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
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Words From the President

Program to Focus on Responding to Missionaries

According to the organization Jews for Judaism and the Jewish Community Relations Council of New York, more than 100,000 Jews have been converted to "Hebrew-Christianity." Fundamentalist Christian denominations have allocated more than \$100 million toward a worldwide effort to convert the Jewish people. Even here at Brook, efforts Stony have been made to turn Jewish students away from Judaism and toward this "Hebrew-Christianity," with the claim that it will make them more fulfilled as Jews. Now Hillel and Chabad are giving you the opportunity to learn the facts. Noted scholar Rabbi Tovia Singer will return to

Stony Brook on the weekend of September 11 -12 to present two lectures to help you deal with this situation. On Friday evening (9/11), at Shabbat dinner, Rabbi Singer will speak on "Why Have More Jews Converted to Christianity in the Last 19 Years Than in the Last 1,900 Years? Services begin at 6:00 pm, followed by Shabbat dinner and the lecture. Then on Saturday afternoon at Shabbat lunch, Rabbi Singer will speak on "How do Missionaries Paint Jesus into the Jewish Scriptures?" Services that morning are at 9:30 am, and lunch is at 1:00 pm. Both programs are in Roth Quad Cafeteria, Kosher Dining Room and the university community is invited.

I also learned to enjoy life now, because regrets are like poison to the people that I Most importantly met.

I developed relationships with people that I will always remember and always cherish.

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You see, bagging groceries may have given me a good work schedule and decent pay, but I would not have had any of the personal growth that I had this summer. My point or perhaps one of my points is that if I were not involved in B'nai B'rith Hillel/ JACY, I would never have known that such an internship existed. Israelis Win 2 Olympic Medals - Tragedy of Munich Still Lingers

The Olympics is a spectacle presented to the world every four years. It is a gathering of hundreds of athletes coming together to compete for pride, nationalism and glory from all corners of the earth. It is the closest thing to world peace, despite its com-For petitive nature. countries, most the Olympics have brought a feeling of togetherness among competing athletes and the countries they represent. For Israel the Olympics have marked one of the most horrible episodes in its young history.

In Munich, 1972, Germany wanted to show the world that it was a different country from the Germany of 1936 when Hitler cast a dark shadow over the Berlin summer games and over the world. A few days into the 1972 Munich summer Olympics, however, terror struck when no one expected it. Eleven Israeli athletes were taken hostage in the Olympic Village and then killed Palestinian by terrorists. It was the most tragic day in Olympic history and a day that Israel and the watched world that never could forget. From that day Israel,

in the world of the Olympics, unfortunately was only remembered for this tragic event.

This summer at the 1992 summer Olympics in Barcelona, Spain, Israel again made Olympic history but with great triumph instead of great misfortune. Yael Arad, a judoist from Tel Aviv won a silver medal in the women's 134.5 pound weight class. It was Israel's first Olympic medal. Arad immediately dedicated the medal to the 11 Israeli athletes who were slain 20 years ago. Twenty four later, hours Oren Smadja, a 21 year old judoist from Beersheba won Israel's second medal, a bronze in the 156.5 pound class.


For Israel, winning these medals in the Olympics, the pinnacle of athletic accomplishment, means much more than athletic achievement. It means that Israel has something to be proud of and to show the world. It represents the end of 20 years of agony and the attainment of respect for a country which has not been receiving the respect it deserves. This year at the Olympic Games in Barcelona, the Israeli flag flew high above Barcelona, and high above the world.

Absence on Religious Holidays Protected by State Law

Provisions have been made in state law for students to be excused from all required course work and study because of absence due to religious observance. Not only that, but you must be given an <u>equivalent</u> make-up opportunity at the expense of the faculty and the institution, and you may not be made to suffer from any prejudicial effects exercising for your Any aggrieved rights. student is also given the right to maintain an action or proceeding in the supreme court of the county in which the university is located.

In effectuating the provisions of this section, it shall be the duty of the faculty and of the administrative officials of each institution of higher education to exercise the fullest measure of good faith. No adverse or prejudicial effects shall result to any because students of their availing themselves of the provisions of this section.

6. Any student who aggrieved by the is alleged failure of any faculty or administrative official to comply in good faith with the provisions of this section shall be entitled to maintain an action or proceeding in the supreme court of the

county in which such institution of higher education is located for the enforcement of his [or her] rights

under this section. 7. As used in this section, the term "institution of higher education" shall mean schools under the control of the Board of Trustees of the Statue University of New York or of the Board of High Education of the City of New York or any community college.
