in the Dark, Sarah and Abraham, Loving Daniel Boone, and Trudy Blue. She also wrote the book for The Color Purple, currently on Broadway. Published work includes Four Plays and a novel, The Fortune Teller. Television and film credits include Face of a Stranger, starring Gena Rowlands and Tyne Daley. Norman is co-chair, with Christopher Durang, of the Playwriting Department of the Juilliard School and vice president of the Dramatists Guild of America.

Timothy A. McDonald is a respected director and playwright (Roald Dahl's Willy Wonka, The Ant and the Elephant, The Musical Adventures of Flat Stanley) and CEO of the New York-based educational musical theatre consulting company iTheatrics. Tim directed sold-out performances of *The Phantom* Tollbooth at The Kennedy Center and served as playwright and director for the Kennedy Centercommissioned production of Roald Dahl's Willy Wonka in 2004, which subsequently toured the United States for two seasons. Tim is currently developing a stage version of the classic *James and the* Giant Peach, which will be performed with the prestigious Pilobolus Dance Company, and is the coplaywright of the stage production of Jim Henson's *Emmet Otter*, which had its world premiere at Goodspeed Musicals in November 2008. Prior to founding his company, iTheatrics, Tim created and developed Music Theatre International (MTI) Education, the first educational division in a major musical theatre-licensing firm. For ten years Tim worked side-by-side with theatrical greats (including Cameron Mackintosh, Stephen Sondheim, Arthur Laurents, Stephen Flaherty, Lynn Ahrens, Stephen Schwartz and Sheldon Harnick) to create age-appropriate versions of classic musicals – such as Les Misérables, Annie, Meredith Willson's The Music Man and Into the Woods - for students to perform, along with corresponding educational materials. While at MTI, Tim also teamed with Disney Theatricals to adapt beloved Disney animation titles – including Aladdin, The Jungle Book, Cinderella, Mulan, and 101 Dalmatians – for the stage, virtually creating the "direct to licensing" musical theatre market. Through iTheatrics' partnership with Stephen Gabriel of Work Light Productions, Tim has developed five new Theatre for Young Audiences touring shows: Broadway Junior on Tour, Disney's Discover Theater!, Frankly Ben, The Musical Adventures of Flat Stanley, and The Ant and the Elephant.
