Rich Cultural Traditions Brought to Stage in Africa Oyé!

Drums beat, dancers leap and voices ring out. This is Africa Oyé!, a troupe of African performers coming to the Staller Center for the Arts Monday, Nov. 19 at 8:00 p.m.

"Africa Oyé!" means "Long Live Africa," a cry of celebration known across the African continent. The performers hail from Zaire, Mali, Senegal, Niger and other countries. Each act features a different region and culture, complete with folk instruments, costumes and masks. As a whole, the show offers a glimpse into the heart and soul of seven African societies in a panoramic view of Africa's past, present and future.

The Percussionists of Guinea, for example, are six male drummers accompanied by three women dancers. They perform their complex rhythms on a variety of native drums including the Djembe—a chalice-shaped instrument carved from a single block of wood and covered by goat or antelope skin—and the Krim, made of hollow logs.

Africa Oyé! is part of the Staller Center's Variety Series, a new offering for the 1990-90 season. The next performance in this series will be the Imperial Bells of China on Saturday, March 2 at 8:00 p.m.

Waverly Consort Spreads the Christmas Spirit



A cast of eight singers and five instrumentalists will perform the Medieval music and pageantry. The text is a blend of religious and dramatic passages from the 11th through the 14th century, translated from French, Latin and Spanish into English. Musical instruments include reproductions of the shawm, gemshorn, citole, nun's fiddle,

harp, slide trumpet and bells.

The Waverly Consort's version of the Christmas Story premiered at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in 1980 and has become an annual Christmastime event ever since. The ensemble has toured widely throughout the United States, Europe, South America and the Far East.

An Interdisciplinary Look at Culture

An all-day conference, bringing together faculty from universities around the country for an interdisciplinary look at culture, will take place Wednesday, Nov. 28 at Stony Brook.

"Modern Culture: Social Science and Social Theory," will be held from 8:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. in the Alliance Room of Frank Melville, Jr. Memorial Library. It is sponsored by the Institute for Social Analysis.

The conference will feature wide-ranging discussion sessions on five major topics, all chaired by experts in their fields. The sessions are: "Modern Art/Culture," chaired by Jeffrey A. Halley of the University of Texas at San Antonio; "Democratizing Culture?" chaired by Paul DiMaggio of Yale University; "Modern Film and Modern Culture," chaired by Michael Schwartz, professor of sociology at Stony Brook; "Cultural Boundaries and Social Class," chaired by Michel Lamont of Princeton University; and "Cultural Theory," chaired by Jean Franco of Columbia University.






