NEWS SUMMARY

■ University judicial proceeding halted after complaint withdrawn ■ Last chance to sign-up for Pride Patrol ■ Wheelchair basketball game to benefit children with disabilities.

Complaint Against USB Senior Withdrawn

A complaint filed through the university's judicial system against Quincy Brandon Troupe, a USB senior who was arrested by Suffolk County Police in connection with a March 24 rape on the campus, has been withdrawn.

The woman, a USB student who has not been identified, said she is temporarily withdrawing her complaint because the district attorney has told her that the university's proceedings could potentially interfere with the court's action in the case.

The action puts a halt to the university's judicial proceedings in the matter. A hearing that had been scheduled for April 18 has been cancelled, and an executive suspension that had been issued to Mr. Troupe pending the hearing has been lifted.

Two Weeks Until Campus Clean-up

Doug Heir, an attorney who was named one of 10 outstanding men of 1988 by the JayCees and the 1987 World's All-Around Wheelchair Athlete, will play for the All-Stars.

Travel Company Helps USB Lacrosse Team

The USB lacrosse team was nearly a casualty in the Eastern Airlines' strike last month. Scheduled to play in the Sunbelt Tournament in Tampa during spring break, Omega World Travel, the university's official travel agency, originally booked the Patriots on a discounted Easter Airlines flight. At the onset of the strike, Omega's began to search for 33 discounted replacement seats to during this peak travel period.

Since no airline would accept the Eastern tickets as an exchange, Omega Travel had to purchase "high season, full fare" seats. After investigating several less expensive alternatives, including Amtrack and coach rental, the Omega Travel secured seats on Continental Airlines. In support of the team's efforts, Omega covered the difference in fares.

Faculty/Staff vs. Students in Sports Event

Rain date is May 3.

SCORES: The USB lacrosse team improved its record to 6-1 with wins over Marist (12-5) and the University of Rochester (15-7). Bob Henry had three goals against Marist while Tony Cabrera had four against Rochester.

The men's baseball team lost to Dowling 16-10 in a Knickerbocker Conference game. Mike Moccio's bases loaded single with two out in the seventh inning gave the Patriots a 4-3 win over Staten Island Saturday. The second game was postponed because of rain. The team is now 4-3 overall, 2-2 in the conference.

The women's softball team defeated Molloy 5-1 and lost to William Paterson 1-0. They are now 6-5.

The men's tennis team lost to St. John's 9-0, and had their match with Concordia suspended due to rain.

The women's track team placed sixth at the Trenton State Invitational. The men's team finished third. Jean Massillon captured the 110 meter high hurdles in a time of 14.81 seconds.

Hyman Korman, 34, of Port Jefferson died Sunday, April 9 of a heart attack. He was a graduate student in the Department of Sociology who was due to complete his dissertation this spring after nearly 10 years on the campus.

"Hyman has been a friend, colleague and teacher to countless people who will remember him for his unending kindness, generosity and good spirits," say friends in the department. "Hyman believed in scientific truth and social justice. This was reflected in his relentless pursuit of professional work that combined these commitments."

Besides his wife Sonia, he leaves behind his parents in Colombia, where he was raised. Mr. Korman earned his bachelor's degree in industrial engineering from *Universidad de Los Andes* of Bogota, Colombia in 1979 before coming to Stony Brook.
