Actress Shares Understanding

She won a Tony award for her performance in *Children of a Lesser God* on Broadway and appeared on television shows ranging from "Spenser For Hire" to "Barney Miller." She is deaf actress Phyllis Frelich, and she will present "Signs of Understanding" Tuesday, March 6 as part of Stony Brook's University Distinguished Lecture Series.

Speaking through sign language, Frelich is translated by her husband, actor Robert Steinberg, into verbal speech. She has addressed the annual conventions of the National Association of College Activities and the National Endowment of the Arts and has served as a presenter at the annual Tony Award ceremonies in New York City. Most recently, she starred in the NBC Hallmark Hall of Fame feature, "Love is Never Silent."

Frelich is also a founding member of the National Theatre for the Deaf touring company. In addition to her performances and presentations, she has been involved in repertory theatres on the West Coast.

The free presentation, co-sponsored by the Office of the Provost and *Newsday*, begins at 4:00 p.m. in the Staller Center for the Arts Recital Hall.

March Heralds Women's History Month

For the first time, Stony Brook will recognize Women's History Month this March with a campus-wide, month-long celebration. More than 75 lectures, exhibits, dramatic presentations and other programs are planned.

"The designation of March as Women's History Month was a grass roots endeavor that grew out of the Women's Movement of the 1970s," explains Connie Koppelman, Women's History Month coordinator. She and Barbara Weinstein, acting director of the Women's Studies Program, organized the Stony Brook celebration, which in the past has consisted solely of individual activities acknowledging Women's History Month. "We're delighted by the enthusiasm, cooperation and creative suggestions that have been made to make Women's History Month here a success."

The month's events are reflective of the program's overall aim to present the community with the opportunity to attend lectures, workshops, meetings and performances where women's roles, career choices and contributions are highlighted. These events include the Humanities Institute's "North American Women Directors Series"; a Sundays at Stony Brook presentation on "Women in the Long Island Economy"; and several artistic presentations and performances at the Staller Center for the Arts.

The Humanities Institute Visiting Scholar Lecture Series will sponsor the lecture "Women Filmmakers and Feminist Theory" presented by filmmaker Yvonne Rainier March 5 at 4:00 p.m. in Room E-4340 of the Frank Melville, Jr. Memorial Library. Rainier will also be on hand at Theatre Three later that evening to introduce and comment on her film, "The Man Who Envied Women," a comic story that reveals the differences between men and women. Admission to the film costs \$3; it will be shown at 8:00 p.m. at 412 Main Street, Port Jefferson.

grand piano to center stage with a little help from her friends. She sits down with fellow graduate student in music, Ruth Philips, and together they play a difficult piece of 20th-century music, Benjamin Britten's Sonata in C for Cello and Piano. They exchange smiles between movements with the easy rapport that develops after years of working together. The performers then push the piano aside and Dan Kennedy sets up three elaborate percussion stations. Flutist Tara Helen O'Connor joins them for a skillfully manipulated rendition of a George Crumb piece composed in 1985.

These are the Stony Brook Comptemporary Chamber Players, currently led by Millet and Kennedy. At their first "Six American Premieres" concert at Merkin Hall in New York City two years ago, 28 musicians performed over the course of a "splendid and well-managed." At their second Merkin Hall concert in last year the *Times* found them "a remarkably welltrained ensemble."

They will perform several more concerts this spring, beginning March 7. The season continues with shows on on March 21, April 4, and April 29, when the group will present their third annual "Six American Premieres" concert at Merkin Hall. The program will consist of six pieces written especially for this concert, all of which will be previewed at a concert at Stony Brook April 25.




