AM I RIGHT OR WRONG?

Charlie Hansen was never one to mince words. If he engaged you in conversation (usually involved with employee rights) you would ultimately be asked to react with an answer to the above question. For those of us in the professional ranks there was little or no reason to disagree. Charlie was a passionate advocate for fairness and equality. He seemed to take a particular pride in negotiating with management even before there was a contractual basis.

United University Professions annually presents the Nina Mitchell Award. It is our union's highest honor and goes to recognize UUP members who have served the union with distinction. This edition of INSIGHT highlights one of Stony Brook's own, Charles C. Hansen, the 2000recipient of the Mitchell award. Personally, I was fortunate enough to have worked alongside Charlie for two years, a time when the seeds of unionism for professionals and faculty were just being planted. Charlie was one of the high profile "farmers".

He was a talker, a compromiser, a needler, a pusher and an educator. He had his fair share of doubters, skeptics and

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adversaries. While some could question his tactics, no one could question his motives. He was and still is a union man. He was with us from the beginning and will be with us until he takes his last breath. His vision of and for the union has led to the sense of importance and belonging that many members feel today. The legacy of Charlie Hansen has long endured at Stony Brook. If there was one individual who faculty or professional staff could turn for a sympathetic ear and the promise of some kind of action, that individual was Charlie. He had staff and management working on safety issues long before it was popular or mandatory to do so.

We do not live solely in the present. We stand on the shoulders of those who, like Charlie built the foundation on which our organization stands. The Nina Mitchell award in recognition of service is a fitting tribute to a man who committed his working life to the betterment of terms and conditions of employment for SUNY employees. Individual Development Awards

Articles 12.2 and 43 of our contract with the state provides money "for professional development and training programs whichwill improve job performance and assist employees in developing their full professional potential and in preparing for advancement."

Full-time and part-time recipients receive their awards from two separate pools of money. The West Campus Committee received \$52,041 in funds to be divided among 107 Full-time and 14 Part-time applications. A small number of applications were not approved because they either missed the deadline or did not fit into the state described eligibility criteria.



QUESTION: I am a part-time employee with a term appointment. If my appointment is going to be non-renewed, what notice must the employer give me?

ANSWER: If you are a part-time employee with a Term appointment, the employer is required to give you 45 days notice prior to the end of the appointment. (Article 32 of the 1999-2003 NYS/UUP Agreement).

If you have a Temporary appointment, the employer is not required to give any notice. Temporary appointments may be terminated at any time. Part time employees with temporary appointments must receive term appointments at the end of six consecutive semesters of employment.

Tríals and Tríumph

UUPer looks back on struggle to organize

note that I recently read in The Active Retiree regarding a request for UUP history brought back so many memories. For some reason, the attempt to record the history and origins of UUP has been met with great resistance. Some members tried to do this, and their efforts died. And now, some of those who organized that effort have also died. Let me try once more to set the record straight on the formation of UUP.



In 1962, I was hired in the SUNY Stony Brook physics department as a U-grade employee, which meant that I was unclassified, nontenured and not covered by a contract such as the one available to CSEA employees. According to the policies of the SUNY Board of Trustees at the time, U-grade employees worked at the pleasure of their campus administration and could be terminated without explanation. When my department chair explained the status of U-grade employees to me, I responded, "That will be changed."

In 1967, a group of us in the Stony Brook Bowling League raised the issue of department chairs and their decision-making power. We felt that, too often, they were making problematic decisions without any input from employees. Four of us decided to join together and try to form an association that would allow us to have some input with the administration.

We met in the engineering department conference room for weeks and established a set of bylaws for what at the time we called the Stony Brook Professional Association. Our efforts were successful. The Stony Brook Professional Association had a bearing on many decisions that previously would have been reach without our input.

We then decided to contact a number of SUNY campuses and see if it would be possible to establish a statewide association. contacted 25 campuses and found great enthusiasm for the idea. We scheduled a meeting and each campus sent two delegates. As a result, we formed a statewide association known as the State University Professional Association (SUPA).

Through SUPA, we made many of the needs of the U-grade employee

known to the state. Our ranks grew. When the state of New York decided it was time to designate one bargaining unit for the 08 category, it was SUPA that coordinated meetings with the many unions seeking to represent this group.

We decided that we did not need an outside union to represent us. We had, within our ranks, the talent to know and meet our needs. SUPA formed a coalition with the Faculty Senate and from that came the very first group to be elected as the bargaining agent for SUNY. It was known as the Senate Professional Association (SPA).

In 1971, SPA negotiated the first contract between SUNY and the state of New York. This contract contained the Memorandum of Understanding and eliminated the term "working at the pleasure of" from the policies of the SUNY Board of Trustees.

A joining of SPA and an upstate organization then known as the State University Federation of Teachers (SUFT) followed. Initially known as SUNY United, this collaboration was eventually renamed United University Professions.

This how UUP came into being.

I take great pride in the fact that our endeavors brought forth such a wonderful organization as UUP. We grew from nothing into the largest higher education union in the country.

Charles C. Hansen 2000 Mitchell Award Winner

"I'm mad as hell and I'm not going to take it anymore!"

That was the battle cry of Stony Brook's Charles Hansen long before Peter Finch bellowed it from an apartment window as Howard Beale in the 1975 film "Network."

Hansen was mad, all right. Mad because SUNY's professional employees were, by all accounts, hired and fired at the whim of managers. So Hansen, an assistant director of business management at the Graduate Physics Facility, fought for changes right from the start.

By the time Hansen began working to reform SUNY's unsatisfactory and unstable work environment, he was already known as a union leader. He had been a member of Local 1450 of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Worker in the 1950's and, by early 1960's was grievance chair for the Civil Service Employees Association. His colleagues tapped him to lead, and he soon became one of the pioneering members of UNP's predecesson organization — State University Professional Association (SUPA) and the Senaie Professional Association (SUPA).

Hansen had an "unwavering agenda to make faculty and protectionals equal partners in the eyes of SUNY and state managers," according to his nominating petition, submitted by the Story Brook Chapter.

In SUPA, he served as a delegate and on several committees. When SPA evolved as a hybrid organization to encompass both academic and professional faculty, Hansen was called on to serve as his chapter's first president and, later, as vice president for professionals. He is still a UUP delegate.

"No one worked harder for union issues than Charlie Hansen," his nominators said. "His vision of and for the union has led to a sense of importance and itelonging that many members feel today. Every professional today has been positively affected by Charlie's vision three decades ago."




