Committee Reports:

Housing committee: Masa Prodanovic (speaker) - Schomburg rent review
GSO representatives were originally denied access to the rent review meeting. The review committee was reminded of their open door policy.

Election committee: Sherrye Glaser (secretary) - April elections
There will soon be an open call for candidates for the 2002-2003 exec committee. Please notify your departments and recruit nominees. Any GSO member can run.

The online voting system has been completed by the GSO webmaster Bin Xu. A couple days ago, an administrator voiced concerns about security, and requested that the system not be used until it has been reviewed by DoIT. As soon as all concerns have been addressed, a trial run of the system will take place, and the senators will be asked via email to participate.

Lounge committee: Pegine Walrad (president) Habitat for Humanity fundraiser at the spot.

Special committees:

Task force for Habitat for Humanity Fundraising: Pegine Walrad - There will be a 'Beat the Dean' (L. Martin) and Michael Klein foose ball competition at the spot. There

will also be a race around the pond to 'chase the leprechaun' and a dirty limerick competition. T-shirts and prizes will be distributed.

CAPRA, University Senate, and Grad Council Reports: Maureen Shaiman (Grad Advocate) -

1) Registering by snapshot - Every grad must be registered for the correct number of credits prior to the snapshot date or else they may lose their TA lines, tuition scholarship, and immigration status. If you are blocked from registering, correct the problem prior to this date!!!! Also, keep records of all conversations and emails. Get PROOF of registering..... that means you need a printout, even if you register by phone. Occasionally, people can be accidentally 'de-registered'.

2) CAPRA - the budget cuts are not as severe as previously anticipated. There will be a reduction in the number of new faculty hired (but no hiring freeze), and there was a suggested large cuts in TA and GA lines. Dean L. Martin was against those cuts, and the President and Provost agreed.

3) Grad council - External reviews of Technology and Society dept on 3/18, Neurobiology and Behavior on 4/4, Art on 4/9, and Biochemistry and Cell Biology on 4/11. Students should be prepared to meet with reviewers to discuss the grad programs.

Also, a change was made in the grad school's academic probation policy. 'A student who has been on academic probation a total of 3 semesters and whose GPA remains or falls below 3.0 will not be permitted to re-enroll.' (Prior, a student was not allowed to re-enroll following 2 consecutive semesters on probation, which allowed students to go on and off probation multiple times.)

The practice of allowing doctoral students nearing the completion of their dissertations to be hooded at Commencement prior to completing the oral defense has now been eliminated.

Stony Brook Day in Albany - Pegine Walrad - The day was productive. SBU students met with four state congressmen. The issue of stipend levels being the same at SBU as at other SUNY's, while living expenses on Long Island are drastically higher was brought to their attention.
