To give Freshmen and Transfer students a taste of the Stony Brook life, the University Student Affairs office began a series of "Opening Activities" from August 30 to continue through October 2. The little over a month long activities includes BBQs, bus trips, movies and other socials introducing students to the different cultural events on campus, culminating in the annual Homecoming Festivities on October 1st, and 2nd. Throughout this period, a sea of "red shirts" can be seen helping newcomers and familiarizing them with building locations. These are volunteers who each year, assist the Student Affairs and Dean of Student offices in the mammoth task of

helping new students to settle into campus life here at Stony Brook. As these new students and their parents arrive and begin to unload, another set of "red shirts" called the Welcome Wagon, can be seen assisting them with their luggages and finding their respective accommodations.

For the first time starting this semester, every first-year student has been assigned an Undergraduate College based on his/her general interest. According to the official Undergraduate Colleges website, these colleges are "designed to support and develop the interests of students and assist them in taking advantage of the vast resources Stony Brook has to offer."

These colleges are the College of Information and Technology Studies, the College of Arts, Culture, and Humanities, the College of Science and Society, the College of Global Studies, the College of Leadership and Service, and the College of Human Development. There will be subsequent articles on each individual college over the next several months.

Another fresh start is the new look of the SOLAR system. For those who don't know, SOLAR is an acronym that stands for Students On-Line Access to Records. SOLAR has information on your class schedule, a course description, your unofficial transcript, enrollment appointment dates, it even has messages that the University wants to relay to you, from time to time. By this, every student has been on the SOLAR system at least once. For incoming Freshmen and Transfer students this may not seem strange. However, for the "seasoned veterans" who have been on the system one time too many, this new SOLAR is a welcome change. According to some students, the new SOLAR is "cool!" There are a lot more features and access to information. Not everyone likes the new system however. According to one student who didn't want us to use his name (for fear of the Registrar's office), he preferred the old SOLAR. "It doesn't look welcoming, he said. "It looks cheesy!"




Returning students still make up the majority of the students staying on campus and some of them felt reluctant about coming back to school a day before the beginning of classes because that



# Ivan The Terrible

Hurricane Ivan, the third major hurricane to hit the Caribbean and southeastern United States in less than a month, has left a trail of destruction all across the Caribbean and when last reported, was expected to hit the Florida Keys on Monday.

Following on the heels of hurricanes, Charley and Frances, Ivan has brought more damage to the already devastated Caribbean islands and U.S. coastline.

When the class four hurricane struck the island of Grenada this past week it left over 20 people dead and over 90 percent of the homes on the island in ruins. According to CNN, in a statement given on Thursday by the Associated Press' United Nations Spokesman, Fred Eckhard, most of the major buildings in St. Georges have suffered structural damage and the United Nations was sending their disaster team to help relieve victims.

This was reported to be the largest hurricane to hit the Caribbean, thus far, in ten years. In response to the extreme amount of damage caused by Ivan on the island, the U.S. has officially declared Grenada a disaster area. The U.S. will immediately send \$50,000 to the island and plans to send more in the future.

As of this writing, Ivan was reported by the Associated Press to be just a few miles away from Jamaica and was producing winds of up to 150 miles per

hour. As of Saturday's projected forecast, Ivan was expected to hit Jamaica by late Friday evening into Saturday morning. It was expected to cause a lot of damage when it reached the mainland of Jamaica early Friday morning and the coast of Florida on Monday.

Interestingly, it was 16 years ago this

same time that Hurricane gilbert created havoc on the small island, killing 45 people and leaving \$600 million in damages in it's wake. As of this writing, tourists were gathering at the airports to get on any available flight out of this island paradise

People in Haiti and the Dominican Republic were praying that Ivan will not cause a repeat of the floods they had this past May. During those floods over 1,500 people died between the two respective countries. They also took heavy damage when Charley and Frances hit.

Government officials in both the Caribbean and U.S. have been evacuating many residents and preparing for the worst. In both countries, people are still trying put their lives back together after being pummeled by Charley and Frances. Many people lost their homes, livelihoods, and family members. Even so, they now have to prepare to deal with an even stronger storm in Ivan

This is of concern to many Stony Brook students, as many of them are from the Caribbean and may have families still residing there. Our sympathies to all the families in Grenada and Jamaica!

> **Psyched Out** By Curtis Morris

An inter office memo originating in the Psychology department implied that PSY 347, Psychology of the African American Experience, a new course to be added to the Spring 1998 curriculum will not be a useful addition because it will "attract large numbers of students with poor academic credentials."

The memo, addressed to Richard Gerrig, Psychology Undergraduate Director and Judy Thompson, Psychology Chairman Assistant, also said that "the course does not appear to easily fit into our new core curriculum. We should not get into the habit of altering the new curriculum structure whenever a new course is proposed or else we would be back where we started before we undertook the curriculum revision."

The 300-level course will examine the broad spectrum of theory, research, and practice in relation to the study of psychosocial experiences from the unique framework of the history and culture of African Americans. Both the course and topic are entirely new at Stony Brook. The class will taught by Shawn N. Thompson, a Psychology graduate student, who has also designed the curriculum.



Psychology faculty members involved with the memo, Dr. Brener confirmed that he did indeed write and circulate the memorandum. While Brener admitted that the memo was, "very embarrassing," he went on to explain the meaning of what Professor Thompson catagorized as, "a poorly worded document." "The reference here to 'poor academic credentials refers entirely and only to the adequately prepared in Psychology [sic]. And since this was going to be an upper division course, we wanted to ensure that students would be adequately prepared to undertake a serious study of Black psychology said Brener. The psychology chairman explained that the premise behind the memo was based on a desire to protect Thompson from an over-enrollment of students outside of the psychology

BLACKWORLD spoke with Dr. William McAdoo, Chair of Africana Studies, concerning the memo, and he stated that Dr. Brener had called him to discuss the matter once the it became public. When shown the memo, Dr. McAdoo expressed astonishment that such a memo could emanate from the Psychology department let alone from Dr. Brener, who he had known to be an ardent opponent of Apartheid in the past. Dr. McAdoo. However, expressed the concern that in substance and tone, despite what was intended, the last paragraph of the memo unfortunately had the appearance of harboring "sexist, racist and elitist assumptions." He also observed, that given the unfortunate fact that this memo is now in the public domain, and given the current assault on Affirmative Action, it prove highly inflammatory.

Dr. Brener could not provide any reasonable explanation as to why the memo was not addressed or sent to Shawn Thompson directly, if it indeed was designed "to protect." Nor could he legitimize the fact that the Black Psychology course will be limited to juniors and seniors who have already taken core curriculums in Psychology, presumably eliminating those poor students. In academically accordance with University guidelines, graduate instructors are prohibited from teaching over sixty students, thereby solving any overcrowding issues. The Black Psychology course will not be cross listed, like the Psychology of Women course, which is cross listed with a Women's Studies course and is taught by faculty member.

#### National Association of Black Journalists (NABJ) Leaders Passed On Over the Summer

Carl Morris, a former National Association of Black Journalists' Executive Director, and several other black journalists, regrettably have died this summer. Morris, also founder of the National Association of Minority Media Executives, and publisher of an industry newsletter on diversity, "The Morris Memo," a newsletter on people of color and the media, died on August 27, 2004 at the age of 73.

The National Association of Black Journalists is an organization of journalists, students and mediarelated professionals, in which Blackworld is a member, that provides quality programs and services to journalists and advocates on their behalf. It is the largest organization of minority journalist in the world.

As the Executive Director, he was adamant about publishing material on the accomplishments of black journalists, such as Pulitzer Prize winners. Sidmel Estes-Sumpter remembers him as having a "...no-nonsense attitude" and deep dedication to the organization.

Peggy Peterman, a 1989 lifetime achievement award winner, also passed in August. She died at the age of 67 on August 19. Peterman was also a longtime reporter, columinst and editorial at the St. Petersburg Times, having worked there 31 years. She helped change the face of the newspaper as well as She mentored the community. dozens of young journalists throughtout the years; founded and directed a black history pageant and later in life, became a minister. According to Paul Tash, the St. Petersburg Times' editor and chairman, "She challenged the newspaper to make room for new voices."

It's a long way from the Apollo Theatre to the Apollo program. And while his playing may have been "as lofty as a moon flight," as Time magazine once suggested, that would be as close as Louis Daniel Armstrong would ever get to taking "one small step for man."

But as the premier jazz musician of the 20th



Armstrong left his footprints all over the jazz world. And he usually did it in lace-up oxfords.

century, giant leaps were a matter of course for Satchmo. No person before or since has ever embodied - and revolutionized — jazz the way Louis Armstrong did.

Take solos, for instance. It's impossible to imagine jazz without them. But they actually didn't become an established part of the jazz vocabulary until Armstrong helped popularize them. Seventy years later, his solos are still revered for their audacity and virtuosity.

In the 1950s, when his popularity became too big to be contained within our borders, he accepted an invitation from the State Department to act as an American goodwill ambassador around the world. And when he

became the last jazz musician to hit #1 on the Billboard pop chart, he beat the Beatles to do it.

Not bad for a kid whose first experience with a trumpet was as a guest in a New Orleans correction home for wayward boys. If only today's schools were as enlightened as that reformatory was.


Which makes it so surprising that the arts have been allowed to virtually disappear from our schools. And our children's lives.





The most of us, don't have enough





#### Dear A.D.

According the University Student Conduct Code, "No student shall take,


whether by omission or commission, any action, create, or participate in the creation of any situation that recklessly or intentionally endangers another person's psychological, mental, or physical health or that involves the forced consumption of liquor or drugs for the purpose of initiation into or affiliation with any organization. Examples of hazing activities include, but are not limited to:

"In the case of an organization that authorizes such conduct, there will be a rescission of permission"

paddling or other physical abuse or brutality; activities that involve illegal acts of excessive fatigue and/or stress; verbal and/or psychological abuse that compromises the dignity of individuals. Hazing conduct may result in charges and arrest under the New York State Penal Law, and charges under this CODE, which can lead to suspension or expulsion from the University and withdrawal of chapter recognition. In the

case of an organization that authorizes such conduct, there will be a rescission of permission for that organization to operate on campus property. Students who are members of fraternities, sororities, or other campus organizations, whose campus recognition has been suspended either temporarily or permanently, are not permitted to participate as individuals, or as a group, in any campus activities or events, i.e., Rush/Pledge Program, Athletics, Club Intramurals, Sports, Interfraternity/Sorority Council, Campus Committees, Talent Shows, Contests, or Community Service Projects, in which such student(s) participate as a representative(s) of any suspended organization. Any violations of this policy/directive may result in individual and/or group sanctions, such as the extension of the current suspension, or the permanent expulsion of the organization from future campus recognition." I hope this puts your mind at ease. At the very least, you can forego joining a Sorority. After all, there are over 200 other clubs and organizations on campus. I hope you find what you are looking for. This information is also available in your Student Handbook under "Hazing."
