



SBU Students Say "Don't Walk Alone"

In light of the alleged attacks that have made Roth Quad the highlight of the campus, the graduate and undergraduate student body of Stony Brook University has taken the initiative to hold a "Don't Walk Alone" program. The subdued event, characterized by students holding flashlights and signs around Roth Pond, took place on April 6 from 7:15 PM to 9:00 PM. Most significantly, the event served as an escorting forum where students voluntarily accompanied other students who were walking alone.

The aforementioned attacks purportedly first took place on March 25, when the alleged victim was grabbed from behind, around the parking lot near Hendrix building. The second attack, the following Thursday, involved the same victim and assailant in what Doug Little, Assistant Chief of the University Police, has described as "inappropriate touching."

The "Don't Walk Alone" campaign is not the first. In the past, it has taken place at freshman orientations for purposes of campus safety. According to organizer Emily Bottino, the objective of the event was "to walk student passersby who may still be unaware of the attacks and continue to unknowingly put themselves at risk."

In addition to programs, such as, "Don't Walk Alone," a resolution titled "Students Against Administrative Silence" (S.A.A.S.) has been released. The resoof blue lights, extra lights and security personnel among from Chief Little, Peter Baigent, Vice President for

To its credit, the residential administration has held two meetings-one in Hendrix building on April 3, and another in Cardozo building on April 5-to address these concerns. The Roth quad-wide meeting in Cardozo brought together the President of the Wo/Men's Center, Dr. Jenny Hwang and Dean of Students, Dr. Jerrold Stein. Both individuals, according to Bottino, have been an "exception" to the administration's "uncommunicative and obstinate" nature and have been "supportive of student input ... without being aggressive."


Bottino wishes to highlight that even if the actions taken by students tarnish the University's image, "for [Stony Brook University] to keep things like assault reports and specified safety measures in the dark, is not only to assume student's lack of maturity [and] understanding about dangerous events, but it is also a show of laziness and apathy on behalf of [its] administration."

Fortunately, the student body has not been so apathetic. The "Don't Walk Alone" campaign has received a positive response from the student body. According to Bottino, "about 30 undergraduates and exactly 2 graduate students actively participated and the turnout was great." The campaign took place to gain more signatures for the resolution and to apply "voin the hope that this will instate programs that will better address student safety. In this regard, the campaign has been quite successful. The S.A.A.S. resolution was able to collect 950 signatures by the conclusion of the campaign.



Rent is the kind of movie that stays with you. Rent is the kind of movie that at first seems too ridiculous and over the top but ends up making you laugh and cry at the same time. Innovatively composed by Jonathan Larson as a rock opera, Rent tackles some really tough issues such as poverty, disease, and drugs and celebrates life at the same time. Quoting the opening song Seasons of Love, Rent teaches us to, "Measure our lives in love".

Set in the heat of the aids epidemic of the late 1990's, this film provides an accurate portrayal of the "starving artist" in the East Village of New York City. The strife that these characters are constantly suffering makes them a strong, passionate group of friends. Headed by Anthony Rapp and Adam Pascal playing the dynamic duo Mark and Roger, this cast shines brilliantly as they sing and dance their way through a seemingly impoverished, but emotionally rich Manhattan. Together, this group of bohemians helps each other deal with aids, love, and poverty. Their struggle breeds a real sense of camaraderie, making this movie all the more touching and affective. There is no real plot here; Rent just portrays a year in the life of Mark, Roger, Mimi, Maureen, Joanne, Angel, and Collins. They love and live. There are some love stories in the offing, but mostly these characters stick together through everything.

Making Rent a musical gives it a real edge and purpose. Since it is a rock opera, the characters have the opportunity to sing every single line and distinguish it by melody. The music accurately expresses all of the tension and passion the characters are experiencing. In Light my Candle, Mimi and Roger flirt, exchange pasts, and illustrate a great, exciting sexual tension. Will I is a poignant song about the universal fear of living with aids shared by many characters. Santa Fe is a jubilant celebration of "escaping the cold, bohemian hell" of the big apple sung in a New York City subway car. The grand number La Vie Boheme symbolizes the whole movie itself. It embraces difference, culture, arts, literature, sexuality, and a real joie de vivre. Numbers like Santa Fe and La Vie Boheme are what make Rent seem so outlandish yet powerful at the same time. They are set in public places and have ridiculous lyrics, but the music is so captivating and the words are so universal that the audience ends up wishing they were singing along on the subway, too.

The musical numbers of Rent celebrate life and friendship through difficult times. That is why this movie is so memorable. That is why people who see it fall in love with it, see it again and again, and go on to the memorize all of the words to all of the songs. The late, celebrated Larson really proves that any emotion can be well expressed through song. He also shows the true power of good friends. Even if you are poor and sick, friends make you feel as alive and happy as humanly possible. That is something to sing about.

Gamers' Lounge 24: The Game

Also, the cut-scenes in the game are done exactly the same way as the show, down to the shaky camera and picture-in-picture segments.

this game. While it may be cool to watch, it's at times not all that fun to play. The basic gameplay is similar to games like James Bond 007: Everything or Nothing. Unlike that game, the controls in 24: The Game are very unresponsive. At times you'll be asked to perform certain button sequences to do things like arrest an enemy that has surrendered.

I had to press the X button five times before I could arrest someone. Also, the developers decided to put two functions on the same button in some cases. There will be times when you will need to do one thing, and something else happens. Aiming can also be a problem. The game uses an auto-aim mechanic, but there will be times when you lock-on to someone behind a wall or just beyond your reach. Luckily, you can get close enough to most of the bad guys to shoot them because they either can't aim or run around pointlessly.

At times, the picture-in-picture technique used during the cut-scenes are used during gameplay. While its cool at first, it can get really frustrating, especially when you are trying to attack someone or move through a hazardous area. Despite all these flaws, this style of play can actually be fun at times. You can play as

multiple characters, Yet for some reason, it's more fun to play as Jack Bauer than anyone else.

The minigames are probably the best on the ever popular Fox TV show of the aspect of the game. Though simple, they are fun to play; the best of these being the interrogations. During these segments, you must control the intensity of your character's voice to try and find out information. Other minigames include bomb diffusing and scanning for snipers. All these must be done within a set period of time. The only minigame that isn't fun is the sniper minigame, because for some reason, Jack Bauer aims like he's drunk.

Best Overall Value 2007 Dodge Caliber



The 2007 Dodge Caliber offers the aggressive looks of an SUV with the fuel economy and handling of a compact. In essence, this car is the best of both worlds. Starting at roughly \$14,000, this undercuts the Toyota Corolla and Honda Civic price-wise while offering more power, with choices of a 1.8-, 2.0-, and 2.4-liter engines that make 138, 158, and 172 horses, respectively. Also available is AWDunique in this class and price range. Of the various modernizations and improvements over the Neon its replacements, the Caliber comes with a Continuously Variable Transmission standard in an effort to improve both performance and mileage, estimated at 23/26 for AWD and 28/32 for FWD. Available for sale by the Summer is the Caliber SRT-4, which packs a 300-hp engine and FWD for an estimated \$26,000.

Best Coupe 2006 Mitsubishi Eclipse



Is this a nice car or what? Albeit a bit underpowered with a standard 2.4-liter four banger that produces 162-hp, this is one hell of a deal. Starting at roughly \$20,000, with an optional 3.8-liter 6-cylinder putting you back \$24,000, nothing even comes close to matching the style and class of the Eclipse at this price range. The interior is done up beautifully, easily one of the best in its class. The base GS model may not win any drag races, but the 6-cylinder GT might, going from 0-60 in 5.5 seconds, by some estimates. While it may look like a pure sports car, there are a few quirks to watch out for. Since it weighs in at a hefty 3,300 pounds, it handles a bit more like a heavy sedan than, say, a Mazda3. Nevertheless, the Eclipse manages .82g on the skipad, according to *Car and Driver* tests (for reference, the Mazda3 comes in at .87g). Definitely a great car at a great price.

Best Economy Car 2007 Nissan Versa



After years of watching companies like Toyota and GM fail to produce an exciting low-budget car, Nissan finally showed up to set them straight. The Nissan Versa is ages ahead of the Toyota Echo/Yaris and the Chevy Aveo it will compete with. Powered by a 2.0-liter 4-cylinder engine that makes at least 120-hp and will get an estimated 31/33 mpg, the Versa is one of the nicest assembled cars on the market, regardless of price range. The interior is cavernous, considering this is a sub-compact, in a category below a Corolla. The instrument panel is clean and polished, as is the rest of the interior. Surprisingly, the back seat feels at least as roomy as a Civic and even a bit more refined. With optional features including a CVT, automatic entry (one step above keyless), Satellite Radio, and a Bluetooth Handsfree system, this is one classy sub-compact, starting at only \$12,000.


