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



Report From Israel

I first found out that I would have the opportunity to go to Israel during intersession in October. At that time I wasn't paying attention to the situation in the Middle East. I knew that Saddam Hussein's army had invaded Kuwait. I also knew that American soldiers were being sent to Saudi Arabia and perhaps most of all, I knew that gasoline prices were rapidly rising. But at that time, at least to me, war did not seem like a possibility, and I did not give this issue consideration when I thought about going to Israel.

As I became wrapped up in classes, I stopped thinking about Israel until late November when I had to make my decision. By this time, the Middle East situation had become a conflict and Bush had set his first deadline for Iraq to pull out of Kuwait. The television news was devoting less time to Donald Trump and more time to the conflict. (This was an obvious sign of the seriousness of the conflict).

All along, I knew that I wanted to go to Israel. I did not consider that Israel might be dangerous, although I was almost alone in this attitude. I made my plans to go, but did, however, make certain that I would be home before the 15th of January. This was my father's idea, and it was the least I could do to please my mother

who was not happy about the trip to begin with.

As the date of departure neared, the conflict intensified and what was originally supposed to be a United Jewish Appeal mission of 180 was reduced to 77 students. In the short time that I spent in Israel I saw so many wonderful things, that it is almost too much to communicate in this article. But there is something I would like to address which is a major concern of Israel today. This concern was obvious when visiting the country, it is about support of Israel.

In the days before I left, former New York mayor Ed Koch, a strong supporter of Israel, was visiting there in an effort to boost American tourism, which had dropped nearly 80% since August. Koch, unfortunately, was hit on the head by a rock. The terrorist who threw the rock obviously knew who Koch was and also knew that his act would be newsworthy here in the States.

I referred to Jewpeople visiting ish Israel as tourism, but it is much more. Jewish diaspora support of Israel has been very strong and the enemies of Israel realize this. Israelis also realize it and are reassured by worldwide support, although Israel is capable of protecting itself. When Jews stopped going to Israel, Israelis began to question their support.
