

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Veird Science: **That Kid Will Pump You Up!**

America has everything, you name it, we have it. Ferraris, hotdogs, roller coasters, skyscrapers, and fictitious superheroes like Batman and Robin. We've got it all! Ah, remember the good old days when it was socially acceptable to make laser sounds while running frantically with your arms out, or having that slight hope that you may be able to levitate with enough practice. Unfortunately, pretending to be a superhero faded out in early college. These days, the only power I pretend to possess is the devious X-ray vision of Superman, but that may be testosterone driven.

But what about Germany, what do they have besides Bimmers and the Autobahn? Superboy! That's right, they have their very own superhero, and he's real. Somewhere in Berlin, there is an extraordinary four year old lurking around various sandboxes and jungle gyms, beating up helpless pre-schoolers.

The four year-old has bulging arm and leg muscles, and can even hold seven-pound dumbbells with his arms fully extended, something even I can't do. He has abnormally large protruding muscles, twice the size of average kids his age with half their body fat.

So how did this mini-bodybuilder get his powers? No, he doesn't work out, didn't bath in green ooze, wasn't near any nuclear explosion. Essentially he was born with an extremely rare genetic mutation in his DNA that blocks production of a protein called myostatin that limits muscle growth.

For those who haven't taken intro bio, genes are inherited from both parents. The myostatin blocking gene or allele is recessive, meaning that both parents must have the mutated copy, and the child must inherit both copies for the gene to be phenotypically apparent, or expressed. The case is incredibly rare, since the mutation is extremely rare. The chance of two carriers of the gene meeting is slim to none, and then there is approximately 25% chance for each offspring to be homozygous or carrying both copies of the mutated gene.

This marvel child has given scientific proof to confirm

that myostatin is indeed the culprit of muscle degradation in humans. "Now we can say that


myostatin acts the same way in humans as in animals," said Dr. Markus Schuelke, a professor in the child neurology department at Charitel University Medical Center of Berlin.


The discovery has caused a ruckus in various genetic engineering research labs and pharmaceutical companies to find a way to limit the amount and activity of myostatin in the body. One of the most common genetic diseases is muscular dystrophy, that has no cure and in the most common form, Duchenne's, usually kills before adulthood.

Wyeth, a pharmaceutical company has already begun human testing of a genetically engineered antibody designed to neutralize myostatin, which will hopefully eradicate the muscle disease. The potential effects of these drugs are astronomical in the medical field. It could suppress fat accumulation, which will hinder the development of diabetes. It could also prevent muscle wasting in the elderly and patients with diseases such as cancer and AIDS.

The drug can also be used for those who would like to bulk up, or even athletes who may want to improve their game. Some researchers are even going as far as trying to turn off the myostatin gene in chickens to produce more meat per bird. "Just decreasing this protein by 20, 30, 50% can have a profound effect on muscle bulk," said Dr. Lou Kunkel, a professor of pediatrics and genetics at Harvard Medical School.

Long term effects of low levels of myostatin in humans are unknown but lets all hope he stays healthy so I can become a superhero too.

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

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

Hero Get Your Sword: Chinese Nation-Building at an American Crossroad

After President George W. Bush quixotically invaded Iraq, literary circles jumped to compare current events with ancient Greek narrative. After all, you should always "Read the Greeks!" Aeschylus' commentary on Athenian hubris on the eve of war issues salient reminders of the downfalls of empires: rapid military expansion, pathological optimism, and burning bridge foreign relations. A year into Bush's war, a story from the East meets the Western narrative of conquest. "Hero," starring Jet Li, is a myth explaining the consolidation of ancient empires by the Qin Dynasty, consequently creating China. This Chinese movie speaks favorably on military expansion at a time when Americans are torn as to how exactly their story should be written.

Since Jet Li made his American blockbuster in "Lethal Weapon III," we in the West have come to know him as a lethal, cold-blooded villain. Unlike his harbinger import Jackie Chan, whose warm smile has endeared him as an underdog hero, Li has no relation to the common man. Fittingly, he plays the title Hero in name only. Li narrates his only biographical information at the onset of the film - an orphaned peasant obsessively training his sword technique. Like a true homicidal martial artist, the less human Li gets, the better he comes across on screen.

Bespeaking the self-reflective nature of this epic, Hero unfolds when Li is given a hero's welcome to the capital city, having recently dispatched the emperor's looming assassins. Thousands of soldiers line the palace grounds bowing to Li's triumphant efforts. As the Olympics recently reflected, we moderns are fond of the pomp and circumstance of empires. But the Parthenon, like the Coliseum, the Pyramids, and the Great Wall, were built on the backs of slaves. Marx may have argued that religion is the opiate of the masses, but it is nationalism that keeps the lower class oblivious to its exploita-

tion. Blind nationalism is the trick of tyrants, and the indulgence of the enslaved. Few things could be worse than honoring the exploitation of humanity, and "Hero" seems to embrace it.

Ultimately, the Qin Dynasty, invaded its neighbors. What should separate a democracy from an empire is the dissent of its citizens. As De Tocqueville might warn, even though a tyranny of the majority represents the majority, its still a tyranny. "Hero" fails to explore this subtlety. It loves its king either unconditionally as a servant, or hates him absolutely as an enemy.

Fittingly, the greatest assassin of them all, Broken Sword, provides the ambivalence needed in character crisis. Sword places emphasis on the ethical struggles surrounding conquest as he wrestles with the king's vision of China's future. With each interpretation of the past also comes the normative statement of the future. Reality is, after all, about perception. If the Greeks warned of the danger of hubris, the Chinese speak loudly of the deceit of narrative.

Like Tarantino would tell you, if you put the end at the beginning, there had better be a twist or two along the way. Real life, like history, tends to be complicated. "Hero's" best triumph is the surreal way it blends together different strands of past events. Who, ultimately, is telling the truth? As each scene shifts from the deep reds of passion, to the jade-like greens of wisdom, to the autumn oranges of revenge, "Hero" builds on the uncertainty of narrative. Who is telling the truth and who is in control?

Ultimately, history is just one of the spoils of war that goes to the victor. This time war does mean peace. This time the emperor is wise and just. This time empire is good for the people. And, of course, this time the people are slaves.

Hero is in Chinese with English subtitles. It is rated PG-13 for violence and light sex, though neither are particularly graphic. Audiences should be more wary of long landscape shots at the end of the movie that may induce sleep. Ultimately, the not quite faux cheesiness of Hero and Li's poor casting are saved by rhythmic martial arts and Broken Sword's depth. Sword, in fact, demands a prequel.


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Welcome Back from the Statesman

Is Kerry America's Enemy?

Senator Kerry's campaign for Presidency of the United States is unconscionable, and frankly, he should know better. In an August 25th press release, Senator Kerry has impugned the honor and integrity of the Secretary of Defense, Donald Rumsfeld. He called for his resignation in response to the torture and abuse that took place at Abu Ghraib prison, and also because of U.S. defense policies in Iraq that in Senator Kerry's words are "failing to win the peace." Senator Kerry demanded the resignation despite former Defense Secretary James Schlesinger's comments that Secretary Rumsfeld's "resignation would be a boon to all of America's enemies and, consequently, I think that it would be a misfortune if it were to take place ... "

From his press release: "Yesterday, the Schlesinger panel released their report which found that much of the responsibility for setting the conditions for the abuse at Abu Ghraib can be attributed to failures at highest levels of our government. Today the Fay report will be released and will recommend punitive action for those in our military who were directly involved... But what is missing from all these reports is accountability from the senior civilian leaders in the Pentagon and in the White House. From the bottom of the chain of command all the way to the top, there needs to be accountability."

Senator Kerry is politicizing the crimes that were committed at Abu Ghraib, the fighting that is taking place in Iraq and the sacrifices that are being made by our brave men and women in uniform. In other words, Senator Kerry is using the horrors of war

for political gain. While he certainly has the right to make these statements, and if elected to enact policies that he believes are right and wise, he must now be confronted for his lack of judgment. Despite being warned that the resignation of Secretary Rumsfeld would be a boon for the enemy, he thinks it should happen anyway. Apparently, he has no problem with encouraging actions that would help the enemy win the "War On Terror."

This is not the first time that statements made by Senator Kerry, in a sense, aided the enemy in a war America was fighting. Today's episode is eerily reminiscent to Senator Kerry's testimony before the U.S. Senate's Committee on Foreign Relations on April 22nd, 1971. Then, as now, Mr. Kerry is blaming war crimes on U.S. foreign policy. Then, as now, he is challenging the honor and integrity of men who have served their nation. Then, as now, he is politicizing war crimes.

From his testimony: "I would like to talk, representing all those veterans, and say that several months ago in Detroit, we had an investigation at which over 150 honorably discharged and many very highly decorated veterans testified to war crimes committed in Southeast Asia, not isolated incidents but crimes committed on a day-to-day basis with the full awareness of officers at all levels of command... It is impossible to describe to you exactly what did happen in Detroit, the emotions in the room, the feelings of the men who were reliving their experiences in Vietnam, but they did. They relived the absolute horror of what this country, in a sense, made them do.

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

Younger Robinson Shines With Solo Debut

If Rich Robinson had walked away from his stint as guitarist and co-songwriter of the Black Crowes and simply rested on his laurels, he would certainly be sitting pretty to say the least. After all, his body of work with the Crowes (which filled six studio albums, one collaboration with Jimmy Page and a wealth of b-sides and unreleased material) is one to be admired and certainly more than any musician could accomplish in a lifetime of playing. But lucky for us, resting on his laurels isn't something that's in Robinson's vocabulary. After trying to assemble a band (Hookah Brown) and having it fold after a brief period of touring, Rich Robinson has elected to do it all on his own with the release of his studio album Paper.

His second release this year (following right on the heels of the internet-only live masterpiece *Live at the Knitting Factory*), *Paper* shows a side of Robinson that some might not have realized existed. Not only is the man a gifted purveyor of guitar riffs, but his lyrics aren't too shabby either. Couple them with his unique vocal style (which is miles away from brother Chris) and you've got yourself quite a unique package. Add the fact that Robinson handled everything on the album himself, save for some assorted instrumentation,



and you've got the makings of a rock music force to be reckoned with.


The album opens with the rocker "Yesterday I Saw You," which has a guitar riff so powerful you'd swear it'd fallen off of a Black Crowes record somewhere in the mid-90's. Robinson doesn't rest after this song's burst of energy, flying right into another piece of high-velocity rock with "Enemy." In fact, the album doesn't slow down the rock pace until it hits "Forgiven Song," a beautiful piece of acoustic-based magic that recalls Robinson's Georgia roots. Complete with a fiddle solo and pedal steel flourishes, "Forgiven Song" is one of the album's most beautiful moments.

You can't keep Robinson down for long, as he shotguns right back into the dirty boogie with "Veil." Like a handful of other tracks on the album, "Veil" began as a Hookah Brown tune under a different title. But Robinson's version is the definitive one. The guitar drips with a sleazy distortion, which although originated from Keith Richards, is now a style that undeniably belongs to Robinson.

Things slow down again to reveal one of Robinson's most intimate compositions to date, the heartfelt "When You Will." The track is like a Sunday afternoon back porch ditty you'd hear somewhere on the bayou and is nothing short of a delight. Almost in severe contrast, Robinson proceeds into the thunderous "Places," which can only be described as a Black Sabbath riff to the hundredth power. The entire song is a repetition of a single riff, yet is something that one cannot possibly be bored by. It is truly a testament to Robinson's talent.

The album culminates in the neardizzying "Answers," which is a majestic piece of dynamics that could very well be the pinnacle of Robinson's songwriting. It's almost if the track is daring you not to get infected by its groove as it rocks along. It wouldn't surprise me if the track was never a hit on the radio, but it certainly would annoy me to no end. "Answers" is a track that should be right up there with all the other rock classics put forth by the likes of the Stones, the Allman Brothers and artists of a similar ilk.

Closing out the album is the fun and aptly titled "It's Over," which if nothing else provides the listener with a bit of a breather after the power of its predecessors. It's the perfect ending to what I consider a perfect album, one that every fan of music should have in their collection. Not that he had to, given his startlingly brilliant work with the Black Crowes, but Rich Robinson has proven himself as a rock music icon with *Paper*.



A brief overview of new construction on campus...

The New Face of the Seawolves Marketplace



Finished in late August, the Seawolves Marketplace underwent a massive series of renovations that left it cleaner, bigger, and more open. The increased size is to accommodate new services, including a laundry drop-off and boxed meals.

They are currently opened for business and located in the Student Activities Center. The Marketplace sells notebooks, flip flops, pencils, pens, bike locks and everything else a students need to survive at Stony Brook.

School of Thought Walkway

Tens of thousands of dollars were donated to the Union Walkway Project, an effort by the campus club School of Thought to beautify the campus and "foster a sense of a cooperation between students and the environment." Construction is currently ongoing on the walkway, which is estimated to be complete in four to six weeks. The landscaping designs for the walkway were made by John Belle of the architectural firm Beyer Blender Belle, and will include an elevated circular bed of trees with a walking brick path etched in the middle. Contributions from donors will be awarded by trees, benches and bricks with the donors names attributed.

Wang Center, The named after Charles B. Wang, the former chairman and CEO of Associates Computer who donated millions of dollars to the university, is undergoing some new construction of its own.

A new food court is expected to be in operation sometime in October, likely sporting foreign eats as an alternative to the pizza and hamburgers so common in other places on campus. There are also rumors of a new halaal food section for Muslim students.

Humanities Construction Presses Forward


The Humanities construction project began June 1, 2002, and is expected to be finished July 2005 as scheduled. The contract for the project cost is approximately \$19,920,000. The development is under the renown architectural firm Beyer Blinder Belle Architects. John Belle, a world famous architect that is responsible for the design of the Grand Central Station, and other constructions in Stony Brook, will be leading the undertaking. The building will feature three floors and a courtyard for students to relax between classes. The first floor will provide students with two large lecture halls, and will also have faculty and staff offices, as well as seminar rooms. The second floor will have mainly faculty and staff offices, and one or two classrooms. The third floor will contain mostly classrooms, approximately eight to ten. Unfortunately, the new humanities building will not have a cafeteria.






Staller Center Renovations

Of course, there is always tax, but \$1.25 for 50 CDs is still a pretty good deal. Addition-



ally, for a deal without rebates, I bought a \$185 set of speakers for \$45.

Through a deal I found on Slickdeals.net, I purchased a digital camera from the "Home Shopping Network", along with an accessory kit for about \$120, and subsequently sent in a \$100 rebate that I received about three weeks later. Was it worth it? Certainly. It was the best deal I ever got. I turned around and sold the camera on eBay for \$111. You do the math; I made 90 bucks for clicking a few buttons and taking the time to ship the item. I spend more time walking to Javits every day.

Just about everyone has heard about eBay, but either some people chose not to buy into the hype, or they're too scared. Get over it. Over the past few years, eBay has become one of the safest ways to buy and sell items online and some of the prices are about half of what you would be paying in stores. Take it from someone who spent many years buying, selling, and scheming on eBay: you can't afford to ignore this website.

eBay cut down on almost all the scheming and made their services very buyer friendly, although there are a few things to watch out for. Make sure to review the condition of the item you're buying before you go through with an auction. Also, you should check the user ratings, which you will see as soon as you open any auction in the right-hand portion of the screen. The number accurately grades your seller's reliability, and gives you a good idea of who you can trust. Any seller who has over 250 feedbacks and a 98% positive rating is a safe bet when buying.

One last thing to mention is Pricescan.com. This website lets you search for great deals on books, among many other things. When you go to the website, just click on books, and you can search by the title, author or ISBN. It may be too late this semester, but I bought new books through this service for up 40 to 60 percent less than I would have paid for their used counterparts at Stony Books.

That's about all the money I can help you save, and I hope this article will help you with your online purchases. Go ahead, and try it out. Just check out some of the prices for some of your electronics on eBay, or take a look at how much you could have saved buying books using Pricescan's search, and you'll be surprised. Make sure to look out for "Kozlovsky's Pick," my new column in the Statesman, starting next issue, for the latest high tech gear.



working agendas. One of their principle concerns lies in the task of renewing the contracts of clubs and organizations on campus.

The organization also faces the task of finding a new administrative director. Louis Medina, who formerly held the position, was fired in April after administrators decided that he made an improper call to bring police into a public senate meeting. Medina requested the presence of campus police in a senate meeting when William Schwalback III interrupted senate proceedings and called out. Schwalback claimed that he would not leave until the senate had properly voted for his removal from the floor. The police restrained him by force, arrested him, and charged him with criminal trespass and assaulting an officer. Medina has been temporarily replaced by Sonia Gutman, who also serves as the USG accountant.

Wong said he would have handled the Schwalback incident differently. "I've had classes with Bill Schwalback," he said. "He was a good guy. We didn't have to remove him from the room. We could have called a vote. I could have seen him afterwards. We didn't have to get to that point. Both sides were wrong, but the USG crossed the line first."

While many wounds remain from a semester of doubt and skepticism about the USG's ability to properly distribute student funds, the new administration offers some hope for a student body looking for change. Still, Wong's marginal win shows that a strong body of students had resisted the change nonetheless. Only a close watch on upcoming government decisions and changes in policy will provide a proper assessment of the new administration's abilities. The most pressing issues still face this new group of reformers, and students are watching and waiting.



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

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End Features Features Contested Runoff Election Brings Dramatic Changes to USG

At the end of a tumultuous semester of power struggles and senate controversies, Jared Wong, a senior and political science major, defeated presidential incumbent Sandy Curtis in an unexpected runoff election. He secured the position with a solid recount, taking 52.4 percent of the student vote.

In his efforts to change the often berated organization, Wong promised that USG would be open to more students. As the primary venue of financial student power and influence on campus, USG distributes nearly \$2.4 million per semester—a sum drawn from student college fees. As president, Wong is responsible for ensuring that that USG operates properly, and acts as its official spokesperson.

"[The USG] will be more transparent, we'll make the budget readily available [on the internet]," Wong said. "We'll have better communication [with students]."

The trade-off of presidential responsibilities was delayed, however, as Curtis filed a temporary injunction with the USG judiciary, citing an unfair runoff election. She claimed that the election board failed to properly advertise the runoff, showing that 2134 students voted in the general elections, while only 1409 voted in the runoff. She later dropped her injunction and assumed a position as advisor to USG.

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
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Joe Filippazzo, executive editor of the *Stony Brook Press* (a campus student newspaper), praised Wong's leadership. "[Wong] already assisted us, and he cleared up some things with our summer budget," Filippazzo said. "And he's only been USG president [for a short time]."

Curtis and her administration allegedly lost her popularity partly because the USG withheld funds from several college organizations, including the Stony Brook Volunteer Ambulance Corps, the *Stony Brook Press*, and the *Stony Brook Statesman*. USG officers maintained that those organizations did not provide proper documentation for their expenses.

"Records will show than many clubs and organizations were not in compliance with the financial policies," said Sergio DeFreitas, former executive USG vice president. "These same clubs and organizations failed to bring their documenta-

tion up to standards." These organizations joined together in an effort spearheaded by the Stony Brook Press, and prepared petitions and documentation to dispute those charges. Finally, with the help of college administrators and pressure from the student body, funding was restored to most of these organizations by the end of the semester.

In an effort to prevent a recurrence of the student distrust and dissatisfaction that clouded the USG last semester, new officers have been meeting over the summer to plan new events. Comedy shows, concerts, new events, and insurance matters spotted their new
