

First Polity Senate Meeting

The Polity Senate, in its first meeting of the semester on Wednesday night, voted to form a committee to investigate the actions of the Student Polity Activities Board.

SPAB had arranged for David Muhammad of the Nation of Islam to speak that night in the Union senate and the SPAB could have auditorium. Members of Polity canceled the event after discovering flyers advertising it, according to Mike Bernardin, a senator and vice president of the Commuter Student Association.

Events with overt religious or partisan content cannot be funded by Polity," said Bernardin. The flyer identifies "Minister David Muhammad" as a "Registered member of the Nation of Islam." The bottom of the flyer read, "In The Name of Allah, The Beneficent, The Merciful."

According to copies of the SPAB's minutes, on Jan. 22, SPAB voted to pay \$250 to Muhammad for his lecture. Many senators emphasized two irregularities in those minutes: (1) Jan, 22 was two days before the start of the spring semester, and (2) nobody was listed as having voted for or against the motion in question.

Some said the Nation of Islam is offensive and objectionable to most of the student body, "The Nation of Islam is a racist, anti-Semitic, anti-white organization. They have never hidden that fact," said Bernardin.

After 20 minutes of discussion, the senate voted in the affirmative 20-5 to form a committee to investigate the actions of the SPAB and decide

appropriate action. Soon thereafter, the senate voted to freeze the budget of the SPAB for two weeks pending the results of the investigation.

"If there was wrongdoing, someone must be held responsible,' said Andrew Murray, president of the Commuter Student Association.

A member of the SPAB said the worked out their differences if the senate discussed its objections before taking such drastic action.

Later that night, the senate allocated \$500 to Whitman College for a social event. The \$500 will be funded from a \$70,000 surplus from greater than expected enrollment during the previous academic year, according to Stephen Adams, the Polity Executive Director. There were a total of 11 proposals for the use of the surplus. The Whitman College allocation was the only one that passed. Among the more significant proposals voted down were \$15,000 for the Commuter Student Association, \$10,000 for the Polity Council, and \$5,700 for the Minority Planning Board. Polity's annual budget is \$2.2. million.

The senate agreed to meet next Wednesday, Feb. 14, despite the objections of some senators that Wednesday is Valentine's day. Kaedrea Jackson, the Polity Vice President, caused an uproar when she declared "Valentine's day is not a real holiday."

Polity Senate meetings are held every Wednesday at 8:30 p.m. in the Student Union bi-level. Meetings are open to the public.

NBC Correspondent Speaks at HSC

Student National Medical Association Hosts Second Annual Diaspora of Color

Hip-hop and soul food accompanied motivational speaking and traditional dance, Friday evening, in the Health Science Center, when the Student National Medical Association (SMNA) hosted its Second Annual Diaspora of Color.

The SNMA is the nation's oldest and largest organization for medical students of color. Founded in at the Howard University College of Medicine, in 1964, the SNMA now has over 5,000 members.

Dr. Ian Smith, the medical correspondent for NBC television, opened the event as the banquet's guest speaker. He talked of his lifelong pursuit to become a doctor, and the unexpected events that led him into broadcasting.

"When I was in school, at Dartmouth Medical School, I was an active member of the SNMA," Smith said. "I found that there wasn't enough support for minority medical students, and I wanted to change that."

He said that many African Americans in television and news are involved with sports, and minorities have to want to branch out into other fields. Smith also suggested that networks must become more willing to place minorities in visible positions.

Recounting how he got into medicine, Smith explained that an article in Jet magazine inspired him to pursue neurosurgery. And in order to follow his dream Smith first attended Harvard university.

"It was kind of a lonely journey, because here I was studying this very esoteric discipline," Smith said. "I was always in the lab. My friends, who were economics and environmental science majors, didn't get it."

Smith made strong ties with his mentor at Dartmouth, and later achieved a residency in

neurosurgery. But he eventually came to a disturbing realization. He wasn't enjoying himself. After some soul searching, he switched to orthopedic surgery, and took a residency in New York.

Through another set of events, however, Smith had already acted as an intern to Art Norman, a pioneering black broadcaster. Feeling the financial crunch, he used that connection to call the vice president of NBC, and land a position with the station.

At first, Smith's forays into the world of television news were only to supplement his Manhattan living expenses. But as patients began turning to him for advice, instead of the doctors above him, Smith knew he would have to make a decision.


After three months of intense contemplation, he went to NBC.

"I did it because it made me happy, and it's been a wonderful career," Smith said, referring to his decision to become both a doctor and a television personality. "You can't keep driving yourself without stopping to look at the landscape. What you learn in medical school is beyond anatomy. Rote memorization will leave you. What won't leave you is the ethic that comes out of it."

The Cinque Folkloric Dance Theater took the stage after Smith's speech. Consisting of a drum quartet, a female dance trio and a fire dancer - all dressed in African style clothing - the company performed Senegalese music and movements.

The musicians drummed and the women danced with a contagious intensity. A cacophony of rapid bass concussions stirred the dancers to execute feverish stomps, claps and twirls for nearly 20 minutes.

Then came the fire dancer. He whirled blazing batons, employed grandiose poses and spouted bursts

of flame. He gave an extremely dramatic, even aweinspiring performance. And he set off the fire alarm. The police, who arrived in mid-performance, were so captivated they hardly seemed to care.

The Cinque Theater finished its show, the executive board of the SNMA thanked the audience, and the DJ closed the evening with urban beats and a packed dance floor

USB Reggae Marathon

Reggae music at Stony Brook went back to its roots with the spirit of protest last week as the 7th annual reggae marathon resonated from the airwaves of the campus radio station 90.1 WUSB.

The marathon, titled the Reggae Am"Bush," lasted five days, starting last Friday and ending on Tuesday, Feb. 6, the 56th birthday of reggae icon Bob Marley. The day also coincided with Marley receiving a star on the Walk of Fame in Hollywood.

The Am"Bush" was an attempt to protest against the way the U.S. presidential elections were held. Kibret Neguse, a marathon coordinator and DJ on Thursday's No Sound Test reggae show, said that using reggae music to protest against the elections is relevant.

"Reggae music was born out of a necessity to voice objection to social conditions in Jamaica," said Neguse, who has been involved with WUSB for the past 18 years. "The political climate in the US at the present time has heightened a critical awareness of how a corrupt voting system adversely affects this socialled democracy." Neguse went on to say that reggae's "ammunition" is real life circumstances. "It is the perfect weapon to aim at the belly of the beast," he said.

In the election, Neguse said that it was a matter of choosing between the lesser of two evils. He said that although no candidate was officially endorsed by the reggae community, the majority leaned towards Gore. "It became obvious that "republican" is a bad word," said Neguse.

Although the Am"Bush" gave a serious edge to the marathon, the playful and melodic side of reggae did not fail to come through. Just as in previous marathons, the Am"Bush" prompted calls from listeners around the world including London, Jamaica, Australia and Malaysia. The overseas reggae fans tuned in to the marathon via numerous websites that broadcast it live, such as Reggae24.com and the station's own site, www.wusb.org.

Famous reggae musicians also called into the marathon including Shaggy, Ini Kamoze and Michael Rose from the group Black Uhuru.

The campus community also joined in the reggae vibe. Previous marathons had been held during summer and intersession months when most students were home, leaving them unable to participate.

"An editorial in a campus newspaper revealed the frustration of the campus community not being able to tune into 90.1 during the previous marathons," Neguse said. "Now that we held the marathon when

the campus is open the response has been tremendous." Neguse said that the station received regular visits and calls from students. "It was always a goal of ours to air the marathon during the school session so that students on campus could fully enjoy the event," Neguse said.

Erik Steinbach, general manager of WUSB and reggae music director, said that it was worth preempting other programs for five days for the marathon. "It coincided with Black History Month," he said.

The next marathon, slated for July 1 through July 5, will coincide with International Reggae Awareness Day, which is July 1.

Neguse said that he does not believe the election of Bush will be harmful to sustaining the values that reggae stands for. In fact, he said that this is the environment in which reggae thrives.

"Political opposition only serves to strengthen the bond of the masses and creates a call for action," he said. "Reggae encompasses all aspects of life and reflects a multitude of values. You can't kill the truth, only suppress it." Neguse said that when truth is trying to come out, a reggae song is born.

"Like a poison pill, this is only harmful to the lies perpetuated by this and any administration that seeks to deceive," Neguse said. "Can you honestly say, 'In Bush we trust?"

Down to the Wire

Seawolves Win Tenth Straight Victory at Home

The Seawolves withstood Antione Johnson's sixpointbarrage in the final eight seconds of the game to edge the Great Danes of Albany, 63-62. Stony Brook used a 9-0 run to recapture the lead in the final five minutes, after trailing by as much as ten points midway

through the second half. USB swept the season series against their instate rivals for the second time in three years. In front of roughly 2000 fans, the Seawolves notched their tenth straight victory at the Indoor SportsComplex and improved their record to an astounding 12-1 at home. USB is currently riding its longest home-winning streak in 15 years, which is in stark contrast to last year's 3-9 mark.

"We have 15 wins now and we have a winning season,"said Coach Nick Macarchuk. "The fact that it is Albany makes it extra special."

Leon Brisport, who has been an integral part of Stony Brook's success this season, stepped up for the umpteenth time against the Great Danes. The 6-8 senior center ruled the paint as he poured in 18 points by shooting six of eight from the field, pulled down

8 boards and registered five rejections. Equally

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impressive, was Brisport's ability to neutralize Albany's centers, Will Brand and Joe Vukovic, holding them to a combined four points. This was the same Brand who have dropped 24 on Stony Brook earlier this season in Albany.

However, Stony Brook's latest victory required the Seawolves to concentrate and execute infallibly till the very end. Even then, USB only eked out a one-point win. This was by far the closest contest at home in over a month for Coach Macarchuk's crew.

A 5-27 Albany run chewing up a combined 11 minutes brought about the narrow margin of victory. When the carnage was done the Seawolves had allowed an 11-point lead to turn into a ten-point deficit.

Towards the end of the first half, point guard DJ Munir took a knock on defense and was forced to leave the game. At around this time, USB began to lose its focus. The Seawolves committed unforced turnovers, didn't rebound with as much intensity and settled for bad shots.

Yet, Coach Macarchuk wouldn't let his team give up and after a timeout midway through the second half, the Seawolves slowly chipped away at the deficit. USB stepped up the defensive pressure, blocked shots and denied Albany second chance opportunities.

As the Seawolves defensive pressure picked up, back-up point guard Lee Church (#20) started to settle down.

Stony Brook began to attack the basket and draw fouls; USB went to the free throw line 16 more times than Albany in the second half.


The Seawolves climbed back into the game with a nine to zero run after a Joe Vukovic's lay-up, with 4:55 to go, gave the Great Danes a 52-46 advantage. Stony

Brook kept Albany off the scoreboard over the next 2:39. One of three second half three-pointers by Chris Balliro (#33) keyed the run and tied the score at 52-52. Lee Church's three-point play with 2:29 left gave the Seawolves their first lead since the 16:35 mark of the second half at 55-52.

However, Albany had come to far to give up without a fight. Sam Hopes' two free throws and steal led to four straight points and gave the Great Danes their last lead of the night at 56-55, with 1:24 left.

Church answered Albany's challenge as he found a cutting Jairus McCollum (#30) in the lane on the ensuing possession. McCollum's acrobatic shot went in as he was fouled. His free throw gave Stony Brook a 58-56 lead with under a minute to play.

"I looked to the paint and it opened up, like the Red Sea it just parted," said McCollum of his tip-in. "Lee had been watching me the whole time. The dish came and he had me."

With eight seconds left, Antione Johnson hit a long-range three-pointer that cut the deficit to 62-59, and keep Albany's faint hopes alive. McCollum received the inbound pass and was fouled on Stony Brook's next possession. The 6-5 freshman who specializes in demoralizing dunks showed off his shooting touch as he hit both free throws to make the score 63-59 with two seconds left.

Nevertheless, Albany continued to scrap and scheme as they tried to engineer a miracle. Johnson who scored a game-high 22-points, including 16 points in the second half was the Great Danes' last hope. His 40-foot prayer as time expired counted and made the score, 63-62.

Stony Brook survived the late scare and came away with a win thanks to some heroic performances by some unexpected players. "We're very fortunate to win the game. We had some guys who made some good plays at the end of the game," said a relieved Coach Macarchuk. "They came up big. The two freshman [Church and McCollum] came up really big for us!" Church played heavy minutes in place of Munir and finished the game with three decisive points and three steals. "He had a chance to play tonight and he came through with flying colors," said Macarchuk.

Afterwards, Church had his own perspective. "Our team came together defensively at the end and that's what got us the win," he said. "It was a team effort all the way. I just wanted to thank the fans for coming out and supporting us. It made a difference at the end" McCollum and Balliro combined with Brisport to carry the Seawolves in the second half. McCollum and Balliro each chipped in with ten second-half points as they converted crucial free throws in the game's final moments. Rob Hartman making his third consecutive start also added 10 points and four rebounds. McCollum who scored the first points of the game, showed great composure when sealing the deal for Stony Brook by making all four of his free throws, including the game winner with eight seconds on the clock. Unfortunately, the win was marred by an injury to starting point guard DJ Munir (#15) who suffered a severely bruised cheekbone after trying to take a charge in the first half. The 6-3 freshman sat out the rest of the game with a contusion that caused in his left eye to be swollen shut. Afterwards, Munir was taken to University Hospital as a precaution. Fortunately, the X-rays were negative and he is expected to play in the Seawolves' next game on Tuesday against Maryland-ES.

Students Interested in Financial Aid It's not too late to apply for 2000-01

A reminder from the Office of Financial Aid and Student Employment about APPLYING FOR FINANCIAL AID (CURRENT YEAR, SUMMER 2001 AND 2001-2002)

2000-2001 (Current Year) Applications

Students who have NOT applied for financial aid for 2000-2001 (current year)

- Federal regulations require students to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and submit the <u>valid Student Aid Report (SAR)</u> to the Financial Aid Office before the last day of classes for the spring semester = May 16, 2001. Federal financial aid cannot be processed after your last day of class attendance.
- We strongly urge you to file the FAFSA immediately as the process of filing the FAFSA will take four to six weeks.
- The deadline to apply for TAP is May 1, 2001.

Summer 2001 Applications

- Students must complete and file the 2001-2002 FAFSA and have it date-stamped at the federal processor by March 1, 2001.
- Students must obtain from the Financial Aid Office a USB Summer 2001 Application for Financial Aid. It must be completed and returned to the Financial Aid Office by the deadlines specified (Summer 2001 Federal Work Study deadline = April 1, 2001).

2001-2002 Applications

Students should complete and file the 2001-2002 FAFSA and have it date-stamped at the federal processor by March 1, 2001 to be considered for priority financial aid programs: Federal Work-Study, Federal SEOG (grant) and Federal Perkins Loan.

There are three ways you can file the FAFSA for the 2001-2002 school year:



Complete, sign and send the Renewal FAFSA that you receive in the mail to the federal processor; OR



Complete, sign and send the FAFSA that you requested from the financial aid office to the federal processor; OR



Complete and electronically sign the FAFSA on the Web application at: www.fafsa.ed.gov
*By completing the PIN Registration prior to filing the FAFSA on the Web, students and parents are able to electronically sign the application. PIN Registration takes approximately 10 days. If you do not register for a PIN, you must print out the signature sheet once you have completed the FAFSA on the Web and mail it to the federal processor.

Upon filing the FAFSA, New York State residents will receive a pre-printed Express TAP Application (ETA) from Higher Education Services Corporation (HESC). The ETA must be reviewed, completed, signed and returned to HESC. Continuing and Transfer students will receive a TAP Change Form (rather than an ETA) to update the TAP school code (Stony Brook = 0875) and any other information that has changed from the previous year.

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
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
