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USG Senate to be Paid

The Undergraduate Student Government Senate voted last month to pay themselves for their previously volunteer position. Under the "Pay Roll Adjustment Act," senators will now receive \$60 a week. Only two senators abstained, allowing the motion to pass unanimously.

"It slid right through, people were all for it," said President Pro-tempore Robert Romano, one of the bill's drafters. He said it was only fair that senators are paid like most other USG members. "Equal pay for equal work," Romano said.

While most of the senate supported the measure, there are students who don't.

"I don't think it's a good idea for any of these people to be paid," said Matthew Willemain, the campus editor of the Stony Brook Independent, who often attends USG meetings. "You want people motivated by desire to do a good job, not money."

But many USG members believe that it is difficult to find people willing to do a good job for free.


"There's a history of senators not coming to meetings and office hours," said Treasurer Stephen Hui.

Elections Board Commissioner, Max Sequeira agreed. "Instead of having one or two senators do everything voluntarily, and in a sacrificial manner, the entire senate will be responsible to work as a team and get things done."

According to the Pay Roll Adjustment Act, senators need to perform a minimum of two office hours a week and come to the weekly two-hour senate meetings to be paid. Their pay comes out to \$15 an hour.

Previously, the only recourse available to deal with senators not fulfilling duties was impeachment. Now USG can just withold their pay.

"It creates incentives," said Hui.



There are, however, loopholes. While senators are constitutionally required to be a member of one budget subcommittee and one standing committee, there is currently no legislation that requires them to attend these meetings to receive their paycheck.

Senators are also allowed two excused absences and three proxies for senate meetings, allowing up to five weeks for a senator to be paid for only attending his or her two office hours. Essentially, this amounts to them working for \$30 an hour.

"Come to think of it, yeah it is kind of high," Hui admitted

Senator Christopher Dolley, one of the two senators who abstained from the vote on the bill, said he should have voted against it "I signed up as a volunteer and I see it as a volunteer job. This is going to cost the students over \$40,000."

The money will come out of the student activities budget, which students fund with their mandatory activity fee. The senators' salaries will account for only about two percent of the \$2.6 million budget.

Still Michael, a senior English major, was not thrilled with the bill, and characterized it as "shady."

"You have to know its going to get under people's skin when you give yourself a raise. It's one thing to give it to posterity....it's bad form."

In the U.S. Congress, the 27th Amendment requires any pay adjustments to take place during the following term-- a measure added to curb corruption

But Romano thought it was important for the new pay to take effect immediately, pointing to the necessity of keeping good senators. He said some

senators had to resign last year, including Igor Levenberg, who Romano said left for a part-time job. Levenberg could not be reached for comment.

Senator Nathan Shapiro also thought that the pay would attract more candidates for the upcoming special elections for the vacant seats in the senate. Seven senators have resigned since the beginning of the year.

Another change under the Pay Roll Adjustment Act is that now members of the judicial council and supreme court will be paid \$20 a case. Before justices were unpaid.

Romano said this will prevent justices from "sitting on cases" and require them to hear briefs in the timely manner required by the constitution.

Raises were also given to various USG members.

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Southampton Welcomed to SUNY Family

Stony Brook University took the final step on October 4 in securing what used to be Long Island University's Southampton College campus for Stony Brook's ownership and use.

University President Shirley Strum Kenny and numerous Stony Brook University, Southampton College, Stony Brook town and Southampton town officials met on the Southampton campus to reveal the new "Stony Brook Southampton" sign that graces the entrance of the newly acquired campus into the SUNY system.

"We are going to do great things," Kenny said at the gathering, referring to the campus. "And we are going to do them together."

For the past year, Stony Brook University has been leasing space on the once LIU Southampton campus that was closed down after the spring '05 semester. Stony Brook's Marine Sciences program has been holding classes on the otherwise empty campus with about 200 Stony Brook students attending. In March of this year, Stony Brook and SUNY reached an agreement with LIU that allowed Stony Brook to purchase the Southampton property for \$35 million.

"You will see in a few years a bubbling campus offering a top notch education," State Senator Ken La Valle said to the eager and happy guests at the gathering.

Congressman Tim Bishop added to that saying, "To have this


campus reborn is the best possible outcome we could have."

"This is a wonderful day for those of us who love Southampton College...who believe in the transforming power of higher education," he said.

When Southampton College closed its doors, the college suggested to the students that they transfer to CW Post, another LIU school. However, the Marine Sciences Research Center at Stony Brook offered students in Southampton's Marine Science program an alternative to CW Post. With the influx of Marine Sciences students in the fall semester of '05, Stony Brook's Marine Sciences Research Center was extended to the Southampton campus, thus allowing former Southampton students, now current Stony Brook students, to return to their former college campus for the

"This is the end of an extremely long task, an extremely long battle to keep this campus an educational facility" Fred Thiele, a New York State assemblyman, said.

A group was formed called "Save the College" whose goal was to provide support for restoration of the college and acting as a leader in the Southampton community to build up support from residents and businesses in the town. The group, together with Strum Kenny, Thiele, Bishop, LaValle and many other politicians and Stony Brook and Southampton officials, were able to keep the campus, just that: a campus. There was a fear that the



82-acre plot would be used to build "McMansions" as Kenny and others referred to the million-dollar homes on the east end in Southampton.

"Today we get to exhale," Thiele said. "We get to enjoy a great accomplishment. We'll be back here a year from now and we'll be amazed at how great this campus is." In an interview Kenny explained that admission to the Southampton campus will be through the Stony Brook administration. In other words, students interested in enroll-

ing in one of the programs offered at the Southampton campus will still apply directly to Stony Brook University.

Currently the only programs available at the campus are the Marine Sciences program and a graduate program in creative writing. In the fall of 2007, when the campus is expected to be up and running, programs in nursing and health technology will be added to the curriculum. The end result, Kenny added, is to make studies of the environment

and ecology the main curriculum at the campus.

Kenny announced the Interim Dean of Stony Brook Southampton, Martin Schoonen, a professor of geochemistry and Stony Brook's Associate Vice President for Research, who summed up what the previous speakers had all agreed on by saying, "We want to make this a first-rate campus that will be a leader for others to follow."

USG to Hold Formal Dance


"It's going to be a really nice night," said President Jean-Baptise in a telephone interview.

The catered formal will take place in one of the Student Activity Ballrooms, with an expected capacity of 200-300 people. The dress will be formal, and men will be encouraged to wear suits instead of tuxes.

"I don't want people spending money," said Jean Baptise, who will be directing the event.

While the dance will be "highly advertised" as formal, "if someone comes with jeans, there's no problem," Jean-Baptise said. "They might be in a financial situation where they can't buy pants."

Jean-Baptise said he planned to decorate tables with candles

Former VP of CBS to Head SBU Dept.

She started out as a secretary working for CBS news. At the age of 20, she had no formal training as a journalist and having just graduated a two-year, all-girls' college in Washington D.C., she came to New York. Her name is Marcy McCinnis and she is an important figure in shaping the growing School of Journalism here at Stony Brook.

McCinnis, the senior vice president of news at CBS for four years, from 2001 to 2005, overseeing the worldwide operations of the news station, spoke to a room full of students and journalism professors on September 27 at Stony Brook and shared her experiences in journalism.

Painting a picture for her audience, she described her first news reporting assignment at the Kennedy Space Center as Apollo 14 was about to launch.

"Here I am, 22 years old, standing there with my short skirt, platform shoes and long hair down to here," McCinnis said. "I couldn't have looked older than 12."

"A guy from NASA comes up to me and says, 'I'm sorry, this is a tour for the press. No dependents allowed.' And I said, 'I am the press."

"I am glad today to say, 'I am the press' and I still say it with a great deal of passion," she said.

McCinnis explained her advancement over the course of her 30-year career at CBS from secretary, to assistant producer, to associate producer, to senior producer, to London deputy bureau chief, to senior vice president of news at CBS.

Explaining her success she said, "I just learned. I learned from the best." She mentioned that about every three years she received a promotion; promotions that were all her ideas.

"This is the most competitive field you could possibly pick," she said to the crowd of journalism students. "Go for it."

She narrated her memories of stories she had covered over the years. The collapse of the Berlin Wall, the Pope's election in St. Peter's Square, Princess Diana's wedding, her death, traveling to Auschwitz, traveling through Poland with the Pope, covering Ronald Reagan's presidential campaign, seeing Nelson Mandela released

from jail in South Africa and other covered. exciting events.

Then came 9-11.

"Every single person in that newsroom had some connection to someone down there," she said. McCinnis herself was in a cab on her way to the CBS building in NYC on September 11 when she got a phone call from a friend who told her a plane had crashed into one of the Trade Center buildings.

"Terrorism was the farthest thing from my mind," she said. "I figured it was an accident."

She said her role as a leader at CBS, where people were looking to her for guidance as well as comfort, was difficult. She had to juggle her responsibility to cover the news and at the same time, keep her crew and herself sane.

"It's counter-intuitive," she said, speaking of the reaction journalists have to disasters, and in particular to 9-11. "Everyone's running away and you're running to it." This also applied to cases like Hurricane Katrina and the War in Iraq, both of which she

McCinnis, along with many other CBS employees, was asked to leave CBS after Dan Rather's scandal involving fake documents on President Bush's time served in the military. Although she had nothing to do with the story, a "changing of the guard", as McCinnis put it, came into effect and a new president and vice president, among others, were hired at CBS.

"I was hurt," she said of the firing. "I wanted to say, 'It wasn't my fault! Why should I have to go?!' but I knew it wasn't personal." In the end it opened up a door for McCinnis to help start a broadcast journalism program at Stony Brook.

McCinnis said to herself at age 26, "If I get to do more stuff then I'm going to help the people behind me." And she did.

After the firing, McCinnis began volunteering at Habitat for Humanity and at a hospital. Soon after, she decided she wanted to give back to students eager to enter the field she had so reluctantly left after 30 years.

"It was about giving back so it's not all about me," she said. Mc-Cinnis has been named the head of the Broadcast Journalism Department and announced that the first ever broadcast journalism class will be offered in the spring semester, with the pre-requisites of JRN 110 and JRN 210.

"You've picked a field that is exciting and interesting and fun...a field that I am proud to be in... a field that has a huge amount of responsibility," she said to the future (and some present) journalists.

The first level is the unregistered user. Unregistered users are tracked by their IP addresses, and can be prevented from making future posts if necessary. Registered users are one step "above," followed by registered users



The Economy:





On December 19, 1777, an ill fed and ragged Continental army of some 11,000 men went into winter quarters on the bleak hills of Valley Forge. While there, George Washington wrote, "Through the want of shoes and stockings, and the hard frozen ground, you might have tracked the army from White Marsh to Valley Forge by the blood of their feet."

Washington pitched his marquee or tent with his men and set the shivering army working like crazy to hew the trees and build huts. Which they did...900 of them in all. The encampment was laid out by General Duportail and safeguards were thrown up for a possible attack by Howe's army which was still in Philadelphia, 20 miles away. An army that was well fed and comfortable for the

winter

Further suffering of Washington's men occurred when the commissary department broke down completely, leaving the army destitute. The suffering of his men at Valley Forge was described by Washington as such, "Naked and starving as they are, we cannot enough admire the incomparable patience and fidelity of the soldiery, that they have not been ere this excited by their suffering to a general mutiny and dispersion." Before long, 3000 of the men in his camp would die from disease and exposure.

A soldier at Valley Forge once reported that he came upon his Commander-in-chief, out in the snow, alone and kneeling in silent prayer. Washington was a reverently religious man and certainly

found ample need of prayer during those dark and despairing days. Valley Forge marked the low ebb of the American Revolution. Of it, Washington once said, "No history now extant can furnish an instance of an army's suffering such uncommon hardships as ours has done, and bearing them with the same patience and fortitude...men without clothes, without blankets to lie on, without shoes, for want of which their marches might be traced by the blood from their feet, and almost as often without provisions as with them...And again, I feel superabundantly for the naked, sick and distressed soldiers, and from my soul, pity those miseries which it is neither in my power to relieve or prevent."

With the coming of spring the army began to take heart. On

May 6, 1778 news of the French Alliance was celebrated and General George Washington, whose example had held the ragged army together in its darkest hours, was wildly cheered by his troops as he rode down the line.

On June 19, 1778, Washington led his troops from Valley Forge in pursuit of General Sir Henry Clinton's British army near Philadelphia. Washington overtook the enemy, and after a long day of battle, the British were forced from the field. Final victory was to take place three years later at Yorktown, but the heroism and sacrifices of Valley Forge would stay with General Washington for the rest of his days.




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Genius. If libs are so convinced they can "talk" things out, why don't we put them on the front lines to do it?

The best example they can provide is of an attack that happened over 11 years ago. In the 11 years since that attack, there have been more Islamic based terrorist attacks and acts of violence than one can even keep track of. It is no secret that today, the number one

group that desires to kill Americans is Islamic extremists.

Let's make a conservative estimate that the likelihood of a terrorist attack in this country being purported by an Islamic group is 75 percent. If there was a 75 percent chance of rain, you would bring an umbrella. Upon bringing an umbrella, I doubt anyone would cite your bigoted weather profiling. People would deem your decision as a very logical one, had they heard

the weather report as well.

So who should we profile? Not simply men of middle-eastern descent; but rather those of the Islamic faith. There are many non-Arabic examples of Muslim violence. This includes the two snipers in Washington DC who were of African descent. This also includes the Chechnyan rebels in Russia who conducted the attack on the Moscow theater. The list could go on. There are several indications to one being of this faith. These could include but are not limited to the wearing of traditional clothing, wearing an Islamic turban or Islamic skull cap, having religiously significant first and/or last names, etc.

Even though in totality, one can still state that most Muslims are good people, this does not mean that the desire to kill is extremely isolated. The Palestinian people voted in the terror group Hamas in a popular democratic election. The people of Lebanon show overwhelming support of the ruthless terror group Hezbollah in nearly every poll. I think the satire of former Saturday Night Live star Colin Quinn sums it up best. "You can't let a few million bad apples spoil the bunch".



Doom, Gloom, and Democracy

Election season is upon us yet again. And thus, we the people of these united States are subject once more to the usual senseless pretension and demagogic rhetoric commonly associated with the electoral charade. And a charade it is. You may disagree with my assertion that there is little real choice in the national elections. And if you would like to discuss one's ability to have a submicroscopic effect on the particular ways by which we are tyrannized, then you may be on to something. But on the grand political spectrum the two major parties which now dominate the American political scene are nigh indistinguishable. The political platforms of every member of congress to whom we are now subject, with the notable exception of Ron Paul, represent some stilted amalgamation of, in short: democratic socialism, economic fascism and generally well-meaning authoritarianism.

Both sides of every major issue are statist in nature. The question is how to save Social Security, not if it should exist at all. The Welfare State must be if anything reformed, but not abolished. Whether or not we should interlope in the affairs of other nations is not questioned; only the particular nature of our intervention is under discussion. etc. etc. Of course lip service is paid to such Draconian artifacts as the Constitution and the Declaration of Independence; but these documents have long since been tossed aside as actual features of the U.S. political

Nonetheless, to vote we are told is one's sacred duty. The separation of church and state may be in vogue, but a sort of mysticism yet surrounds political society; we are ever implored to worship at the shrine of democracy. It is for all practical purposes synonymous with liberty and peace. Thus democratic government is the solution to all that which plagues less prosperous nations, even if this means war and tyranny in the meantime. But what, exactly, do I mean by 'democracy'? The term is now used so promiscuously that it seems to have lost all meaning as a term useful to political science ('liberal', being the other great etymological treachery of the American politi-

cal lexicon). The most accurate meaning historically is simply majority rule. And if this alone is the essence of 'democracy,' then any educated individual should want nothing to do with it. For the majority can certainly be as tyrannical and warlike as the minority.

Another term often used synonymously with democracy by muddled thinkers is 'self-government'. Needless to say, it appears to me that we can discharge this notion outright. Democracy in none of its semantic incarnations can be described as such. By self-government we mean, in short, one's having control over his own body and property; in other words, we mean one's not being in a position to be dominated over against his will by another. Self-government is thus synonymous with the practice of the Golden Rule: keep your hands to yourself. This is the only possible incarnation of self-government on the individual level. And I can see no correlation between any sensible meaning of the word democracy and true self-government which can be reached in some way other than mysticism or buffoonery. Majority rule is not self government. It is, plain and simple, the domination of the individual by the majority.

But we know better than to believe that simply 'majority rule' or even 'self-government' is meant when the term 'democracy' is used by our beloved politicians. Never too precise in their rhetoric are the do-gooders who now have, or seek to gain control of that particular organization which has managed to dominate over those territories, which we now call among others, the United States, Guam, Puerto Rico and the Green Zone. Indeed, anyone so masochistically inclined as to pay dutiful attention to the political class can see that democracy is used simply to describe the current structure of the United States' federal and state governments.

The U.S. is certainly not a democracy, nor was it ever intended to be one. The very word democracy appears nowhere in either the Declaration of Independence or the United States Constitution. In fact, the Founding Fathers were in large part anti-democratic. Johns Adams wrote to Thomas Jefferson in an 1814 letter, "Democracy will envy all, contend with all, endeavor to pull down all, and when by chance it happens to get

the upper hand for a short time, it will be revengeful, bloody and cruel." Jefferson, for his part, only supported majority rule which was highly localized and limited in scope; and he completely rejected it in the urban setting: "The mobs of great cities add just so much to the support of pure government as sores do to the strength of the human body." Finally, Madison once wrote that laws must be "capable of protecting the rights of property against the spirit of democracy." They all rightly saw the unfettered will of the majority to be as much of a threat to life, liberty and property as a despotic minority.

But we need only quote them if we wish to be superfluous; for the Constitution itself is evidence enough. The very nature of limited government is contradictory to true democracy; and the overarching end found in the Constitution of these united States is, contrary to what assorted fools and knaves now tell us, not democracy, but limited government. One need only read the document, and perhaps the Federalist papers to be convinced of this (incidentally, one might also wish to read the Anti-Federalist papers, for an explanation of the current, unfortunate state of the Union).

Moreover, we find that, as it was originally conceived, only one part of one branch of the government can even be considered truly republican in form. That part is of course the House of Representatives. The Senate was not originally intended to represent the people of the Union even through representatives. Rather, it was a body which represented the assorted governments of the individual states. It should be remembered that the individual states established the Union, not the people themselves. As for the Supreme Court and President, we all know of Senatorial appointments and the Electoral College; though these institutions have both become perverted and generally more democratic in character today due to the rise of political parties. The United States government as founded could be best described as an aristocratic republic. It was perhaps the best hope liberty ever had in form of a government.

Such is no longer the case, for there can be no hope for lib-

erty in government. Constitutional limits on federal power are now largely illusory; and state sovereignty was long ago swept away by the Grand Armies of the Republic. With the coming of the Federal Reserve, the government now prints fiat faux money to subsidize the massive cost of the Welfare-Warfare State, sowing in its wake inflation and business cycles; this combined with the 16th Amendment gives the federal government powers of expropriation which Louis XIV would envy. As well, the alleged system of checks and balances in operation within the federal government is apparently inadequate. Perhaps on petty issues such as federal investigations and the nuances of bills is there some functionality; but in the bigger picture, the trend is one characterized only by the political class as a whole resting ever more power from the general populace.

And what particular portion of society has control of Leviathan; that is, who really decides which individuals hold the seats of power within this government and what they legislate? Do the sincere opinions of the majority, however perverted by the political process they may end up, indeed find their way into the legislation on congress; or are the issues at hand and the terms of the debate determined instead by an elite cadre of influential party members, bureaucrats and lobbyists? I am inclined to believe the latter opinion. Is the average voter really satisfied with his representatives; does he even care? I don't deny that I can find no shortage of people who are enamored, indeed completely enthralled, by their political party or candidate. These people are always highly politicized individuals. Members of the subject class though they are, they are of the mind to govern. And one day they just might transcend the masses and enter into the political class; but for now they are simply party members. It would appear that these people's opinions are manifest fully in the platform of their party. Or is it perhaps the other way around: that the political opinions

of the party leadership are fully manifest in the faithful? Too often I find only those who's guiding principle is simply the party line. As the particulars of the platform ebb and flow, so the opinions of the rank and file follow suit. Whoever is truly determining party opinion, these satisfied voters are in my experience, limited though it may be, a small minority of the population.

In large part, voters are generally apathetic but for a few major issues. These are usually defined by the political climate and the facts of society at the time. In other words, they are defined by what the government is doing, or some condition in society which is the result of prior government activity. As such, we may consider these major issues themselves to be dictated by either the government itself or by the leadership of the major political parties and interest groups. Whichever portion of society is actually in control of the government, the fact yet remains that its potential scope is no longer limited by legal or traditional restrains. Depending on one's interpretation of the American political system, it seems we have but two possible views of the current, sad, state of affairs: tyranny of the majority, or tyranny of the minority. Which is worse? I haven't the mental faculties to discern.

The truth, though, is likely somewhere betwixt the two. A legitimate opinion of the majority must occasionally manage to climb the rungs of power and influence, finding itself at long last codified in legislation (though that legislation is almost certainly unconstitutional). But as always, legislation is subject primarily to the machinations of powerful interest groups seeking to gain power by providing their constituents with a portion of the legal plunder. It is what Adams feared when we wrote of the envy and contention of democracy. Without constitutional restraints on federal power, our union has become, as the French economist Frederic Bastiat put it "[that] great fiction through which everybody endeavors to live at the expense of everybody else."

And so election season is upon us; there are a few ways

one may look at it. You can disregard the fact that whether or not you personally cast a ballot will have no noticeable effect on the outcome of the election whatsoever, and go to the polls. In this case, I implore you to vote for the politician whom you think will be able to get the least done while in office, preferably someone who is old, infirm, and likely to be frequently hospitalized. On the other hand, you could spend that portion of your precious little time on this planet doing something more constructive, like studying or exchanging theories on television shows like Lost with your friends and acquaintances.


If you are a decent individual who is ashamed of his government and yet disillusioned with the political process, then you might seek the spend that time educating others. For in the end, this all comes down to education. It is because the general population is ignorant of both politics and economics that things are now as they are. A recent Zogby poll found that only 42% of the population was able to name the three branches of government (now allow me to do 58% of you a favor: Executive, Legislative, Judiciary). Moreover, the masses are ignorant of the political thought and values of our forefathers.

These men saw the dangers of what Jefferson called "energetic government." Through the Constitution they sought to create a system which would inhibit the rise in America of this eternal scourge of civilization. They unfortunately overestimated the ability of a written constitution to deter the State. Federalism and internal checks were not enough; for it is within the very nature of government to grow. Ink and parchment can not long endure the onslaught of those who are committed to the consolidation of power, and to the expansion of political influence over vast areas: social, economic and territorial. In hindsight it does not come as a surprise that the experiment failed; and considering that America's attempt at republicanism was the best hope liberty ever had, we may wonder whether limited government is itself the truly utopian idea.



In 1997 the New York Mets were a complete afterthought. They were in what was their 4th year of trying to rebuild while the Yankees were the defending champion. On any given night at Shea Stadium you could find thousands of empty seats, seats of which even the best in the house only cost \$18.00.

But for a group of junior high school friends, none of that mattered. We loved those guys, and we were there every week cheering, knowing that tonight would be the night that things started to turn around for us.

That summer, my friends and I got the chance to meet a lot of those players. Unlike the Mets


