

ONTRACT RATIFIED BY 88% OF VOTERS

the new contract has been ratified by UUP members of a vote of 6,227to 829. It became effective immedially upon the vote count by the American Arbitration association on August 12. In addition, last week the late legislature passed a pay bill; this should mean will see our increases as negotiated, with no troactivity (September for calendar year employees and November for those with academic year appointments).

OTE TO BE HELD ON DUES DECREASE

t this fall's Delegate Assembly, which will take place eptember 30 and October 1 in Melville, Long Island, elegates will vote on a resolution to lower UUP dues. The SUNY Buffalo chapter has submitted the resolution, which would amend Article XIII of the UUP constitution. If passed, dues will be .95 percent of the ase annual salary for the 1989-90 fiscal year and ine-tenths of one percent of the base annual salary in acceeding fiscal years.

IEW SOCIAL SECURITY SERVICE

he Social Security Administration will now provide a ersonalized benefit statement which will give you an pproximation of how much the system will pay you ach month upon retirement.

This service is available free to anyone who fills out and submits a disclosure form requesting the "Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement". Call 800/937-2000 to request a copy of form SSA-7004. After you complete and send in this form, it will take the agency from two to three weeks to send you your benefit statement.

You can also obtain a copy of form SSA-7004 at any Social Security office or by writing to the Consumer Information Center, Department 55, Social Security Administration, Pueblo, CO 81009.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Each time a new contract comes into force we receive a copy of it. Most of us promptly put it away and forget about it. The law requires that all members of the bargaining unit receive copies of the contract and any other documents that pertain to our "terms and conditions of employment" because we are each responsible for knowing what our rights are. Knowing is the key; not knowing is not an excuse if or when we are deprived of our rights and do not take the recourses spelled out in the contract in the time frame specified.

Because time does not permit me to ask each of you what you know regarding our rights under the agreement, I would like to talk about two of the most common violations committed daily by both management and us, because we let it happen.

As Professionals, we are not required to punch a time clock, sign in and out, or fill out any other time accounting sheets except the two sanctioned by the union (the payroll computer printout and the "Professional Staff Individual Report of Attendance,"

ow those days are to be charged). A report is quired once a month, not every pay day.

has been brought to my attention that in some partments there is discussion about having a board which employees would indicate their presence and eir whereabouts during the day. The next step is ck to the TIME CLOCK.

e other area where violations occur is in the evaluaon process. The use of a scale of one to 10, or ABCD, evaluate an employee is out of conformance with Memorandum of Understanding. Because NO critethave been established which define what is outanding versus what is less than outstanding, the pross described is not legal. The ONLY evaluation pross that is spelled out in the Memorandum is whether not the employee has performed his or her agreedion tasks as described in the Performance Program. e evaluation can be SATISFACTORY or UNSATISFAC-DRY, ONLY. Nothing else.

rige you to spend a few minutes each day reading e 1988-1991 Agreement we will all receive shortly, well as the "Policies of the Board of Trustees." Many, any hours of thought and debate have gone into our ntract. It is there to protect our rights, and if used rectly, it will make our jobs easier. UP/PEBF PRESCRIPTION DRUG PROGRAM

IP Fund members filled almost 228,000 prescriptions a cost of \$3,800,000 during the Fund's fiscal year nich ended March 31, 1988. This represented a 29% crease in prescription drug costs over the last fiscal ar.

e average cost of a prescription drug was \$16.98, it including the \$2.00 co-payment - up 12 1/2% over e last year. Furthermore, each Fund member used most 14 prescriptions for the year, including drugs for gible family members. The increase in prescription ug utilization over the past year was almost 13%.

e can help in the effort to control our Fund's prescripon drug costs by discussing the use of generic drugs the our physicians and pharmacists. Generic equivants have the same chemical composition, same effect to the body, and are subject to the same FDA regulaons as brand name drugs. However, generic drugs INSIGHT is published during the academic year by the Stony Brook Chapter of United University Professions. cost considerably less than their brand name counterparts because they aren't heavily advertised or promoted.

Approximately 50% of all brand name drugs have generic equivalents. The average cost of brand name drugs utilized by Fund members was \$18.59. The average cost of generic drugs was two-thirds less, or \$5.99.
