

#### **UPDATE: Health and Safety Survey**

Earlier this year the UUP Health and Safety Committee sent out a questionnaire to the UUP membership asking them to report their workplace problems at Stony Brook. We received approximately one hundred responses. We have tabulated the overall data in terms of the percentage of problems by category and building.

Many of the problems seem to require immediate

attention (inadequate building and campus security at night, danger of electrical shock, danger of impingement on an entrance gate, a railing which does not protect children from falling, fungal contamination of the air, poor security due to broken locks, a dangerous area of campus because of inadequate outside lighting or other hazards, etc.) Many other problems seem to be chronic and dangerous to the ealth of the respondents (air pollution, use of asbestos gloves, icy conditions by certain building entrances, inadequate air circulation of the library particularly on Friday afternoons, poor temperature control, pedestrian safety and cars on campus walkways).

We have passed on the complaints (the names have been removed) to the Vice President of Campus Services and Campus Operations (Harry Snoreck). At this time, most of the problems have been addressed by Environmental Health and Safety. If you feel that a problem has not been resolved, please contact the appropriate office listed, or contact the UUP office at 2-6570 and leave a message for the safety committee so that we may take up the issue at a Labor Management Meeting. # Mandatory Retirement Outlawed For Higher Public Education

This summer, lawmakers passed long-sought legislation that extends protection from mandatory retirement to faculty and professional staff in public institutions of higher education. The law (Chapter 483) became effective immediately after the Governor signed it on July 18th. Ending this form of age discrimination against our members has been part of UUP's Legislative Program for several years. Prior to passage of this law, tenured employees at institutions of higher education were one of the small number of citizens not protected against age discrimination in New York State. Now no SUNY or CUNY employee can be fired solely for reaching his or her seventieth birthday.

### **Membership Update**

As a member-based organization, UUP needs to know what is one the minds of people reviewing their professional lives, the terms and conditions under which they work, the ways those conditions might be improved. Remember, though, if you are not a member, the opportunity to participate in this review ill not be yours. Remember this too: Our membership figures are important. The State can compare, every other week, the numbers of UUP members and agency-fee payers in our unity. It does. In the distant past the State has claimed across the bargaining table that we were not truly representative of our constituency. Not any more. UUP members now comprise 83.5% of our unit. Needless to say, the higher our membership, the uneasier the State--and the easier our work of improving the lot of all - Ed Alfonsin bargaining-unit members.

#### What is your membership status in UUP?

If you don't know, check your pay stub. Members are 222 on the Other Deductions entry. 215 denotes inclusion in UUP benefits. There are just two differences between 222's and

215s: 1) 222s have 'signed on' - joined the union - and 2) they can participate in developing our proposals or vote on the agreement we offer.

#### Tiers III and IV TIAA/CREF Contributions

The UUP Administrative Office has been notified that all technical procedures have been completed to implement the 3% mandatory employee contribution to TIAA/Cref on a pretax basis. This affects members in Tiers III and IV. The change, effective as of September 12, 1990, should be automatic and not require the individual to sign an individual salary reduction agreement. This would result in more takehome pay.

## **UUP and GOER** To Resolve Salary Disparity Dispute

Deciding how to distribute \$3 million in salary disparity funds earmarked in our 1985-88 agreement (Article 21) is something UUP will be doing without SUNY, thanks to an "escape hatch" agreement negotiated with the state.

The salary disparity matter - the subject of endless negotiations with SUNY - will now be resolved by UUP President John Reilly and Elizabeth Moore, director of the Governor's Office of Employee Relations (GOER). UUP recently exercised its option to move the entire matter out of SUNY's hands following repeated delaying tactics, withdrawal of earlier settlements and assorted "dilatory maneuvers," according to Reilly.

"We stuck with the SUNY talks, despite their snail's pace, because we were determined to get as much information as possible to help our negotiations effort. Unlike SUNY, we also happen to believe in the labor-management process," he said.

In fact, the series of frustrating talks did yield key information on women and academics that will prove useful to the union's future actions, Reilly noted.

Disparity funds for longevity and equity remain UUP's goal as it moves into a new round of talks with GOER, he emphasized.
