# Darwin-The Carrie Bradshaw of Science\*

It was by accident that I found out about Darwin Day. As I was passing through the campus bookstore, I saw David Sloan Wilson's new book, Evolution for Everyone, and an advertisement for his upcoming lecture on campus. This lecture was part of Darwin Day, which is an international event that takes place on Charles Darwin's birthday, February 12th. Darwin Day at Stony Brook consisted of various film presentations, lectures, and information tables in the SAC.

Evolution really is for everyone, because it is easy to relate Darwin's Theory of Evolution to mundane problems and social questions. In his lecture, Wilson discussed adaptive purposes of morality, the relation between one's behavior and environment, and other topics that were meant to persuade about evolution's role outside of science. I happen to agree wholeheartedly. After taking an Anthropology course on Darwin and evolutionary theory, I have looked at relationships and the human mind in a different way. Everyone has something to learn from Darwin because his theories are applicable to many types of human behavior. For example, say you are having lunch with your female friends and they are all complaining about their pickiness. They are worried that their standards are too high to get them laid. Or maybe they just feel lonely and need a date for V-day. They don't want to be lonely, but they can't seem to control their pickiness.

Darwin has taught us that this selectivity in females is there for a reproductive reason. Women have fewer eggs than men have sperm and could be subconsciously weeding out potential males to father their children. Since females are the ones to carry a baby, they are more susceptible to being picky and less inclined to sleep with people they don't know. #### Hungarian Potato Soup

Potatoes are great because they're so easy to cook, but quite honestly it's difficult to find a way to make an interesting meal out of them. They're great baked with butter, salt and pepper, but that gets a little old after a while. The recipe that follows is an easy and delicious one dish meal that's more interesting than a baked potato and is great to eat on a cold winter night. It serves four, so if you're just making it for yourself, it's easy to reheat. You can also put it in a freezer bag and freeze it for another day. It defrosts easily in a pot over a low heat.

#### Ingredients:

- 2 lbs russet potatoes peeled
  (optional: I prefer not to peel them
  because I love the skin
  and that swhere most of the
  nutrients are) and cut into cubes
  1 tbsp olive oil
  1 white onion, chopped
- 4 cups vegetable or chicken broth (I recommend going with a no or low sodium broth since they are incredibly salty. It[]s better to add your own salt to taste.)
- 2 tbsp chopped dill 1 tbsp paprika 1 tsp hot paprika 1 tsp whole celery seeds ½ tsp salt, or to taste
- # tsp sait, or to taste
  Black pepper to taste
  1/8 tsp ground nutmeg
  1 cup fat-free milk (If you don[t
  drink cow[s milk, soy or rice m

If you want to make this a full meal and you eat meat, buy some red meat, chicken or pork, cut it into bite sized pieces and cook it in a pan off to the side. You can add it into the soup at the end. I cut up a sirloin steak and did this. It was soooo good!

- 1. Boil the potatoes in water for about 20 minutes or until soft. Drain them, mash them and set aside.
- 2. Heat the oil in a stockpot over medium heat. Add the onion and cook for five to ten minutes, or until they are soft and translucent.
- 3. Add the broth and potatoes into the pot. Stir the potatoes and break them up, but not too much. This is meant to be a chunky soup.
- 4. Add the two paprikas, dill, nutmeg, celery seeds and salt and black pepper. If you are using meat, add it to the soup now as well to let it heat through.
- 5. Pour in the milk at the very end and heat for no more than 5 minutes. Don't let the soup reach a boil. Serve!



# 1001 Types of Investors

The world of investing is one of the few arenas in which one can be successful by following a myriad of unique strategies. Like snowflakes, no two investors are ever the same- nor do they have to be to achieve success. Although different factions of investing philosophy frequently disagree with each other, reality shows that profitable investors can come from nearly all sides of the debate. The common denominator among all victorious investors is the ability to pick an investing strategy that best complements their individual personality, investing goals and risk tolerance. In this article, I will showcase the broad spectrum of investing philosophies and the successful practitioners that follow them. Fundamental Investors

Fundamental investors are so-called because they primarily pick stocks based on fundamental financial information, such as company profitability, debt load ratios and levels of free cash held by a company. A good proportion of purely fundamental investors disregard short-term stock price movements, preferring to analyze stocks from a business perspective. Fundamental investors typically hold stocks for several years and eschew the frenzied short term trading of stocks.

#### A) Value Investors

Value investors are a particularly successful breed of fundamental investors and include in their ranks such luminaries as Warren Buffett (worth \$57 billion), the world's second richest man, and Charlie Munger (worth \$2 billion), not to mention dozens of others. The crux of the value investing philosophy is the purchasing of undervalued or "bargain" stocks. A value investor looks to buy \$1 for \$.75, figuratively speaking, and does this by purchasing stocks that sell at a discount to their intrinsic value. Intrinsic value is determined by estimating a corporation's asset values, such as the value of factories, real estate, cash, investments and intellectual property. For example, a value investor may appraise a company's assets to be worth \$20 per share, while the actual stock price is trading at \$14. Very often, an undervalued stock will reach parity with its intrinsic value after some time, giving a value investor a healthy and relatively low risk profit.

#### B) Growth Stock Investors

Growth stock investors are always on the lookout for the next Microsoft. These financial sleuths only invest in companies that sport a rapid growth in earnings, sales and brand recognition. Growth stocks tend to be smaller, newer companies that are rapidly expanding their presence on the global business stage. Growth stocks tend to be relatively risk investments, but the opportunities to grow rich are astronomical. An archetypal growth investor is the muchlauded Peter Lynch, who built a fortune for himself and his investors as the manager of the Fidelity Magellan mutual fund.

#### C) Short Sellers

Short sellers are a fascinating breed of investors, to say the least. As the vultures of the financial world, they look for companies on the precipice of disaster and actually profit off of the dramatic share price declines. How is this possible? Short sellers use a strategy that is the polar opposite of buying and investing in stocks. Short sellers first borrow shares that they don't own, sell them in the open market and look to buy back at much lower prices. The difference in the sale price and the buyback price is the short seller's profit. A short seller may short a stock at \$100 and buy it back at \$20, while keeping the \$80 per share gain. Short sellers actually look forward to stock market crashes, as strange as it sounds. The infamous short seller, George Soros, has used his unusual financial acumen to earn nearly \$10 billion for himself. In one famous coup, Soros made over \$1.7 billion overnight by shorting the British financial markets!

#### 2) Technical Investors

Technical investors are the philosophical opposites of fundamental investors. These investors are students of stock price movements, while giving little credence to the value of fundamental financial information. Many technical investors believe that fundamental information is virtually useless, because it is woefully out of date by the time investors have access to it. Consequently, technical analysts posit that stock prices contain all known and useful information that is necessary to make profitable investment decisions.

#### A)Day Traders

Day traders are the A.D.D/A.D.H.D-afflicted types of

the financial world. These speculators sit in front of computer screens all day, while seeking to exploit minute stock price movements. Day traders rarely hold a stock for longer than one hour, and usually avoid holding a position past the market's 4:00 PM close. Some day traders can make several hundred trades in a single day, while seeking to pocket only several cents per share. If properly executed, these "mere pennies" can add up quite profitably when multiplied by thousands of shares and hundreds of trades per day.

#### B)Swing Traders

Swing traders seek profits by surfing the vagaries of week-to-week stock price fluctuations or "swings." Typically holding positions for one to several weeks, these investors are masters at analyzing recurring price patterns in stocks, many of which have wonderfully evocative names, such as the "head and shoulders pattern" and the "abandoned baby top pattern." Steven A. Cohen, who runs the extremely successful SAC hedge fund, has become a billionaire by using computer algorithms to scour the financial markets for price patterns and taking bets on them. On any given day, SAC is responsible for 1-2% of trading volume on the New York Stock Exchange.

#### C)Position Traders

Position traders are technical traders with longer term investing perspectives. Most position traders hold stocks from one to twelve months and incorporate a combination of stock price pattern analysis and some fundamental analysis. These traders can be thought of as hybrid fundamental and technical investors, taking the best aspects of each methodology. The billionaire investor, Michael Steinhardt, looks for fundamentally undervalued stocks and uses technical stock price analysis to time his actual trades.

To conclude, the investing profession allows a great degree of creativity in the development of a successful investing strategy. In my next few articles, I intend to profile each method in greater depth, so that my readers can utilize these aforementioned strategies in their own investing.

# Medical Myths Exposed

## Does drinking coffee drunk help sober you up?


Weren't you paying attention in health class?! Heh, me neither... well, maybe just a little. The quick answer is no; coffee (black, light and sweet, or any way you prepare it) will not make you any less drunk.

Although I have issues with Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) for being partly responsible in unfair changes to the drinking age, they are a reliable source of information. According to the MADD Web site, "Although (coffee) may make you feel clean and awake, nothing sobers you up but time. Coffee is a stimulant – it'll keep you awake but won't sober you up."

Bottom line is that your liver sobers you up because it breaks down the alcohol in your system and removes it from your bloodstream. Coffee doesn't have anything to do with this process and no matter how much you drink, if you have alcohol in your bloodstream, the only thing that will sober you up is time. According to MADD (and high school health, but we forgot a lot of that) the average person metabolizes about one drink per hour... so bring your pocket calculators with you when you go out drinking!

That said, coffee does have some positive effects on those who have consumed alcohol (Editor's note: this is by no means an endorsement of driving drunk). 

Huckabee's views on everything from abortion to immigration are completely conformist. The bulk of his viewpoints center on religious ideals; one look at his campaign website affirms that. And while the religious affiliation of a presidential candidate is important to many Americans, our President should focus less on the Bible and more on politics.

There is a time and a place for everything and Mc-Cain's political ideals support that notion. Some of them are founded on a more religious basis (such as his stance on overturning the verdict of Roe v. Wade), and others from a more scientific standpoint (he has strong opinions on programs such as NASA and a future mission to Mars). A review of Huckabee's stance on issues reads like a broken record, with every second phrase being, "my faith." Huckabee himself is quoted as saying, "My faith is my life - it defines me. My faith doesn't influence my decisions, it drives them." Really? I would think decisions made by people in powerful government positions completely driven by faith have proven to be a bad thing. In fact, there are certain contemporary organizations with that same line of thought - Al-Qaeda, Hamas, Taliban, and Hezbolla. These are all groups run by people who make decisions driven by faith. The person who holds the most responsibility in the free world should be willing and able to come to conclusions that aren't pigeonholed by orthodox opinion. 



## Ron Paul Republicans: The Past, Present and Future of Libertarianism in Partisan Politics

Almost immediately following the days George Washington left office, US politics morphed into a two party system. For better or worse, it is, at least for now, the system that we are stuck with.

The Democrats and Republicans have a chokehold over US party politics. Independents have been able to make successful runs in local elections, but are rarely seen in larger races. America's largest 3rd party is the Libertarian party, but they barely have a fraction of the membership of the big two.

Third parties spend most of their paltry campaign contributions trying to get ballot access. As a result, third party ideas tend to get little news coverage and public attention. This is a shame because, according to the Libertarian party, at least a quarter of the people who take their short political quiz would fit well within the Libertarian party platform or should consider themselves libertarians (small l).

So, what are these libertarians doing? Most of them are probably independents, waffling between various Democrats and Republicans trying to find some candidate that fits their 'small federal government' ideals. A lot of them probably don't even know they're libertarians, but are still indefinably uncomfortable with their current affiliation.

This year, a lot them are Republicans, and that's thanks to one 'small' politician with some big ideas.

I'm talking, of course, about Dr. Ron Paul. A 10th term Texas congressman who began his run for President fully expecting to meet virtually zero national appreciation for his ideas. And, although nobody is expecting him to sweep the nomination – he's only received at most 40 delegates to date – he has become something of a cult icon, especially among the internet-savvy youth.

Although Paul has been a Republican for his entire political career, he attracts people from all political realms who are disenchanted with the way government is currently run. Or, as the doctor would put it himself, 'Liberty is a popular idea.'

In an election where the popular word is 'change' Paul asked this question, "Well what kind of change is he [Obama] offering?" The answer is big government. Some of the Democrat's ideas include expanding federal programs to offer single provider health insurance, education, entitlements, military presence overseas etc. These are not ideas a libertarian can hold dear.

Republicanism has traditionally been a better fit for libertarians than the Democrat party. Republicans realize that expanding domestic government almost never yields positive results. Entitlement programs breed dependence and free market solutions can offer products and services far more efficiently than government can.

Republican pundits Neil Boortz and Glenn Beck call themselves libertarians and have admired many of the ideas that Ron Paul talks about. However, they are little more than 'beltway' republicans in some of the other ideas that they espouse. These are conservative ideals because they call for the reduction of federal government, and are for individual liberty.

Ron Paul is one of the few people in government that talk about monetary policy. As a scholar of economics, Paul draws attention to problems, and proposes solutions to problems little considered before him. The Federal Reserve and fiat money is unconstitutional, but Paul is the only presidential candidate that talks about this. Letting the Fed control interest rates and print money causes inflation and destabilizes the economy. "The President is commander-in-chief of the armed forces, not the economy says Paul. The idea that it's the President and the economy should be allow to control the economy, which should be determined by market forces is a direct contradiction of conservative ideals. We are a nation for and by the people, so why should we hand over control of the nation's economy to a few Fed board members, which are not beholden to or controlled by any legislative body. Nothing in US history smacks more of oligarchal rule on the federal level.

As a realistic proposal to fix this problem, Paul

suggests legalizing a federal currency backed by gold and/ or silver to be traded alongside the Federal Reserve note. Having domestic currency compete domestically will, in the free market theory, strengthen the economy, because the stronger dollar would succeed.

The modern Republican and Democrat parties are controlled by lobbyists and corporations. Ron Paul would end our current corporate welfare state, corporations where never meant to receive the tax breaks meant for private citizens. Corporations should survive on their own merit in the free market, and not be supported by the taxpayers. We call them 'free' trade agreements, but there is nothing free about them. By setting up preferred trading partners and special arrangements for certain nations, we undermine the effectiveness of competition in the free market.

While most Republicans would agree that the biggest threat facing our great nation is that of Islamic terrorism, Ron Paul Republicans would most vehemently disagree. Terrorism is a serious problem, to be sure, but not a problem we can solve by fighting wars overseas. The last major terrorist attack on US soil could have been prevent much more cheaply by defending our boarders than by a multi-billion dollar conflict that has had negligible results in neutralizing the terrorist threat.

And, while Ron Paul will never tell you we are responsible for terrorist actions, the entire Western world and the US in particular is almost certainly responsible for providing catalyst for the formation of terrorist groups.

Our history is full of imperialistic ventures in the Middle East and elsewhere. We use our military to secure oil supremacy and we have troops stationed in over 130 nations overseas. Our current military exploits in the

Middle East are running us billions of dollars in debt, without any indication that our presence will have any lasting impact on stopping terrorism or even preventing a civil war.

Having a large military empire overseas completely defies the ideals of conservatism. Republicans

say they are the

party of small government, yet they have no problem selling debt to China to fund wars and expanding our already vast military. Since when have conservatives wanted to police the world, imposing 'democracy' on everyone? George W. Bush himself won the Presidency in 2000 campaigned on a foreign policy of non-interventionism.

Liberty will only come to those who fight for it themselves. To try to use violence to grant other nations 'liberty' only risks our own freedoms, as we've seen with the passage of the PATRIOT act. To impose our version of democracy on sovereign nations is a paradox in its own right.

These libertarian ideas are also conservative ideas and they have their place in the Republican Party. Ron Paul has aired these issues, and now the public has taken note, and many of them have agreed.

Many Paul supporters call his candidacy of "Revolution," and like all good revolutions, it's going to take a few years to take route. Most Ron Paul Republicans agree that this is only the beginning of their movement.

Barry Goldwater's ideas (which are incidentally similar to Paul's; Goldwater Jr. has endorsed Paul) were not accepted by the general public outright. But 16 years later a man with a similar platform, Ronald Regan, was elected and re-elected to the Presidency and is thought of as one of our nations most successful leaders.

Similarly, Ron Paul Republicanism will most likely outlive the 72 year old congressman, who has shot down all notions of his running under a third party or independent bid for the Presidency.

And besides, Paul's version of libertarianism belongs in the Republican Party, because it represents the old guard of conservatives before the 'neocon' hijacking.

Although I don't expect the Ron Paul revolution to launch a successful Presidential bid in this election cycle, it seems to me that the mainstreaming of his ideas is inevitable. We are facing an economic recession, so Americans will be looking for a candidate who has all the right fixes at the right time.

By launching numerous and simultaneous bids for local and congressional seats, Ron Paul Republicans will slowly gain acceptance. Most likely, Paul will form a Political Action Committee, which will be supporter by the financial contributions of his thousands of followers. This money will go to support the people who share his wise platform, and help spread his logical ideas into the mainstream.

The future of libertarianism in Republican politics, and its acceptance into the mainstream, has never been brighter. The use of the internet as a vehicle for political communication has allowed supporters from across the nation, and even overseas supporters, to collaborate and structure themselves into a strong grassroots movement.

The ideas themselves are viral, and gain acceptance wherever people are disenchanted with government, which seems to be almost everywhere. However, Paul's ideas are important and valuable, but he is consistently labeled a fringe candidate by the mainstream media, as he threatens to truly rock the status quo. However, when the people truly demand change, we have the power, through our elected officials to shape our own political landscape.

There are those who claim that Paul's desire to return to a stricter interpretation Constitution is laughable, and that the Constitution is a document that made sense in the 18th century but certainly not in todays fast pace world. That is a naïve approach, because the Constitution is more than just a historical document. It is the law that insures all the inhabitants of this nation their freedoms and rights. Liberty is a timeless concept that the founding fathers wanted us to preserve. And lest we forget, the Constitution can be changed, by amending by state ratification, a way insure delocalized power away from a federal government, an idea loved by libertarians, conservatives, constitutionalists and our founding fathers.


