Major Modernization Project

The Major Modernization Project is in its 4th year of implementation. We have seen many notable improvements to our facility including clinical areas, equipment upgrades and site and landscaping enhancements. As we proceed, our next undertaking includes the expansion and renovation of the hospital lobby and surgical suite and a new three story wing to house our Emergency Department (ED) and the Women and Infants' Center. Construction activities, our most ambitious to date, will begin on **April 3, 2006**.

The expansion and renovation of the lobby and surgical suite, which includes considerable excavation, requires the closure of the main hospital traffic circle and the construction of a temporary entrance and temporary bridge (traffic circle to close week of April 17, 2006).

During the week of April 2nd thru the 8th, we will see construction activity in front of the ED. The old ED parking lot will be enclosed with construction fencing and the old ED roadway entrance will be rerouted for future patient drop off.

In the new ED parking deck, some parking spaces will be temporarily closed to make room for a necessary construction partition. The partition will separate the existing building from our new to-be-built three story wing.

Construction partitioning, as required by life safety and infection control regulations, will also be seen at level 3 for the Central Sterile and Supply renovations and on level 5 at the temporary entrance. The entrance will be located by the old administrative offices of the Long Island Cancer Center.

Other construction activities will occur on level 2 at the Histology Laboratory and at the new roof top air handling unit on level 6. These units will have utility piping and electrical work installed.
