Dalai Lama Opens 1990-91 Distinguished Lecture Series

His Holiness Tenzin Gyatso, the 14th Dalai Lama of Tibet, spiritual leader of the people of Tibet and recipient of the 1989 Nobel Peace Prize, will make an unprecedented visit to Stony Brook Monday, Sept. 17.

While on campus, the Dalai Lama will speak on "Tibet: Past and Present" at 4:00 p.m. on the Main Stage of the Staller Center for the Arts. The lecture, part of the University Distinguished Lecture Series, is free and open to the public but those planning to attend must present a ticket. To accommodate an anticipated overflow crowd, the lecture will be broadcast in the Recital Hall and heard over loudspeakers in the Fine Arts Plaza.

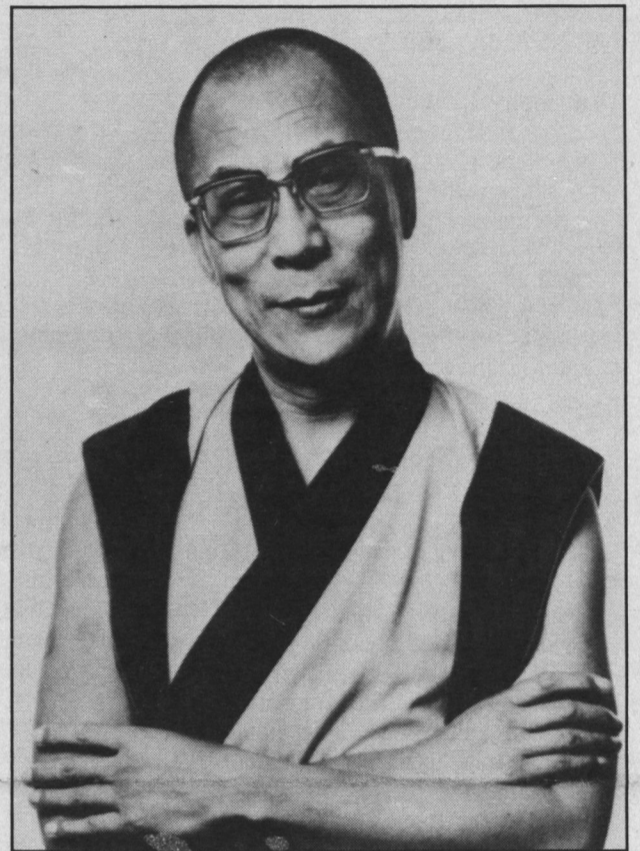
A spiritual and political leader, the Dalai Lama has gained worldwide recognition as a leading human rights and world peace advocate. He received the 1989 Nobel Peace Prize for his dedication to finding peaceful solutions

to the Tibetan liberation struggle; he accepted the award on behalf of "the oppressed everywhere."

The Dalai Lama's numerous honors and awards include the Bi-Annual Award of the Foundation for Freedom and Human Rights, the Raoul Wallenberg Congressional Human Rights Award, the Albert Schweitzer Humanitarian Award and many honorary degrees from universities around the world.

During his visit to Stony Brook, the Dalai Lama will receive an honorary degree. Frederick Salerno, chair of the State University of New York board of trustees, will confer a Doctor of Humane Letters degree on the Dalai Lama immediately before the speech.

The Two Gentlemen of Verona: A 'Wild West' Version

The Acting Company, the touring arm of the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington DC, will perform a lively version of Shakespeare's romantic comedy, *The Two Gentlemen of Verona*, on the Main Stage of the Staller Center for the Arts Saturday, Sept. 22.

The comedy, the first offering in the Staller Center's Drama Series, centers on two best friends who fall in love with the same woman. Adding to the confusion is the former girlfriend of one of the men, who disguises herself as a boy to follow her unfaithful lover and keep an eye on his escapades. In the end everyone is properly paired up, and love and friendship are reconciled.

The Acting Company's version of the play, directed by Charles Newell, is an exuberant romp set in the Old West. Broad physical comedy and live music add to the entertainment.

Imagination Comes To Life at Fantastic Voyages Exhibition

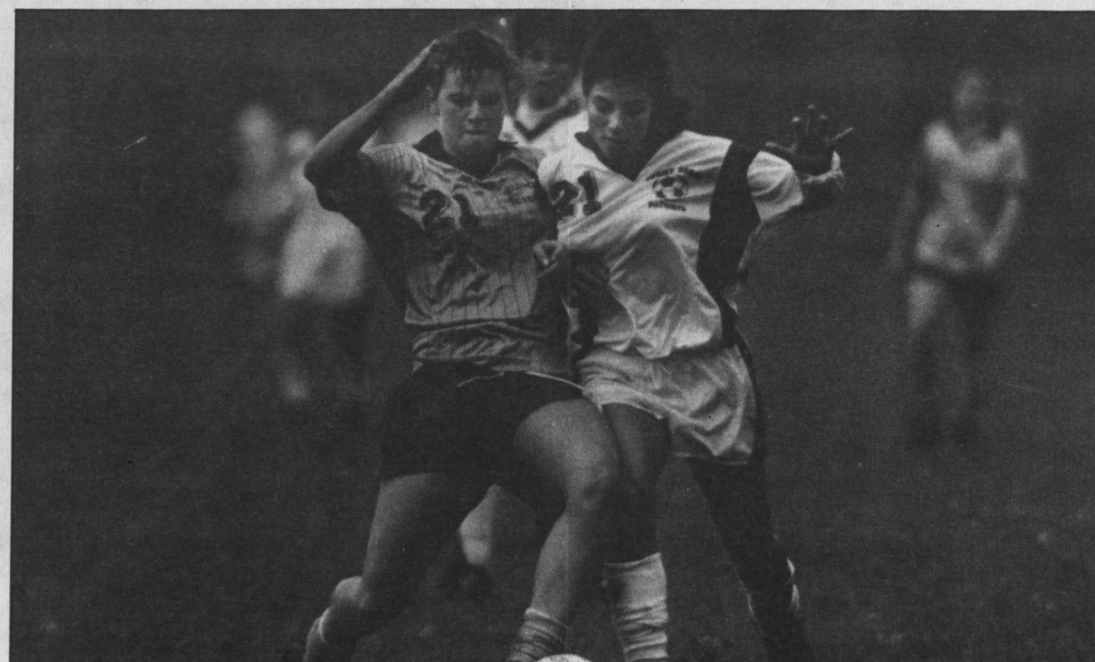

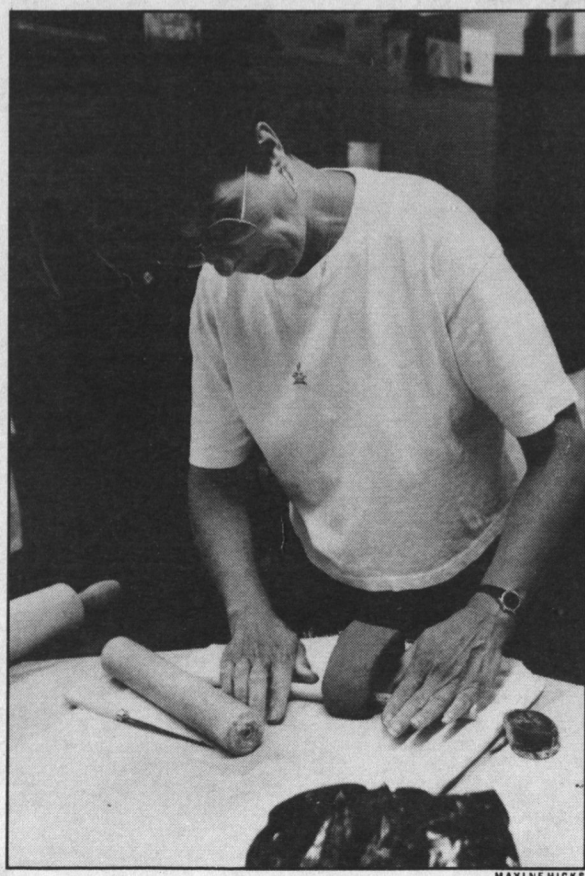

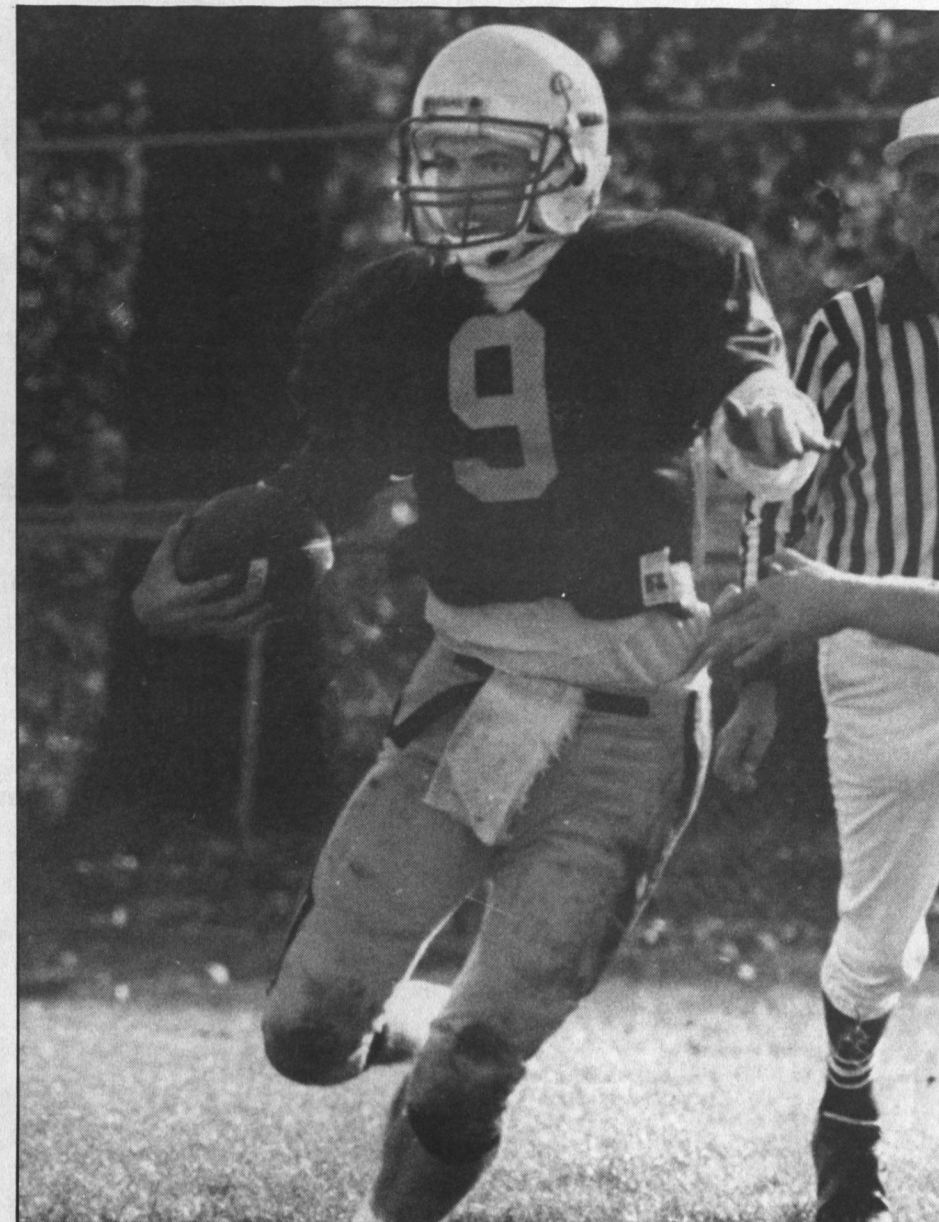
