Railroad and ESS Lots Reopened

The asphalt has dried. The barriers have come down, and the cars have moved in. Thus did the ESS and Railroad parking lots, freshly repaved, reopen last

Monday.

The reopening of the lots expands campus parking space capacity by more than 600 cars. Workmen were scheduled to

begin work on the Tabler Quad lot this week; completion is expected soon. Construction is moving forward on the Stage XII and Old Main Entrance lots, and both are expected to be ready soon.

The Math-Physics parking lot was scheduled to be closed yesterday in order to allow workmen to begin laying a fresh layer of asphalt.

Cars Diverted

The installation of the new high temperature-hot water system, which has forced the diversion of cars traveling on the Loop road near Kelly Quad, is continuing and should be completed in the next few weeks.

Work is set to begin soon on a new Visitor's lot, which will be located north of the toll booth at the new main entrance to the University.

A great deal of roadwork and repavement of parking lots has already been completed. The Stony Brook Union parking lot and bus turn-around has been reopened. The new main entrance to the University has been completed and workmen have finished repaving the Biselector Road in front of the Fine Arts Building. The G quad lot has also undergone expansion with the opening of additional parking space for over 100 cars.

Night Time Bus Service Expanded

A new campus bus schedule providing for expanded night time service went into effect last Monday.

The recent hiring of three additional drivers has enabled the General Institutional Services Department to increase the frequency of bus service after 6 p.m., and to initiate night time service to the Stony Brook Union, according to Bill Millington, the coordinator of campus bus service.

Bus service between the South "P" parking lot and the Campus Mall

(behind Engineering building at rear of old Biology building) with stops at the South Campus will begin at 7:30 a.m. until 11:10 p.m. These buses will run at 3 minute intervals during peak hours (8:30-10 a.m., and 1:30-6 p.m.) — and 7 minute intervals during the off hours. After 7 p.m., buses will operate at 15 minute intervals.

Dormitory Stops

Bus service between the rear of the Stony Brook Union (at the bus turn-around) and the Campus Mall,

with stops at the dorms, will run from 8:30 a.m. until 11:10 p.m. at 20 minute intervals. The layout of this interior route enables buses to stop at the L.I. Railroad and the new North "P" parking lot every 10 minutes.

There will be no further bus service along the bi-sector road, which has been restricted to handicapped persons and trucks. THESE BUS ROUTES WILL SUPERCEDE ALL PREVIOUS ROUTES. For further information please call 6-5904, and ask for Bill Millington.

Maternity Care Benefits Increased

As a result of agreements reached between the State of New York and various employee organizations, maternity benefits for deliveries occurring on and after July 1, 1974 have been

increased for all employees with State appointments. Research personnel are not eligible. The changes are as follows:

The *Blue Cross* Allowance toward hospital charges for normal delivery is increased from \$225 to \$250. The *Blue Shield* Allowance toward physicians' charges for normal delivery is increased from \$175 to \$200. *GHI* has also announced the following increases in its maternity allowances:

Normal Delivery from \$175 to \$200; Caesarean Section from \$275 to \$300; Ectopic Pregnancy from \$250 to \$275.

Blue Shield has not increased payments for Caesarean Section

and Ectopic Pregnancy. The allowance is \$200 for Caesarean Section; \$175 for Ectopic Pregnancy.

The Metropolitan Life Insurance Company has advised the Office of Personnel that, as a result of a recent court decision, they will now consider claims for therapeutic services of psychologists. Claims for services of psychologists rendered on or after November 1, 1969, on behalf of enrollees will be considered if those services would have been covered had they been rendered by a physician. Until now, only psychiatric care was covered.

Metropolitan Life Insurance is currently processing those claims received on or after May 2, 1972. Those enrollees who filed claims for such services after November

1, 1969, but prior to May 2, 1972, should immediately advise Metropolitan of the name and identification number of the enrollee as well as the name of the patient and the approximate date the claim was filed.

The insurance company has notified the New York State Psychological Association that appropriate claims will be considered. The members of the Association will undoubtedly advise their patients and former patients of this determination.

Claims for services rendered before December 31, 1973 will be considered only until March 31, 1975. It is, therefore, most important that you file past claims for psychological services with the Office of Personnel promptly.

The Fellowships are open to all qualified persons of any race, creed or citizenship, single or married, who have serious interest in careers of teaching and/or administration in colleges and universities, and who plan to study for a Ph.D. in any field of study common to the undergraduate liberal arts curriculum in the United States. Applicants must be under 35 years of age at the time application papers are filed, and may not have undertaken any graduate or professional study beyond the baccalaureate. Persons must be nominated by Liaison Officers of their undergraduate institutions by November 20, 1974.

The award is for one year, and is normally renewable until completion of the degree or for a maximum total of four years of graduate study. Fellowship stipends are based on individual need, but may not exceed \$2025 for single Fellows and \$2200 for married Fellows for the academic year, plus dependency allowances for children and required tuition and fees.

Rheumatic Disease Lab Opens

The Departments of Medicine and Pathology of the Health Sciences Center's School of Medicine have announced the opening of a reference laboratory that will assist local residents afflicted with arthritis and other rheumatic diseases.

Funded by the New York Chapter of the Arthritis Foundation and the State University of New York, the laboratory will provide consultation services to Physicians in the diagnosis and management of such diseases. Dr. Leon Sokoloff, a national authority on arthritis and related diseases, and Dr. Fred Miller, both of the Department of Pathology; and Dr. Leonard Meiselas, Professor of Medicine and Associate Dean of the School of Medicine will supervise the laboratory.

Specimens will be accepted from directors of established arthritis clinics on Long Island and from hospitals after approval by the hospital's laboratory director.

"We're providing a sophisticated laboratory for the diagnosis and management of rheumatic diseases on Long Island. To my knowledge, no other area of New York State is so serviced. The laboratory is now

operable and we're making our services available to physicians and their patients," stated Dr. Meiselas who is the project director for the \$30,000 grant awarded by the Arthritis Foundation, New York

Chapter, which made this research and service activity possible.

SB Women Writers Publish First Journal

"ANONYMOUS", a journal of poetry, prose, art and photography by and about women, has just been published by the Women Writers' Workshop at Stony Brook.

The journal marks the first publishing attempt by the Workshop, a group independent project under the Interdisciplinary Program in Social Sciences at Stony Brook. Its editor chose the name "ANONYMOUS" because that unknown signature has graced literary and artistic works for thousands of centuries. According to a statement prefacing "ANONYMOUS" this nomenclature was probably penned by women who found that only by using such a title could they

"hope to see their form of art in print in a male dominated field." Sybil Lefferts, Instructor for the Workshop, hopes that this publication will encourage other groups of women to publish journals of their own.

"ANONYMOUS" was funded through contributions from members of the community and the university. It is available free of charge through the Womens Center (Stony Brook Union, Room 062), the women's section of the campus Bookstore, and the University center's Infirmary Gynecology Clinic. Off-campus, "ANONYMOUS" can be found at the Corner Bookstore on Route 25A in Stony Brook.

Access Expanded to Libraries

The library resources of 38 SUNY campuses have been made available to Stony Brook's faculty, staff and students under an "Open Access" policy recently announced by the State University Central Administration.

Upon presentation of a valid State University I.D. card, a reader will be entitled to the same privileges, including borrowing, which each library offers its own campus community.

The reader, in using another campus, accepts the same responsibilities for the care and protection of library materials, and is bound by the same requirements, as those accepted by the community on the host campus.

Privileges are available to all persons who are currently enrolled in or employed by the institutions of State University.

Members of the State University who are continuing their association with the University in the next full

semester are also eligible for open access privileges. Thus, for example, a student who is enrolled for the next semester may use a campus library near his or her home between semesters.

After registration at that campus library the reader may use the library facilities as if belonging to that campus. The reference services may be used and books borrowed, subject to the same restrictions (on periodicals or reserve material, for example) that are accepted by the host community.

Responsibilities are simply that the reader is expected to protect library materials. The reader is liable to the same charges for lost, damaged, or overdue material as those normally levied by the host campus. Notices of overdues, recalls or unremitted charges will be sent directly to the user, but the user's home campus will, however, intercede on behalf of the lending library on request. Open access privileges can be withdrawn from any user given evidence of abuse.

Procedures have been kept as simple as possible. It is not necessary to give advance notice to the library one intends to visit, but such a courtesy will enable the library to be prepared for one's visit and enable it to provide better service. In any case, it is advisable to confirm opening hours before making a journey, particularly during vacation periods.

When returning borrowed material, either to one's own or another library, one should indicate clearly the library from which the material was borrowed, and allow adequate time for mailing so that the material reaches the lending library before the item is overdue.

Services are available at all State University campuses. The Community Colleges may also participate in the system should they decide to do so. The circulation desk at participating libraries will have precise information on those community colleges which are participating in the open access system.
