



The following article appeared in <u>New</u> <u>York Newsday</u> on January 10, 1992 on page obscurity:

"Kuwait deported 319 men, women and children to Iraq in the past 10 days, the International Red Cross said yesterday. Jean-Philippe Lavoyer, head of the Red Cross regional headquarters in Kuwait, said 55 detainees and 104 of their dependents were taken by bus Tuesday to the border town of Abdali. A similar group of 100 detainees and 60 of their dependents -- mainly Iraqis, Jordanians and Bedouin or stateless Arabs--left December 31, he said.



Kuwait is deporting or not renewing residence permits for thousands of people perceived to be a security threat following Iraq's sevenmonth occupation of the emirate."



The trip includes round trip bus transportation from the Stony Brook campus, a professionally led tour of important Jewish sites on the Lower East Side, a tour of the Eldridge Street Synagogue, and participa-tion in its "clean and shine" project. A limited number of seats are available to students for only \$5 per person, and to faculty and staff for only \$10 per person.

The Eldridge Street Synagogue was built in 1887, and is the first house of worship in the area constructed by Jews from Eastern Europe. The synagogue has been in

continuous use since its opening more than 100 year ago, but unfortunately the deterioration of the Jewish community in the area and limited financial resources brought the building to a state of disrepair. Recent efforts, fundraising and the building's recognition as an important landmark syna-

gogue, have resulted in an ambitious restoration project. Our trip will enable us to participate in this effort and help in the preservation of a vital piece of American Jewish history.


