## Students Protest Dorm Conditions

45 Stage Admin Building Sit-In, Meet with Administrators

About 45 students outraged by living conditions in the residence halls staged a sit-in in the Administration Building Wednesday, then met for about two hours with university administrators, one of whom promised to resolve their complaints.

The protesters, led by about 20 Benedict College residents, marched into the office of Campus Operations Vice-President Robert Francis for an informal and impromptu meeting at which Francis took a list of their grievances, and said afterwards that he would try to remedy their problems. An hour earlier, about 8 PM, they shouted out their grievances — ranging from curfews and insufficient dorm cooking facilities to closed dorm bars and greater enforcement of the conduct code by student staff — in the lobby of the building before moving downstairs amid chants of "we want Dallas" in reference to Residence Life Director Dallas Bauman. Bauman, along with Assistant Residence Life Director Gary Matthews, then agreed to meet with the demonstrators in Francis' office.

The demonstration was without incident, although at least 10 Public Safety officers in civilian clothes were in attendance at one point and at least seven were present — some interspersed within the crowd — at most times.

The protesters' complaints usually centered on the

## SB Student Becomes US Citizen

While Lillian Varela was being sworn in as a United States citizen Wednesday, she glanced at her watch and realized she was missing class.

"I thought there must be something wrong with me," Varela said. "I saw some of the older people who were really excited, and some of them even got real emotional about it. I looked at my watch at 10:30 and realized that Professor Landsley was beginning his talk on metamorphic rocks."

The ceremony was unusual because it fell on National Constitution Week. There was a military color guard present, which is unusual. The judge also read a letter from President Reagan, recognizing National Citizen's Day, which had been on Friday, although the New York State Courthouse in New York City only hears petitions for naturalization on Wednesdays.

"The judge was very nice. He was very sincere. He said 51 years ago today my parents became U.S. citizens and from the bottom of my heart I want to congratulate you all on becoming citizens of this great country," Varela said. "At that moment I wondered if he said the same thing every Wednesday at 8:30."

Lynn Morris, director of Foreign Student Affairs, said it is unusual for a student to become a citizen while still in school, because he must first become a permanent resident, and five years more must elapse before he can petition for citizenship. "It's not common for this to happen to a high school or college student because it is such a long process," Morris said. Varela has lived in the United States since she was four, when her family arrived from Argentina. She had to wait until she turned 21 last February before she could petition for citizenship, because her mother and father never became citizens, which would have automatically

made her one. "I had to do it on my own," she said.

In February she was studying at the University of Urbino in Marche, Italy, as part of the SUNY Foreign Student Exchange Program. She sent in the paperwork for citizenship first, only because she wanted to become a citizen as soon as she returned. "It's just about time. My family is very Americanized. My father is very successful here. I just went through the bureaucratic thing. I finalized the natural way I always felt," Varela's parents own a successful wine and cheese establishment, Il Cantone, in Manhattan. They are planning to open an Italian restaurant she said and her nine-year-old brother, Brian, recently was filmed in a McDonald's commercial. "You have to tell them how American I am," she said. "Sometimes I forget I was born in another country," Varela said. Varela and her father

## Students Stage Second Protest

The Administration Building became the scene of the second demonstration in two weeks Monday, when at least 200 students protested living conditions in the dormitories and the Office of Residence Life's policy of more thorough enforcement of the Student Conduct Code.

The protest began at 3:15 PM with students chanting "Dallas in the toilet bowl," referring to Residence Life Director Dallas Bauman, who was also the target of a banner saying the same thing. The event lasted about 3 1/2 hours. Student Affairs Vice-President Fred Preston, Campus Operations Vice-President Robert Francis and Gary Matthews, assistant director of Residence Life, left a meeting with some of the students at about 6:45 PM, after an hour and a half of discussion that followed the more than two-hour demonstration.

The first speaker at the protest was Polity Judiciary member Ellen Brounstein, who charged that University President John Marburger considered students' needs a low priority and was more concerned about research grants and enhancing the university's image. She said the students living in a six person suite paid a total of more than \$1,000 a month and got poor service. "There's no reason we should be spending \$1,000 a month's rent for the conditions we're living in," she said.

Polity Vice-president David Gamberg complained that the dorm cooking fee shouldn't be increased when services aren't. He said the cooking fee had increased by 300 percent in recent years and asked "Do you see a 300 percent increase in service? In staff? In equipment?"

Benedict resident Jim Quinn said the university administration doesn't give students a voice in making the decisions that affect their lives. He mentioned a committee that Preston is setting up to study alternatives to having pubs in the dorms and said there would probably be one or two students on the committee and more than a dozen administrators. "There should be 16,000 students on that committee and about 10 administrators," Quinn said.

Senior class Representative Jim Burton, a Managerial Assistant (MA) from Douglas College, said Residential Assistants (RAs) and MAs were being turned into informers, rather than people who worked for students. Other subjects of complaint ranged from the lack of toilet paper in the dormitories to the curfew for parties, roaches, the phasing out of pubs in the dormitories, and the meal plan food.

Jeff Zoldan, a senior and a commuter, said his problem — he did not pay a housing deposit on time this spring, so he had not been able to get a room this semester — is worse.

In addition to the protesters, the rally drew representatives of the campus media, the New York Times, Newsday, radio stations WCBS-AM and WALK-AM and FM, and according to Community Relations Lieutenant Doug Little, about 25 Public Safety Officers, some in plain-clothes. Before the demonstration, Public Safety had set a handful of rules for it, barring the

## Renovations Put 'On Hold'

About \$65,000 worth of dormitory renovations have been put "on hold" by the state Dormitory Authority, including changes that were slated for the O'Neill Irving heat control and security systems, said Gary Matthews, assistant director of Residence Life.

"On hold," Matthews said, "is different from cancelled." The projects will be completed when financial problems within the Dorm Authority are cleared up. These postponements were because of the financial difficulties the Dormitory Authority found itself in when Lombard Wall, Inc., a firm with which the authority had \$305 million invested, collapsed, said Peter Schultz, director of Project Management for the authority. About \$55 million of the money was misplaced in Lombard Wall's accounts, said Arthur Bates, deputy executive director of the authority and acting director.

The projects will "eventually" be completed, said Mitch Gerstel, director of Facilities Planning for the university. Schultz said he hadn't "the slightest idea" when the work would be done.

Gerstel called the projects "dormitory rehabilitation" to differentiate the projects from repairs or large-scale building.

Included in the postponed projects are an \$11,000 security system to "limit access" to the building con-

taining Irving and O'Neill colleges, said Robert Francis, vice president for Campus Operations. That building was also to receive \$10,000 for hallway carpeting and a \$21,000 heat control system.

Bob Patino, residence hall director for the College, said the new security system is badly needed in the building to prevent entry by non-residents. He said that there have been incidents of violence between students and non-students in O'Neill and Irving, as well as serious vandalism. He said that false fire alarms were set off in the building "very, very often."

Patino said heat was also a problem in the building. He said during last winter he slept with the windows open or air conditioner on to keep his apartment from becoming too hot. He said he covered the radiators in his apartment with aluminum foil last winter, and eventually had a plumber come into his room to turn the heat off entirely.

Joanne Schlager, resident assistant for Irving H2, said the carpets definitely needed replacement. She said they are "disgusting," stained and often smell.

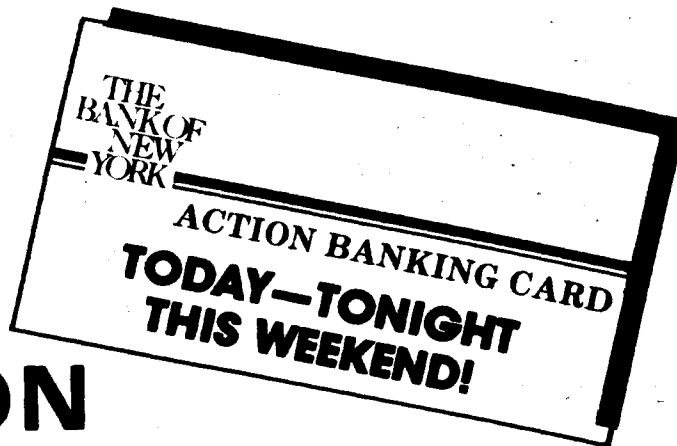
Other expenditures cancelled by the authority include \$4,000 to install cabinets for fire extinguishers and \$12,500 for locks in Kelly and Tabler quads. Gerstel said the dorm authority also directed that an order for new doors in G and H quads be cancelled, but the doors have already been delivered.

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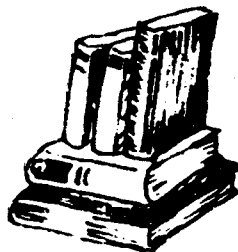
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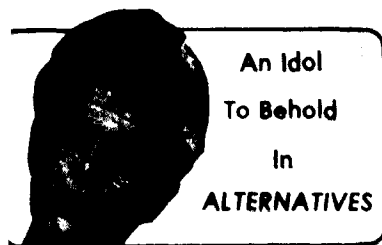


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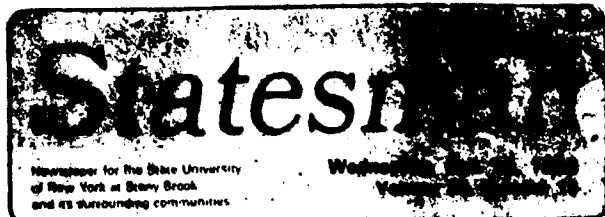

## Housing Shortage Cited as Causing Problems

(The identities of most of the people in this article have been left out to avoid causing them harm, since they may be in violation of university policies.)

"I live out of my suitcase. People call me the shopping bag lady," said Rhonda. Rhonda is one of many people still waiting on-campus housing. She said she usually crashes in any one of five different suites.

"It's only recently I got used to sleeping in here. I am still not getting a lot of sleep," said Wallace, a first-year foreign graduate student who slept on his office floor for two weeks until a friend recently lent him a cot. He, too, is awaiting a vacant space.

Although Bauman said he is unaware of a problem existing with students sleeping around the campus, Rhonda said that she is not alone. "I thought I was unusual but I talked to a lot of people and they know several people in the same situation," she said. "I feel really awful about cluttering up people's suites. I feel like I am imposing." Bauman said he has no idea how many students are sleeping on campus illegally. "It's not so much a concern to pursue illegal residents as much as it is to assign housing as soon as vacancies arise, so that we are taking care of those people that really need space," he said.

Ricky sleeps on a very worn castro convertible couch in his friend's suite. Since he sleeps in the suite room, he has to get up and go to sleep with the rest of the suite. "I am suffering totally academically. I don't even have a desk to study on," he said.

"We're not searching for people, but when staff members become aware of, or receive complaints about people staying longer than the guest policy allows, then it has to be dealt with," said Dallas Bauman, Director of Residence Life. The policy, as outlined in the Residence Life Terms of Agreement, is one night.

"My pots and pans are in one quad and my food is in another," Rhonda said. "I feel like a damn refugee." Rhonda said her name has been on the waiting list since August. Baumann said that all females on the waiting list for women that lived on campus last year, but did not go through the college selection process, have all been placed. Rhonda's name was not on that list.

"I constantly have to think, if I sleep here I have to get my stuff from there," Rhonda said.

Rhonda originally planned to share an apartment off-campus with a friend, but that did not work out. "Right now I am so bogged down with classes and exams I don't have the time to pursue it [off-campus housing] I am just hoping [for on-campus housing]," she said.

Scrap, a carpet that his office mate uses to meditate on Wallace used as a bed for two weeks. He lived off-campus for another two weeks. But, he said, living off campus was difficult for him. He lived in Lake Grove and without transportation he felt stranded. When the bus stopped running it was a 70 to 75 minute walk, and cabs are expensive, he said. Now he has a

locker in the Gymnasium, where he showers, and he keeps his possessions in his office closet. Not realizing that there was a housing shortage, Wallace had decided that he would look over the dorms before living on-campus. When he arrived on Aug. 24 and realized that there was little housing off-campus that was within walking distance, he placed his name on the waiting list. Originally he was placed on the wrong list. "That really upset me. I can't believe the way they make mistakes. Housing is a pretty crucial thing. They knew full well that I was a new graduate student and they put me on the wrong list."

Most women on waiting lists have been accommodated according to Bauman. On the new graduate waiting list there are 10 women and 30 men remaining. While all returning women who lived on campus last year who missed the college selection deadline last spring have been placed, 85 men are still waiting. There are 115 men waiting on the housing list for returning commuting students who have not lived on campus before. Almost all women have been placed in that category, Bauman said.

Another waiting list for students who moved off campus has 95 men on it. One-hundred thirty tripled rooms remain on-campus and Bauman said. Residence Life will be evaluating the amount of remaining housing, and will stop adding names to the waiting list in order to de-triple.

Bauman said he does not believe that it is possible to accommodate everyone who wants housing. Students who applied for housing after the first day of classes will probably not get housing at all, Bauman said. "I doubt we're going to get to them. There's just too many people ahead of them. We don't get enough cancellations."

Bauman feels that specified occupancy levels are not

unusual. "It isn't a typical tenant-landlord relationship, but even when you rent from a landlord it's not unusual to specify the number of tenants. Student are not paying the full costs of operating the residence halls. It's an agreement not a lease," he said.

Ruth Quad Director Pat Love, said he only knows of one incident in which a student slept in his quad for an extended period. He, like Bauman, does not perceive a problem. "It may very well be happening but people are being very quiet about it, if it is happening at all," Love said.

"I have enough clothes to last me the week. I just don't feel settled," said Ricky, a senior Political Science major. He returns home to Queens each weekend every day. "I definitely have to go home every single weekend. I have to have some study time alone in a peaceful environment, living in this environment is a total mess," he said. "How can you study when you always worry about where you are going to keep your stuff?" he added.

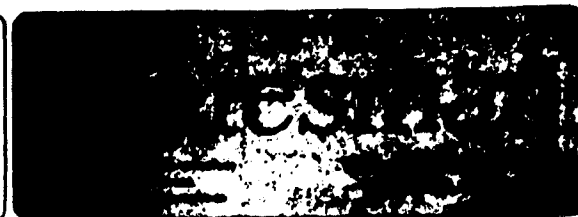
Ricky said he was unaware of the housing deadline last spring. On May 26 he put his name on the waiting list. "I offered to go to places like James College, but they said there is just no way," he said.

His host Robert, doesn't mind the fact that Ricky's bed blocks the burners, which makes cooking difficult, especially in the morning. "It's messier, it's just more cluttered living, but we have a give and take situation, everybody helps out," Robert said. "A lot of us are not here all the time, that's what makes it work."

Ricky does not feel that the University provides enough housing. "They should have adequate housing for all the people that ask for it. There should be adequate housing in a university such as this," he said.

## Trustees Vote to Seek Alternative To \$80 Dormitory Rent Increase

### Board Approves \$196M for SB

Albany — The 1983-84 budget request made by the university at Stony Brook was passed virtually unchanged by the SUNY Board of Trustees at their meeting here yesterday.

The requested \$196.6 million budget along with the rest of the SUNY budget was then presented to the Division of the Budget (DOB), which will review it and submit it to the governor after making revisions. This being an election year the budget process will be unique in the sense that after an approval by the present governor, the newly elected governor will be allotted 10 days to make further revisions before the proposal is submitted to the State Legislature, said Carl Hanes, Stony Brook's vice president for Administration.

Compared to all other SUNY schools, Stony Brook was allowed the highest percentage of budget increase, 19.9 percent over last year's \$164 million adjusted base. The majority of the increase provides for the development of the University Hospital and Health Sciences Center, said Sally Flaherty, an assistant to Stony Brook's president. A \$6.7 million allocation for expanded services for Stony Brook was approved by SUNY's 15 member Trustee Board.

This year the appropriations should complete the development of Stony Brook's Health Sciences Center (HSC), said Harry Spindler, SUNY vice chancellor for Business and Finance. He also said that allocations made next year should finish the Hospital's phased opening. Provisions in this year's budget would open the Hospital to a level of 112 beds, or 72 percent of its capacity, according to the budget request. This is an increase of about 100 beds from last year. The Hospital has planned to open two beds for the Burn Unit next year, Hanes said. The beds will be in the main hospital instead of in the burn clinic, which, he said, they were intending to open in the 1983-84 year.

The development of the clinical departments within the School of Medicine will proceed along with the scheduled Hospital opening, according to the budget request. Hanes said there will be an additional 100 medical students at Stony Brook this fall. He said that it will increase the present 72 student class size to a balance of 400 students in the Medical School within the next four years. Two years ago, he said, the classes averaged 48 students.

Stony Brook is also concentrating on academic growth in areas such as Engineering, according to the proposal, in order to aid New York State's economic

Albany — A \$5 million increase in the SUNY budget for dormitory operations was approved by the SUNY Board of Trustees yesterday, but the 800-per-cent dorm rent increase that was to generate the \$5 million was held off pending an alternate way of raising the money.

A proposal that would have nearly doubled tuition for out-of-state residents was also not passed by the trustees, but the \$10 million they sought to raise through the increase was approved, leaving the method of how to raise that money also uncertain.

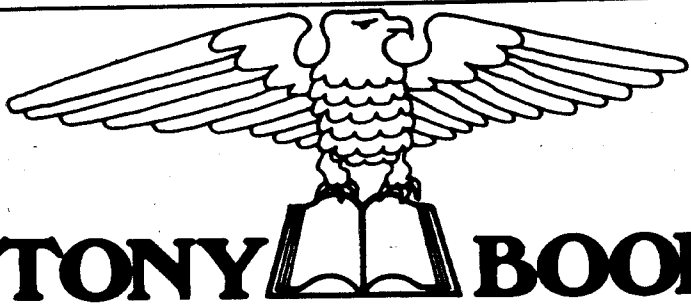
Both moves held off plans that student leaders here had fervently protested against. A proposal would have to be voted upon at the trustees' next meeting, Nov. 22 and Nov. 23 and may pass then as originally proposed, if no alternate means of raising the money is found to be suitable.

The two resolutions were amended from the original \$1.2 billion 1983-84 SUNY budget which Chancellor Milton Wharton distributed to the trustees last Friday and which was passed and sent to the State Division of the Budget (DOB) yesterday. It included an increase of 11 percent over this year. Two other key issues — reducing enrollment target and removing the one-third tuition limit that community college students can pay — were discussed but not voted on at the meeting. James Tierney, president of the Student Association of the State University of New York (SASU) and the only student on the 15 member Board of Trustees, made a presentation to get the trustees to omit from the budget request mention of how the \$5 million originally sought from the rent increase would be generated. That did not receive much support from the trustees, as the plan to say that the money will either be a rent increase or a comparable method of reducing costs, was adopted.

"It is possible to pull that five million out of other areas," Tierney said, arguing that he could come up with alternate plans of given more than the three days he had since Wharton released the budget. For example, he said, SUNY Buffalo saved \$3 million in false costs recently when students there performed maintenance tasks.

The meeting was packed by about 75 students representing at least a SUNY schools, many of whom were organized the night before the SASU officials brought in more students, the majority arriving from SUNY New Paltz just after the 8 AM public meeting began, were barred from attending because of fire safety regulations, according to Hani Harris, director of SUNY Public Safety. The board meeting room in the SUNY Central Administration Building was designed to accommodate only

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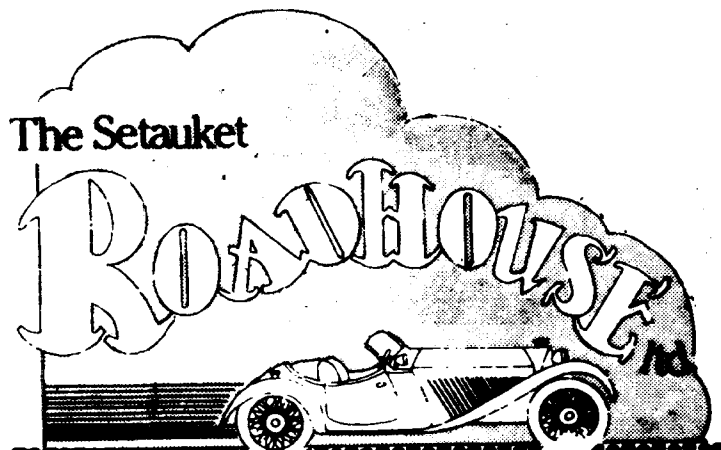

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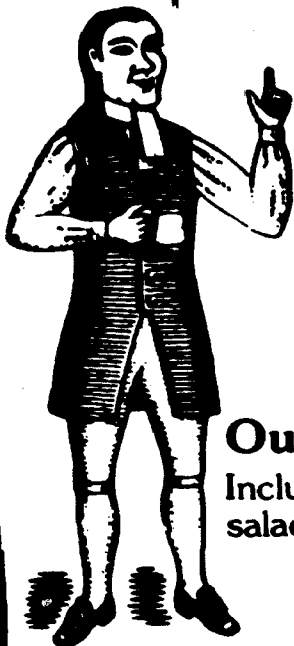

# Future SUNY Fee Hikes Feared

**Rent Increase Held Off, But Student Leaders Say Others Likely**

 Albany — In the wake of a victory in holding off an \$80 per year dormitory rent increase and the near-doubling of out-of-state tuition, student leaders here are preparing for an even larger battle they feel is on the horizon: a tuition increase.

The fear that a tuition increase will be included when the new governor unveils his budget on Feb. 1 is real, although it is based on conjecture. Leaders of the Students Association of the State University (SASU), a student-advocacy group based in the capital, say the increase is imminent in the budget. Under this year's budget, the state will be directly paying for about 72.7 percent of SUNY's costs, under the budget passed by the SUNY Board of Trustees on Wednesday, the state would have to pick up about 78.3 percent. An increase of state support for SUNY is not only unrealistic, SASU leaders say, it also would reverse a slide in state support that began in the early 1970s, when the state paid for close to 90 percent of SUNY's costs.

More certain for SUNY students in upcoming years is another dormitory

rent increase, probably around \$150. That increase has its roots in a May 1980 mandate by Gov. Hugh Carey to make the dormitories self-sufficient. At that time, the state was subsidizing \$600 per student per year out of a total cost of \$1,400 for a dorm space.

Room rents were raised each of the three following years by \$150, to its current total of \$1,250, as a result of that mandate, but the state is still paying a \$150 per student subsidy. That will eventually be charged to students, according to Harry Spindler, SUNY vice-chancellor for Finance and Business. The \$80 increase that was put on hold this year, as well as a \$50 increase in 1979-80 year, was not an increase toward the goal of self-sufficiency, but to pay for increased operating costs, Spindler said.

The tuition increase, if it materializes, would come as a result of an increasing SUNY budget that coincides with decreasing state support. This year, for example, the state approved an increase of \$62 million for SUNY, but mandated that \$67 million be raised by SUNY itself. In other words, SUNY increased its budget by about \$129 million, but got \$5 million less from the state.

For 1983-84, SUNY is requesting \$1,265 billion, an 11 percent increase over this year, with state support accounting for most of the increase. If the state does not grant that support, it will have to come from elsewhere.

"If they only get the 71 or 72 percent [state support] rather than the requested 78 percent, which is the pattern, that six percent is about \$200 for every student in the system that has to come from tuition and fees," said SASU legislative director Steve Cox. The increase, Cox said, "is implied in the numbers." "It's very much in the cards," said SASU President Jim Tierney, who also holds the student seat on the SUNY Board of Trustees. "Nobody told that to me. Nobody stated that publicly. But they're going to do it."

If there is a tuition increase, Tierney said, it would come from the state's executive branch, not the trustees or the SUNY administration. The election of a new governor next week will be a large factor in the SUNY budget and, as a result, in a possible tuition increase, he said.

Peter Lynch, the spokesman for the State Division of Budget (DOB), which receives budget requests from state agencies such as SUNY and then makes alterations for the governor, agreed that since a new governor will be taking over, it is hard to predict how SUNY's budget will fare. Lynch also said it is "inappropriate" to comment about SASU's concern that the SUNY budget request is overly optimistic in terms of its reliance on the state.

Spindler admitted that the budget request "is a very large number," but, he said, "obviously we have to wait until a governor is elected before the subject can even be intelligently discussed." SUNY Chancellor Clifton Wharton, in a prepared statement he read to the Board of Trustees on Wednesday, admitted that "the state's fiscal picture for 1982-83 is most serious. Whether the projected deficit is the \$579 million estimated by the governor last week or half that amount, the implications for the 1983-84 funding of state agencies are quite severe. The same report indicated a projected shortfall for 1983-84 of \$1.3 billion."

"Although higher education in general and SUNY in particular have already been experiencing a declining share of state tax support in recent years," Wharton continued, "there is little likelihood of recovering all that ground during these stringent times."

The possibility of a tuition increase was discussed publicly in a meeting of about 100 students on the SUNY Albany campus Tuesday night. Michael Corso, president of the Albany student government, told the group, which had gathered from various SUNY campuses to plan strategy for the next morning's trustees meeting, that he had been at a meeting of the SUNY Albany board of trustees and heard informal talk of a tuition increase.

"I take that pretty strongly because they've never been wrong on this," Corso said. "It's something that's inevitable. It's going to happen anyway. They need the money."

Said Tierney, "I'm very fearful at this point." But Donald Blinken, chairman of the Board of Trustees, denied that a tuition increase was "in the cards" as Tierney put it. "We've heard no rumor, neither public, private or any other way," of a tuition increase, Blinken said.

"I can't predict the future. If the budget is two million [dollars] or three million [dollars] off instead of one million, obviously they'll [the DOB or governor] be pressing us to do something. They have not suggested there ought to be a tuition increase. We aren't expecting one and we're hoping there isn't one."

## Study: States Giving Less to Colleges

 State governments are giving higher education the smallest funding increase in more than 20 years for 1982-83, according to the Chronicle of Higher Education.

Total state spending for higher education went up only six percent this year, well below the inflation rate. A report published in the Chronicle of Higher Education last week said that when the effects of inflation are counted, most states are spending less on higher education now than they did two years ago.

The report, which blamed the national recession, said state spending on higher education had only increased at a pace this slow two other times in the last 20 years. Legislatures in Oregon and South Dakota actually allocated less

total money for higher education this year than last. But States with strong industries, particularly in oil, gas or coal are enjoying a healthy economy and continue to increase spending for colleges and universities. Alaska is spending 79 percent more on higher education this year than last, the report said, and Oklahoma 47 percent more.

On a per-capita basis, average state spending for higher education this year is up to \$106, from \$101.50 last year. Per-capita spending ranges from \$356.37 in Alaska to \$37.86 in New Hampshire.

New York will spend more than \$2 billion on higher education this year, the third-highest amount in the nation, according to the report. This represents a 22 percent increase over the last two

years, or a four percent increase when inflation is counted, the report said.

The Chronicle of Higher Education also found that over the last decade, New York's spending on higher education had increased by 144 percent, 5 percent more than inflation. Yet a study prepared for the New York State Assembly's Ways and Means Committee this summer found an "alarming" decrease in the state's funding for SUNY. That study said that aid to private colleges and universities and to the City University of New York had kept pace with inflation but that over the last eight years state spending for SUNY went up only about half as much as inflation. State spending for SUNY went up 36.4 percent per student since 1975-76, but a 66 percent increase would have been necessary to match inflation, the study said.

The Stony Brook football club will be elevated to Division III status before next season, a move that University President John Marburger said will raise money for athletics from the private sector and give the institution "greater name recognition."

The decision was made by Marburger yesterday afternoon after a number of financial uncertainties were determined to be resolvable. The team's coaching staff will remain intact for the 1983 season, but there will be a search process for a permanent coach, which would not exclude current Head Coach Fred Kemp, after the season ends, Marburger said.

Division III is the least competitive of three National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) units. The Stony Brook Patriots have been playing as what is called a "club," compiling a 7-1 record this year, including victories over two Division III teams—that earned them the third best ranking nationally among all teams.

The move is a symbolic sport in America and American colleges," Marburger said. "Football is a very important sport for a college to take seriously." He said the name recognition a university has aids in recruitment of students to all departments in the school and generates financial support for sports from the community.

"We are all obviously here for academics first but in terms of developing spirit, a strong football program can serve as a link between the student body, the

# New Legal Drinking Age to Take Effect

## Task Force Is Lacking Leader

The law, which goes into effect at 12:01 AM Dec. 5, 1982, reads: "No person shall sell, deliver or give away or cause or permit or procure to be sold, delivered or given away any alcoholic beverages to any person actually or apparently under the age of 19 years"—Alcohol Beverage Control Law, Sect. 85, as amended.

The ad hoc committee on the 19-year-old drinking age, which is a subcommittee of the task force, stated at an information session that parents or guardians of minors are allowed to give them alcohol. In addition, it is now illegal to serve the "habitual drunk," although that term has not been defined. They said that legislators amended the

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# Blaze Causes \$3M Damage; Fire Safety Violations Cited

A fire that ravaged the university's main storage facility for 15 hours Wednesday and yesterday caused \$3 million in damage would have been significantly less potent if numerous fire safety violations, which the university was aware of, had been corrected, state and campus fire officials said yesterday.

Dozens of fire fighters from the Setauket and Stony Brook departments began battling the blaze at the Commissary, located on Center Drive next to the Gymnasium, shortly after it was reported at around 10 P.M. Wednesday. But, "they had to let it burn" because an excessive amount of supplies stockpiled in the building restricted access, according to George Marshall, director of campus Environmental Health and Safety. Fire fighters had to knock down parts of two walls of the steel-frame, 20-year-old brick building to get at the blaze.

## Curiosity And A Good Time

Campus Operations Vice-President Robert Francis was jogging past the Commissary building on Center Drive at 9:30 Wednesday night and didn't notice anything out of the ordinary. He never would have guessed that the building would be engulfed by flames and firemen within 30 minutes nor that it would look like a smoldering mess he saw at 8 A.M. the next day. Shortly after Francis passed, red lights were flashing on the walls of the Gymnasium and Graduate Physics buildings and

About \$750,000 of the damage was to commodities stored in the building, according to Robert Francis, vice-president for Campus Operations, including a \$100,000 supply—a year's worth—of toilet paper. Plastic bags—about \$60,000 worth—light bulbs, paper towels, cement, paint, ammonia and other maintenance supplies were also destroyed. The remainder of the damage was to the building itself.

A supply of commodities that would last into intercession will be sought and stored in trailers, Francis said he is trying to buy less than a week's supply of the commodities are stored in each campus building, he said.

There were no injuries reported and a cause has not been determined. Arson is not suspected, but is being investigated by the county, a common practice in cases where there are significant losses, according to Ed Nichols, field representative for this area in the state's Office of Fire Prevention and Control.

No Alarm  
Marshall said, and Nichols agreed, that three violations of fire safety rules made the damage worse than it would have been. Supplies were stored just inches from the ceiling in the one-story building, while fire codes say they must be 36 inches below ceiling level in buildings without sprinklers, according to Marshall. That prevented fire fighters from spraying water on the blaze, which began in the middle of the building, Marshall said. Aisles that are supposed to be 44 inches wide were reported as less than 36 inches wide, aiding the spread of the blaze.

# SB Employee Charged With Arson

Stony Brook fire marshal and Terrenceville volunteer fire fighter John Magione, who was arrested Jan. 2 and charged with setting a night building— including Stony Brook physical plant commissary— was indicted Jan. 11 on three counts of arson. Magione, 20, of 4 Hilda Court in Port Jefferson Station, served 18 months in prison after being convicted of arson in 1967.

A grand jury accused Magione of setting a fire on Dec. 30, 1982, in a Stage XVI apartment building. That blaze caused \$20,000 in damage and forced many people to flee their apartments. The jury also accused the fire fighter of setting two other fires—one in May 1982 at Friends' Ice Cream in Port Jefferson Station, and the other in September 1982 at Port Jefferson Plumbing and Heating. The latter fire caused \$100,000 worth of damage and the former caused \$75,000 in damage.

Magione pleaded not guilty to all three counts. The grand jury ordered that he be held without bail. Bail had previously been set at \$25,000. The most destructive fire that Magione allegedly set occurred at the physical plant commissary Dec. 30, 1982. Damage was estimated at \$3 million. Assistant District Attorney Donald Sullivan said that the five remaining arson charges will be considered by the grand jury in the next several weeks. If arraigned on any of these charges, Magione will probably plead not guilty, said Michael Terrene, the accused's lawyer.

Following his arrest Jan. 2, Magione told police that he had set the night fire and Detective James Gross of the Suffolk County arson squad. However, Terrene said he was told by sources that the detectives promised Magione that he would not spend a day in prison if he turned up to the crimes. Terrene also said his client was pressured by the police into making a confession. Detective Gross denied these allegations.

Magione will undergo psychological tests to determine whether he has a mental disease or defect, Terrene said.

# Hospital Records Are Subpoenaed

## Attorney General's Office to Investigate Finances, Employees

Twelve past and present University Hospital employees, along with records detailing the finances and operations of the hospital over the last five years, were subpoenaed yesterday by the Attorney General's office.

Documents returned by the Attorney General's office and the records are being reviewed and analyzed by the Attorney General's office, according to University President John Marburger. But he would not reveal any investigations as extensive as the recent request for five years' worth of data.

Marburger said the subpoenas are related to an investigation of the hospital's operations by the Deputy Attorney General for Medicaid Fraud in an office under the Attorney General.

The subpoenas, Marburger said, were issued to 12 individuals who worked at the hospital between 1977 and 1982. The subpoenas are for the records of the hospital's operations from 1977 to 1982.



The Attorney General's office has been investigating the operations of University Hospital and subpoenaed records from the past five years.

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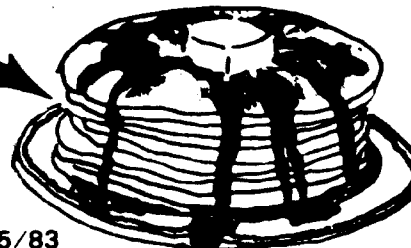

## Tuition, Dorm Rent Hikes And Layoffs Expected In Cuomo's Budget Proposal

Sharp increases in tuition and dormitory rents for SUNY students, plus layoffs of SUNY personnel are included in Governor Mario Cuomo's 1983-84 budget proposal, University President John Marburger has confirmed.

Cuomo's budget proposal is to be publicly released today, but the New York Times quoted anonymous Cuomo aides on Saturday as saying it gives New York resident students a \$250 tuition hike and a \$150 dormitory rent increase, plus forces layoffs of five or six percent of SUNY's employees.

Marburger said yesterday that the article was accurate, but that he expected the layoffs would be more extensive. He said probably about 10 percent of SUNY's workforce would be affected. That would mean laying off hundreds of staff and faculty at this university alone, he said.

The \$250 increase would send the present rate for New York state resident undergraduates up to \$1,300 a year. Tuition has been \$1,050 for two years up from \$900 in the 1981-82 fiscal year.

The \$150 dormitory rent hike would raise the present charge to \$1,400. The fee has been increased four times within the past six years by \$150 each time.

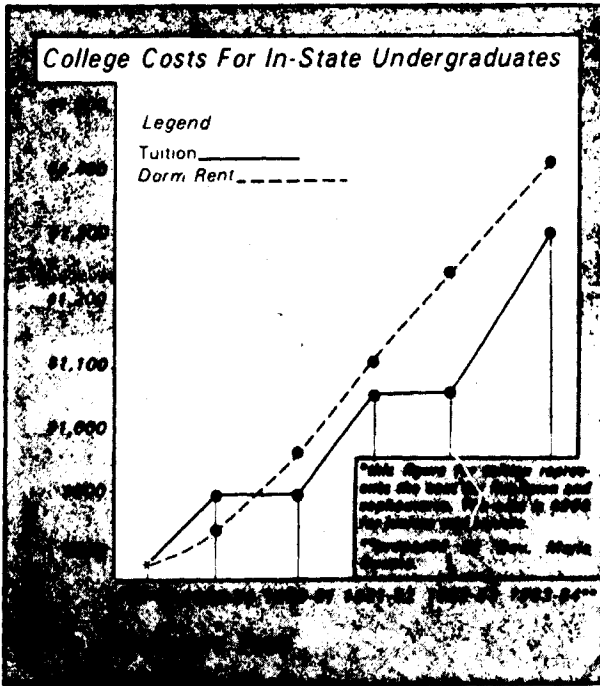
The Times article made no mention of tuition rates for graduate students, but said that tuition for students from out-of-state would nearly double. Their present \$1,700 tuition will jump another \$1,400.

The governor cannot set the tuition or dormitory rents, which are decided instead by the SUNY Board of Trustees, however the fee hikes have been described as "inevitable" since SUNY will be receiving less state funds next year than the trustees requested.

Marburger said although salaries and fees at Stony Brook are still set at higher levels of the state bureaucracy, in terms of what the expenses are, "It's looking more and more like a private university."

In addition to the tuition and dorm rent hikes, a \$25 computer fee will provide the money for the purchase of small computers for student use. Marburger said it is unclear whether this charge would be covered by the Tuition Assistance Program (TAP) awards. The State Division of Budget is also likely to insist that the state impose a higher tax on Faculty Student

## Economic Growth, Less State Support Emphasized for SUNY

Albany Economic growth, investment in high technology and relatively less state support were emphasized for the SUNY system in Gov. Mario Cuomo's 1983-84 budget proposal, which he announced to the state legislature yesterday.

The proposed \$1.8 billion SUNY budget exceeded last year's total by \$59 million, but state support declined by \$6 million, roughly three percent. The budget was drawn on the assumption that tuition for in-state undergraduates be raised \$250, dormitory rents \$150 and 3,000 faculty and staff be laid off.

"It presents the university with the most difficult choices it has had to make in recent years, and it will barely permit the university to carry out its basic mission," SUNY Chancellor Clifton Wharton said in a prepared statement. He called a rise in tuition "inescapable" and acknowledged that a number of SUNY personnel will be reduced.

Cuomo's \$31.5 billion budget proposal is undergoing negotiations between the state Division of Budget (DOB) and any desiring state agencies until March 1, when it will formally be presented to the legislature. The legislature can make any revisions they see necessary in the proposal.

When the SUNY system's individual campuses have until Feb. 28 to issue an impact statement detailing how the proposed budget will affect their respective institutions, to the SUNY Central Administration.

Cuomo stressed the importance of a balanced budget being approved by the legislature no later than April 1 in Monday's budget briefing to the press. In the annual budget message, Cuomo said, "We have inherited a legacy of four years in which our spending exceeded our revenues, and three years of an inability to progress to a balanced spending plan by April 1."

Commenting on the overall budget, Cuomo said, "Do I think it's unfair? No. Hard? Yes. Regrettable? Yes. But unfair? No."

"I am in a state of shock," said Kenneth LaValle, a state senator and chairman of the Senate Higher Education Committee, after being briefed on the SUNY budget state. The proposal is long ways from the final adoption, he said, but added that it was too early to comment on the flexibility of the proposal during the negotiations.

Expressing dissatisfaction with the proposed layoffs and tuition and dorm rent hikes, LaValle said, "I have a difficult time seeing prices up and the diminishing

Albany Stony Brook might have to do continue with academic departments and schools and will lose a vast amount of staff if Gov. Cuomo's proposed budget is passed into law, University President John Marburger said yesterday.

Shortly after Cuomo made his \$31.5 billion state budget proposal public, SUNY Chancellor Clifton Wharton released a statement calling the \$1.8 billion proposal for SUNY "a survival budget" which "will barely permit the university to carry out its basic mission." An institution even as large as SUNY cannot continue to absorb such major reduction over a large period of time without sharply affecting its ability to educate, Wharton said.

Just before attending a series of conferences regarding the budget proposal at State University Plaza, the central headquarters of the SUNY system, Marburger said the budget was drawn up through two drafts. The second draft, which included the elimination of 3,000 SUNY positions, would have caused serious problems, he said. However, he said, Cuomo has asked for many serious cuts to deal with the state's budget deficits. The second draft calls for another 1,000 SUNY employees to be laid off, and another \$100 million in attrition for a savings of about \$100 million, said Hans Stroh, Stony Brook's vice president for Administration.

Marburger and Hanes said that Stroh would immediately have to lay off about 300 people if the proposal were made effective by the state legislature, which must approve a budget by April 1. They said, however, that more positions will likely be laid off as state agencies voluntarily cut budgets and attrition. Also, Marburger said that the layoffs may not be as painful as they appear to be because of the budget proposal. This is because the proposed number of layoffs is based on an expectation that the state will still fund an average share of about 15 percent, Marburger said. It may be found that the higher paid personnel are deemed essential and will not be laid off, and that some positions will be filled by less state funds, he said.

Marburger said that in about 10 days he must submit a plan to SUNY's headquarters that outlines the impact of the budget on Stony Brook and how university officials will deal with it. Within that time, he said, he and Provost Homer New will meet with Stony Brook's deans, department heads, administrators and various committees of the SUNY Senate, the university's chief governing body, to decide where the university will institute its layoffs and cutbacks.

We will have to start assigning priorities, looking for finding what things we can consolidate, combine or restructure," Marburger said. "The cuts can't be across the board," he said. "They have to be selective. We'll probably have to remove some units, including whole schools and departments." He said he could not specify what schools or departments might be affected. Marburger also said, "I wouldn't discount the possibility of a

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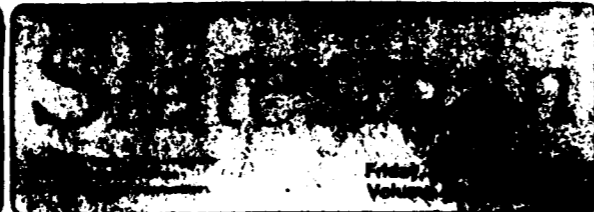
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## Rape Is Result Of Heroic Ploy

A former Stony Brook student confessed to police this week that, in a scheme to appear heroic, he paid a man to rob his girlfriend last semester. But the would-be robber also raped the Dreiser College woman in what police described as a brutal attack.

Charlie Moux, 22, turned himself in to Suffolk County police Wednesday and was charged on one count of burglary and two counts of first degree robbery. He was released on \$2,000 bail, and his trial is set for Wednesday, March 23.

In his confession, Moux said he paid a man—whom he said he can only identify by first name—\$25 to rob his girlfriend in her dormitory room on Dec. 15. Moux then planned to stage her rescue, police said. Moux said that he met the man in a Bronx pool hall on Nov. 27 and showed him a picture of his girlfriend and gave him directions on how to enter her dormitory room.

Moux also told the alleged rapist that he could keep anything he found in the room as part of his payment. Police said the alleged rapist robbed at knifepoint the woman and her roommate of \$34, tied the roommate up and put her in a closet, then raped and sodomized Moux's girlfriend.

At the time of the incident Moux said he was waiting in a nearby lounge area, unaware of the rape in progress, police said. Moux said he knocked on her door and phoned her room, but got no response from either the room crying for help, followed by the assailant, who Moux chased down the hall and out of the building, police said. In his statement, Moux said he first learned about the rape when he returned to the building after chasing the alleged rapist.

The alleged rapist fled the university in a taxi, police said. He is still being sought. Police said they have several suspects, including one who is currently being held on an unrelated charge.

Police became suspicious of Moux when, as a witness, his accounts of the incident were flawed, said Sixth Precinct Sgt. Richard Frasse. Moux agreed to take lie detector tests about why he had stopped pursuing the assailant, but failed, Frasse said.

Moux, a sophomore until his withdrawal from the university at the end of last semester, faces a sentence from one to 15 years, Frasse said. He is now living in the Bronx.

When Moux lived in Dreiser College, his resident hall director William Freud, said that as far as he knew Moux had never had any trouble with anyone in the building and had always been helpful to anyone in need of assistance.

## Recommended Tenure Denial Is Protested by Students

Hundreds of students protested the psychology department's recommendation that Assistant Professor Brett Silverstein not be granted tenure, rallying outside the Social Sciences A building Wednesday afternoon and eventually entering a faculty meeting which was immediately broken up.

Silverstein, a former undergraduate at Stony Brook, has been an assistant professor for six years. His case will be heard by the Personnel Policy Committee of the College of Arts and Sciences and various administrators before going to University President John Marburger for a final decision, but according to Silverstein, when the professor's department votes against him, "almost always that means bad news, goodbye." If he is not granted tenure, he will have to leave in one year.

The protest began about 2:30 P.M. and a crowd numbering over 200 gathered soon. It reached as high as 300-350 at one point.

Most of the speakers, which included both faculty and students, praised Silverstein as an excellent teacher and said the other faculty in the psychology department hadn't

given his teaching ability a high enough priority in their decision. "His sin is that he has spent time with students instead of writing articles," said Ronald Friend, associate professor of Psychology. Friend said Silverstein could have devoted himself to scholarly work instead, and if he had, his tenure would be granted.

Michael Zweiss, associate professor of Economics, said tenure decisions placed too little emphasis on students' concerns, but added, "things can be won. A climate can be established on the campus that respects good teaching. A climate that recognizes the work of progressive teachers." He encouraged everyone to continue fighting for Silverstein.

Stacy Kitt, a member of the Student Committee for Reform of Undergraduate Education, said Silverstein's case was an important issue to speak out on because he is in danger of losing tenure only because he valued students more highly than research "and that's a not what the university wants to hear."

"Psych 101 and 102 was disastrously taught before he came here and it'll be disastrously taught if he leaves," Friend said. The courses were previously taught by a series of

professors in rotations during the semester, but Silverstein restructured it. Friend said the psychology department was proving Silverstein's value as a teacher by scheduling two faculty members to teach the courses next year, and still planning to enroll fewer students than Silverstein teaches by himself.

Polity Secretary Barry Ritholtz and Vice President David Gamburg both said the incident showed that students' concerns were being ignored at Stony Brook and that students have to force the university to listen. Gamburg called it a "damn shame" that students are not represented on the university's Personnel Policy Committee.

Martha Livingston, a graduate student in Social Psychology, said Silverstein was more easily available and helpful than anyone else in the department, as well as being an excellent teacher. One student said even when he woke up with a hangover, he still enjoyed going to Silverstein's class, because it was the most interesting one he ever had.

The rally ended at about 3:35 P.M., but a large part of the crowd entered the Social Sciences A building, where the faculty of the psychology

## U Hospital Vice President And Director Announce Resignations

Two top officials at University Hospital announced their intentions to resign at a meeting of the hospital's leadership heads Friday afternoon.

Michael Elliott, 41, vice president for Hospital Affairs and Hospital Director D. Michael Grimes, 57, will leave their positions in the near future. University President John Marburger confirmed, although he could not say exactly when.

Elliott, who has been with the hospital since 1976 when it was no more than a "hole in the ground" overseeing the construction, staffing and landscaping of the facilities. He could not be reached for comment. Grimes' director position was created in December to focus on the day-to-day operation of the hospital, a job that Elliott had previously been doing along with his vice presidential responsibilities. Grimes said he had no comment on why he is leaving, when it will take effect or if the two resignations were related.

Hospital spokesman Jim Rhatigan said they both resigned to pursue other "professional opportunities in the field," since the salaries at state-run hospitals are not competitive with those at private hospitals.

Marburger said he believed the two resignations were related because Elliott and Grimes were close and also said they had worked together in the past. Marburger said Elliott had received several "very good" job offers in the past and that although he has not been presented with their resignations yet, he believes the two are leaving for career advancement reasons.

Marvin Kuschner, dean of the Medical School, described his state upon hearing of the resignations as

devastate. He said Elliott has done a superb job in getting the hospital started from its planning stages to the current \$270 million operation. Kuschner said Grimes' resignation stemmed from the amount of responsibilities of his position responsibilities that he had not expected nor wanted after leaving his chief executive post at Middlesex General Hospital in New Brunswick, New Jersey. Kuschner said he believed Grimes saw more responsibilities heading his way upon Elliott's departure and that it was instrumental in his decision.

When Grimes was asked if he was leaving because of these responsibilities or for career advancement, he replied, "Do you believe that?" He declined to comment further on his reasons for leaving.

Marburger said of the resignations that "It is knowledge they have nothing to do with the Grand Jury's investigation. The hospital has been the subject of an on-going state Grand Jury investigation into its finances by the special prosecutor for Nursing Homes and Hospitals, Terrence Buckley, special assistant to the attorney general for Medicaid fraud, said that Elliott's name had been on one of the ten subpoenas of hospital personnel issued in late January. The subpoena for Elliott was for the books and records of the hospital's operations over the past five years and not for his personal testimony. Buckley said that in fact the hospital has been cooperative.

Elliott came to the university in 1976 from a position as director of the Mount Sinai Medical Center in Milwaukee, another teaching hospital.

## SB Council Protests Summer Tuition Hike

The Stony Brook Council, the university's governing board, voted Thursday to voice opposition to the proposed tuition increases for the 1983 summer session.

The SUNY Board of Trustees in Albany are to consider the proposed increases at a meeting on Tuesday, and according to a memo to different campuses by Harry Spindler, SUNY vice chancellor for Finance and Business, the trustees are expected to enact them. New York State resident students would pay \$45 per credit hour for undergraduate courses, up from \$35 last year, while in-state graduate students would pay \$90 per credit hour, up from \$71.

Out of state undergraduates would be charged \$68.50 per credit hour, up from \$58.50, while out of state graduate students would face an increase from \$91.50 to \$132.50.

In anticipation of the trustees approval, Stony Brook students are being charged the increased rates, but Summer Session Director Megh Shea said the students will receive refunds if the fee hikes are not implemented.

Spindler has called the increase necessary, saying that the \$3 million the tuition hikes would generate are needed, and if the increases are not approved, will have to be made up somehow. However, Todd Houslanger, the student member on the Stony Brook Council, said the fee hikes represented an unacceptable hardship on students, and that it was especially unfair to adopt

an increase just before bills for the summer session are due.

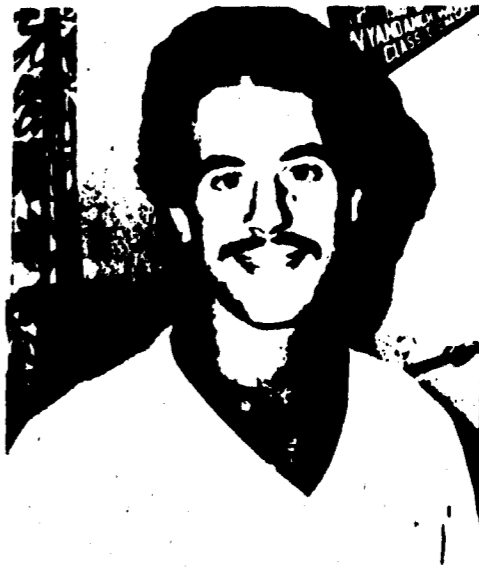
Jim Tierney, the president of the Student Association of the State University (SASU), who was on campus campaigning for Stony Brook students to join SASU, addressed the Council, arguing that the fee hikes were particularly hard on graduate students, and could drive them away from SUNY schools.

He said that compared to SUNY's tuition rates for undergraduates graduate programs at SUNY schools are expensive—a statement University President John Marburger concurred with—and argued that the proposed fee hikes would decrease SUNY's already dropping enrollment of part-time graduate students. Sam Hoff, president of the Graduate Student Organization (GSO), pointed out the increases had been protested by both GSO and Polity.

Council member Leonard Eichenholtz questioned whether the council's protest would be effective, especially since the council could not offer alternatives to the fee hikes.

Houslanger argued, however, that for them to ignore it when fee hikes were being considered in such a late and inappropriate manner would set a bad precedent. "I think we should at least let them know how we feel about that," he said.

Houslanger also announced at the meeting that the Polity Senate had voted to allow the GSO to elect next year's representative to the council.

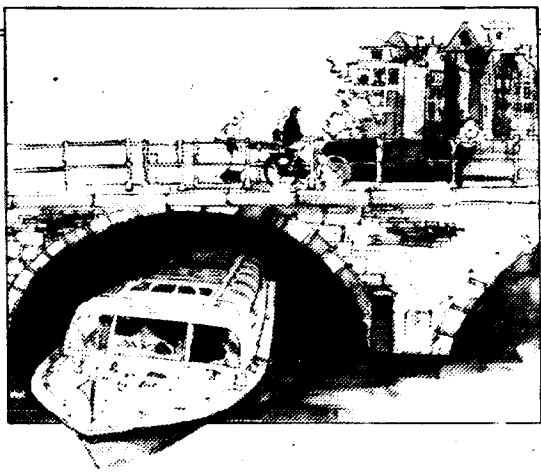


Todd Houslanger, the student representative to the Stony Brook Council, makes a member of the council passed to voice opposition to the proposed tuition hikes for this summer.

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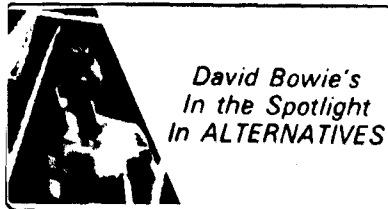

## Gamberg Elected Polity Prez; VP Race Ends in Run-Off

Polity Vice-President David Gamberg, whose goals for the next year include improving student opinions of and participation in their government, will be given an opportunity to see those goals through next year as he was elected Polity President in yesterday's elections. Gamberg beat his opponent, Kirby Brouard, a junior anthropology major, by a margin of 1,165-550 votes.

In the race for Polity's vice-presidential seat, between Polity Secretary Barry Riboltz and Senator Class Representative Jim Burton, neither won a clear-cut majority, and the two will vie for the positions more in a run-off election, scheduled for May 5. Burton received 718 votes, Riboltz 684 and write-in candidates a total of 371. Election Board chairman Cynthia Fulmer revealed early this morning.

The uncontested Belina Anderson, currently sophomore representative,

won the position as Polity Secretary with 950 votes, 377 write-in candidates accounting for 540.

A total of 1,043 undergraduate votes passed the Student Association of the State University of New York at Stony Brook referendum that makes Polity once again a member of SASU and raises the activity fee to \$15 per semester. The vote against this referendum tallied 548.

Another referendum that would have asked for the allocation of \$2.00 per student per semester from the current activity fee to toward paying subscription costs for Statesman did not appear on the ballot, but will appear in the run-off election (see related story).

There will be another run-off between John Perry and Eric Levine who are in the race for sophomore representative seat. The vote was Perry, 291; Levine, 201. For an unopposed representative, the unopposed

## Chancellor Awards SB Five

Bethin, who lives in Stony Brook, lists Slavic linguistics and phonological theory as her academic and research interests.

• Albert Carlson, professor of Neurobiology and Behavior, and a researcher in freely neurophysiology. A Stony Brook faculty member since 1960, he lives in Setauket.

• Carmen Gwinner, assistant to the dean of the School of Medicine in Stony Brook's Health Sciences Center since 1979 and a staff member since 1967. She lives in East Setauket.

• Donald Marx, director of Communications Management Engineering since 1977, a 15-year Stony Brook employee who lives in St. James.

• Joan Moos, associate vice provost for Undergraduate Studies since 1979, a 17-year employee who is a Stony Brook resident.

Gwinner, Marx and Moos were honored earlier this year with five others who were given the Presidential Award for Excellence in Professional Service by University President John Marburger.

## Guilty Verdict Decided In Letter-Bomber Case

Richard Stewart Levy, a Stony Brook student, was convicted of second-degree attempted murder and conspiracy last Friday.

Levy was arrested Nov. 15, 1982 by detectives of Suffolk County's Sixth Precinct as he got off a train at the Long Island Railroad Station at Stony Brook. Levy had mailed a fake bomb from the Hicksville train station that day to Michael Barrett, who was then the current boyfriend of Levy's girl friend, Jane Zisk.

During the trial, Levy, testifying in his own defense, said he wanted the bomb so he could commit suicide but he was dependent over the loss of his girlfriend. The jury decided that the evidence suggested otherwise.

Levy and Zisk had been dating steadily from June of 1979 until February of 1982, although the two remained friends until the incident.

Levy asked Elliot Gang, a Stony Brook Electrical Engineering major, to design a bomb for him. Gang, on the advice of his residence hall director, notified the police. The police told Gang

to play along with the scheme and make a dummy bomb. Gang presented the fake bomb to Levy at the Stony Brook Railroad Station, wearing an explosive-dropping device.

Suffolk detectives and postal inspectors arrested Levy at Stony Brook upon his return from Hicksville where he mailed the package.

Levy testified that he wanted the bomb so he could commit suicide but he feared Levy would make the bomb if Gang thought it was for a suicide. When Gang accompanied him to the train station, Levy said, he had to take the bomb to carry out the charade. He said that while he was on the train he began to fear the damage the bomb could do and that he changed his mind about suicide. He said that he dropped the bomb into the post box to get rid of it and was going to tell the postmaster about it, but that he was interrupted when arrested in Stony Brook. He told Assistant District Attorney Dennis Sweeney on cross-examination that "It was not the best idea in the world. I grant you."

## 40 Hold Sit-In in SB Prez' Office Marburger Says He Will Speed Up Decision on Silverstein

It began as a rally in support of Psychology Professor Brett Silverstein outside the Administration Building. It ended three hours later as a discussion of student rights with University President John Marburger in a conference room on the floor.

About 40 of the 200 people who participated in the rally held a sit-in in Marburger's office for about 10 minutes until he finished a meeting and spoke to them. After about 20 minutes of discussion, Marburger said he would speed up the decision process on Silverstein's tenure and try to have an answer by next Friday. The rally's organizers had said they were afraid the decision would be deliberately delayed until the summer, when few students would be on campus to protest.

The rally, organized by the Silverstein Support Committee, was also in protest of the Personnel Policy Committee's withholding of their recommendations concerning Silverstein.

"The question isn't just about Brett Silverstein," said Anne Hunter, a member of the Silverstein Support Committee. "It's also about students having a say in their education."

The Personnel Policy Committee ordinarily keeps its recommendations secret, so as not to drive away anybody they want to keep, according to President Marburger, who makes the final decision about whether to grant tenure. "The secrecy business is not a bad idea since they [the Personnel Policy Committee] aren't making decisions—they're only giving advice."

Preventing students from having information is a way of keeping control away from them," said Hunter. "It's a dirty ploy."

Silverstein made a brief appearance at the rally, receiving loud cheers and applause from the crowd, which at one point numbered about 200 people.

"I'm a nice guy, a good teacher, but what you guys [the students] are doing is so important in other ways," said Silverstein. "There are excellent teachers

## SUNY Trustees Approve Summer Tuition Hike

Summer tuition rates were raised yesterday by the SUNY Board of Trustees in an effort to raise revenue to 95 percent set in the state budget according to a SUNY spokesman.

In a vote of 10-0, the board raised the tuition fees so that about \$2.5 million could be raised to meet state revenue requirements for the 83 fiscal year, SUNY spokesman Hugh Finley said.

Summer tuition for in-state under-graduates will go from \$16 per credit hour to \$18 and for out-of-state under-graduates from \$58.50 to \$60.50. For in-state graduate students, the rate would be from \$71 to \$80 and for those out of state from \$91.50 to \$102.50. Summer tuition hikes for law, pharmacy, medical and dental students are comparable.

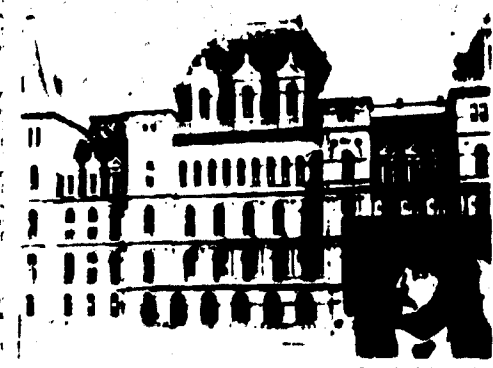
According to Jim Tierney, the student representative board member and the only one to vote against the hikes, the state budget mandates that SUNY Central Administration has to raise about \$53 million this year on its own, being the only state agency with the capability to raise money by itself, mainly through tuition and rent. According to SUNY officials, this tuition hike and the \$300 tuition hike expected to be approved by the board in its meeting in late May are necessary to meet this target and sustain normal operations. Harry Spindler,

SUNY vice-chancellor for Finance and Business, would so far as to say, "I wish that the summer tuition hike was not passed. The money might have to be saved through employee pay-offs."

Stony Brook President John Marburger said that one of the reasons for this year's tuition hike is that about the State Legislature is expected to add \$10 million to SUNY in passing the budget for '83, about half of it was to be used to pay off the state's debt, leaving SUNY with only half through fee hikes. The additional revenues, provided by the legislature, allowed SUNY to avoid laying off any of its employees even though it had to lay off about 500 before the budget deliberations began.

For Stony Brook administration, the board's decision posed somewhat of a problem. Because the recently distributed summer session schedules don't list the increased tuition rates, some students have already paid the lower rate. According to Summer Session Director Megs Shea, those out-of-state students who paid the lower fee will soon be sent letters telling them of the increase and that they have within a week after the start of the first summer session which begins June 8th to pay the difference.

Aaron Rosenblatt, the director of Student Accounts and the person in charge of the summer session billing of in-state

students, said all students were told of the likelihood of increased fees when they registered for the summer session. About 95 percent of the students paid the increased fees when they heard they would probably become official soon, he said, so he didn't have a real problem. He also said schedules now contain an insert explaining the hikes.

How have students been reacting to the cuts? Rosenblatt said, "Their reaction so far has been no more than what people say when they go to gas stations or supermarkets to find the prices have gone up. People seem to be used to this sort of thing."

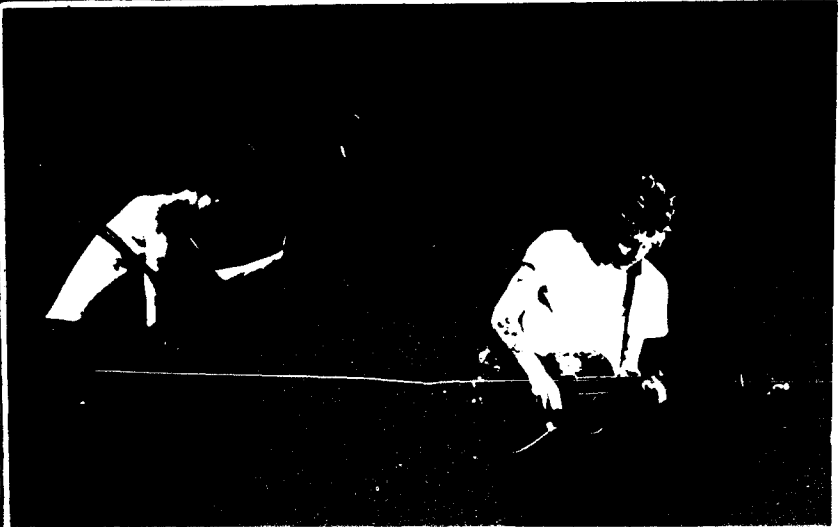

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
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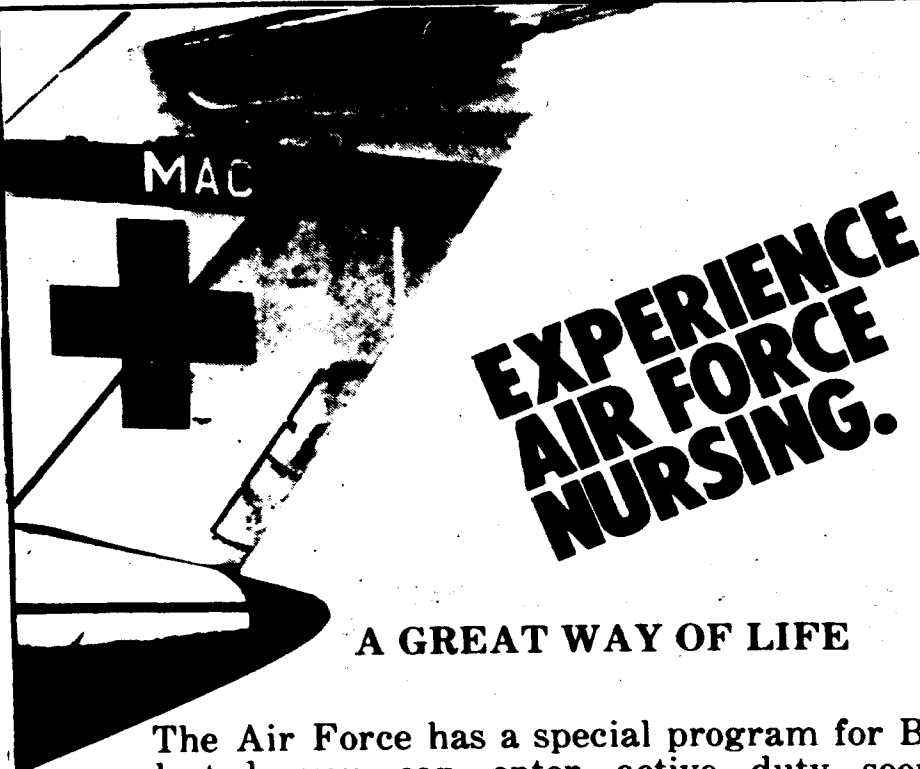

Double winner Donlevy won the 200-yard freestyle upsetting the current conference record holder from Kings Point.  
Kevin McAnulty said, "It feels great to win by so much after all the hard work." He placed first in the 200-yard butterfly with his best time of the year. Robert Schorr won the 200-yard breaststroke with his best time of the season of 2:23. He said, "Our resting period came at the right time for me. I felt good." Donlevy, co-captain Jeff Kozak, captain Howie Levine and Tarpinian won the 400-yard freestyle relay. Diver Fritz Fidele took first for the 1 meter dive. Diver Rich Kowalski took first for the 3 meter dive.  
Levine said, "In my four years of swimming, I've never swam with a faster team at Stony Brook and we're going to win the MeTa." The Patriots held the lead throughout the entire meet. Screaming fans helped the home team to keep the momentum going. "We out swam them," said Coach John DeMarie.

Denny was a double winner in this meet. He again, won the 200-yard backstroke. Hansen was a

double winner for the same event as when against Kings Point. He, however, set a new New Paltz pool record for the 500-yard freestyle. McAnulty won the 200-yard butterfly with his personal best time. McAnulty and Kozak both did their best times for the 200-yard individual medley. "Kevin has done nothing but get better since he got here [Stony Brook]," said Donlevy. Donlevy won the 100-yard freestyle. Diver Fidele took second on the 1 meter dive.  
This weekend the Patriots are going to SUNY at Albany to defend their title as SUNY center champs. DeMarie said "We've got an excellent shot at keeping our title."

The Stony Brook women's swim team chalked up its ninth win of the season as they defeated Barnard College by the score of 81-36.  
"Although the times weren't as fast as the previous meets, it was still a good meet," said Collette Houston. Teammate Ursula Smith added, "It was a good meet. We did all different types of events so that we can qualify for the states."  
The 200 yard medley relay team consisting of Cindy Hamlett, Lynne Ames, co-captain Jan Hanter and Judi Latta ignited the Patriot surge by taking first place. The team's time was 2:03.4.  
The 1650 yard free event, which is equivalent to a mile, was swum by co-captain Jeanine Haer. Haer swam a close second in the first 42 laps and then on the 43rd lap, she suddenly overtook her Barnard opponent and held on to win with the time of 20:14.1 in the 100 yard individual medley event. Mary Lou Roeborn's 1:09.8, Linda McGovern's 1:10.7 and Ames' 1:14.2 swept the event by taking first, second and third places. Following suit, in the 50-yard back event, the trio of Houston, Ute Rahn

and Joan Aird also swept their event. Their times were 30.9, 32.0 and 35.0, respectively.  
Hamlett won her second event by finishing first in the 50-yard breast event. Her time was 36.3, .07 seconds away from the school record in the 50-yard free event. Rahn whizzed through the waves to take first in 27.8 seconds. Houston finished second, .03 seconds behind Rahn's winning time. # Bentley College Edges SB, 23-21

 The Stony Brook Patriots football season was ended Saturday by the Bentley College Falcons in the first round of the National Collegiate Football Association play-off. The Patriots lost 23-21 after a potential game-winning field goal in the contest's closing moments narrowly missed the uprights.  
 When the Patriots took the field to warm-up prior to the game the scoreboard read 30-6 in the favor of the Falcons. The score was a reference to the 1980 play-off game Bentley defeated Stony Brook in. Any Bentley hopes for an easy victory were quickly erased on the opening kickoff when Dino Delany rocked Bentley kick returner Frank Lanusa. After the game, Patriot kicker-receiver Mark VanKeuren said, "Dino's hit really set the tone for the game—we could not have been up for this game anymore than we were."

Stony Brook opened the scoring when they took their first possession 59 yards for a touchdown. That drive was spurred by three plays that accounted for 40 of the 59 yards. On a third and 16, quarterback Ray McKenna passed to Pat Galway for 18 yards and a first down. On the next play running back Jorge Taylor took an option pitch to his right for 18 more yards. The third of these plays was another option that McKenna kept and turned upfield for a 15 yard gain. Chris Brown capped the drive with a five yard second effort touchdown. With Mike Quirk's extra point the Patriots had an early 7-0 lead.

Bentley quickly answered the Stony Brook touchdown with a six play 70-yard touchdown scoring drive. The Falcon touchdown was scored by running back Dave Doolittle on a five yard run. The anticipated duel between Taylor and Doolittle, two of the Association's

leading backs, never materialized because of a first half injury to Doolittle. The score didn't stay tied for long when the Pats took their next possession 80 yards on 10 plays to retake the lead 13-7. McKenna and Fred Knechtel connected for a

key 25-yard pass play that brought the ball to the Bentley two yard line. From there Taylor scored the first of his two touchdowns.

The Patriots opened the second half with the ball and a 13-7 lead and began to drive down field. This series of downs featured a spectacular catch by Galway. McKenna's pass was slightly overthrown but Galway leaped in mid-air and pulled the ball from his finger tips as it passed over his head. Galway then tucked the ball in and turned the play into a 28 yard gain. The mood of the afternoon quickly shifted when under heavy pressure McKenna looked to his right end over the middle. Instead his pass found middle linebacker Steve Devos who returned the interception 65 yards for a touchdown.

After failing to move the ball on their next possession the Pats set up for a punt on their own eleven yard line. The protection for punter McKenna broke down and the kick was blocked for a safety by Mike Zapatta.

For the first time this season the Patriot squad was unsettled on the field. Bentley took advantage of the moment to score one more touchdown in the third quarter to make their lead 23-13.

Stony Brook quickly regrouped and moved 55 yards for a touchdown. Again the offensive leaders were McKenna, Taylor and Galway.

Jorge Taylor's two yard touchdown and Paul Emmanuel's two point conversion nullified the Pats within two points of Bentley. Stony Brook failed to utilize a Rich Valdez interception on the Bentley 20. Bentley retook possession after the Pats failed to move the ball in their four plays.

Stony Brook had one last chance to win the game when with 3:26 to play they took over at their own 19. The Pats moved the ball across midfield with a pair of McKenna-to-VanKeuren passes and a twelve yard run by Brown. The Pats couldn't get any further than the Bentley 26. With less than a minute to play McKenna lined up on his left hashmark 42 yards away from the goalpost. McKenna's kick had plenty of distance but was barely wide to the right.

Despite the loss several Patriots had outstanding games. In the words of Bentley's assistant coach Joe Papaginia, "Ray McKenna showed us that he is the best athlete we have competed against all year." Running back Jorge Taylor rushed for 109 yards and set a Stony Brook record for touchdowns at 13. Pat Galway caught seven passes for 93 yards and drew double coverage for much of the second half.

On defense, Mike Infranco led the team in tackles and played the kind of game that has made him the anchor of the squad. Chris Domenech and Martin Foray also turned in strong games.

The Patriots final record for the season stands at 7-2 in what head coach Fred Kemp called a very successful season.
